Dreams Of Sonora Nursing Home Become Reality

Dreams for the erection of a nursing home in this area have finally become a reality. Construction will begin momentarily on the \$200,000

structure which has been in the planning stages for some time. Chairman of the Hudspeth Hospital Board, Joseph Vander-

Stucken, Monday signed the contract with the builders, Southwest Medical Centers of San Antonio. Members of the Board of Di-

rectors are pleased that no government funds are being used to construct the home. The project is being financed through bonds and from the

operation of the Hudspeth Hospital Ranch bequeathed by the late Roy Hudspeth several years ago for the building of Hudspeth Memorial Hospital.

The ultra-modern 36-bed capacity convalescent home will extend outward from the present wing on the east side of the hospital. Although it

will be a separate unit from the hospital, both will utilize the existing kitchen facilities.

Completion date is hopefully scheduled for August 9. John S. Swope, construction superintendent, representing the builders at the preparation ceremonies Tuesday, said that the specifications and plans are comparable to any of the most modern existing nursing homes throughout the Southwest.

The building committee headed by Edwin Sawyer, vice chairman of the hospital board, and members Mrs. G. H. Davis, Hillman Brown, Web El-

liott, Lea Allison and Armer Earwood are enthusiastically lending their support to what they feel has long been a much needed addition to the current local medical facilities.

Two new members, Doyle Morgan and Mrs. Robert Hardgrave, have just recently been elected to the Board of Directors at Hudspeth Hospital. Members of the board, other than those already designated, include Clayton Hamilton, secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Rector Cusenbary, Mrs. R. A. Halbert, Herbert Fields, Dan Cauthorn and Bryan Hunt, who is chairman of the ranch committee.

The Grand Jury which was scheduled to meet April 17, has been postponed until April 23, according to information obtained from the County Clerk's office.

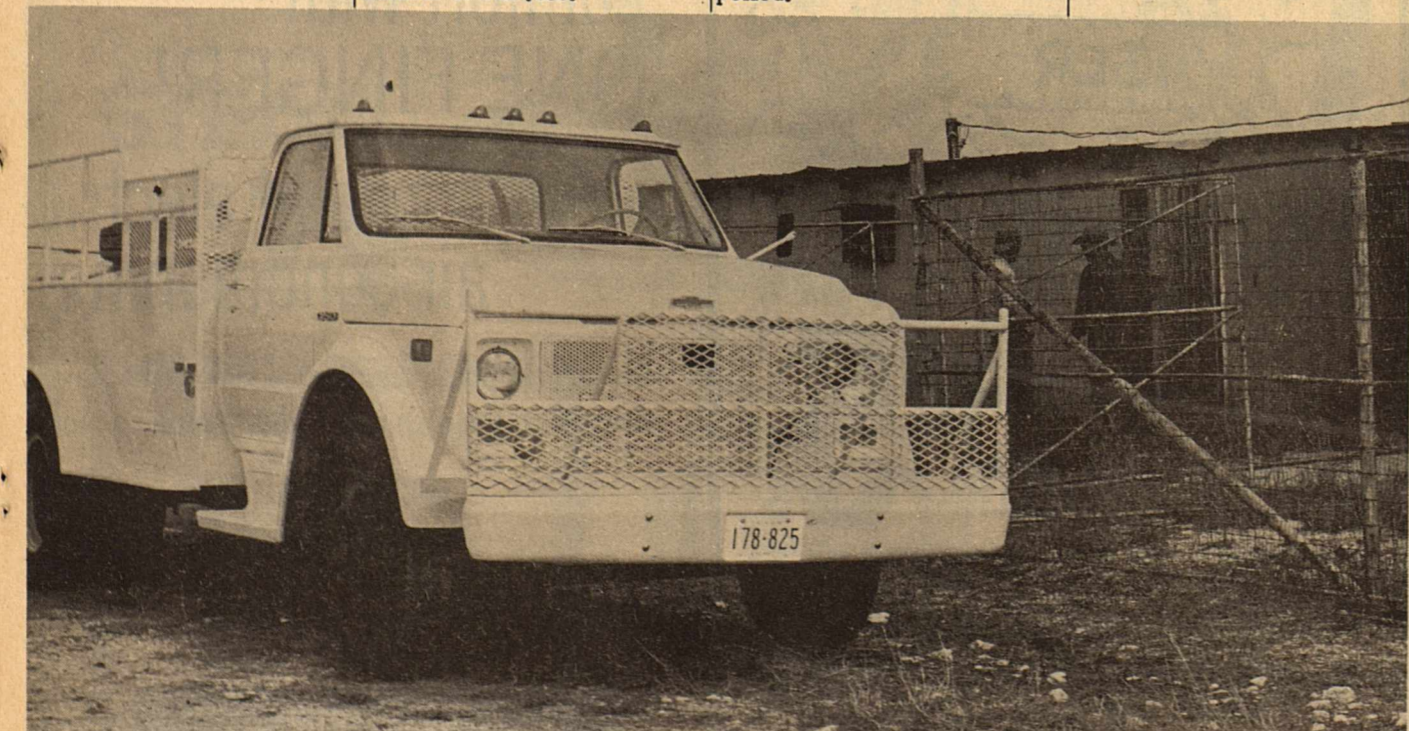
The petit jury has also been postponed for an indefinite period.

Track Team Places Third In Saturday Meet

Sonora came in third with 116 points in the Sonora Relays held Saturday at Bronco field. Eldorado took the team championship with 144 points compared to Ozona's second place score of 132. Junction came in fourth with 54 points while Christoval had 28 and Menard in last place had 17.

Ozona's Mike Haire and Eldorado's Wayne Doyle came up with the top performances of the day. Haire took a triple win while Doyle took two firsts. Haire made a sweep of the hurdles events with a 15.2 showing on the 120 highs and 41.1 in the intermediates. His third win was in the high jump with a leap of 5-10.

Doyle won the 100 in 10.1 ousting his teammate Keith Williams who had 10.4. The 220 went to Doyle in a clocking of 22.6. Again Williams was second with 23.7.

Sonora split the relay events with Eldorado. The Broncos took a mile at 3:36.3 with Eldorado topping the 440 field in 44.8.

The only record of the day was set by Chuck Womack of Ozona in the pole vault when he broke the old record of 12-6 by vaulting 12-9.

third; long jump, Mike Taylor, first with 21-1 1/2 and Jacoby third; shot put, David Wuest, second with 48-4-3/4 and discus, Wuest, second with 137-5 1/2.

Some Early Blooms In Evidence

 There are signs that spring is just around the corner—and a tremendous spring is anticipated. Good winter moisture germinated a great variety of annual weeds and grasses. The countryside should develop a riot of color by April.

Some of the early blooming plants are in evidence now. Bladderpod, or cloth-of-gold, has a lemon yellow flower, and is in full bloom now. In the mustard family, this plant will develop many small, bladder-like pods that give it the name. It is a very good sheep and goat forb.

One of the earliest native plants to bloom is the anemone. These flowers may be white or purple. Another very early plant is the wedgeleaf draba, a very small plant with a white flower. California filaree is very abundant this year, and is covered with small lavender blooms.

In the shrub department, red-buds are coming into full bloom.

The few remaining buckeye plants are also covered with red blooms. The algerita and elbow bushes are blooming now, both with yellow flowers. A few Spanish daggers are putting up their individual bouquets of large white, or cream colored blooms. Bluebonnets will again be abundant in protected areas, and should start blooming in late April. A few early bitterweed plants are beginning to bloom.

The old liveoak leaves are turning brown, and will soon be replaced by a new crop of bright green leaves. Shinoaks are budding, and will be in full leaf and bloom very shortly.

Two of the widely known harbingers of spring are holding back, apparently awaiting the last of the cold weather. The scissortail flycatcher has not been reported in the area. When the scissortails arrive for nesting, most people believe that spring is really here. The mesquite trees have also shown no sign of breaking dormancy. They are occasionally killed by late frosts, but this occurs rarely. Sonora citizens have a wonderful opportunity to observe some of the beauties of nature. The Soil Conservation Service will be more than happy to help interested citizens identify any wild flowers found.

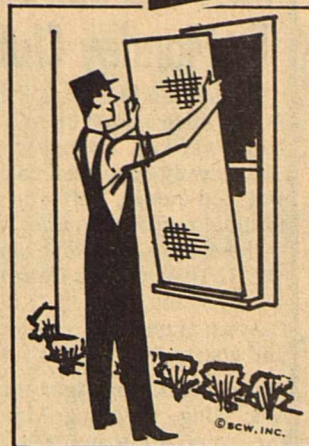
G. T. Gilligan, band director at Kermit, was chosen as Texas Band Director of the year. Directors are judged on records and outstanding performances of the year.

Sheep and Wool Clinic Scheduled

The Sonora Wool and Mohair Company will sponsor a sheep and wool clinic Wednesday, March 25 at the 4-H Center. The program will start at 10 a. m., and will be concluded at 3 p. m. according to county agent D. C. Langford.
