## New Fire Truck Ready For Use

The first of the two new fire trucks will be ready for use when members of the Sonora Volunteer Fire Department are called on to fight the siege of grass fires that normally plague the county early in the spring and summer.

E. L. Harrell and his crew of county employees at the County Maintenance Warehouse have made ready the Chevrolet pumper unit that was purchased through efforts of Sutton Counties by their contributions for the much needed fire fighting equipment.

Bids on the second new truck were accepted at the February meeting of the County Commissioners. Elliott Chevrolet submitted the low bid and the truck should arrive in the near future, according to Harrell.

With the addition of the two latest checks from Mr. and Mrs. Henry Greenhill in the amount of \$50, and from Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Fields in the amount of \$100, the fire truck fund has risen to \$15,419. This surpasses the initial goal of \$15,000 that was set when plans to obtain the new trucks started.

A contribution from each rancher of \$10 per section of land owned was recommended by the Chamber of Commerce in order to reach this goal. However the many contributions received from individuals and business houses have aided in carrying this fund much higher than was expected.

In the rash of grass fires the volunteer fire department fought last spring and summer, much repair and maintenance was required to keep the old trucks in operating condition. About 95 percent of the fires in town and in the country are extinguished with these pumper units which will now be replaced.

## Lions Set Broom Sale

Members of the Downtown Lions Club and the Westside Lions Club will hold their annual broom sale March 17, starting at 12:30 p. m.

This sale sponsored by the Lions clubs offers a wide array of household items that are made by Texas blind workmen in shops or lighthouses, both non-profit organizations.

Proceeds of the sale are used for sight conservation. Last year's proceeds amounted to \$1,647.30.

Teachers and pupils will enjoy a long spring holiday as the Board of Trustees for Sonora Independent Schools set the Easter Holidays beginning Thursday, March 26, through Monday, March 30. Schools will dismiss classes Wednesday afternoon at the regular time, and will reconvene Tuesday morning.

At the meeting Tuesday, March 10, board members re-elected all teachers and coaches for employment during the 1970-71 school year, subject to assignment, with the exception of Herb Faseler, whose contract was not renewed as band director.

In conjunction with the trustee election to be held April 4, a drawing for places on the ballot was held. W. L. (Bill) Morris won the number one spot with Leopoldo Cervantes number two and L. P. Bloodworth number three on the ballot. Jo Hardgrave was designated election judge and the polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

## City Elections Set For April 4

April 4 has been set aside by the City of Sonora in order to elect a mayor and two city commissioners. Those eligible to vote in this election will cast their ballots at the City Hall from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

Those voting absentee in this election should do so at the City Hall beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the election date. Hours for voting absentee are from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.

Incumbents W. B. McMillan and Walter C. Pope III are seeking re-election to the offices of city commissioners and Norman W. Rousset is seeking re-election to the Mayor's post. The last day of filing for a place on the City Council was March 4.

## Commodity Program Supervisor Named

Robert D. (Bob) Johnson has been selected by the State Department of Public Welfare as supervisor of the Commodity Distribution Program in Sutton, Crockett and Edwards counties.

Preparation of commodity distribution centers and acquisition of required refrigeration equipment are currently in progress in Sutton and Crockett counties. Plans are also being developed in these counties to receive and process applications and to establish commodity issue schedules.

L. J. Griffin and James H. Lynch, representatives of the State Department of Public Wel-

fare, were in Sonora March 9 to assist Johnson in formulating plans to implement the program. Johnson stated that schedules for receiving applications and for issuance of the commodities will be announced later. However, he estimates that initial issue of commodities will begin early in April and made each month thereafter.

The Penick building located at 413 Concho, southeast of Frank's Body Shop, has been selected as headquarters for the distribution center. The initial plans for the food distribution in Sutton, Edwards and Crockett counties were dis-

cussed February 11, when representatives from these counties and from the USDA and Texas Department of Public Welfare met.

It was then decided Sutton County would be headquarters for the operation. Judge J. W. Elliott stated at that time that the county would have to provide a storage place for the surplus food supplies.

According to Elliott the position of distributing the surplus food pays \$438 per month and 10¢ per mile for traveling time.

## Patrick Cooper Receives Honor

Patrick D. Cooper of Bryan has been honored by Kentucky Central Life Insurance Company as one of its sales leaders for 1969.

### OPPORTUNITY... Only As Good As You Make It

(Editor's Note: State Representative Hilary B. Doran, Jr. of Del Rio, addressed the new members of the National Honor Society February 24 with the following message. Since few had the opportunity to attend the initiation, this editor would like to share the message with readers.)

I am most deeply honored to have a part in these Honor Society Installations today.

It is a particular honor to speak to you since the work of your Administrators and Faculty is tied so closely with my work in the Legislature. It is our special hope that the school which the State of Texas and your community had provided for you here has given some of you the opportunity for educational excellence, who otherwise would not have had that chance.

But I would like for you to keep one thing in mind as I speak to you today and even after you have left this hall. I would like you to remember that an opportunity is only as good as you make it. You will be graduating in the very top of your class, and if you do nothing about that education, you have completely wasted your opportunity. On the other hand, you could be on the bottom of your academic class, and, if you diligently apply the things that you have learned, you will have taken full advantage of your opportunity.

We are gathered here today in honor of your installation. For many of you this means the end of several long years of hard work.

You will soon be beginning life as a citizen of this great Nation. Your responsibility will increase, but so will your privileges.

Within a few years most of you will be married and have families. You will have jobs to support your families. Possibly some of you will lead the Community, State and Nation. Possibly some of you will be fortunate enough to serve in public office as I have done for the past few years. Others of you will be leaders in business, education or the military. You have a big job ahead and a big responsibility as a citizen of this Nation.

So today I would like to tell you a little about the Nation in which you are beginning productive, useful lives.

First, it is a Nation of laws. This is one of the things we hope you have learned in Sonora High School. Man's life, from earliest recorded history, has been governed by law of one form or another. His conduct has been prescribed by moral law and by civil law.

Hisory has illustrated that order is the first objective of any government. Without it no other goal can be attained. Without laws, and obedience of those laws, there can be no rights. Our United States of America is based on a foundation of liberty and justice for all. But for every chunk of liberty and for each piece of justice, there is also an equally large piece of responsibility.

You have all heard that you don't get something for nothing. This applies to citizenship as much as anything. You live in the greatest nation on earth. That is a privilege many persons take for granted. In truth, it is a very high priced commodity, but worth every bit of what you pay.

And do you pay the price of living in the United States? Some pay it by serving in the military. Others pay it with taxes. But each one of us pay for it by obedience to the laws of the nation.

Those who do not obey the law, who seek selfishly to make their own law, cannot be tolerated.

There is the teenager whose personal law says it is fine to seal a car and go for a joy ride... just as long as he doesn't get caught.

There is this radical political activist whose personal law says it is fine to shout obscenities

in public and throw Molotov cocktails at police if his demands have been overwhelmingly rejected by the majority.

And there is the unprincipled burglar breaking into someone's home to steal a television set... whose personal law blames the homeowner for leaving a window unlatched?

In each one of these instances, the individual becomes a law unto himself. And this just will not work in any society.

No man can be his own law. If one man has that right, then all must have it... the philosopher and the fool alike, because in our society all must be the same under the law of the land.

And that brings me to the second thing I would like to tell you about this nation of ours. Although we must all be the same under the law, this is still a nation of individualism.

The United States was built by men who had the courage to dream and then follow through and make their dreams come true. It was built by men like Thomas Jefferson, Andrew Jackson, Theodore Roosevelt, and Franklin Roosevelt, who were bold enough to overcome adversity, to not give up in the face of despair.

The United States is one of the few places on earth where you can always find a second chance... if you are big enough to take it. You who are here today should know that better than anyone.

The third thing I would like to tell you about our nation is that it is a nation of opportunity.

We may hear terrible things about our country today. We hear of poverty, racial strife, rampant crime and many other newsmaking problems. What we fail to hear are the good encouraging points.

Without a doubt we are the wealthiest nation on earth. Nowhere else do ordinary people own automobiles, television sets, and washing machines in such abundance as in our own United States.

You not only live in the greatest nation, though. You also live in the greatest state. It is a state where per capita income has been doubled in the last 17 years. It is a state of more than 11 million persons... with room for many millions more. It is a state of abundant untapped natural resources. It is a state with a low unemployment record and with a potential for unlimited job opportunities in the future.

It is a state in which you should be truly proud to live. But as I said a few minutes ago... the opportunity offered you by our state and by this great nation is only as good as you make it.

But even more than an opportunity, our nation needs young leaders to guide it through the treacherous road ahead.

We need young leaders who will believe in the ideals and the future of our nation. We need young leaders who are willing to build rather than destroy. We need young individuals who have the imagination to have a dream... and also the courage, patience and fortitude to bring the dream to reality.

Before I close I'd like to tell you about the twenty-one most important words in the world today:

- (1) I admit I made a mistake (6 most important.)
- (2.) You did a good job (5 most important)
- (3.) What is your opinion? (4 most important)
- (4.) If you please (3 most important)
- (5.) Thank you (2 most important)
- (6.) We (1 most important)

(The least most important word... I)

In closing I would like to leave you with this thought:

"Today is the first day of the rest of your life—what are you going to do with it?"

The Heart of Hills Band Festival was held March 6-7 at Brady. Fourteen bands entered the marching, concert playing and sight reading.

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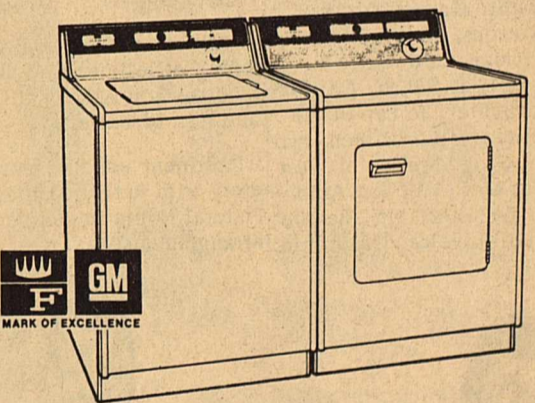


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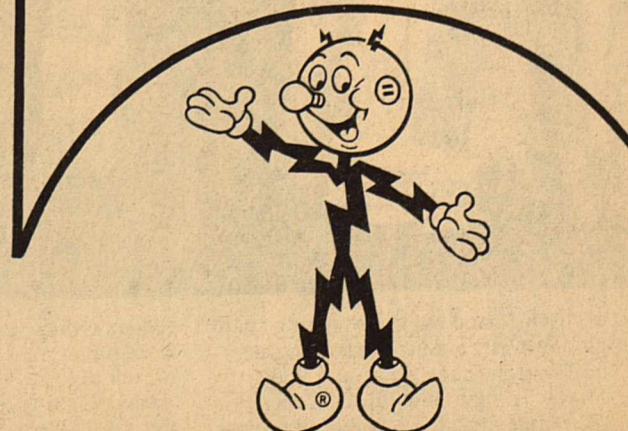

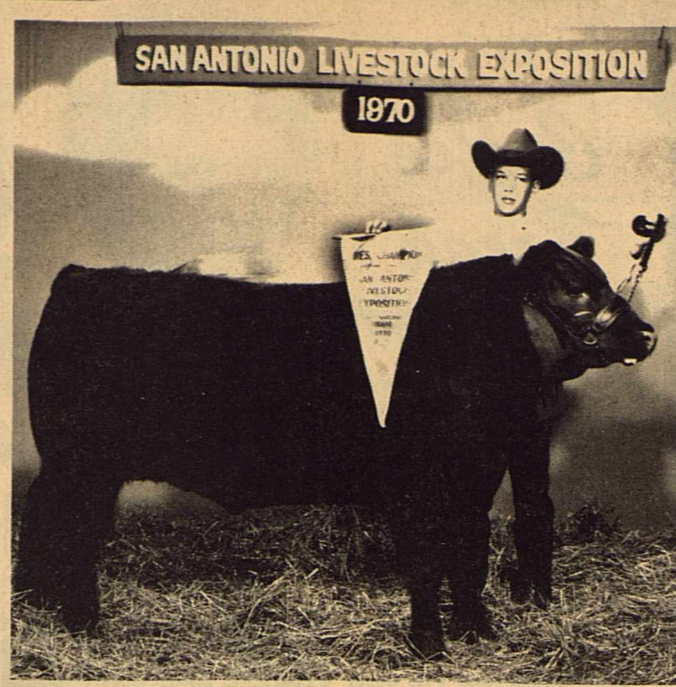

3. Clerks will each day fill lamps, clean chimneys, trim wicks, and wash the windows once a week.

5. This office will open at 7 a.m. and close at 8 p.m. daily, except on the Sabbath, on which day it will remain closed.
6. Men employees will be given an evening off each week for courting purposes, or two evenings a week if they go regularly to church.
7. Every employee should lay aside from each day a goodly sum of his earnings for his benefits during his declining years, so that he will not become a burden upon the charity of his betters.
8. Any employee who smokes Spanish cigars, uses liquor in any form, gets shaved at a barber shop, or frequents pool or public halls, will give me good reason to suspect his worth, intentions, integrity, and honesty.
9. The employees who have performed labors faithfully and without fault for a period of five years in my service, and has been thrifty and attentive to his religious duties, is looked upon by his fellowmen as a substantial and law abiding citizen, will be given an increase of 5cents per day in his pay, providing a just return in profits from the business permits it.

### Border Patrol Seeks Applicants

The U. S. Border Patrol of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has an urgent need for a large number of physically fit young men desiring a career in Federal law enforcement work. The Border Patrol is the armed, uniformed enforcement branch of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Its purpose is to detect and prevent the smuggling and the illegal entry of aliens into the United States and to apprehend those guilty of such violations.

No experience is required for these positions. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test of verbal abilities, judgment, and aptitude for learning a foreign language. Candidates who pass the written test will be called for oral interviews in the order of their standing on the list. The oral interview is designed to determine if the applicant has the personal qualities needed for the work. Candidates must also pass a rigid physical examination.

Those selected for appointment are assigned to the Border Patrol Academy for a period of intensive training in such subjects as immigration laws, Spanish, physical training and marksmanship. Trainees receive full pay while in the academy.

The entrance salary of an Immigration Patrol Inspector is \$7,639 a year. Upon satisfactory completion of their probationary period, trainees are promoted to the journeyman position of Patrol Inspector (grade GS-8, \$8,449 a year). Further advancement can be achieved through regular in-service promotions. Full information is given in announcement No. WAM-911 (Revised), which may be secured from Interagency Boards of Examiners and from many post-offices as well as any office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

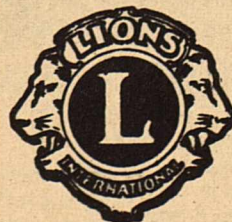
