WHAT A MONTH it has been from a weather standpoint. Parmer County has had wind (quite a lot), warm weather (up to 83 degrees early in the month), and then some freezing weather which brought with it a late-season snowfall.

We've had an old-fashioned sandstorm where you could barely see the front of your vehicle when you were driving.

Track meets have been postponed due to snow. On Easter weekend we were running our car's air conditioner on a trip. The next weekend it was almost too cold to take a trip farther than the store for provisions.

And the month is only half over.

WE HAVE SOME young peach trees we have been hoping would raise some fruit for the past four years. This year seemed like a good bet, going into last weekend's fruitbasket turnover. One would have thought we were through with freezing temperatures, after the summerlike weather of last week.

Amazingly, even with the low temperatures of the recent weekend it appears that our trees have retained at least some of their blossoms.

THE 1980 CENSUS program has entered the "followup" stage, and workers are expected to begin knocking on doors in Parmer County by the end of the week, looking for those who have not as yet filled out a census form.

Those who have not mailed in their forms should do so immediately, if they want to save the census workers the trouble of calling on them and getting the information in person.

Filling out the census forms is required by law, much the same as filing your income tax returns. (A pause at this point would be in order, in observance of the national "day of mourning".)

In addition, the information gathered by the census will determine a number of things, such as a city's pro-rata share in such things as the revenue sharing program.

Also, the makeup of the state legislature and the national congress will be determined as a result of the census.

So, it is vital, as we have said before, that every person be counted.

If for some reason you did not receive a census form, you may call, toll free, 1-800-692-4061 and tell that office you need a form. You may need to let the telephone ring for awhile. The census folks are in their busy period.

FHA/HERO chapters will be held.

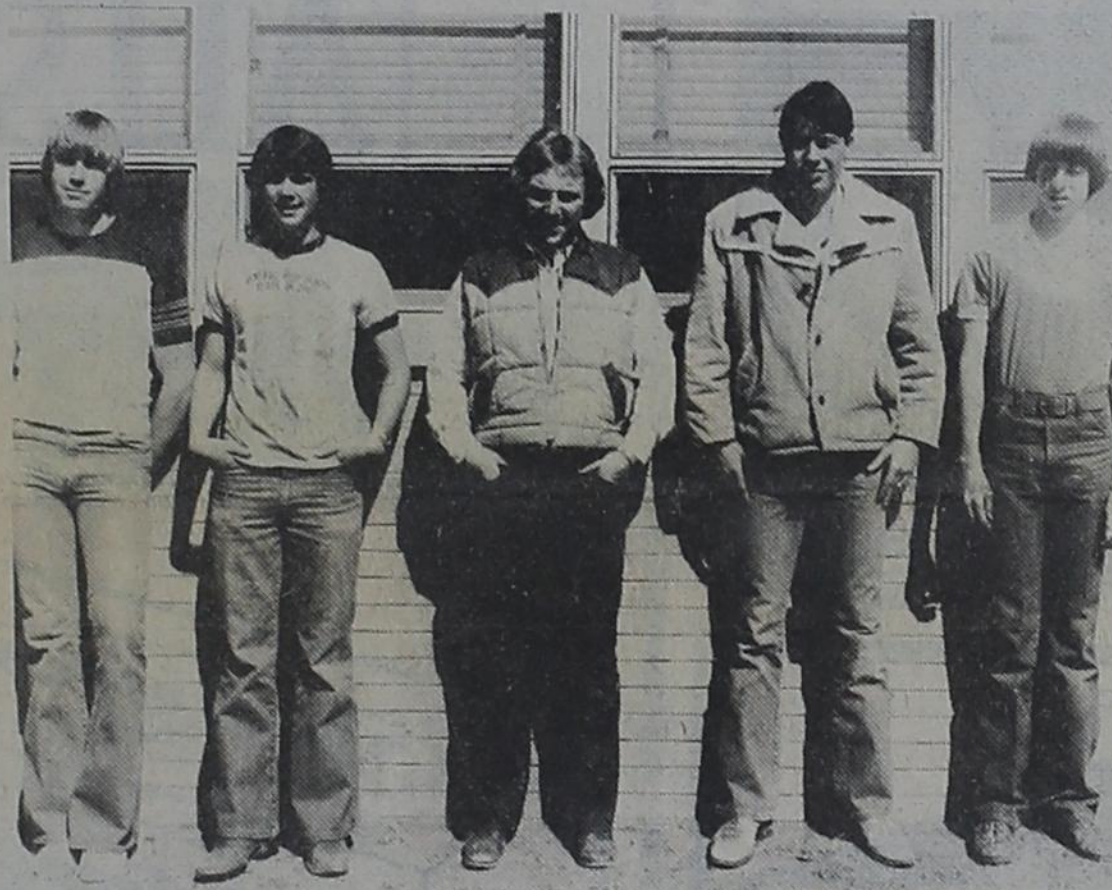
Future Homemakers who have achieved unusual accomplishments by completing all levels of encounter, a special growth and development program, will be honored at the Friday afternoon session.

City's Census Return Tops Region Average

Bovina's 1980 census mail return was probably above average for this region, according to Bill Soule, manager for the Amarillo census district office.

In a telephone interview on Monday, Soule said that it appeared that "about 600" returns had been received from Bovina. The census department figures an average of 2.8 persons per household.

Based on Soule's estimate, this would mean that approximately 1,680 Bovina residents have been enumerated so far by the 1980 census. The city's official population in 1970 was 1,458.

The district census official said that for the Amarillo district, the census returns were running 70 per cent for the mail-in portion of the enumeration drive.

The follow-up portion of the drive was to begin this week, as the Census Bureau will attempt to count all of those who did not return their forms by mail.

Using the overall percentage of forms returned to the Amarillo district census office, would indicate that the Bovina community still may have as many as 250 families who have not completed their census return, representing around 760 people, who have not yet been enumerated.

Three workers were announced this week as having been employed to help with the census in the Bovina area. They are Mary Villarreal, Arlene McCallum and Shirley Ware.

He said that some 49,000 census

forms were returned in the mail on "census day," April 1, and that the number dropped off considerably after that.

Those who have not returned their census forms are urged to do so as quickly as possible. Anyone needing a form may call the Amarillo district office, toll-free, at 1-800-692-4061.

Public Meet Slated On Buffalo Lake

Area residents are urged to attend a public information meeting to be conducted by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Tuesday, April 22 at 7 p.m. in Room 101 of the Science Building on the campus of WTSU in Canyon, concerning the future of Buffalo Lake National Wildlife Refuge near Umbarger.

F&WS has given strong indications that the dam at Buffalo Lake may be breached and the refuge area done away with, despite its popularity as a recreation area for the Panhandle.

F&WS officials will discuss alternatives concerning Buffalo Lake at Tuesday night's meeting.

The Save Buffalo Lake committee, which is composed of Panhandle residents who are fighting to save the dam and refuge is urging a strong public turnout at the Tuesday meeting.

Over 25,000 Panhandle residents have signed petitions calling for Buffalo Lake to be saved. A citizen panel from the Save Buffalo Lake Committee will be on hand Tuesday to present area views concerning the importance of the lake for water conservation, downstream flood protection, recreational uses and wildlife habitat.

Representatives from the offices of Congressmen Kent Hance and Jack Hightower, plus a number of state officials are expected to attend the meeting.

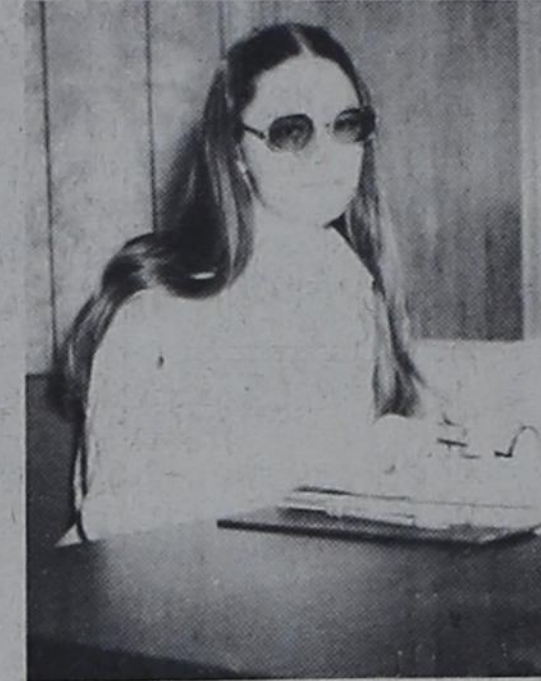
The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District hired Jacquelyn Monk as part-time secretary.

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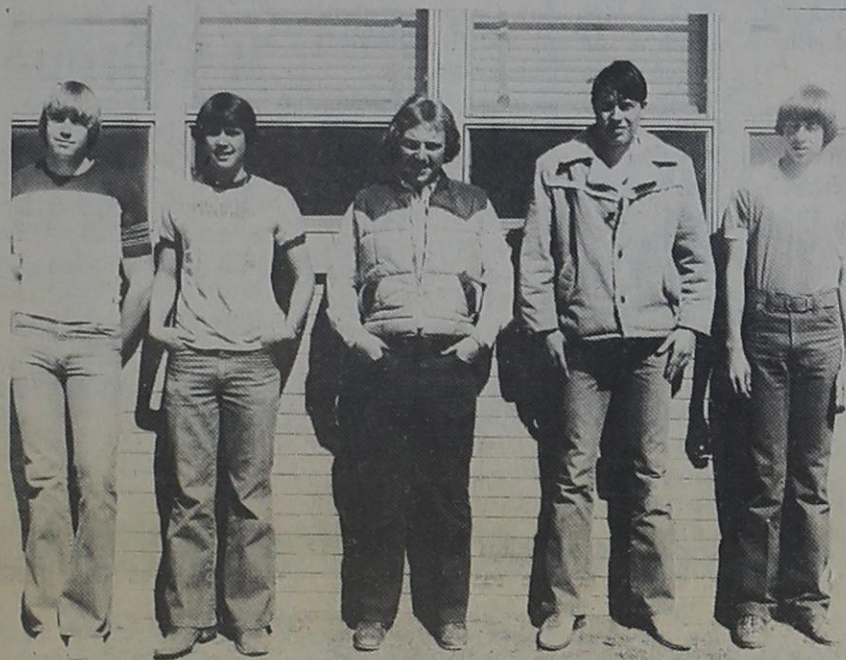

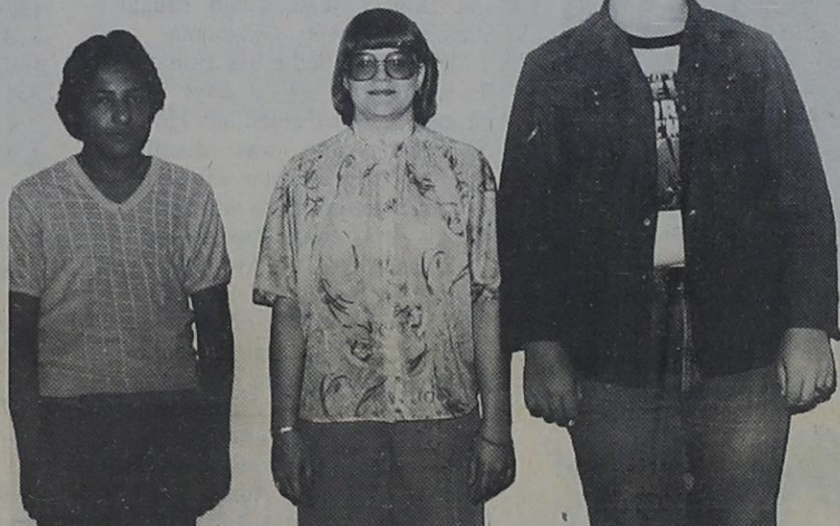
