choose the right lamp for study

The start of school signals the need to take a good look at the area you provide for your young students.

According to the Better Light Better Sight Bureau, you should select fluorescent light or one of the incandescent lights that provide a wide spread of light. Avoid high-intensity lights, pole lamps and goose-neck lamps.

Adequate illumination is important. The bulb should provide about 3,700 lumens (usually 150 or 200 watts in an incandescent bulb). But, the light should be diffused to avoid glare and soften the lighting.

Ideally, the shade should be white and have an open top.

The light should be to the side opposite the writing hand. The bottom edge of the lampshade should be at eye-level.

Also, make sure your study area is quiet and comfortable. The table or desk should have a smooth, flat surface.

Make sure your students have a lighting environment for their home studying.

A Bishop Looks at Life

ENRICHING EXPERIENCES

By Everett H. Jones, Retired Bishop of the Episcopal Church

During the past summer, as an exercise in thankfulness, I began to make a list of the

most enriching experiences that have come to me in three score and ten years of living.

As I made the list, I was impressed with the range and variety of the things I remembered.

Some notations had to do with home and family, with educational opportunities and teachers who really taught, and with the freedom to choose and follow my own vocation—the chance to be myself.

Many had to do with breathtaking beauty experienced and remembered—at certain times and places, before certain wonders of God's creation, in response to certain examples of man's creative genius.

Some had to do with books, especially with those that brought the illumination needed at a particular time, that were like beacon lights to guide my course. I thought of people I came to know thru biography. I gave special thanks for the habit continued to this day of living inwardly with a book while living outwardly in the world.

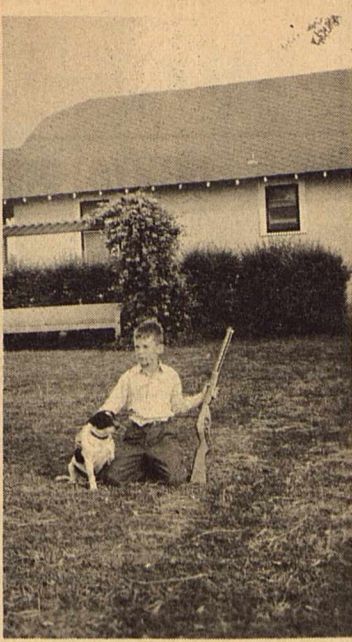
Of course I remembered treasured human relationships, friendships that had given life flavor and meaning. There was something miraculous about the way each one had brought a special kind of healing and inner security.

I thought of causes and movements in which I had some small part, in serving which I received more than I gave.

Perhaps the entry that surprised me most had to do with times in the valley of misery and crisis. They were "enriching" in that they broke down arrogance and self-sufficiency; they gave me better understanding of those in similar crisis; they helped me to re-discover God as my Refuge and Strength.

The final entry on my list of enriching experiences was brief but important: "A growing experience of God—the fact that He is, that He is at work, and that we can live in communion with Him."

The twigs, barks, leaves and pits within the fruit stones of peach and apricot trees all contain cyanide producing compounds.

"The reaction is rapid with little outward signs of poisoning," he said. "Death usually occurs less than an hour after the material is eaten."

Ellis said rhubarb is a spring tonic, but the leafy part of the plant is poisonous, as is uncooked pokeweed.

"Raw pokeweed produces a burning sensation in the mouth, or severe cramps, vomiting and diarrhea," he said. "If recovery does not occur within 24 hours, pokeweed may be fatally poisonous."

He said there are antidotes for most plant poisonings, however, if the active agent is known.
