

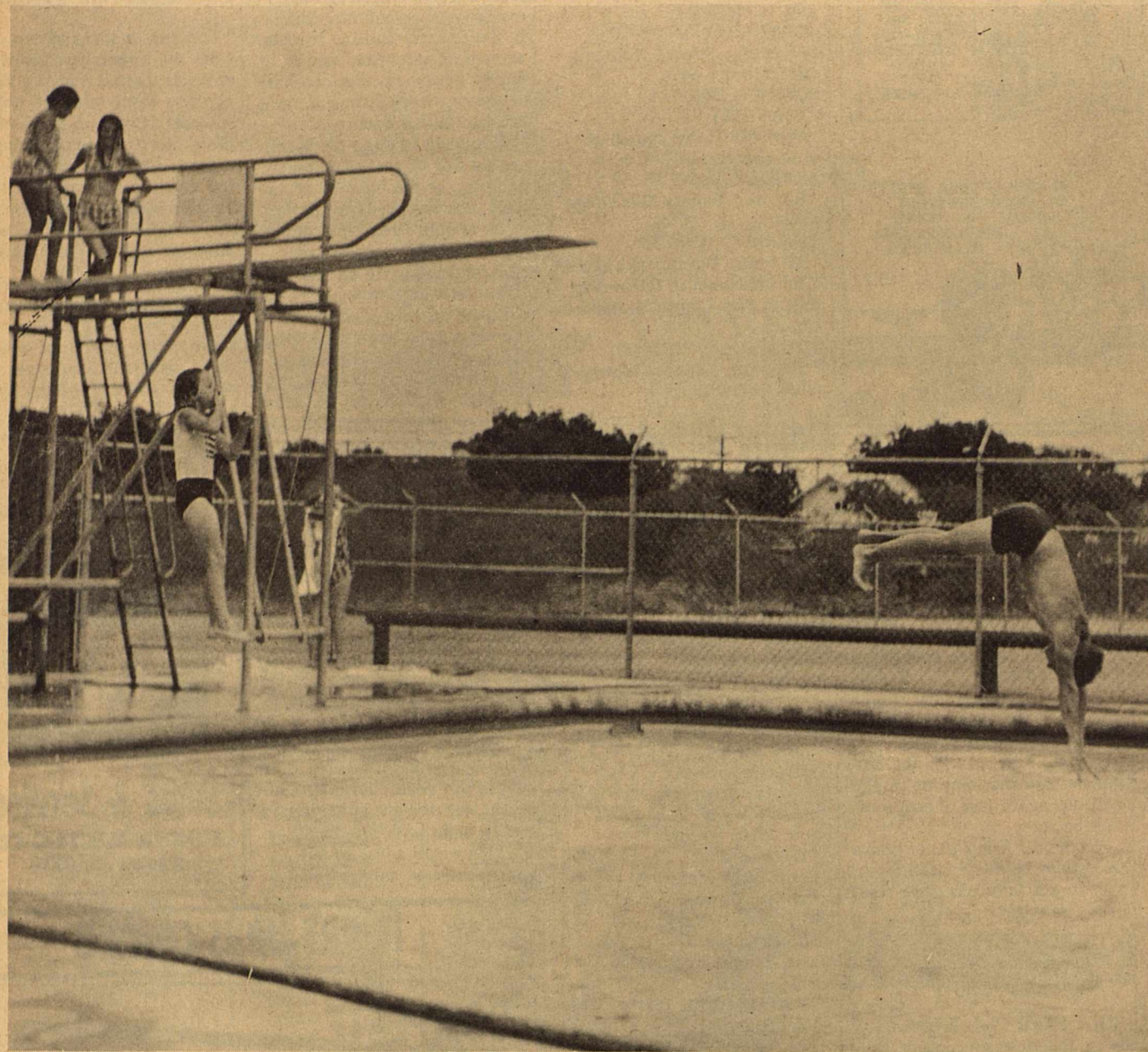

The van will be parked across the street from the Post Office for the benefit of those wishing to learn more about the program.

Construction Starts Monday On 14.3 Mile IH10 Project

Construction has begun on the 14.335 mile section of IH10 in Sutton County. The Texas Highway Department has announced that a contract has been awarded to Borsberry Construction Company, Inc. of El Paso, for the construction of grading and structures of IH10 in Sutton County. The work begins approximately 5 miles east of town and extends to 19 miles east, near the Baker Road.

The project began June 8, and is scheduled for completion by October, 1971. Flexible base and asphaltic concrete pavement will be constructed as a separate project at a later date. Contract price was \$2,686,771.86.

Lands through which the super road will pass include Clara Allison, Annella Stites, Alfred Schwiening, Lea Allison, Shannon Clarkson and Albert Schultz. R. A. McCulloch, supervising

resident engineer, said this section of IH 10 was one of the few sections where no condemnation suits were filed. This factor contributed to the speeding up of completing plans and specifications and helped expedite necessary work in calling for bids.

The barricade was set Monday by Flasher Equipment Company. Sam Borsberry, president of the company, met recently with various officials at the courthouse where key men were introduced and plans laid for the work. Louis Dovenbarger is superintendent in charge of the construction in this county and J. W. Cadwell is the Equal Employment Opportunity Officer. A field office will be maintained on the job site and an office will be secured in town in the near future.

There is now about 27½ miles of the super highway open in

the area, with a 7½ mile link from the city limits to the Caverns Road having been completed last fall. Twenty miles of the big highway was completed in June, 1969. It started at the Caverns Road in Sutton County and ended at Taylor Box Road in Crockett County. This work started December 4, 1966 and contract price was \$5,100,000 for the turn-key job.

IH10 construction in this county has involved an engineering staff of 22 people with the Texas Highway Department, and the contractor's work force on this particular project is expected to be from 50 to 75 employees during peak work load. T. R. Coker is the senior resident engineer for the project.

McCulloch, in charge of construction on this project, stated there would be no interference

with traffic on U. S. Highway 290 except at the west end of the project where flagmen will be provided to direct traffic during construction. It is expected that the work can be completed in 325 working days.

Presently plans are indefinite in regards to construction on the portion of IH10 that will pass through Sonora, McCulloch said.

As a result of the action taken by the Texas Legislature, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission is responsible for the setting of seasons, bag limits, and means and methods of taking the wildlife resources in the county.

are as follows:

1. Change the open season for deer from the second Saturday in November through January 1 to the Saturday nearest November 15 through the first Sunday in January. This would establish a standard 51 day season every year.
2. Outlaw rifle ammunition or .22 caliber jet or rocket guns in the taking or shooting of, or in attempting to take or shoot wild deer, wild elk, wild antelope, wild aoudad sheep, or wild desert big-horn sheep.
3. Open the archery season in all counties under regulatory authority which do not have an archery season now.
4. Outlaw shooting of furbearing animals from a boat on public waters.
5. Institute an any sex turkey season in Bandera, Crockett, Edwards, Gillespie, Kendall, Kerr, Kimble, McCulloch, Menard, Real, Schleicher, Sutton and Val Verde Counties in the Edwards Plateau District.
6. Change the definition of legal buck in the Southeast Regulatory Authority Area to "having a hardened antler protruding through the skin" so that it will be consistent with other regulatory counties throughout the state.
7. Change the mule deer season to run 16 consecutive days starting with the first Saturday in December.

These proposed changes are to be discussed at length by County Commissioners and are subject to approval or disapproval according to wishes of the County officials and local citizens.

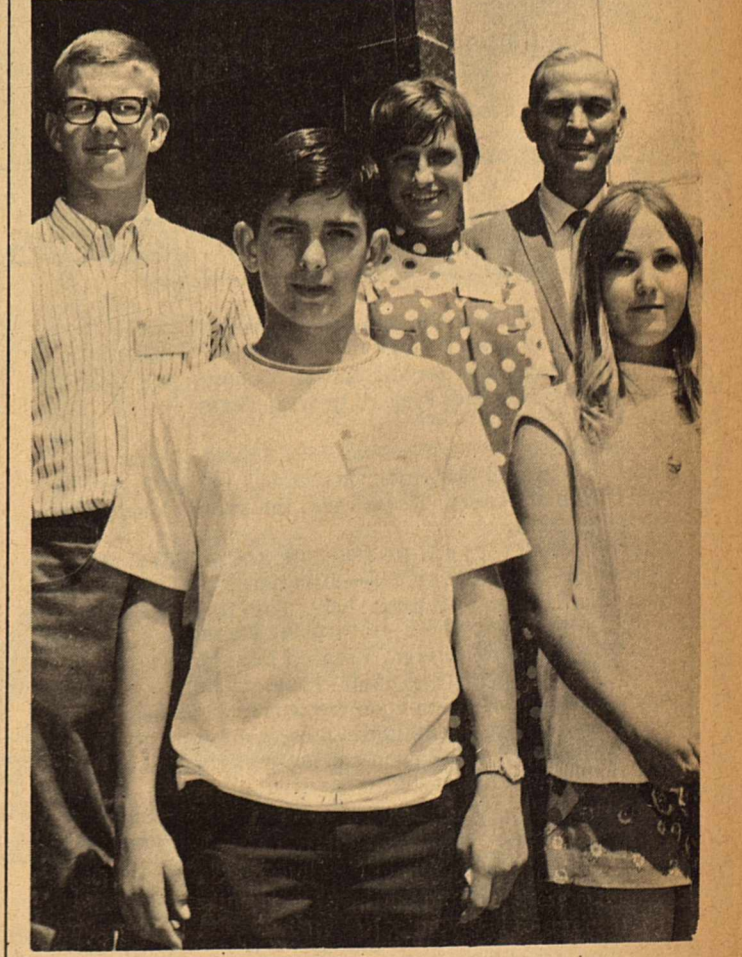

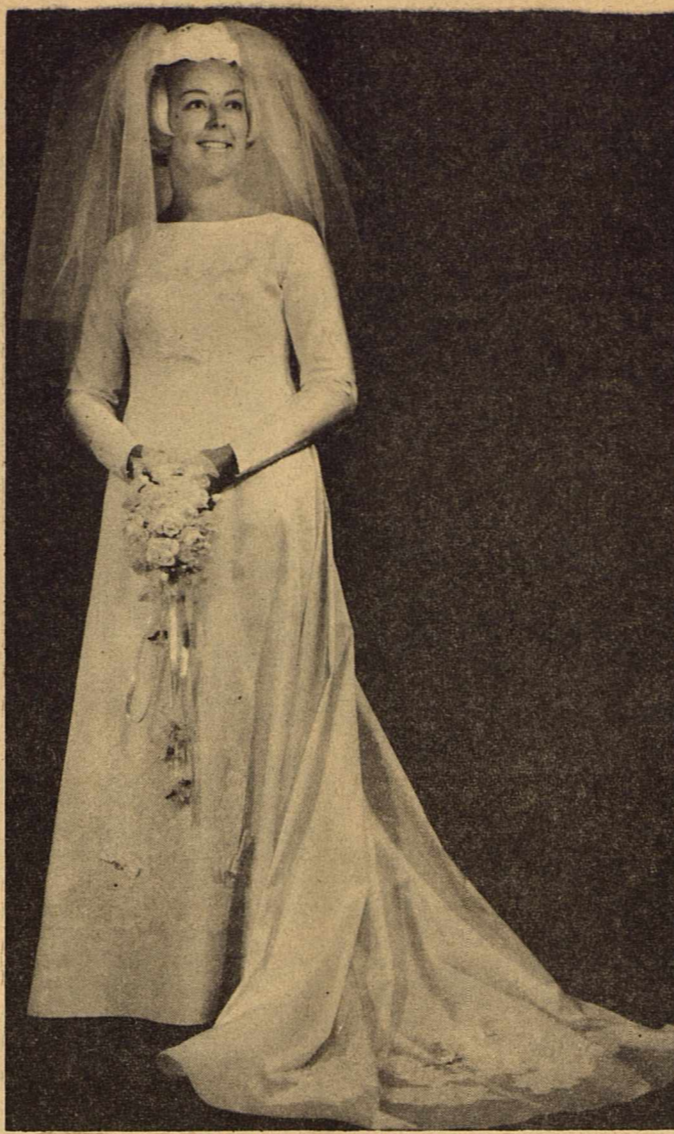
Museum News

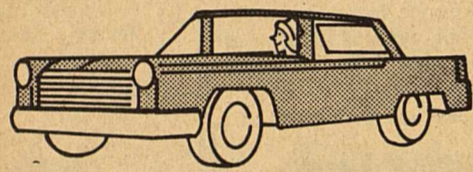

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A Bishop Looks at Life

Our Inclusive God

By Everett H. Jones
Retired Bishop of the EPISCOPAL CHURCH

Not long ago I found this prayer: "God of the city, God of the tenement and the houses of the rich, God of the subway and the night club, God of the cathedral and the streets, God of the sober and the drunk, the junkie and the stripper, the gambler and the good family man; dear God, help us see the world and its children through Your eyes, and to love accordingly."

It is so easy for us to forget the inclusiveness of God's love. Without realizing it we reduce Him to a tribal deity, or even to a protector of our own social class. It is one of the ways in which nominally religious people become enemies to true religion.

Consider our thinking about the Church. By and large we think of Church members not as those with a commission to go into the world with redemption concern as Christ's servants, but rather as members of a special group who draw apart to receive favors from God. In a real sense the Church exists not for those who are inside but for those outside. The purpose of worship is to make us aware of God in His whole creation.

Consider how we feel about our nation and our race. We give verbal assent to the universal fatherhood of God, but actually we think of God as belonging, at least primarily to our own country and our own race. But is He not also the God and Father of the Russians and the North Vietnamese?

Consider our attitude toward drug addiction, sex perverts or leaders in violence. These are the "sick" people of our generation, or those the Bible calls "lost". Jesus made it clear that he came to rescue and help such people. This was the main thrust of his ministry. He said this was the kind of love in the heart of the God He came to reveal.

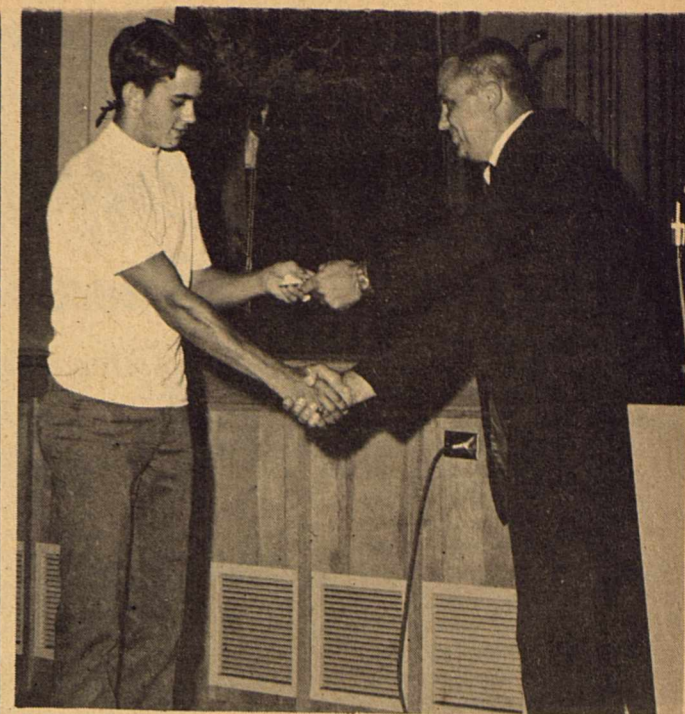

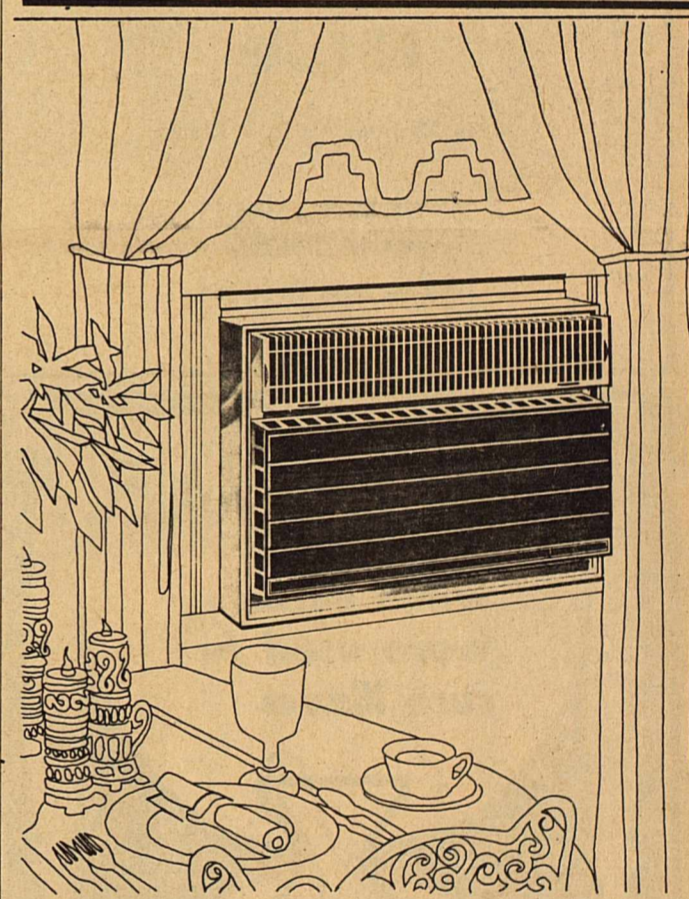

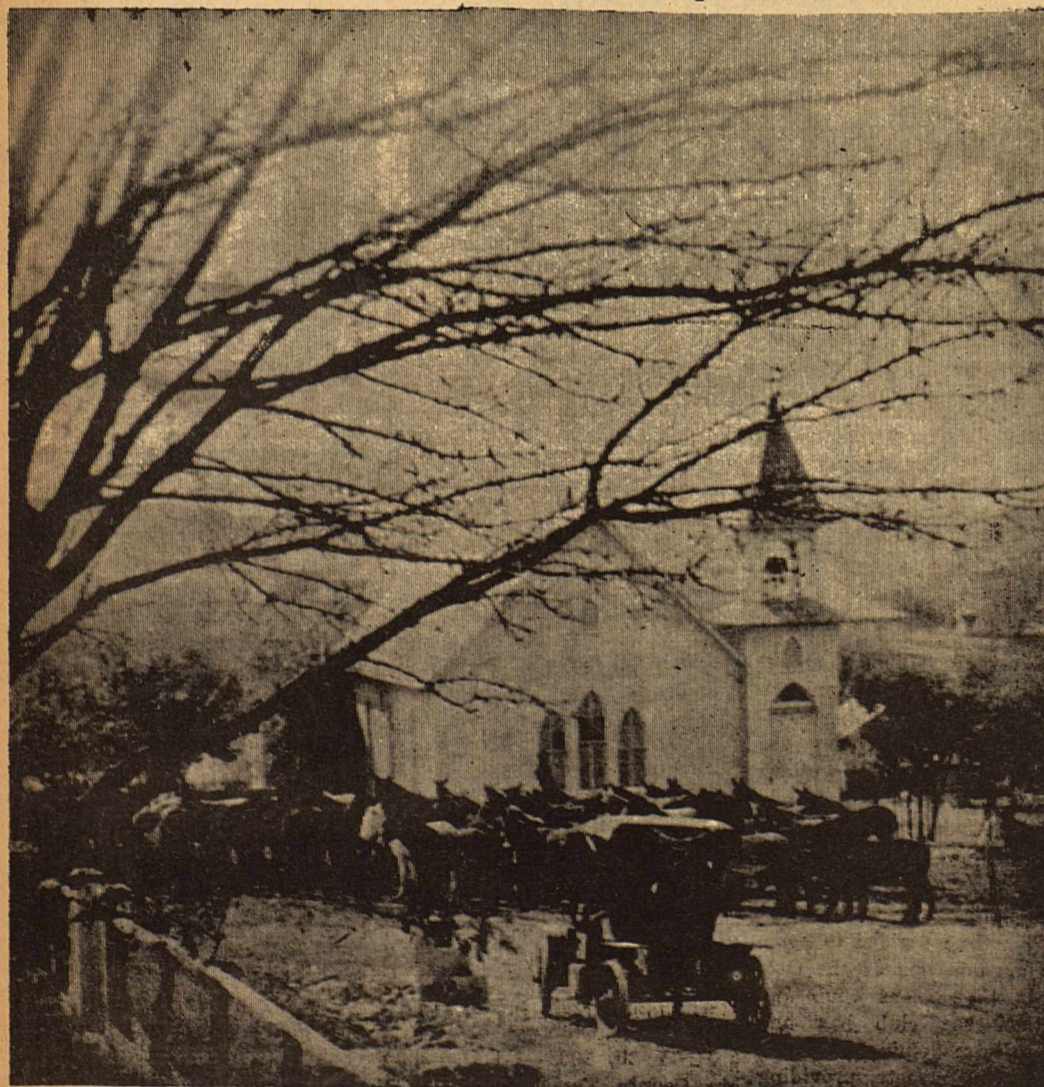
