The next morning we went to the market which was held on the city square. There booths were set up displaying clothes, farm produce, china, and many other things. It was really a fun time because most of our group and their families were there and we all met one another.

The afternoon was spent bicycling. We joined the mayor who cycles twenty miles and conducts a tour of eight Dutch castles. It was quite an afternoon filled with many collisions and some hard feelings, but we did see some beautiful countryside.

The second day of our home stay was spent in driving up to the polders. The polders are the regions of land that have been reclaimed from the sea, and are now used for farming. Outside our bus it was cold and rainy, but inside we were all gay and cheerful. We told jokes and sang songs, both Dutch and English, and once more made many new friends. That night we were given a farewell party which was also combined with celebrating the 4th of July. The party was a lot of fun because we told jokes, sang and danced many a polka and other Dutch folk dances. This ended our home stay

and to many of us it was sad because we were leaving behind many new friends and pleasant experiences. We boarded our bus after having a group picture made for the local newspaper, and for the next 30 minutes never sat down because we were continually waving at our cara-

van of friends who led and followed our bus out of town. After touring the rest of Europe, I don't think any other people can compare with the warmth and friendship that the Dutch people gave us. To me it was the highlight of my trip.



problem this week, more or less. Dear editar: Over the years and several times lately I've read about lawyers arguing that their

clients couldn't get a fair trial in their home towns because too much publicity had been given their crimes. Too many people know about the matter and a change of venue is required to get a fair and impartial jury,

the lawyers say. What they mean is that justice requires that their client be tried before 12 people whove never heard of the murder or the stealing or the defrauding or whatever it was he did. With or without a change of venue, sometimes it takes two or three months and thousands and thousands of dollars just to pick 12

people considered uninformed enough to serve. I have figured out a way to avoid all this. What we need

is a stable of people specially selected and sheltered to serve as jurors. It'd be their lifetime's work.

To make sure they meet the court's requirements, that is, that they are totally ignorant of what's going on, the professional jurors would be prohibited from reading any newspaper that isn't at least five years old. No television of course would be permitted, because

the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of any adjustment if such adjustment would result in an increase in the monthly bill; Be however, failure of Company to apply any adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make any adjustment, in whole or in part in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill. Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross rate shall be applicable thereafter. The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per meter per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location. In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to con duct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect. SECTION 2. The rate set orth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by aw. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office. SECTION 3. It is hereby found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance is passed is open to the public, as required by Texas law, and that advance public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given, and that this rate ordinance is in compliance with the applicable general criteria issued by the Price Commission under the Economic Stabilization Act of 1970, as amended.
