

Are Parents To Blame For Behavior On College Campuses?

Much of the alarmed comment being voiced today about campus disorders implies that, somehow, the parents of today's crop of students are to blame for the whole regrettable mess.

Over and over we hear it said that parents send their kids off to school just to be rid of him, and that parents really don't care what happens to their children and are unconcerned about what they might get into away from home.

Such chatter is unthinking, unfair, and absolutely untrue!!

Parents send their children to colleges to get them educated. For many of them, the efforts represent a lifetime of saving, selfdenial, and scrimping-and fulfillment of a dream that they can have it better than the parents had. More affluent parents may send their children to colleges with less sacrifice, but certainly with no less desire to have them properly educated.

Who can believe that any parent, anywhere, would knowingly send a child away from home to learn about disrespect, dope, and the destruction of Democracy? Who can believe that any parents whose child falls victim to those evils is any less grieved than any of us would be?

Thousands upon thousands of serious students are educationally displaced by a militant few on our campuses and parents are getting too much blame for it. To some extent they are being made scapegoats for laxity and breakdowns in other areas of authority in circumstances over which they have no control.

Through determined effort of public officials and school administrators the situation could be under control by the time our schools reopen in the fall. Existing . regulations, with a little stiffening and lot more enforcement, are sufficient to re-establish order on our campuses.





A Bishop Looks at Life

Our Inclusive God

By Everett H. Jones Retired Bishop of the EPISCOPAL CHURCH

Not long ago I found this prayer: "God of the city, God of the tenement and the houses of the rich, God of the subway and the night club, God of the cathedral and the streets, God of the sober and the drunk, the junkie and the stripper, the gambler and the good family man; dear God, help us see the world and its children through Your eyes, and to love accordingly.

It is so easy for us to forget the inclusiveness of God's love. Without realizing it we reduce Him to a tribal diety, or even to a protector of our own social class. It is one of the ways in which nominally religious people become enemies to true religion.


Consider our thinking about the Church. By and large we think of Church members not as those with a commission to go into the world with redemp tion concern as Christ's servants, but rather as members of a special group who draw apart to receive favors from God. In a real sense the Church exists not for those who are inside but for those outside. The purpose of worship is to make us aware of God in His whole

Consider how we feel about our nation and our race. We give verbal assent to the universal fatherhood of God, but actually we think of God as belonging, at least primarily to our own country and our own race. But is He not also the God Oscar Sniffen, Ozona and Father of the Russians and the North Vietnamese?

Consider our attiture toward drug addiction, sex perverts or leaders in violence. These are the "sick" people of our generation, or those the Bible calls 'lost". Jesue made it clear that he came to rescue and help such people. This was the main thrust of his ministry. He said this was the kind of love in the heart of the God He came
