A look at the ballot which will be used in the November general election indicates that the Republican Party in Texas and on lower levels isn't doing an adequate job of serving the people.

After you get past the presidential election and major state races, Republicans get almost as scarce as hen's teeth. It's strange that they want somebody like Nixon and Agnew heading the nation, Tower in the Senate and after that they pretty well think the Democrats can take care of them.

There's no Republican candidate, for instance, in the Congressional race, where veteran Demo George Mahon, is seeking re-election. It's just as well, of course, that the GOP aren't trying to unseat Mahon. They probably couldn't do it anyway, but we think a lack of candidates in the Republican column on the ballot shows a lack of dedication as a political party.

This might, if the polls are correct, be a good year for GOP candidates. This might be just the time to ride into office on the coattails of the presidential candidate, who is supposedly leading by such a margin that the campaign can hardly be called a race.

While this county is not directly involved, the presidential race could be a factor in the Congressional District north and east of here where Democrat Graham Purcell and Republican Bob Price, both incumbents, are running against each other after their districts were combined.

Before we were re-districted into Mahon's district, we were in with the "Price is right" bunch, you'll remember. Price and Purcell have been battling toe-to-toe for the past several months. How that race comes out will be interesting. Purcell has a good record as a Congressman and if we were in his district, he'd get our vote. However, Price has the advantage of Nixon's popularity which might pick him up a few extra votes.

Of course, in the area north of Amarillo, a Republican just naturally runs pretty good as Price's past success at the polls will indicate.

Those oil and gas oriented folks have a way of voting Republican just about every time the general election polls open.

It would be a shame for Purcell to lose his Congressional seat, but it could happen. Never mind their political parties, it's our opinion that Purcell can do more for the area he represents than can Price. We tried some of that being in Price's district and didn't like it.

Purcell makes a tremendous impression. We're interested in the race because our county was formerly in that district and we're close enough to that district that the Congressman who represents it will know about us, too.

If you have friends in that district, use your influence (that's a good political word) to get them to vote for Purcell.

After having a highly successful motorcycle race show during Bull Town Days for funnies (no admission charge), the Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture is going to have another shot at such a promotion with more emphasis on the financial end of the program. Admission will be charged at the races scheduled for Sunday afternoon.

Chamber leaders agree that a charge for spectators should have been made during the Bull Town Days event. However, at that time they were just adding another program to the list of things to do during the community celebration and making money wasn't especially one of the goals.

The people turned out in such great numbers, though, that a decision was made to have another try at it... with an admission charge.

Surely the crowd will be smaller than it was when it was all for free and the motorcycle enthusiasts and the curious came from miles and miles around. It could afford to be, though, and still be a financial success.

We won't bother to go into gory details about what our percentage was in last week's football contest pickings. We didn't do well, we're pretty sure, so didn't bother to check it out to see just how well.

Of course, it's understandable when you're just playing for fun and not a contest grand prize to have an "off" week now and then.

Floyd Damron Wins Grid Guessing Game

The winner's circle returned to town last week in the sixth round of Bovina Businesses Football Contest with all three places taken by home-folks.

Floyd Damron was the star performer last week, the only one out of 199 to correctly name all 10 winners. He received first place prize money of \$5 for his efforts.

Seven contestants came up with nine correct predictions with Artie Kunselman picking up second place prize money of \$3 and Alan Cockerham taking third place prize money of \$1.

Kunselman missed the outcome of the Springlake-Earth versus Farwell game, as did Cockerham, but was only four points off on the tiebreaker. He picked Bovina to win, 28-12. Cockerham was eight points off the tiebreaker score with a 24-12 prediction. Actual score was 28-16, Bovina.

Last week was the first time for the number of entries to drop below the 200 mark, however, an apparent mix-up in entry blanks caused two contestants' entries to be discounted. Of the remaining 191 entries, 56 had eight correct predic-

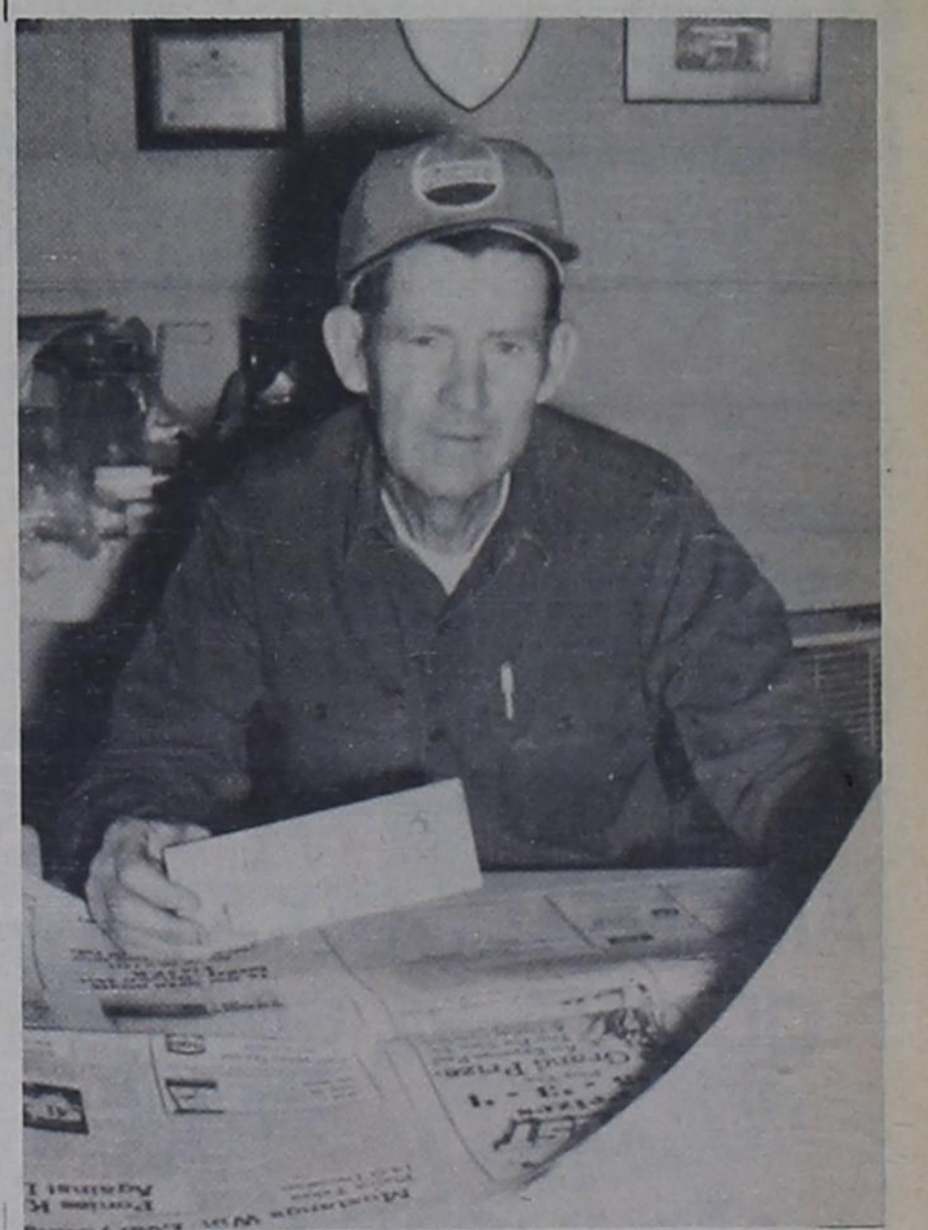
The initial fund raising project for the proposed out-of-state band trip in 1974 brought in about \$500, according to reports. However, an exact figure had not been arrived at as of early this week.

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Friday Night --

Sudan's Hornets Swarm Into Mustang Territory

Bovina's Mustangs, with one district win under their belts, will clash with the Sudan Hornets Friday night at Mustang Field with two objectives -- a repeat of last year's win over the Lamb County team and avoiding further injuries to an already-weakened squad. Kick-off time is 8 p.m. for the District 3-A battle.

Although the Hornets have suffered two defeats in as many outings in district competition, which probably eliminates them from the title race, Head Coach Roger Ezell expects the Hornets to be especially eager to avenge last year's 48-0 loss to the Ponies. That win was the first for the Maroons against Sudan in five years of 3-A play.

"At the beginning of the year, we thought Sudan would be a break for us, but they are coming on and you can be sure they will be up for us Friday night," Ezell said.

"Sudan should have beaten Hart Friday night and from here, it looks as if its anyone's district right now," Ezell commented.

Sudan comes into Friday night's ballgame with a 2-4 record, owning victories over Amherst and Shallowater and falling to Plains, Anton, Springlake-Earth and Hart. Plains is the only common opponent for the two teams with the District 5-A Cowboys defeating Sudan, 39-0, and defeating Bovina, 14-0.

The Hornets average 170 pounds in the line and 180 pounds in the backfield, said Ezell. "Gary Edwards (180-lb full-back) looks very good; he just runs over people," Ezell commented. He estimated that Sudan put the ball in the air from 40 to 50 per cent of the time. Led by Kim Engram, 180-pound senior quarterback, Sudan has seven returning starters from last year's 3-7 squad. Coach of the Hornets is Jim Warren, who guided Plains to a district title in 1971.

"It's beginning to look like a

hospital ward around here," said the Bovina coach following the Vega game Friday night. Elbert Shelby, 152-pound freshman standout at defensive end for the Ponies, is lost for the remainder of the season. Shelby suffered a serious knee injury in the Vega tilt and faces possible surgery.

Billy (Doc) Shelby, 157-pound junior tailback on offense and middle linebacker on defense, suffered a muscle tear in his right shoulder in a collision with the down markers in the second half of play Friday night. It was first believed Shelby was more seriously injured. Ezell said he would not workout this week, but had hopes Shelby would be ready to play Friday night against Sudan.

Also shook up in the hard-hitting contest Friday night was Kim Rundell, senior quarterback, and Jeff McCormick, senior halfback who handles the punting chores for the Mustangs. Both are expected to start Friday night barring further injuries this week.

"We played a better game than we thought we had before looking at the film," Ezell said. "Poor tackling hurt us this time and we just didn't adjust to the option until late in the game. On offense, we got mixed

up on blocking assignments several times, but overall, we didn't do too badly," the coach concluded.

In loop play last week, winless Farwell squeaked by favored Springlake-Earth, 21-20, while Hart edged Sudan, 14-7, and Bovina handed Vega its second district setback. Kress, the other 3-A team, surprised Class AA Dimmitt, 8-7, in a non-district game.

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On The Farm In Parmer County

SCREWORMS STILL SOARING

September's screwworm score set a new state record, as Texas reported 16,882 outbreaks. Officials at the Mission lab said "it was the worst Sep-

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tember since the eradication program was launched in 1962." Southwestern states also suffering screwworm setbacks in September were Arizona, New Mexico and Oklahoma. Records were set in the three states as Arizona recorded 656 cases, New Mexico 480, and Oklahoma, 476.

Kansas, a state traditionally free of the screwworm pest, had two cases confirmed in September. California added two more cases to its 1972 total, and Arkansas had one confirmation.

Outbreaks in the seven southwestern states boosted the national tally for September to 18,499 cases.

August case confirmation for all states totaled 19,147. However, officials at the Mission Center attribute the slightly higher case count for August to "generally better reporting of cases by livestock industry groups" that month than in September.

Cumulative totals for 1972 cases through September are: Texas, 71,651; Arizona, 1,564; New Mexico, 894; Oklahoma, 682; California, 9; and Arkansas and Kansas, 2 each. The national tally for 1972 now is 74,804 cases.

STERILE FLY DISTRIBUTIONS

A whopping 826 million flies were reared and distributed by the Mission Center in September, Texas, as the hardest-hit screwworm area, received 617 million, and Mexico got 127 million. Air drops over Arizona amounted to almost 55 million, and other areas received lesser amounts.

Most of the Texas drops are presently concentrated in Central and South Texas, generally considered to be the "overwintering" area for the flesh-eating livestock pest. Heaviest concentrations amount to 3,200 per square mile each week. Lighter concentrations include weekly drops of from 1,200 downward to 1,000 per square mile in areas of Southeast Texas.

At Home In Parmer County

"Today's consumer knows whether or not she's playing with fire when it comes to carpet." "On April 15, 1971, it became illegal to manufacture carpets larger than 24 square feet, or hall and stair carpets longer than six feet, that aren't flame resistant." "These standards were set by the National Bureau of Standards in the U.S. Department of Commerce."

A flame resistant carpet won't burn more than three inches in any direction from a fire source in a draft-protected environment. Eight specimens from one carpet are tested, and seven must pass the test.

The fire source is a "timed burning tablet" which is really a methenamine pill. The 9" x9" carpet specimens are placed in a special draft-free chamber for the test. The pill is placed on the traffic surface of the carpet and ignited.

The specialists explained that all carpets and rugs having a fire retardant treatment or those made of fibers which have had a fire retardant treatment are to be labeled with the letter "T." Manufacturer's compliance with the standard doesn't guarantee the carpet or rug won't burn. The standard is intended only to eliminate carpets that can be ignited by small flames such as matches, cigarettes or fireplace sparks.

"The standard doesn't apply to 'one-of-a-kind' carpets or rugs, such as antiques, an Oriental or a hide." "It also doesn't apply to carpet manufactured before April 15, 1971. So until old inventories are sold, you may not be able to buy fire retardant carpets."

After December 28, 1971, rugs less than 24 square feet or runners less than six feet must have a label stating that they don't pass federal tests for flammability and therefore may be hazardous.

"Check the label on new carpet to find out if it's flame resistant. It could keep your home just a bit safer."

Ponies Dehorn Vega For First District Win

Bovina Takes 28-16 Verdict

The Bovina Mustangs scored a touchdown in each quarter here Friday night and held off a second half rally by the Vega Longhorns to earn a 28-16 victory. The tilt was the District 3-A opener for the Mustangs.

The loss made the 'Horns' record 0-2 as they had lost to Hart the previous week.

Vega, the defending district champion, couldn't get rolling in the first two quarters as the Mustangs racked up 14 points. They came back after the half, however, looking like a different ballclub and had a 16-point third period.

The Ponies sandwiched their third period TD in between Vega's counters, and kept pretty well control of the game.

Vega was still in the thick of the fight, with a chance to win, midway through the final stanza. After picking up their 16 points quickly, they were stopped on the Mustang 43 as Bovina's Larry Wiseman jump-

ed on a fumble. At that point, the Mustangs' lead was 22-16 and the visitors could tie or take the lead with a tally.

Wiseman's fumble recovery turned the tide and the Mustangs marched in for the insurance touchdown without losing possession of the pigskin. Quarterback Kim Rundell went the final 14 yards for the six points. Rundell also scored in the second period on a two-yard keeper play.

In spite of the fact they won, the game was a tough one physically for the Mustangs. Freshman Defensive End Elbert Shelby was lost for the season with an injured knee. Other members of the team suffered injuries and bruises of lesser degree.

The Maroons, handicapped the week before by a lack of scoring punch, missed an opportunity early in Friday night's game as they bogged down on the Vega

11-yard line on their second possession.

The Longhorns gave the Ponies good field possession seconds later as they attempted to punt from their own 21. Bovina got the ball at the Vega nine as a bad snap from center kept the punter from getting the fourth down kick away. Tailback Billy Shelby sailed into the end zone from eight yards out three plays later to give his team a lead which it enjoyed throughout the contest. Rundell's kick boosted the score to 7-0.

On their next possession, the Mustangs got on the scoreboard again. That TD was set up on a 62-yard jaunt by Shelby who carried from the Bovina 34 to Vega's four. A half-the-distance penalty moved the ball to the

two and Rundell scored from there on the next play.

The conversion was true and the score was 14-0 with 7:50 remaining in the second period. That count stood up for the remainder of the quarter.

The visitors came back after the halftime intermission like they meant business. Receiving the kickoff, they drove 62 yards to the endzone in 10 plays, all on the ground, with Fullback Tim Hubbard blasting his way the final 17 yards. While he

still had his steam up, Hubbard then ran the dual extra and the 'Horns had erased eight points of Bovina's 14 lead.

The Mustangs got it back quickly, though, as they went in for their third score following the kickoff. That drive covered 70 yards and was climaxed by a 27-yard pass play from Shelby to Wiseman in the endzone. Halfback Jeff McCormick ran for the double points and the count was 20-8 with 2:08 remaining in the third quarter.

Shelby threw the pass while relieving Rundell at the quarterback slot. The scoring pass play came as it appeared the Ponies were bogged down.

The Longhorns were still fired up. They scored again before the quarter ended. This time on a 30-yard scamper by Quarterback Roy Watley. The scoring jaunt was set up on the previous play as the hard-running Hubbard had made a 32-yard dash. Hubbard blared around right end for the two

extras, making the score 22-16 with a full quarter remaining to be played.

The fumble recovery by Wiseman shut the door on further scoring chances for the Longhorns and the Mustangs went in for final tally with 1:56 remaining on the scoreboard clock. The drive covered 53 yards and required nine plays.

The Mustangs' aerial game wasn't at its best. They completed only one pass in eight attempts, but that one was for the six points.

Shelby paced the ball carriers as he picked up 148 yards in 23 tries. McCormick carried 15 times for a total of 76. Shelby's total included the 62-

yard jaunt which set up the second TD.

The win made Bovina's season record 3-2.

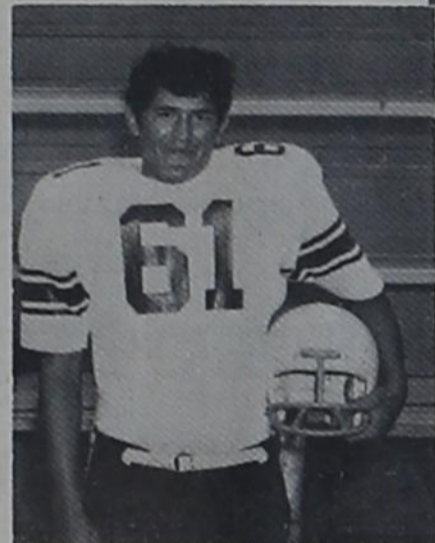

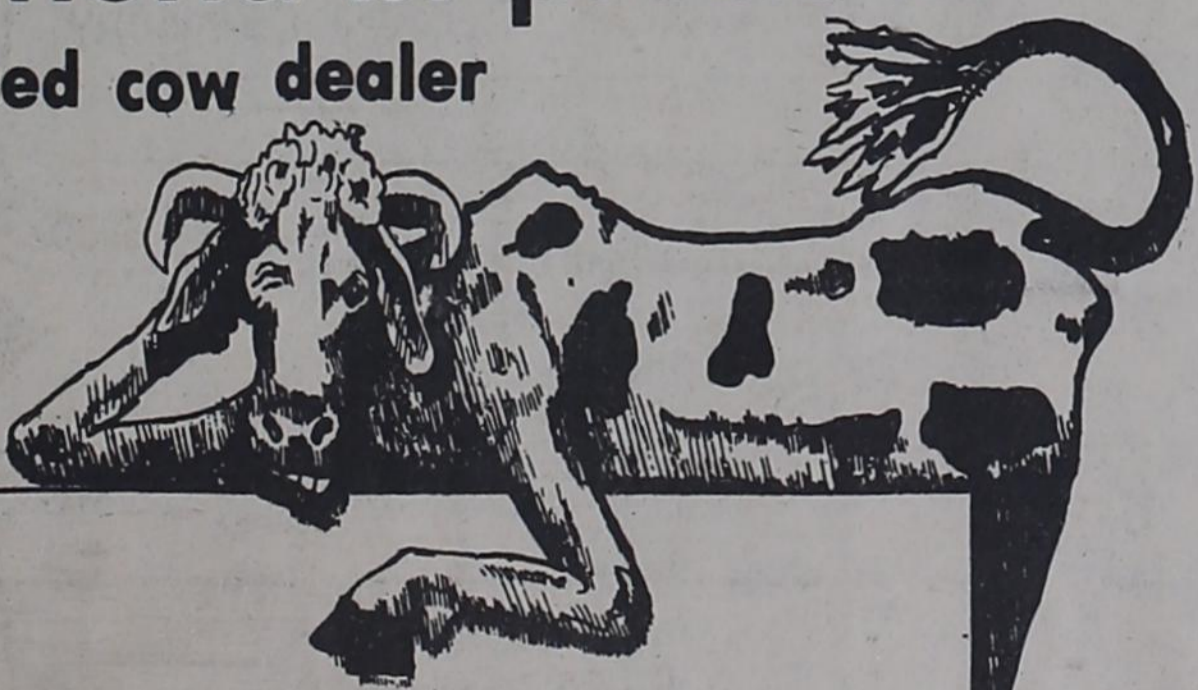

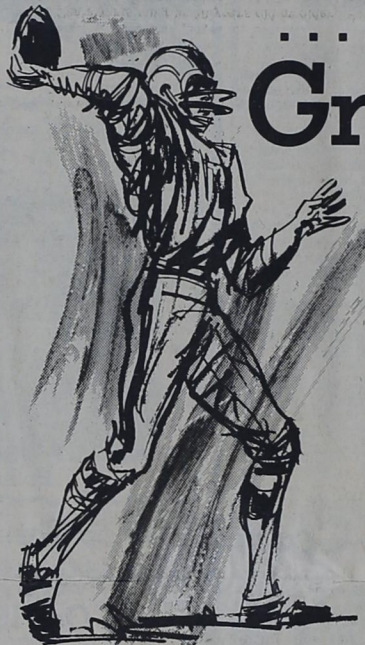
