

1900 estimate of 2 million. Texas has 28 percent of the total deer in the U.S. with an average of 12.3 deer per square mile. Michigan appraches Texas with a population of 650,000 deer while Sutton County alone has more deer than do 30 states combined.

The fawn crop this past spring was 72 percent, a slight drop, but the population is stablized. The fawm crop was down 7.7 percent from last year.

During the hunting season in Texas in 1968, 280,000 deer were killed, in comparison to 269,000 in 1967, 202,000 in 1966 and 220,000 in 1965.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department states that only a 10 percent harvest was killed last year and it should be as much

as 35 percent. The quail population has increased 35 percent in the past year. Only 20 out of every 100 bob white quail will be alive next spring, there is an 80 percent

turn over every year. Two years ago there were 250,-000 turkeys and at this time there are 575,000 turkeys plus polts. The turkey crop last year was 4.39 polts per hen and this year it was down with 3.73 polts

per hen.



Any compendium of advice on "what every parent should know" might comfortably have excluded the subject of drugs.

No longer is this so. Today our pill-oriented society is alarmed and confused over the growing abuse of drugs among young people

Waves of shock follow in the wave of reports of campus-wide 'pot'' or marihuana. The word, "marihuana," has, like it or not, infiltrated the Nation's playgrounds

The problem is real, not just a hobgoblin one. Drugs, such as marihuana, the amphetamines and barbiturates, LSD, and the opiates, (particularly herion) have become familiar: pot, speed, bennies, goofballs, junk, acid, and similar terms in the world of youth, whose innocence frequently blurs the distinction between being turned-on and turned-off. As the principal Federal agency responsible for stimulating research on drug abuse, the National Institute of Mental Health is vitally interested in strengthening our arsenal of knowledge and in helping to make the real facts about drugs, as known from scientific evidence rather than rumor, available to the public. In reaching the public, every member of which has a personal need to know about mind-affect-

ing drugs and their proper and improper use, newspapers are a most important medium. In our current campaign to develope and carry out, as a cooperative program with everyone

Many of the questions about drugs that young people may bring up to their parents will be found answered in this series. "Well, you drink, don't you?" a child may say.

In the first place, the use of alcoholic beverages by persons over 21 is not against the law; marihuana, LSD, and narcotic drugs are illegal.

Secondly, the immoderate use of alcohol-the "abuse" of alcohol-does nothing to recommend this as a means of escaping realities or as a way of life.

Thirdly, the acceptability of moderate social drinking assumes that adults are mature enough to make mature decisions as to their behavior. Finally there is the irrefutable

fact that the fresh young years of personality growth and development are dangerously unappropriate for any chemical means of confounding reality.

As authorities are well aware. neither laws nor knowledge of the medical facts can themselves bring about the prevention of drug abuse

It is not so much the total phenomenon of a great use of drugs in America today that bears investigation. Rather it is the misuse and abuse of drugs.

The major harm and the greatest dangers come through the improper taking of drugs, not their proper utilization.

It is toward understanding of drugs, particularly the more powerful mind-affecting compounds mentioned here, that we are campaigning. It is not to prevent the appropriate, often vital, usage of drugs, but their abuse and misuse, that medical, scientific, and educational efforts are aimed. Stanley F. Yolles, M. D.



And so the dreamers boasted that at last the Nation's capital would become the showcase for intgration in public schools.

That was 15 years ago. What's the situation now? Today 94 percent of all students enrolled in the district's public schools are Negro. What happened was that as compulsory integration was implemented the whites quietly moved into suburbs or their children enrolled in private schools.

Treat Cattle For Lice Before Winter

Lice that are on your cattle now are the ones that start the winter infestation. Since lice do not fly and do not spend any time on the ground or in the brush, treatment of lousy cattle now will kill all of the lice that are on your cattle and the cattle will stay free of lice this winter unless they come in contact with a lousy animal.

Don't wait until your cattle are rubbing the fences down before you treat for lice. Treat cattle by a thorough spraying or a good dipping now before the weather gets bad and their hair gets long. If treatment for lice is put off until cattle are noticeably infested, the cattle have been weakened and the lice are more difficult to control.

Insecticides and application rates recommended for lice control on cattle are listed in the "Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry," which is available in County Agent, Clint Langford's office.

El- vided for the mentally retarded liott, county judge, announced the Kerrville State Hospital has been designated as the state hospital to which mentally ill persons from Sutton County shall be admitted.

This new service became effective November 1, as a result of the opening of a new psychiatric service at the Kerrville hospital. The change will result in more convenient service to the mentally ill of the county. Prior to this time the mentally ill of Sutton County were treated at the state hospital in San Antonio.

The letter received by Elliott from the Kerrville State Hospital reads as follows:

The Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation plans to open the Hill Country State Center for Mental Health and Mental Retardation in the Callcott House in November 1969. The Callcott House is owned by the H. E. Butt Foundation and leased to the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation for \$1 per year.

The Center will serve the following eleven (11) counties; Mason, Llano, Menard, Gillespie, Kimble, Sutton, Edwards, Real, Kendall, Bandera and Kerr. The Center will provide psychiatric services for mental pa-






