## Bovina Schools Begin '69-'70 Year Tuesday

From here, it looks as though the next big thing to happen on the irrigated High Plains of Texas, industry wise, will be the development of pork production into a scale second only in importance to the booming beef business.

For some months now, we've had that impression and have so stated in this space on various occasions.

Latest thing we've seen to substantiate this idea about pork production, which isn't even in the embryonic stage in this immediate area, is a news release from the Lubbock headquarters of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

The GSPA is promoting passage by a vote of the producers of grain sorghum a referendum which will allow the organization more funds with which to develop its product and expand its marketing.

One of the markets which the association intends to develop is that of pork production with grain sorghum, or more simply, feeding maize to hogs.

With an expanded hog feeding industry to go along with the present, and increasing cattle feeding, the need for milo would be increased and the crop would enjoy the benefit of a more stable market.

Up to now, we'd say that what's been good for the grain sorghum producer has been good for the area.

In our section of the Panhandle, some other crops may be more fun to grow, take less water, take more water, make more money year in and year out, offer greater prestige to the producer, or what-have-you, but this is milo country. The crop seems to have more natural ability to produce under the conditions here to its greatest ability than do most of the others.

Corn is a good crop for this area, too, but up to now it hasn't enjoyed the popularity that grain sorghum has and this condition may change, but if it does, it won't happen overnight.

Sugar beets are good but are handicapped by acreage restrictions.

And grain sorghum is just as good for feeding hogs as it is for fattening cattle.

The development of pork production, which has already started on a limited scale over in the Hale County area, will increase to a position of much more importance in the economy picture when the agronomy people decide the time is right.

We think that time is not too far in the distant future.

The primary reason for the GSPA news release is to publicize the forthcoming referendum election and encourage its passage. That objective is cleverly wound around the pork production angle, however.

Here's the release. You can see for yourself:

"The High Plains and Panhandle grain sorghum producers are looking forward to the time when their area will become the leading pork producing area of the nation. Following approval of the grain sorghum referendum in October, one of the major market development programs will be to help establish the pork industry in West Texas.

"Elbert Harp, executive director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, said, 'As grain farmers, we realize our best markets for grain are our local markets. We do not have to pay freight on this grain, as on grain shipped from the area. GSPA has been very active in the development of the cattle feeding industry of the High Plains and Panhandle and we feel this same area is also a natural for development of a pork industry.

"Roy Poage, Lubbock swine breeder and president of West Texas Pork Producers Association, reported, 'Texas is importing about 70 per cent of its dressed pork from other states. We have about the best climate for hog production in this area that is available anywhere. With the feed supply that is plentiful in West Texas, there is no reason why we can not build it into the nation's top pork producing region. As it develops, additional packing companies will move in, and

### Grain Vote Meeting Set

Parmer County grain sorghum producers are urged to attend a meeting Thursday, Sept. 4, to hear the upcoming grain sorghum referendum explained. The meeting will be in the Bovina Schools Auditorium. Meeting time is 8 p.m.

Dr. Bill Black, extension economist in marketing and policy, headquartered at Texas A&M University, will be the speaker at the meeting.

Purpose of the referendum is to develop, carry out and participate in programs of research, disease and insect control, education and promotion designed to encourage production, marketing and use of grain sorghum. The referendum calls for an assessment of five cents per ton to be collected at the point of first sale.

A two-thirds majority vote is required or a vote of approval by farmers producing at least 50 per cent of all the grain in the 29 county area which is involved. The referendum will come before a vote in early October.

## Booster Club Meet Friday

### Amounts Vary --

## Rain Falls Here Sunday, Monday

General rains fell across the area Sunday and Monday nights.

While the moisture was considered area-wide, the amounts received varied in different localities.

In Bovina, .3 of an inch was recorded Sunday night and .17 was measured Monday night. West of town, however, the total was considerably more with 1.2 reported in the two nights. Also, the total amount was considerably higher north and east of town, according to reports.

The rainfall was accompanied by high, gusty winds on both nights, but no hail was reported.

For most crops, the moisture was considered highly beneficial. The moisture is expected to cause only a brief delay in farming activities unless the rain continues. And more is predicted.

## Expect Increase In Enrollment

Bovina Schools began the 1969-'70 school year Tuesday morning.

The total enrollment figure was less than had been expected by school officials, but was expected to increase as students continue to enroll.

Enrollment late Tuesday morning totaled 561, according to L. F. Jacobs, superintendent. The figure will possibly go over the 600 mark before the week is over.

A total of 610 were enrolled on the opening day of school a year ago.

The enrollment figure, broken down, shows 260 students in grades one through five, 156 in grades six, seven and eight, and 140 in high school, the top four grades.

Jacobs expects the enrollment total to reach its peak during October with possibly as many as 700 students at that time.

Registration of high school and junior high students was conducted Monday. A general faculty meeting was held Monday at 8 a.m.

Grade schoolers were not pre-registered. Registration for them was attended to Tuesday, the first day of school.

As of Tuesday morning, the number of grade schoolers was 44, considerably less than the total expected. Here again, however, more are expected to enroll in the next few days.

A long weekend is scheduled for students following their first week of school. They will be dismissed at 2:30 p.m. Friday for the Labor Day weekend and will return to classes at the regular time Tuesday morning.

Except for the excitement and confusion normally associated with the first day of a new school year, Tuesday was a regular school day with buses running on their schedules and lunch being served in the cafeterias.

### In Time For First Game --

## Contract New Lights For Mustang Field

Bovina's Mustang Field will get new lighting for the forthcoming football season.

In a special meeting Friday night, school board members contracted with Lee's Electric of Farwell to install 64 new light bulbs at the field - replacing the present lighting system. This will increase the lighting power over the present set-up substantially.

The bulbs will be erected eight to a pole on eight poles. It will be necessary to replace some two or three of the present poles which are not considered in good enough condition for further use.

The present poles which will be used are 65 feet as will be the new ones.

Cost of the lighting improvement will be approximately \$5250, according to L. F. Jacobs, superintendent.

The agreement calls for the new, improved lighting to be installed in time for the Mustangs' first football game of the season which is September 19.

The present lights have a

lighting capacity of from five to eight candle-foot power. The new system will increase the candle-foot power to 20.

Mr. Williams farmed and ranched in the Bovina area for 30 years prior to retiring and moving to Hereford.

Mrs. Williams was born Aug. 7, 1881 in Montague County. Survivors include his wife, three daughters, Mrs. Joe Wilson and Mrs. Jesse Walling of Bovina and Mrs. Maurice Means of Hereford; five grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

#### FEEDING WHEAT TO CATTLE

The price situation is causing many stockmen to ask questions about the possible use of wheat for feeding cattle. Wheat can be fed to all types of cattle. Research has shown that on full feed best use can be made of wheat by limiting it to 25 per cent of the total ration, according to W. D. Thompson, extension service animal husbandman. When fed in these amounts it is equal to corn in feeding value and no digestive problems are encountered. When one is pressed for feed and needs to use more, it can be raised to 50 per cent for fattening cattle. Generally, it is not economical under any circumstances to increase it beyond 50 per cent for fattening. For wintering calves, where only three or four pounds of grain are being fed along with a full feed of hay or silage, wheat can be used entirely. In fact, where four pounds of grain is the daily limit, 100 per cent wheat can be used.

The problem with wheat for cattle feed is proper preparation and its physical characteristics. If wheat is coarsely cracked or is rolled, it is more acceptable to the cattle. Often in preparation, wheat is ground into a flour and becomes gummy and sticky and quickly soils feed troughs.

Checking the type of equipment and finding the best method to roll or crack wheat will help improve its feeding characteristics.

#### FERTILIZER IS KEY IN WHEAT PRODUCTION

"Fertilizer is perhaps the biggest bargain available to wheat producers on the High Plains," says Jim Valentine, Extension soil chemist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock. "And

the profit to be expected from its use will depend on what your soil actually needs."

"A soil test can tell you what and how much fertilizer is needed," points out the soil chemist. "Nitrogen and phosphorus are the two elements of primary concern, nitrogen being a key nutrient in the production of high quality forage and grain."

At a very low soil test level, 120 pounds of actual nitrogen is often required for 60 bushels of grain after moderate grazing. Heavy soils such as Pullman can accumulate nitrogen where previous rates have exceeded crop removal. A soil test for nitrate nitrogen gives a quick inventory of this carryover. If nitrate levels are in the medium or high range, nitrogen application can be cut down without lowering production.

On heavy soils all the nitrogen can be applied preplant with no hazard of loss through leaching, points out Valentine. On sandy soils where losses can occur, part should be applied before planting and the rest ahead of the jointing stage, usually in February.

"The soil's phosphorus level can also be a critical factor," says Valentine. "If the soil test shows it to be very low, use of phosphate can greatly stimulate early growth as well as increase grain yields. Unlike nitrogen, phosphorus does not move much from the point of application. Phosphates should be applied in the seedbed before planting."

Information on collecting and mailing soil samples is available at the county agricultural agent's office. Soil test reports will be returned within three to five days after samples are received at the Extension Soil Testing Lab at the A&M Center.

Representative Bob Price, Pampa, will be guest speaker for the evening program.

Other displays at Field Day will be farm equipment showing and various exhibits by Foundation commodity committees and several agricultural agencies.

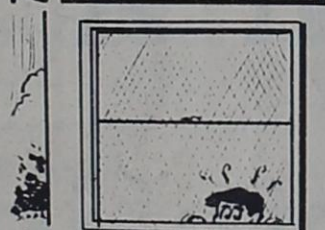

# Mustangs To Scrimmage Ralls Thursday

## Session Set At Abernathy

"Good size" is expected to be the long suit of the 1969 Bovina Mustang football team. After the completion Friday of a week-filled with two-a-day workouts, Mustang Coach Gib Hough and his staff seemed to be "reasonably satisfied" with progress made by their squad members. Coach Hough indicated, however, that they would be in a position to know more about the individuals on the squad following a scrimmage set for tomorrow (Thursday) night at Abernathy against the Ralls Jackrabbits.

The scrimmage is scheduled to begin at 8 p.m.

A total of 52 boys had reported for practice through last week. At least three more are expected now that school has started. Workouts were cut to once a day beginning this week.

While the good size is expected to be the brightest part of the '69 gridiron campaign picture at this stage, the biggest apparent weakness is lack of experience at the all-important quarterback position.

Expected to get the starting nod at quarterback in the Ralls scrimmage is Roy Ramirez, a 145-pound sophomore who saw little action last season. Joining Ramirez in the of-

fensive backfield positions at the beginning of the scrimmage will probably be Stuart McMeans at tailback, Royce Sisk at fullback and Mike Beauchamp at wingback. McMeans and Beauchamp both have quarterback experience.

McMeans is a senior letterman who weighs 185. Sisk is a junior letterman and also weighs 185. Beauchamp is a junior letterman and his weight is 155.

On defense, Mike McMeans will be the nose guard; Barrett and Hall will be the tackles; Sorley and Kelly Jamerson will be the ends; Beauchamp and Stuart McMeans will man the linebacker posts; Harris will be the rover halfback; Carroll and Tony Foster will be the halfbacks and Bruce Caldwell will play safety.

"Our maneuverability is less than satisfactory at this point," Coach Hough said this week. "But we expect this to improve in the next couple of weeks."

The Mustangs' first game is September 12 against Amherst.

The game will be played there.

"We expect to have a strong defense," the coach said in talking about prospects for the forthcoming year, "but up to now our offense has been inconsistent and it needs to improve."

Boys out for the team at the end of last week totaled 52 with three more expected. This is the largest number of Bovina High boys to be out for football in history.

The total includes 14 seniors, 11 juniors, 12 sophomores and 15 freshmen.
