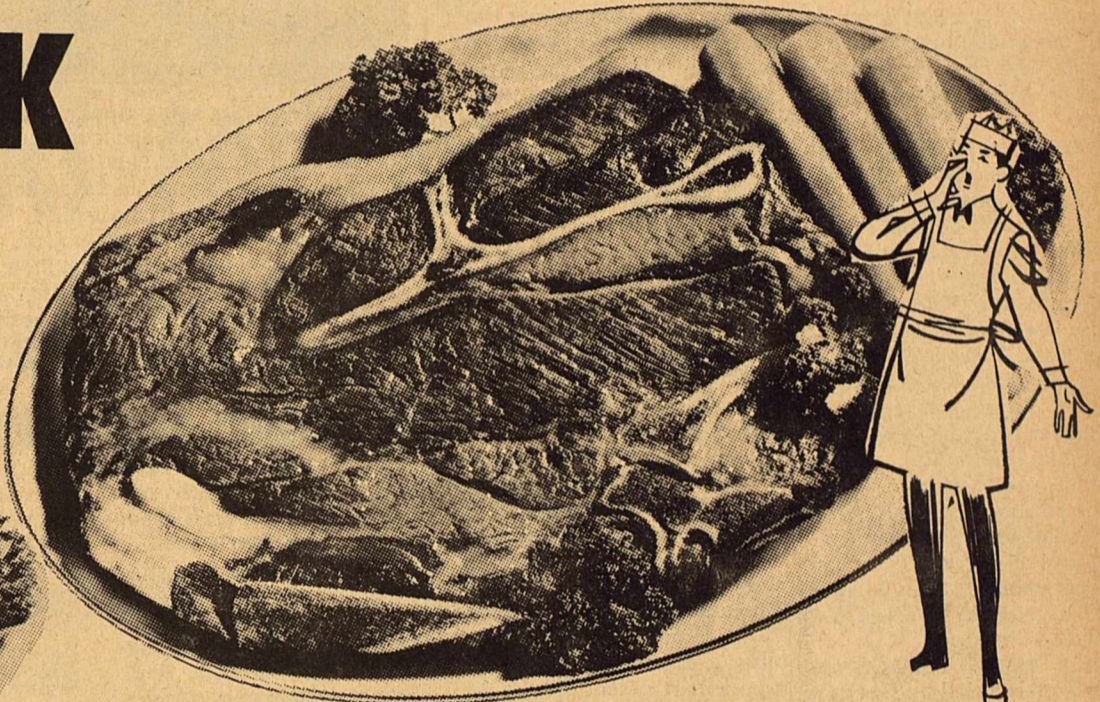

Miss Spencer has worked quite extensively with pros Tommy Aaron, Dave Hill, Bert Yancey and others.

When using her Graph Check Swing Sequence camera, Miss Spencer captures eight fast action sequence shots during one swing of the club. It shows exactly where correction in the arms, legs or body is needed.

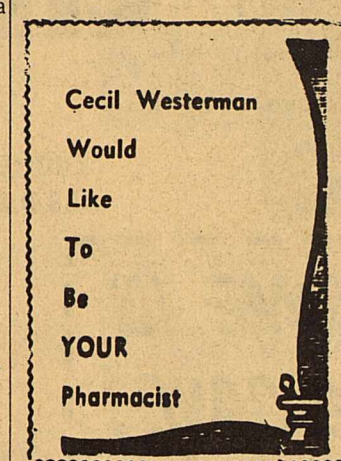
All club members and their friends are urged to take ad-

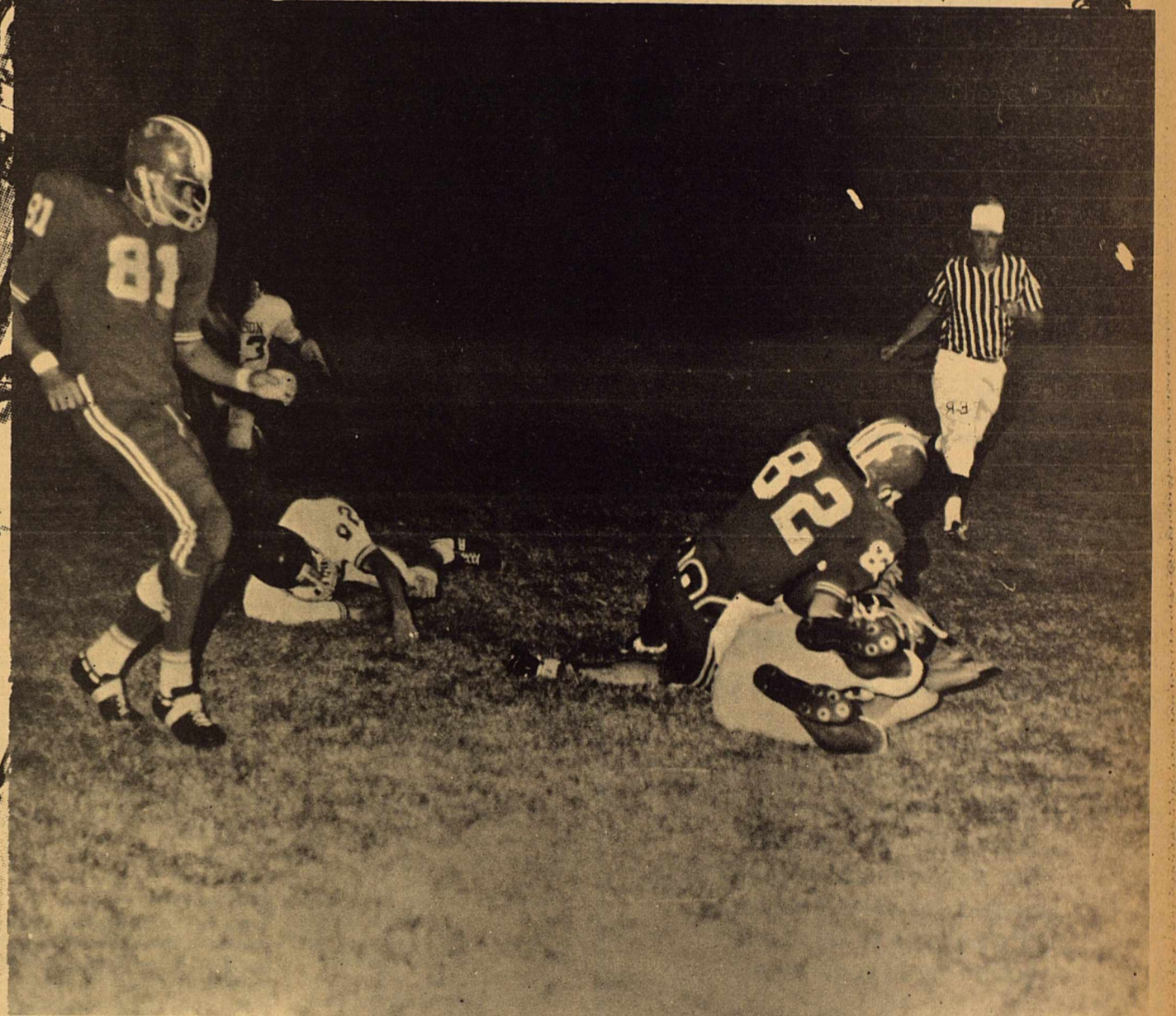
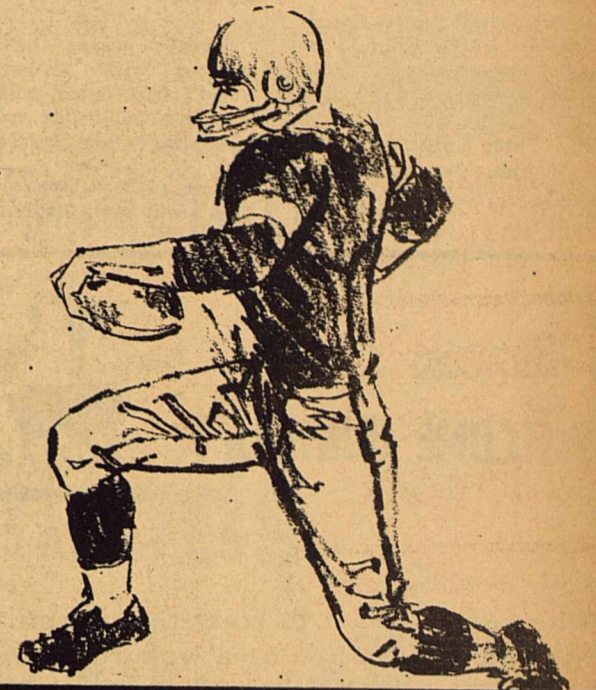

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

If you ever wonder about the speed of a Texas jackrabbit, it sometimes revs up to 45 miles an hour, darting and dodging among the prairie cacti.

Those tumbling tumble weeds also have a poetic name. They are identified as the "roses of Jericho."

Certain wasps have been credited with becoming the world's first paper mills. Their nests are paper-like substances which they make themselves.

Some say bees are color blind. That's why very few red flowers

are fertilized by them because the red is blind to their sight.

Ever wonder why termites stay around so long? Some of them are known to have lived for 30 years or more.

That cute little dormouse is not a mouse at all. It is a relative of the squirrel family.

A steel auto wheel makes an excellent stove for outdoors cooking. Perched on stones, it will hold pots and pans, while the fire burns beneath.

Minnow fishing is not permitted in Oregon. It is illegal to fish with live bait, either whole or in part. This is done to keep down rough fish in stocked impoundments.

Summer flounder is a favorite fish along the east coast. They sometimes weigh up to five pounds. Although most flounder in Texas coastal waters are gigged, they do hit on small lures.

Texas has more coon hunters than fox hunters. Mainly this is because there seem to be more coons than foxes.

When winding new line on your reel, add it to the spool as it comes off the original spool and it will work better.

If you think you've caught a large black bass, consider the known world's record of 22 pounds 4 oz. caught in 1932.

Of all small game, the squirrel ranks second only to the rabbit in hunter popularity. And it is well to remember that most any kind of a dog will develop into a good squirrel hunter.

Swat that mosquito if you are speedy enough . . . but it bats its wings pretty fast . . . in excess of 300 times a minute.

Stay far back from a skunk if you want to be safe. It can hit its target at ranges up to 10 feet and has the capacity of a six-shooter.

The mayfly, of which there are more than 550 species in North America, spends all but a few days of its life under water.

A female dragon fly, such as the one that sits on the tip of your rod, will lay up to 100,000 eggs and there are 412 known species of the dragon fly in the United States.

No wonder termites are so numerous. A queen will lay 60 eggs per minute or something like 80,000 in a single day.

Possums, which long have lived in Texas, now are braving the cold of the north and are found even in New England.

When not molested the trumpeter swan, which almost became extinct, has a life span of 30 years.

Of all the trout species the German brown is the heartiest. It can withstand pollution much better than its many cousins.

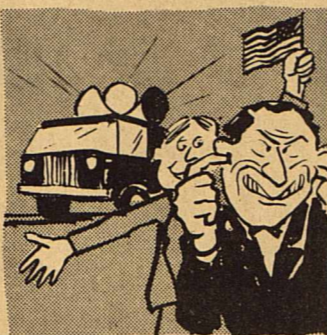

Sound Trucks: Bane or Blessing?

To one bystander, a blaring sound truck is a form of noise pollution, fouling the public air. But to another, the same truck is a healthful exercise in the right of free speech.

Which view is correct? With increasing frequency, our courts are being called upon to decide.

They begin with the proposition that freedom of speech is not an absolute, unlimited right. In one case, a city ordinance forbade sound trucks from making "loud and raucous noises." A local union, embroiled in a labor dispute, challenged the ordinance



as an unconstitutional interference with free speech.

But the court turned down this objection. The court said that, in the name of peace and tranquility, a community had the right to hold noise down to a moderate level.

However, while reasonable restrictions are all right, most courts frown on efforts to ban sound trucks altogether. When a city tried a ban of this kind, a union again took the matter to court.

At the hearing, the city argued that the union could use some other, quieter means of getting its message across to the public. But the court held the ban unconstitutional, saying:

"In certain instances, the sound truck may be the only practical means for communication of opinion. The right of free speech is worthless in the absence of a meaningful method of its expression."

Another city passed an ordinance saying that sound trucks could be used, provided the chief of police first gave his permission. However, the ordinance said nothing at all about any guidelines on which the chief's approval or disapproval should be based.

Here, too, when the ordinance was challenged in a test case, the court saw danger to freedom of speech, especially in the realm of politics.

"The sound truck has become an accepted method of political campaigning," said the court. "Must a candidate for governor or Congress depend on the whim or caprice of the chief of police in order to use his sound truck for campaigning?"

Holding the ordinance invalid, the court said the power to prevent speech, just like the right to speak, must be kept within reasonable limits.

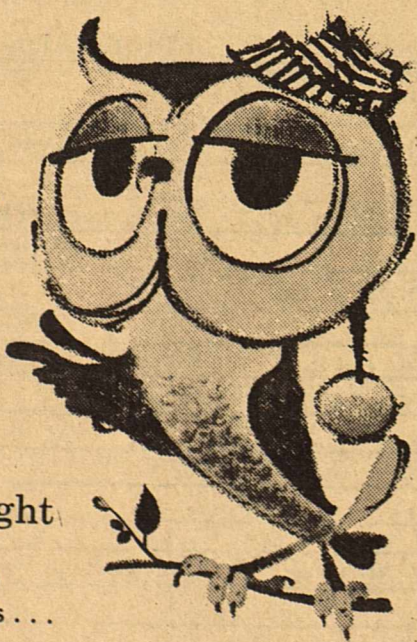
