

## Mohair Prices Increase As Demand Strengthens

A strong demand for mohair has resulted in a sharp increase in prices. Adult mohair which was selling for 25¢ per pound in November is now bringing over 50¢. Prices for kid mohair have increased from 60¢ or less in November to over 80¢ per pound.

Dealers attribute the strong demand to the return of the "soft look" in fashions for fall of 1972. Cloth for fall fashions | tinued good prices for some is now being made by both domestic and foreign mills.

Contributing to the price increase is the short supply of mohair in Texas and South Africa. Carryover of mohair in Texas, January 1, was less than 3½-million pounds compared to about 8½-million a year ago. This low carryover together with possibly the lowest production of mohair in twenty years, sets the stage for con-

time. Causing very serious con-cern to users of mohair is the possibility of not enough mohair to go around. However, it is generally believed that the liquidation of flocks has ceased and flocks will be rebuilt as the demand for mohair increa-

Everyone in the trade is optimistic about a stronger demand for wool in 1972 also. Shearing is currently in progress in Arizona and southern California and it is reported that buyers are active in the area.

The supply of raw wool especially fine wool of good combing types, is very low supply. The January 1 carryover in Texas was only 375,000 pounds. It is anticipated that as shearing progresses in the Southwest, there will be a good demand for the better clips.

New wool fabrics are being made for fall men's suiting that are expected to create new interest in wool. The fabric causing most excitement is a woven material that has a two-way stretch. It is relatively lightweight and has the comfort qualities of the double

Most of the new double knits being developed contain some wool which has been found to add quality to the cheaper polyester knits. Wool adds a softer touch and prevents the blow-through problems of the 100 percent polyester.

All-in-all 1972 is expected to be a much better year for wool and mohair producers than 1971. Although incentive payments on wool and mohair bring prices to a relatively strong initial demand. This encourages pride of ownership of livestock, which has always been evident in the Sonora

### **ASU Featuring** Ceramic, Graphic Art Exhibit

An art exhibit featuring ceram-Picasso, ninety-year-old contemporary master, is on display through February 6 at the Hous-Angelo State University's ampus in San Angelo.

Sponsored by ASU's fine arts department, the exhibition includes 59 ceramics and 12 osters. Among the ceramic ieces are platters, tiles, itchers, vases, bowls and igures representing women, birds and animals.

Picasso began making ceramics in 1946 after moving to Vallauris, an earthenware manufacturing center in southern France. The display contains pieces created there during the

## Alcoholism-A Big Problem

Since the days of the classical Roman orgies-and in fact long before that-man has been an embiber of alcoholic beverages in some form. There is little doubt that many of history's great decisions affecting the courses of whole civilizations have been influenced by the presence of John Barley-

In earlier times, when disease and disability were part of normal living for most people alcohol served the purpose of solace and anesthetic. Seemingly, it was never considered a disease in itself. Today, in America, the story is somewhat different. In a land where three quarters of the adults, at one time or another, drink alcoholic beverages, alcoholism is recognized as a disease that afflicts between 7 and 10 million persons. This means that at least one in every 20 and probably one in every 12 people over the age of 18 is an alcoholic. Simply stated, alcohol is becoming a national health hazard and is so recognized by medical and health author-

In its "Manual on Alcoholism" prepared for use by the medical profession, the American Medical Association addresses itself to the treatability of alcoholics. The Manual notes, 'Alcoholics are treatable patients. Because their illness is a chronic disorder with tendency toward relapse, it should be approached in much the same manner as are other chronic and relapsing medical conditions. The aim of treatment is then viewed more as one of control than cure....

Medical coverage for alcoholism is becoming increasingly available through some health protection sources. For example, a survey in 1969 disclosed that benefits are available through some 75 percent of the Blue Shield and Blue Cross Plans in the United States. Many organizations such as Alcoholics Anonymous, as well as government-sponsored and state-operated programs, have been set up over the country in recent years to treat alcoholism.

The subject of alcoholism is particularly timely at the moment.

Anyone can become an alcoholic. In the words of the Blue Shield pamphlet, "Only three percent of the total alcoholic pouplation is on skid row. Most persons suffering from alcoholism are found in homes, offices, places of business and in every walk of life. The disease attacks without regard to social standing, occupation, intelligence, education, national origin, color or race. A small percentage have an underlying psychosis and many have a personality disturbance. However, many are not noticeably different from the rest of us except in their addiction to alcohol. Many alcoholics after recovery prove to be gifted, talented, generous, responsible and idealistic people, as well

as good parents and good citizens." Although it has been accepted as an illness, science has yet to find the real cause of alcoholism. One thing is certain; it begins with the fact that three out of every four adults drink.

These drinkers fall into three categoriesthe normal drinker, the alcohol dependent drinker and the alcoholic. On the question of greatest concern-how to determine a departure from "normal" -the Blue Shield pamphlet offers very definite advice. It says, "The first real symptom of possible danger is when a firm pattern develops. The second warning signal is when drinking

within this pattern is markedly increased." For example, if an individual used to have one or two drinks at the end of the day and now has three or four, or has taken to drinking to induce sleep or because he is worried or depressed-these and many other symptoms easily discernible point to insipient alcohol-

There is no known cure for alcoholism. But, facilities for treatment and rehabilitation are becoming widespread. Alcoholism is one illness where the attitude of the victim is also important. As the pamphlet concluded: after an alcoholic is ready to accept assistance "...there are an endless number of individuals and organizations waiting to -The Industrial News Review

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## A Bishop Looks at Life **Bad Religion**

By Everett H. Jones, Retired Bishop of the Episcopal Church

During recent days many observers have commented on the fact that in at least three areas of violent conflict in the world religion has been involved; in the class between Hindus and Moslems in India and Pakistan: in the battles between Protestants and Catholics in Ireland; and in the continuing tension between Jews and Arabs in the

The first point that needs to be made is that in these conflicts many other factors are involved, such as a long tradition of excessive nationalism, racial pride and arrogance, a cheap regard for the individual numan life.

Nevertheless, these outbreaks make us face the gigantic amount of unfinished business for the religious forces of the world. They confront us with sin not as a theological doctrine but as an inescapable fact of

human existence. They accent the gap between our profession and our practice, between the goals of religion and its achievements. They make us see how far we have to go to make real the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of

The problem is not new. History is full of crimes committed in the name of religion. The Church must constantly purify its inner life before it can have healing power in the world No one saw more clearly than

Jesus that there is a perennial conflict between good religion and bad. He used some of his strongest words in exposing the cruelty and hypocrisy of religious leaders in his day: "Ye serpents, ye generation of vipers, how can ye escape the damnation of hell;" (St. Mat-

While an earlier decision inalidating the old filing fee law was still on appeal to the J.S. Supreme Court, three udges in Dallas knocked out a

pack-up statute passed last year. If rulings stand, Texas will be without any method of financing its May and June party primary elections. The filing deadline is February 7.

In the original 1970 decision on the old law, fees were declared unconstitutional because they were used for revenuecollecting and were an absolute requirement to get on the bal-

Legislators in 1971 passed a law effective January 1, 1972, setting maximum filing fees amounting to four percent of a candidate's term salary. Another provision provided for getting on the ballot by pauper's affidavits of inability to ay, together with a petition signed by 10 percent of area voters. This, too, was invalidated by a federal court last Thursday.

State is now enjoined from implementing any fee system for financing the primaries.

Gov. Preston Smith and Secretary of State Bob Bullockhave expressed hope courts will stay the latest order until the Supreme Court rules on the first

Circuit Judge Homer Thornberry advised party county and state executive committees to make new rules for carrying out the latest ruling.

Since there is no authority for state financing of the primaries a special legislative session apparently would be necessary to provide for that before May. ne suggested alternative is voluntary contributions to pay the election bill-an estimated \$1.5 million statewide.

OIL ALLOWABLE DELAYED Texas Railroad Commission decided to delay setting the February oil allowable pending

Major purchasers, the commission explained, report inventories are higher than needs. although crude stocks are at a four-year low mark.

Cut fish into six portions. Place fish in a single layer, skin side down, on a preheated, oiled plank or well-greased bake-and-serve platter, 18x13 inches. Combine remaining ingredients, except vegetables, mix well. Pour sauce over fish. Bake in a moderate oven, 350 deg. F., for 20-25 minutes or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork. Remove from oven and arrange the hot mashed potatoes and one or two other vegetables around the

If desired, drizzle melted butter over potatoes and return to oven briefly until brown. Serves six.




