


He was self-employed, operating a Stock Medicine supply

mission opposing the closing of the street was Joe David Ross, who pointed out that the street to future business property. Also meeting with the com-



FLOOD CONTROL STRUCTURE NUMBER 13, just east of town, caught 56% of its capacity last week as heavy rains fell. Though records of damaging floods in 1925, 1930, 1932, 1936 and 1938 are available, a major flood has not occurred since Sonora was founded. The dams are designed by the U.S. Soil Conservation Service to prevent floods from a 100-year frequency flood. Ozona in June, 1954 had such a flood which claimed 15 lives and caused more than \$12-million in damages. During such a flood, the emergency spillway in the foreground of the above picture would flow water, but would not be expected to top the dam. The flood control structures are inspected at least annually by Soil Conservation Service personnel to insure that they function properly.

# Lowrey Draw And Dry Devils River, Tamed

The Lowrey Draw and Dry Devils River watershed project took the brunt of heavy rains last week in the Sonora area and prevented an estimated \$1.5 million in flood damages to about 100 homes and businesses, according to W. B. McMillan, chairman of the Edwards Plateau Soil and Water Conservation District.

Dalton Merz, District Conservationist for the U.S. Soil Conservation Service, said a recent check of flood prevention dams on Dry Devils River showed that all were holding back massive amounts of water that would have otherwise rushed down the river with devastating force, causing possible loss of life and tremendous property damage.

Lester Byer, hydraulic engineering technician, with the Agricultural Research Service reported that site number 13

caught 174 acre feet of water which is 56% of its capacity.

The dam could hold back an additional 141 acre feet which would give almost an added equal amount of flood protection from twice the rainfall that we received. Of the other sites, site num-

ber 12 was 37% of its capacity, site number 9 was 7% of its capacity; number 10 was 6% of its capacity and number 11 was 14% of its capacity.

Byer said, "the Hospital Draw that runs through Sonora into Lowrey Draw would have caused extensive damage to homes, utility lines, roads and bridges if flood retarding dam number 13 had not been built". He said the guages on Lowrey Draw watershed averaged 3. 90 inches in  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hours.

Classes at the county show this year will include carcass lamb classes, market lamb classes, breeding sheep, Angora goat, Beef heifer and other classes if there should be a need.



#### Improved Auto Insurance

Surveys have indicated that although the public really doesn't know what the term "nofault", means, as applied to auto insurance, a majority favor it because they think it will speed claims and reduce their insurance costs by cutting out lawsuits. Insurance authorities describe no-fault insurance simply as "a form of insurance in which all auto accident victims would be paid for their injuries, regardless of who caused the accident".

Life magazine published "a handy guide" to what no-fault insurance is all about. It describes how, in states where no-fault insurance is in force, victims are reimbursed for losses-medical bills, loss of income and the like-up to specified limits, above which the injured person is entitled to take his case to court.

Life points out that the main objection to nofault is that under a pure no-fault plan an accident victim gives up his right to sue for another person's negligence. To rectify this

weakness, major segments of the insurance industry have developed proposals for modified no-fault insurance systems that preserve the principle of driver responsibility for the injuries and property damage inflicted on other people in order to achieve the goal of assuring that all acident victims are paid promptly and without controversy for their injuries.

Irrespective of complexities of reforming insurance laws, both insured and insurers have a common interest in preserving the institution of private insurance coverage. The leadership of the insurance industry in seeking to lower costs, improve service and upgrade coverage is the best protection the public has against the usual pattern being followed of a reform movement becoming a crusade for a government take-over, in this case, of the vital function of providing auto insurance protection.

#### He Takes A Non-Progressive Look At **Plan To Explore Earth's Inner Depths**

ranch on Dry Devil's River may be getting in the way of progress again, his letter this week indicates. Dear editar:

Although it hasn't been established how high up a man owns space above his land, it is generally conceded that he owns as far down as you can go however an item I read in a newspaper last night may unloose a legal bag of worms on that point that even the Supreme Court won't be able to handle.



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

#### **Yellowing Plants** May Signal **Lack Of Iron**

If ornamental plants around your home are yellowing between the leaf veins, iron deficiency in the soil is the likely problem.

According to County Agricultural Agent D.C. Langford, iron deficiency causes leaves of ornamental plants to become light green, yellow or white between the veins. Iron chlorosis, as the condition is called also causes the needles or

scales of conifers to turn yellow. "The more severe the deficiency, the paler the color," notes Langford. "In extreme cases, the plant turns brown

and eventually dies. Even though soil may contain sufficient iron, high pH or excess lime in the soil may prevent the iron from being available to plants.

Where iron is deficient, iron chelates or organic compounds containing a soluble form of iron may be applied to the soil or plants. Ferrous sulfate, also called copperas, is one such organic compound. These supplemental materials are available at most garden supply

Langford emphasizes to apply iron at the first sign of a deficiency. Iron-containing materials can either be worked into the soil around the base of the plant or be dissolved in water and sprayed onto the foliage. In severe cases, plant recovery will be slow following applications.

Zinc deficiency shows up often in pecan, peach, plum, flowering quince and apple trees as well as in pyracantha.

For further information about iron deficiency and soil pH problems with ornamentals, contact the county Extension office. Two pamphlets that are available are L-164, "Soil Reaction (pH) Ranges," and L-435, "Iron Chlorosis."

#### **Emphysema** Country

One cigarette upsets the flow of air and blood in your lungs. Years of smoking can cause emphysema. And in the last decade, deaths from emphysema almost tripled in this

To investigate the relationship of smoking and emphysema, two prominent research ers-Drs. Oscar Auerback and E. Cuyler Hammon-studied whole-lung sections from autopsies of 1800 men and women. ruptured and broken. Among persons with the same smoking habits, the degree of emphysema in their lungs increased with age and number of years they had smoked

cigarettes. Other studies cited by the U. S. Surgeon General show the chances of dying from emphysema are 25 times greater for people who smoke two packs a day than for nonsmokers.





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
