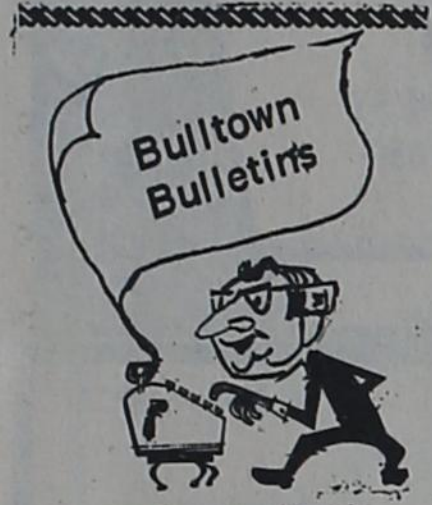

### Coronation Highlights Pre-Game Activities

SOME FOLKS WE KNOW breathed a sigh of relief when October 31 passed this year and there was no snow.

You'll recall that last year, the first snow came on October 31 (Halloween), and this brought forth quotations of an old tradition that said the area would have as many snows during the winter as the number on which the first snow fell.

At the time this was brought forth, many, including this writer, said "Hogwash!" (at least to oneself, but probably in print as well).

All of you except whoever may have moved in since this spring know full well the outcome of the "Winter of '73." It not only started early—it stayed late. We had two big snowstorms in April, one of which measured six inches.

The crux of the matter was that we surely received our predicted 31 snows last winter. If we didn't, it was close enough.

Friona's official weather station recorded 27 dates on which snow fell, with total snowfall for the winter of 37 inches. We suspect that on at least four of those 27 dates, it had to snow twice, to make the "Old Wives' Tale" come true.

Best part of the snow deal was that 95 per cent of it fell perfectly and gave area farmers and ranchers great boost to their ground moisture.

We'll think twice before we go poo-pooing any more "Old Wives' Tales," or weather traditions. In fact, now that it's the seventh of November, it might not be too early to start conjuring up our first snow for this coming season—before it passes the middle of the month and gets down into the larger numbers again.

## Tulia Man Wins; Bonds Gains Lead

Eight contestants turned in entries with eight correct predictions from a slate of 10 games in last week's Bovina Business Cotton Bowl Football Contest as a tie game and several upsets wrecked havoc with the majority of the entries.

Monty Malcom of Tulia picked up the first place prize money of \$5 on the basis of the tiebreaker prediction between Kress and the Bovina Mustangs. Malcom missed the outcome of the Seagraves versus Plains game and the tie game between Oklahoma State and Kansas and was nine points

off the actual 21-0 score with a prediction of 22-8, Bovina.

Two contestants, Tom Bonds and Kenneth Whitecotton, tied for second and third place money and will split \$4. Bonds missed the same games as Malcom and was 14 points off on the tiebreaker score, predicting a 21-14 Bovina victory. Whitecotton missed the outcome of the tie game and the A&M versus Arkansas tilt. He predicted a 14-7 Bovina victory, also 14 points away from the actual score.

Bonds' eight correct predictions earned him the lead in the contest with 69 points going

into the 10th week. The previous leader, H.J. Charles, only had six correct predictions to fall one point behind Bonds with 68.

Other contestants with eight correct predictions were Laura Bartlett, 20 points away with a 28-13 prediction; Hattie Burnett, 21 points off the tiebreaker with a 30-12 prediction; Dwight Cox, 24 off with a 10-7 predicted victory for Kress; Carl Rea, 23 points off with a 28-16 prediction; and Mike Read, 46 points off with a prediction of 32-7 for Kress.

The above contestants missed the tie game, the Caprock

victory over Tascosa, the Perryton win over Canyon and the Levelland victory over Muleshoe in addition to the A&M-Arkansas and Seagraves-Plains games.

Seventeen contestants had seven correct games, a good score for the week of upsets and tossups on the contest slate. Those with seven correct games were Jay Be Barrett, Rocky Bartlett, Pat DiCuffa, Wilson DiCuffa, Manuel Hernandez Jr., Ken Horn, Greg Hromas, Mike Jester, Mrs. Phillip Johnson, Roberta Mager, Lewis McDaniel, Norma Noyes, Jennifer Read, Kent Stanberry, Pat Ware, Billy Whitecotton Jr. and A.M. Wilson.

DiCuffa was the only contestant out of 124 who predicted the exact score on the tiebreaker prediction.

Of the remaining contestants, 39 had six right, 29 had five, 18 had four, 10 had three and three had two correct predictions.

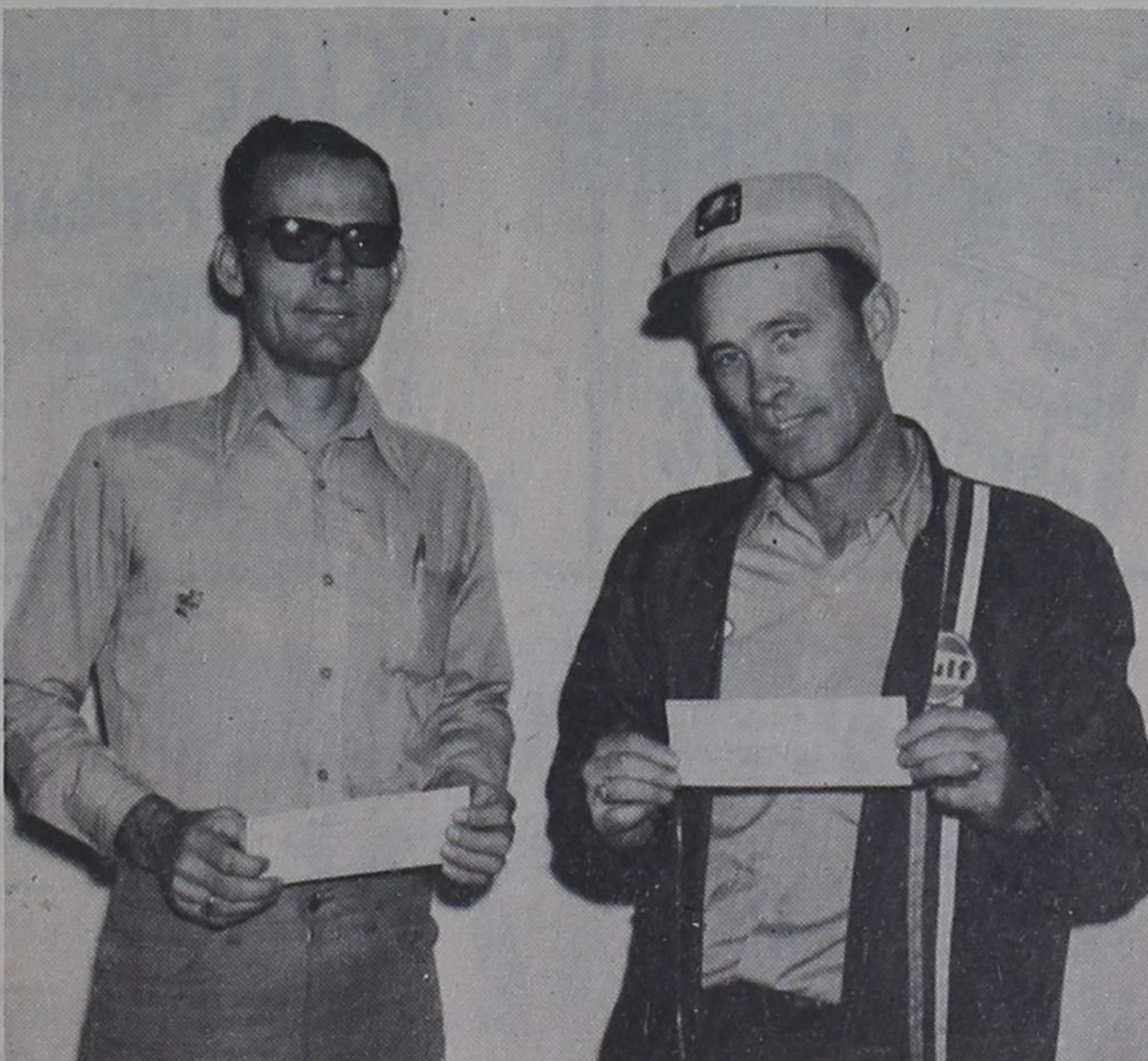
The most missed games on the slate turned out to be Seagraves-Plains, Caprock-Tascosa, Arkansas-A&M, Nebraska-Colorado and LSU-Mississippi in addition to the tie game between Oklahoma State and Kansas.

Bonds is in the lead at the end of nine weeks in total points with 69, followed by Charles with 68, Mrs. Albert Johnson of Farwell with 67 and Bill Moore with 66.

Contestants with 65 points are Lewis McDaniel and Whitecotton.

Contestants with 64 points include Jimmie Clements, Greg Hromas, Weldon Moody and Billy Whitecotton.

Six points behind the leader with 63 are Laura Bartlett, Jay Harris, Mike Jester, Roberta Mager, Monty Malcom of Tulia, H.W. Roberts, Tom Ware and A.M. Wilson.

Taking second place in the parade competition was Ninth Grade's "Mary Had a Little Lamb." Seniors were third with their "The Old Woman Who Lived in a Shoe."

Tom Bonds was winner of a new 16-gauge shotgun which was given away during halftime of Friday night's football game here. Quarterback Club gave the gun away as a fund-raising promotion.

Southwestern Public Service Company officials have announced that a representative of their company will move to Bovina between now and the first of July, 1968.

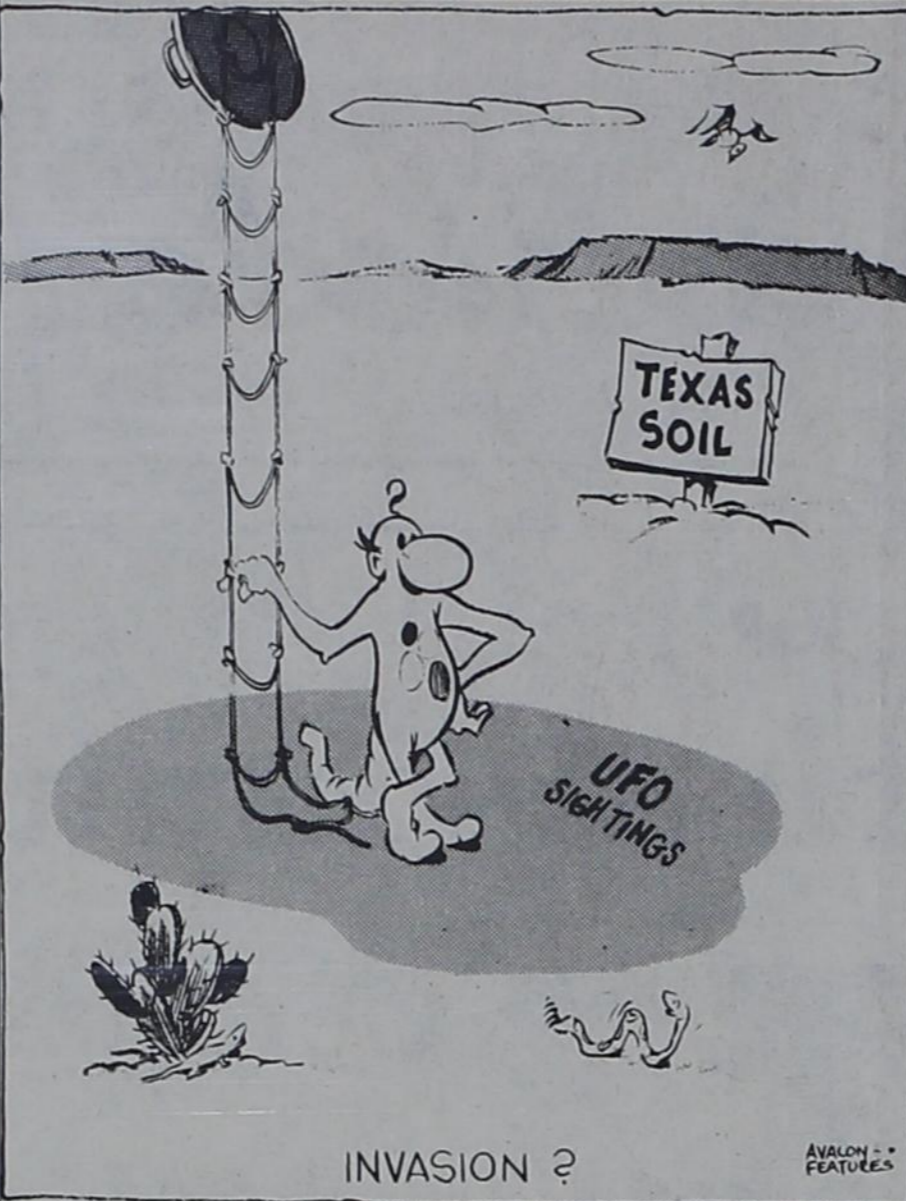
Lanny Pullig won first place and Mrs. Bobby Cumpton increased her lead to six points in this week's Bovina Business Cotton Bowl Football Contest.

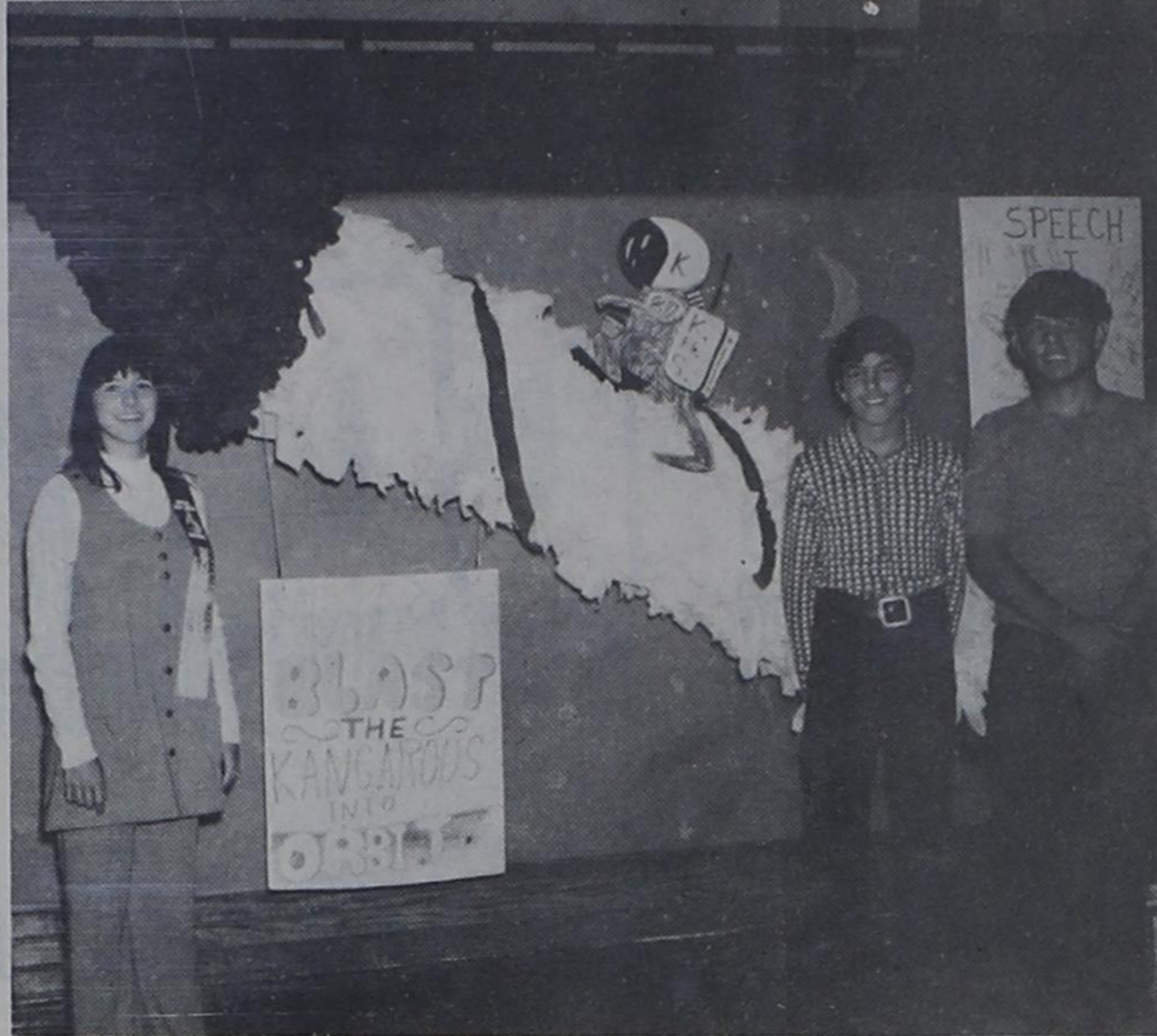

## Agricultural Trends Highlight Meeting

Trends in Texas Panhandle agriculture will be spotlighted at the annual meeting of the Panhandle Economic Program at Canyon, November 16, 1973 according to County Extension Agent Mack Heald.

Governor Dolph Briscoe and Senator Max Sherman, along with specialists and local producers in beef cattle, grain marketing, and family living-youth will headline the event which begins at 9:30 a.m. at the Activities Center, on the West Texas State University Campus.

Mack Heald said that people from across the 25-county PEP area (Upper Panhandle) will be on hand, along with key leaders from each county will be welcomed to the WTSU Campus and 4th Annual PEP meeting by Dr. L.I. Watkins, WTSU President.

Crops, livestock and family living and youth will be singled out for specific discussions during task force meetings in the morning session. Leading the discussions on beef will be Dr. Ed Uvacek, Livestock Marketing Specialist with the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station, and Mr. Jack Carrothers of Friona Industries Incorporated of Friona. Dr. Roland Smith, Grain Marketing Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station and Mr. Carl Jahnel, farmer from Hemphill County will examine the world and local grain situation. The Family Living Youth Task Force will discuss what the future holds for the family in health, family economics as they relate to health programs, and food and nutrition. Dr. Barbara Sears, Lynn Bourland, and Sally Springer, Extension Specialists in health, home management, and food and nutrition will be featured speakers.

Senator Max Sherman of senatorial district 31, said Mack Heald will be the first speaker, addressing the group on activities of the recently created Regional Water Council.

Following his speech, the agricultural task force and the family living youth task force of PEP will meet.

The governor's address comes at 1:30 p.m. with a business meeting scheduled at 2:30, said Mack Heald.

Governor Briscoe's address, he said, is expected to center around the role that Texas will play in the nation's agriculture future.

Included in the business meeting, the agent noted, will be an outline of task force goals, the introduction of the executive committee, the chairman's report, and election of officers.

**On The Farm In Palmer County**

By R. MACK HEALD  
County Agent

**SURE, EVERYONE KNOWS** that agriculture is big business in Texas! But just how big is it?

With November designated as Food and Fiber Appreciation Month in the state, now is a good time to take a brief look at the bigness of Texas Agriculture.

First of all, agriculture in all its phases-agricultural-adds more than \$10 billion to the Texas economy each year. Agribusiness provides employment for about 30 per cent of the state's labor force.

Of the state's 188 million acres of land area, 142 million are devoted to agriculture.

Realized gross farm income in 1972 totaled \$4.7 billion, up 13 per cent from 1971. However, farm production expenses totaled \$3.8 billion, almost 23 percent higher than in 1971. This left realized net income 19 per cent below that of 1971, but a boost in farm inventories brought total net farm income up 28 per cent over that in 1971.

Texas is the third leading state in total agricultural cash receipts behind California and Iowa. However, it leads the country in producing cotton, grain sorghum and rice and is the top cattle producer. Texas also leads in the production of sheep and wool, goats and mohair.

The state is also a leader in other enterprises:

- Fourth in agricultural exports, leading in cotton and rice exports and second in hides, tallow and meat products.
- Second in peanut production.
- Third in vegetable production, leading in cabbage, watermelon and spinach and second in onions, carrots and cantaloupes.
- Second in grapefruit production and third in oranges.
- First in native pecans and third in total production.
- Third in the number of honey bee colonies.
- Among the top 10 dairy states.
- First in horse numbers.
- A leading state in poultry and eggs.
- A leading state in fish farming.

These are just a few of the things that Texas is noted for on the agricultural scene. Agriculture continues to grow and to become more diversified, and it must do so to meet the ever-increasing demands for high quality food and fiber products.

**PRUSSIC ACID POISONING** is a dangerous item this time of the year with the frosty weather we've been experiencing during the past two weeks.

The danger of prussic acid poisoning exists mainly in pastures and fields where sorghum stubble is making regrowth and where there is vigorous, young growth of Johnsongrass, sorghum-sudan hybrids and related plants. Such growth generally has a high content of prussic acid, especially if produced under stress of dry or cool weather.

The main danger to livestock is grazing such pastures and fields immediately after a killing frost.

Livestock producers should wait a week to 10 days following a killing frost before allowing cattle to graze suspect pastures and fields. If only a light frost occurs, remove the cattle until plant growth is killed by a heavy freeze.

Each year numerous animals are lost from prussic acid poisoning. These losses are needless and rob the producer's pocketbook. Giving special attention to grazing management and stay abreast of changing weather conditions can avoid cattle losses to prussic acid poisoning.

**Seventh, JV Rack Up Wins Over Kress**

Bovina won two out of three games and fought to a scoreless tie in the third game at Kress Thursday afternoon of last week.

The Seventh Grade Colts trounced the Kress seventh graders, 30-14, with Quarterback Ruben Salazar starring for the Colts. Salazar scored three touchdowns and completed a 30-yard scoring pass to Mike Read. Richard Villarreal added the fifth counter for the Colts.

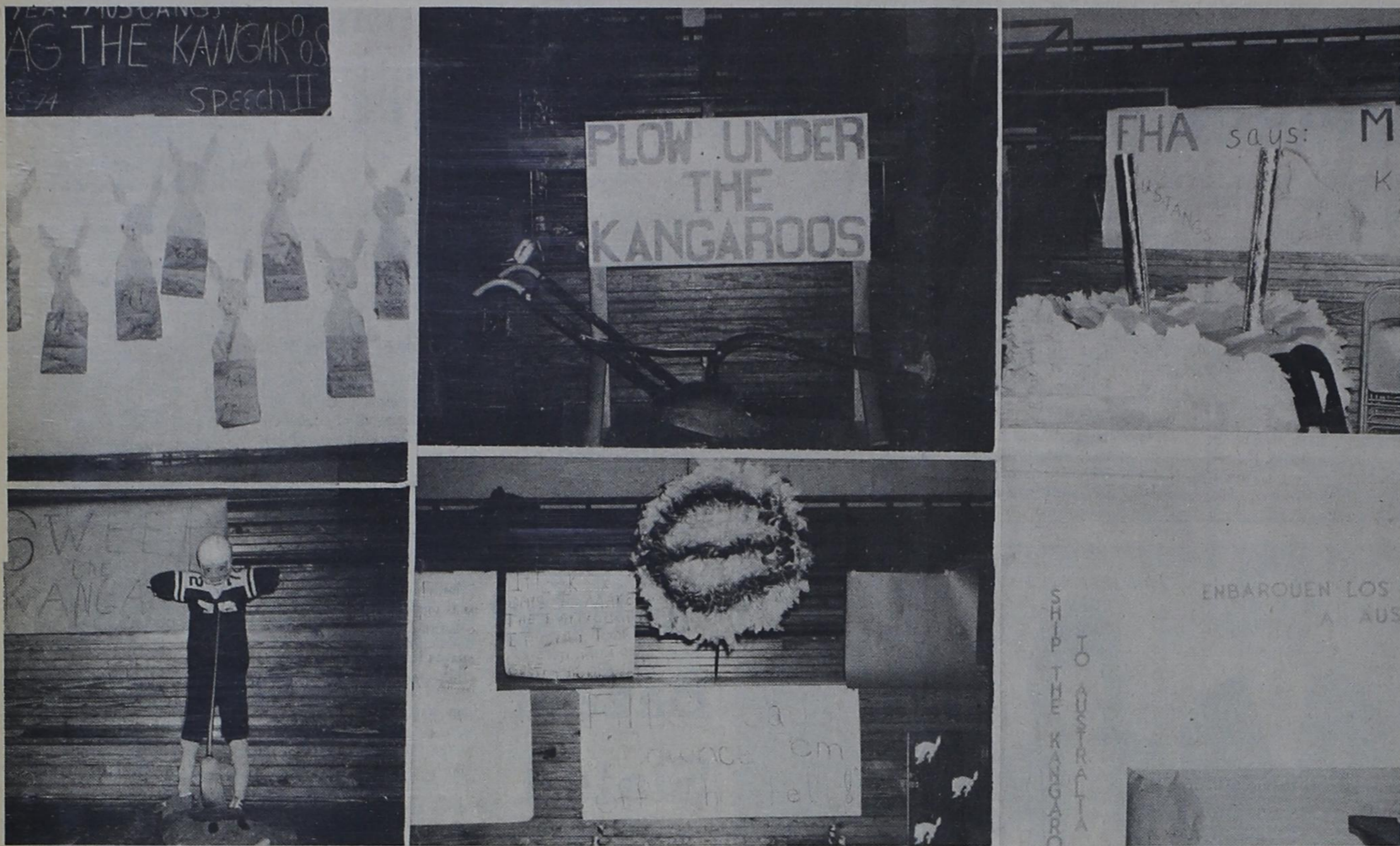

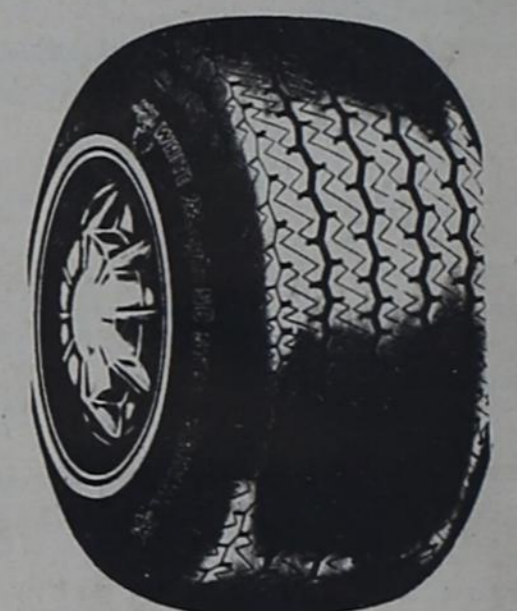

# Parmer County Institutes Special Education Program

Plan A Comprehensive Program for Special Education in Texas is providing schools in Parmer County a new approach to teaching children with learning problems. Elementary and Junior High Schools in Bovina, Farwell, Friona and Lazbuddie are cooperating in the Plan A Program.

The staff for the county-wide program presently includes a supervisor, who administers the program, a counselor, who also serves as a psychometrist

and educational diagnostician, eleven teachers and seven aides. There are plans for further staff development. Children throughout the county in grades one through eight will be served this year. Plans are being made to serve grades Kindergarten through twelve in the future.

Plan A in Friona includes three distinct and separate units. Two of the units are self-contained classrooms for

those children who require small group or individual attention for most of the day. The other unit is a Language/Learning Disabilities Resource Room, into which children will filter from regular classrooms for short periods of the day. Here they will receive attention to specific learning deficits.

The child with a language or learning disability has near-average, average, or above-average intelligence. His sight

and hearing are usually normal. He rarely has physical handicaps. He is not emotionally disturbed. And yet he fails to learn through regular classroom methods. Many estimates have been made concerning the number of learning disabled children. They range from six to seven percent to thirty percent of the school population. There are likely such children in every classroom.

The L/LD Resource Teacher does not teach curriculum. Social studies, science, even arithmetic, reading, and language arts are left to the

classroom teacher. The resource teacher works as a consultant with the teachers of regular classes, helping them to provide methods and materials suitable to the child's needs.

This is the way the program works. A child who is having learning difficulties in the classroom is referred to a team of Plan A specialists. This team, which includes the counselor, diagnostician and the resource teacher determines through observation of the child and his work, through conferences with the child's teacher and parents, through evaluation of the

child's work and the indicated testing procedures whether the child had a learning disability. When the child's disability is identified a committee composed of the child's principal, the Plan A teacher and the Plan A counselor review the findings and admit the child to the resource class or recommend other placement.

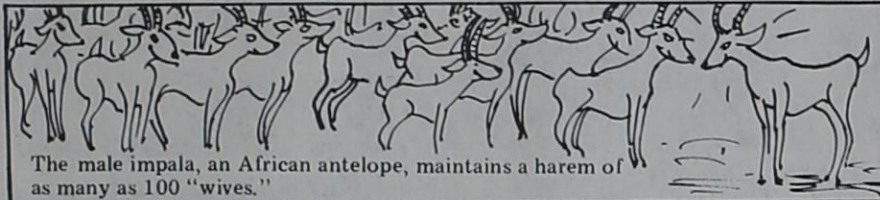
If the child is considered eligible for the special class he is then assigned time in his school day schedule to attend that class. During this time, which may vary from twenty minutes to an hour or more, a

child will work to erase a deficit in a learning channel or will learn to by-pass the channel thus compensating for a problem which is too severe to remediate.

A child's disability may be the results of a visual, auditory or conceptual disorder. He may have visual-motor or motor coordination disorders. He may have receptive or expressive language disorders. Whatever his specific needs, special exercises will train the child to use his eyes, his ears, his hands, his body to see, to hear, and to move in patterns that will

foster learning by opening learning channels which have been blocked.

Plan A Supervisor for the county program is Miss Harriet Nichols of Friona. Charles Turner, formerly counselor for the schools of Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie, is now counselor for the Plan A Program. The staff for Friona includes Mrs. Mary Bavousett and Mrs. Rita Stephenson, who teach the self-contained units and Miss Juannah Nance and Miss Jamie Washington who teach the L/LD Resource Room.

# Ponies Trip Kress, 21-0, Before H'coming Crowd

Relying almost completely on a time-consuming ground game Friday night, Bovina's Mustangs racked up their second consecutive win of the season against six defeats and their second district win in four outings before a homecoming crowd at Mustang Field.

The Ponies put 21 points on the scoreboard while holding the visiting Kress Kangaroos scoreless in the District 3-A tilt. The loss dropped Kress to 2-6 for the season and 1-3 in district competition.

The Maroons scored on their first offensive possession of the game with Back Joe Delgado running the opening kickoff to the visitor's 35-yard line to give Bovina excellent field position for the drive.

Eleven plays later, Halfback Bryan Fillpot drove over right guard from the one-yard line and Bovina led, 6-0, with 6:30 remaining on the clock in the first period. The extra point attempt, a kick by Ray Martinez, failed.

The Kangaroos could move the ball only nine yards before punting from their own 29. The Kress punter got off a booming 41 yard punt with the Mustangs putting the ball into play on their own 21-yard line.

Fullback Martinez picked up 12 yards on the first play from scrimmage for a first down on the 32 yard line. On the next play, Quarterback Dennis Willard fumbled the handoff and the Roos took over on Bovina's 32.

However, Kress couldn't get untracked on offense, with Cornerback Tommy DeLeon trapping the Kress runner on a bad pitchout for a 10 yard loss. Quarterback Barry Street then attempted to hit End Jerry Williams, but overthrew the runner. Guard Terry Sherrill and End Martinez then teamed up to trap the Kress quarterback for a 12 yard loss and the visitors were forced to punt on a fourth and 20 situation from the Bovina 42.

The Ponies failed to pick up a first down on their next series and Willard punted from the 27 to the visitors 45 where Trent Street ran it back to the Mustang 45. On the next play, Middle Linebacker Billy Shelby nit the ballcarrier, jarring the

pigskin loose. End Elbert Shelby pounced on it to give Bovina the ball on the 49.

Two plays later, an over-the-head pitchout by Willard was pounced on by a Kress defender and the visitors took over at the mid-field stripe.

The Kangaroos picked up their initial first down of the game on a 17 yard pass from Street to Street, but it went for nought as Tackle Tony Serna, playing his usual fine defensive game, came up with a Kress fumble.

Fumbles continued to plague both teams, as seven plays later Shelby fumbled the ball away on the Kress 33.

After forcing a Kress punt five plays later, the Ponies began a drive from their own 38 yard line, running the ball to the visitors 14 before the offensive drive halted on a fourth and one situation with 1:32 remaining in the half.

The Mustangs went to the locker room at halftime with a slim 6-0 lead, although Kress had not managed to put together a serious scoring threat.

The third quarter went by with neither team able to penetrate the midfield stripe until seconds before the period ended when the Ponies crossed to the Kress 49. Picking up only two yards on the first play in the final stanza, the Ponies were forced to punt on a fourth and two situation.

The visitors put the ball into play on their own 16, but could pick up only nine yards before punting with the Mustangs putting the ball into play on their own 44.

Shelby broke loose from that point, and evading tacklers sidestepped his way 54 yards to the two before being run out of bounds. Fillpot scored from the two to put the Mustangs 12 points up in front with nine minutes remaining in the game. Billy Shelby hit End Roy Hartzog in the end zone for the extras and Bovina led, 14-0.

Taking to the air, the Kress team seemed to be headed for paydirt as they passed and ran their way from their own 25 to the Bovina nine before losing the ball. With a fourth and three from that point, the Roos tried to run the ball up the

middle of the Mustang line, but could only pick up one yard to kill their only scoring threat of the night.

On the Ponies' first down play, Halfback Martinez brought the Bovina fans to their feet when he broke loose on a quick trap over right guard and rambled untouched for 92 yards to paydirt. Martinez had enough energy remaining to kick the extra point and the Mustangs put the game on ice with a 21-0 lead, and four and a half minutes remaining on the clock.

However, the Ponies muffed another scoring opportunity with about two minutes remaining in the contest when Guard Elbert Shelby crashed into the Kress quarterback just as he released a pass and Middle Linebacker Billy Shelby was in the right place to snag the pass, running it back to the 31.

A Mustang fumble on the next play turned the ball back over to Kress, however, Halfback Joe Delgado snuffed out the last chance for the visitors with a pass interception with 33 seconds remaining in the game. The tilt ended with the Ponies in possession of the ball on the 28.

The Ponies picked up 346 yards rushing for 16 first downs in the contest, attempting only two passes, both of which fell incomplete. The Kangaroos could manage only 99 yards on the ground and picked up 39 through the airways on four complete passes out of 16.

Martinez paced the Mustang ballcarriers with 147 steps in 17 carries. Shelby was close behind with 136 yards in 15 carries and Fillpot added 60 yards in 16 attempts.

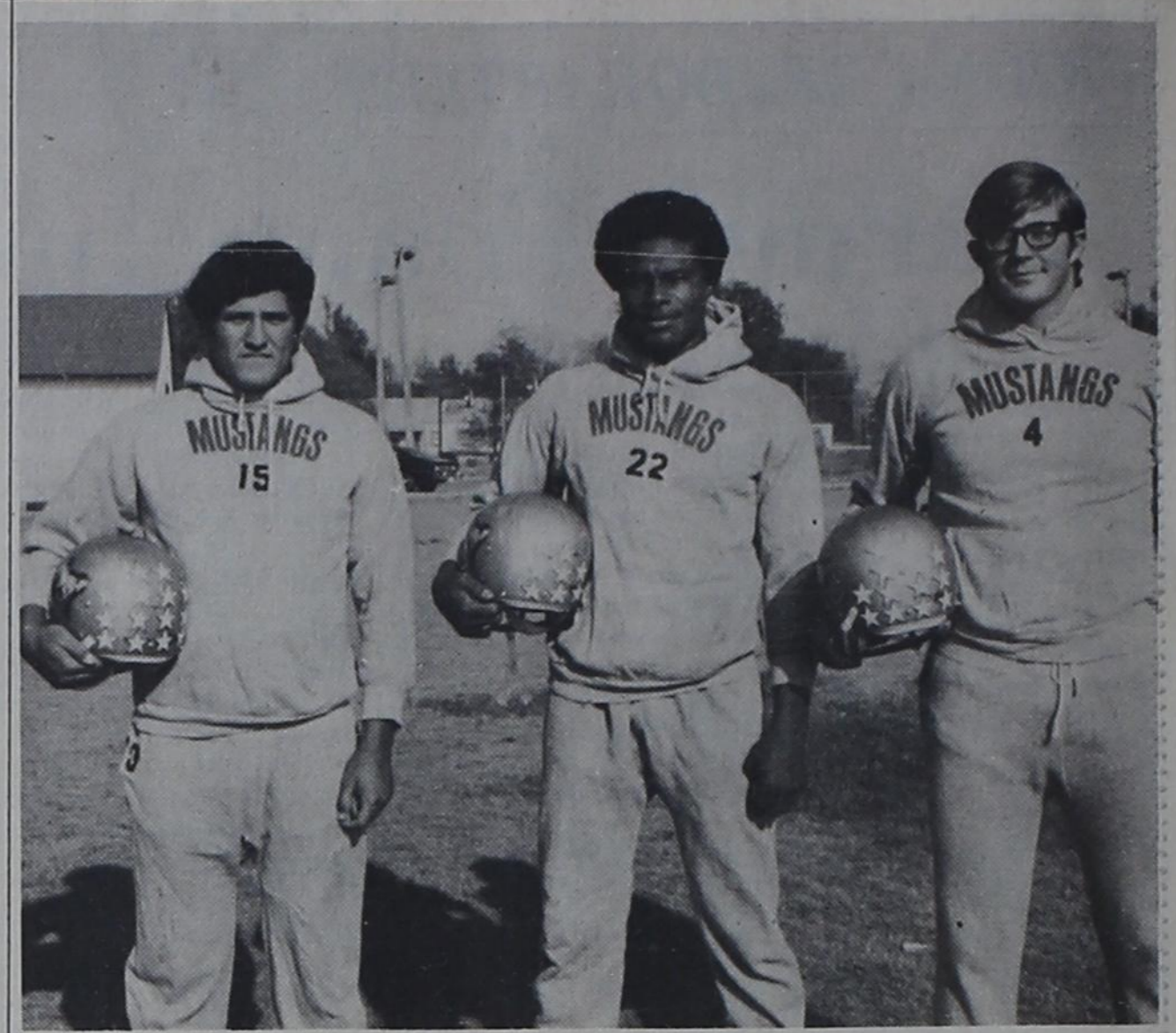
Playing outstanding games for the Maroons on defense were Serna, McKay and the

# Mustangs Set Trap For S-E Wolverines

Bovina's Mustangs, seeking to move up a notch in District 3-A standings, will travel to Springlake-Earth Friday night to do battle with the Wolverines.

Kickoff for the district tilt will be 7:30 p.m. The Ponies are currently tied with Sudan for third place in district, each with 2-2 slates. The Hornets will be playing at Farwell Friday night.

Springlake-Earth comes into the game with a record similar to that of the Mustangs, 2-6, however, the Wolverines stand at 1-3 in district play.

The Wolverines, in district competition, defeated Kress but lost to Sudan, Farwell and Hart, to tie Kress for fifth and sixth place in the standings. In non-district competition, the Wolverines defeated Cooper, 3-0, and lost to Morton, 24-6;

Friona, 46-6; and Dimmitt, 46-0. Sudan defeated S-E, 12-0; Farwell took a 33-19 win, and last week, Hart outscored the Greens, 41-14.

Picked in some pre-season polls to take the district honors, S-E was handicapped from the first by the loss of Brian Britton, 205-pound senior tackle who was touted for certain all-state honors. Britton reportedly broke a leg early in the fall.

"Springlake-Earth has been up and down," commented Head Coach Roger Ezell. "They play well one week and badly the next.

"Defensively," he continued, "We would compare the Wolverines to Kress, however, they are better on offense. They are more explosive and have the necessary speed."

With some eight seniors in the starting lineup, the Wolverines are led by Quarterback Hal Wood, who was one of the best in District 3-A last year. Also back is Halfback Pete Rodriguez, who has 10 flat speed. In the line, the Wolverines are led by Lonnie Wilson, 170-pound senior, at tackle, Sam Parris, 155, and Charles Winders, 150, at guards; and Brad Haley, 155, at center, all seniors.

"Our kids did a good job, especially on defense, Friday night," said Ezell. "Offensively, we weren't that sharp, but we didn't get the holding and offside penalties that had been hurting us," he went on to say.

"Fumbles are still hurting us and we need to establish our passing game," he continued. "If we were passing as well as we are running the ball, we would be as good a ball club as last year."

"Defensively, we got right after them [Kress]," Ezell said. After making a few minor adjustments at halftime "the defense played even better." Ezell went on to say that the team was in several dangerous situations during the game, "but we kept our poise, didn't get rattled and adjusted quickly."

Ezell pointed out a number of Ponies who turned in outstanding performances, including Billy and Elbert Shelby, Ricky Stanberry, Terry Sherrill, Ray Martinez, Tommy DeLeon, Dannie McKay and Tony Serna.

The Mustangs emerged from the game in top physical condition, as far as injuries, however, Ezell said Quarterback Dennis Willard is out of school with strep throat but is expected to be in the lineup Friday night.

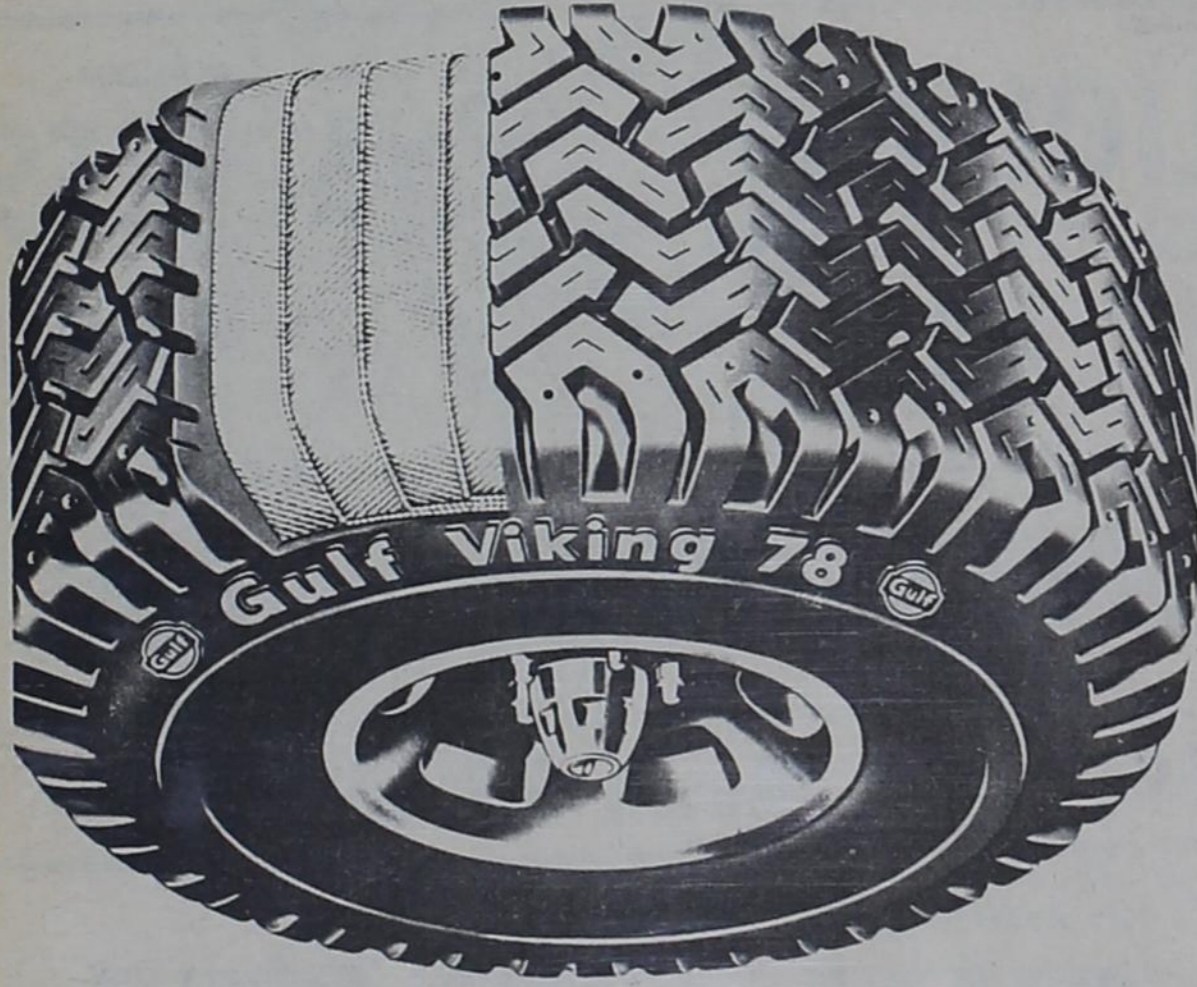
