A Bishop Looks at Life A Desperate Need

By Everett H. Jones, Retired Bishop of the Episcopal Church

Along with thousands of others all over this country I have been grieving with the Art Linkletter family as they have faced the tragic death of their daughter, Diane. Diane was the 20 year old girl who on October 3 killed herself by jumping from the kitchen window of her sixth floor apartment in San Francisco. Her father has said she did not commit suicide, but was murdered by those who sell, and condone the sale of, LSD. The girl was in a depressed state because of bad "trips" she had had from this dangerous drug.

Art Linkletter has launched a campaign to save other young people and their families from more such tragedies. He has met with President Nixon and Congressional leaders in Washington to see what stronger laws might be enacted. He plans to produce a film on drugs for educators with a grant he has received from the University of California Medical School. He has said that "Kids who've tried the drug scene and 'turned off' are the best weapons in curbing the further use of hard drugs. Teen-agers will listen to those who have tried it and found it was no good."

The soundness of this latter approach is amply proved by the success of Alcoholics Anonymous in the last thirty years. There are over half a million sick alcoholics who have found sobriety because they have asked for help and someone who had found the way out came to help them. The heart of the movement is the sharing of fellowship, concern, and support by those who have risen above compulsive drinking.

Today any person who really wants to kick the drinking habit has friends more than ready to show him the way.

There is no reason similar groups, especially composed of young people, could not be started on the same basic principles for those trying to stop the drug habit. There must be some in every community, including this community, who have gone far enough to put an ad in the paper offering to help those wanting help. (That is the way A.A. began in most areas.)

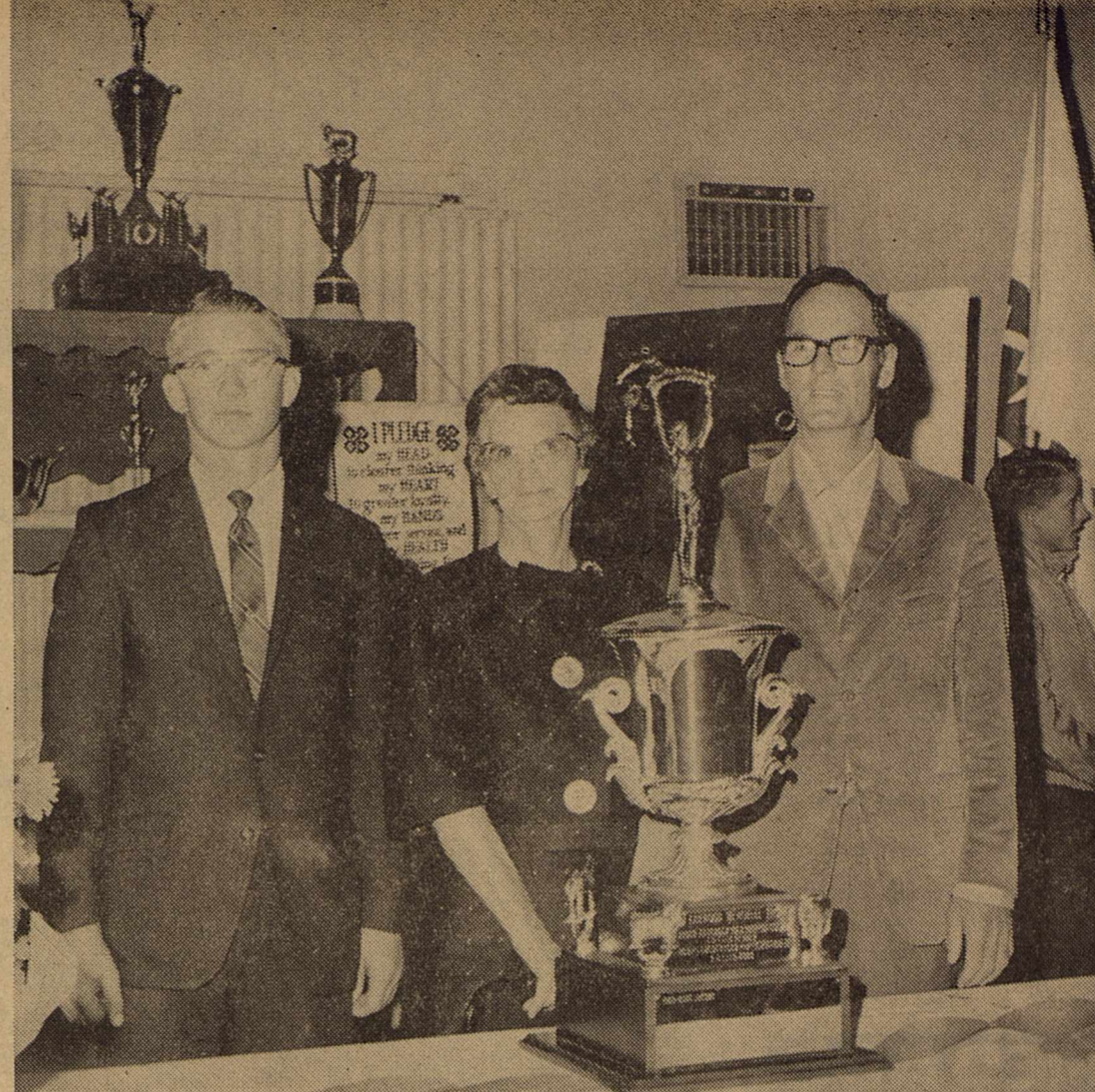

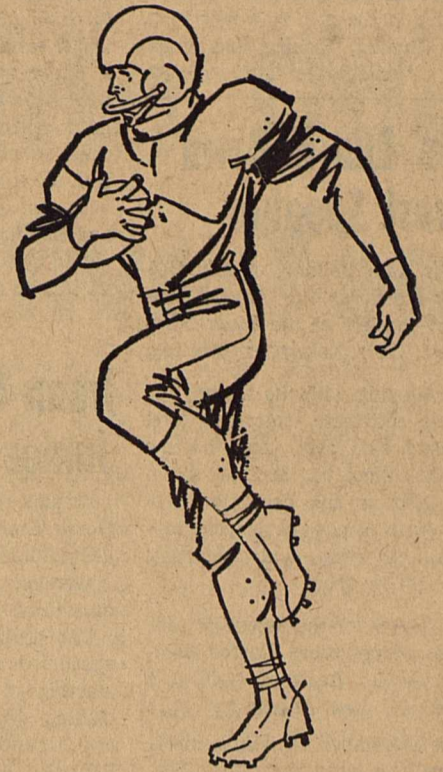

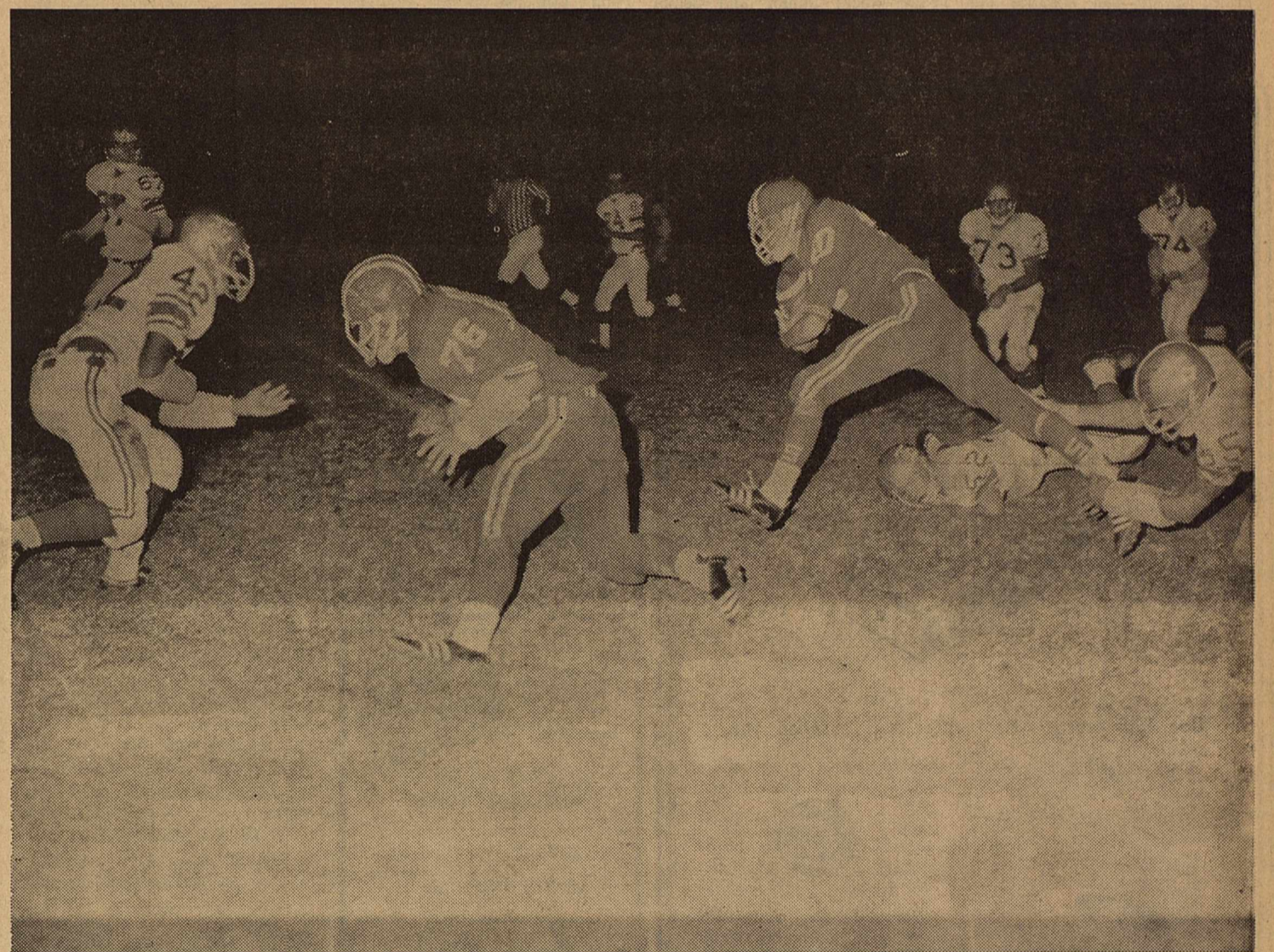

New Proclamation Quoted By County Game Warden Nolan Johnson

It shall be unlawful for any person to possess the carcass of any deer which does not have attached thereto a tag, issued to such person on his valid hunting license unless the carcass has been finally processed. It shall be unlawful to attach the bonus deer tag from a valid hunting license to a deer other than an antlerless and-or doe deer.

Nolan Johnson, Sutton county game warden, quoted this from a portion of the new Edwards Plateau Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Proclamation No. A-22 to

aid the hunter in further understanding the laws.

Additional information from the proclamation also states, it shall be unlawful to possess the carcass of any deer with all evidence of sex removed until the carcass has been finally processed. A deer tag and evidence of sex shall remain on deer carcasses while on storage and shall remain with the carcass until reaching its final destination. Final destination shall be the permanent residence of the hunter or a commercial processing facility where the deer is finally processed. Antlers with tag attached shall be accepted as evidence of sex of a buck deer. A foreleg with an antlerless deer permit and hunting license tag attached shall be accepted as a legal antlerless deer.

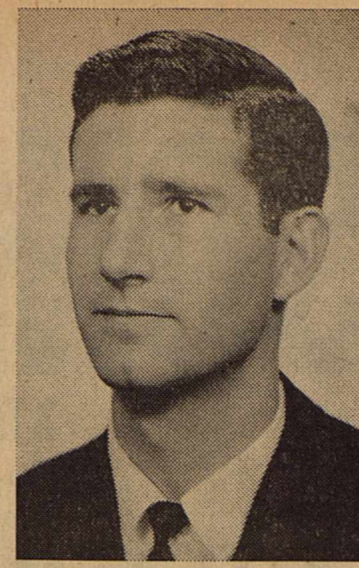

Hill County State Center Will Serve Eleven Counties In This Area

A letter from the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation to J. W. Elliott, county judge, announced the Kerrville State Hospital has been designated as the state hospital to which mentally ill persons from Sutton County shall be admitted.

This new service became effective November 1, as a result of the opening of a new psychiatric service at the Kerrville hospital. The change will result in more convenient service to the mentally ill of the county. Prior to this time the mentally ill of Sutton County were treated at the state hospital in San Antonio.

The letter received by Elliott from the Kerrville State Hospital reads as follows:

The Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation plans to open the Hill Country State Center for Mental Health and Mental Retardation in the Callcott House in November 1969. The Callcott House is owned by the H. E. Butt Foundation and leased to the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation for \$1 per year.

The Center will serve the following eleven (11) counties: Mason, Llano, Menard, Gillespie, Kimble, Sutton, Edwards, Real, Kendall, Bandera and Kerr.

The Center will provide psychiatric services for mental pa-

tients. Diagnostic testing and counseling services will be provided for the mentally retarded and adolescents with emotional problems.

An alcoholic Counselor will work with persons in the eleven county area who have drinking problems.

The Center may also serve as a meeting place for Senior Citizens' activities. Some occupational therapy will also be provided.

The goal of the Center is to treat these people locally to help the mentally ill, the mentally retarded, and the alcoholic function in their home communities and to prevent them from having to be institutionalized.

A small percentage will need in-patient care. Kerrville State Hospital is setting aside twenty six (26) beds for the in-patient care when it becomes necessary. The goal of the in-patient unit will be to treat and rehabilitate the patient as quickly as possible and then return the patient to his home community.

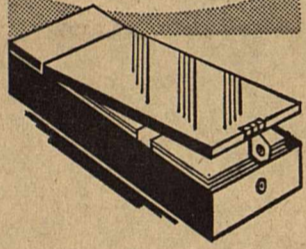

after the disaster, and up the street hogs are eating flour scattered on the street. It is interesting to note that most of the boys are wearing hats, but are barefoot.

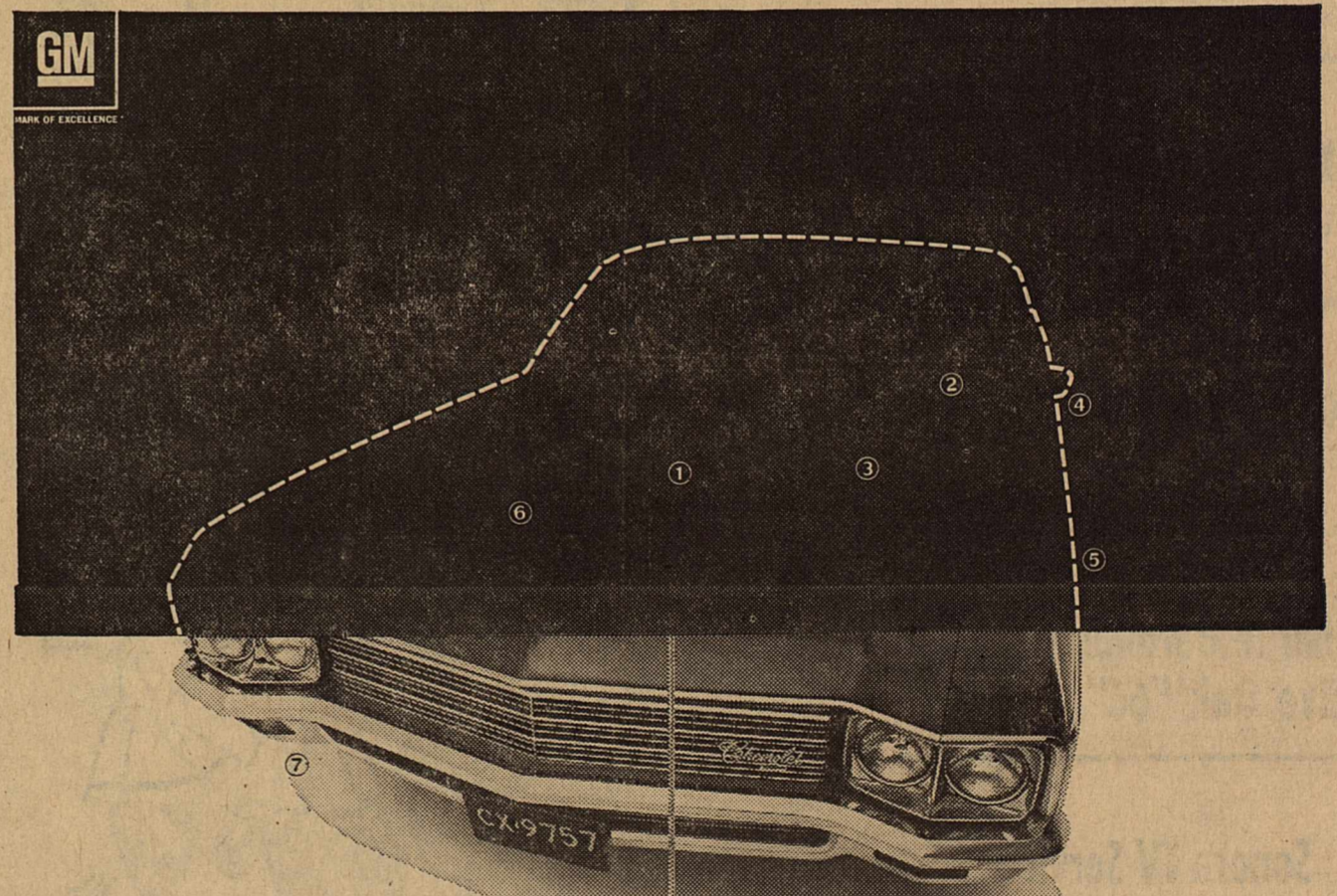
