

The current recession has slowed growth of state tax revenues in nearly every state. As expected, politicians and bureaucrats in states without personal income taxes use the opportunity to "prove" that an income tax is necessary for the continuation of essential state services. Texas and Florida are the two largest states without an income tax; the other income tax free states are Alaska, Nevada, South Dakota, Washington, and Wyoming. Connecticut, New Hampshire, and Tennessee do not tax wage or salary income.

Certainly an income tax will fuel the expansion of state government. Based on the experiences of the eight most recent states to adopt an income tax, we can expect that adopting even a modest 3 to 4 percent state tax on personal income will increase state spending over 20 percent over the next decade. So if expanding the size and scope of state government is the goal, an income tax is a very effective way to achieve it.

But a state income tax is also a strong prescription for slowing

A parade is being put into the works for the Fourth and all businesses and organizations, as well as individuals, are urged to enter a float in the parade.



A computer simulation undertaken for the Texas Public Policy Foundation estimated that a Texas state income tax would reduce personal income 8 to 9 percent below otherwise forecast for the year 2000, an annual loss of nearly \$40 billion to the citizens of the state.





Delegates To Attend Confab

More than 1,000 United Methodists will gather June 3-6 at Polk Street United Methodist Church in Amarillo for the 82nd session of the Northwest Texas Annual Conference.

The event, an annual meeting of clergy and elected lay delegates from United Methodist congregations, is the official business and policy-making session for the denomination in the Northwest Texas area.

Delegates from the Bovina congregation will be Bob Owen and Durward Bell.

Highlights of the event will include election of eight delegates-four clergy and four laity--to the 1992 General Conference. The General Conference, held every four years, is United Methodism's top policy-making body.

In addition, ten representatives, five clergy, five laity--will be chosen as delegates to the 1992 South Central Jurisdictional Conference, set for July 13-16 in Fort Worth.

At 7 p.m., Monday, June 3, by Bishop Louis W. Schowengerdt, area bishop of the Northwest Texas/New Mexico Area since 1980, will address the conference during the service of worship. The giving and receiving of new pastoral appointments for 1991-92 will also take place during the worship service at Polk Street UMC, located at 1411 S. Polk Street, in downtown Amarillo.

A conference-wide celebration and rally are set for Tuesday, June 4 in the Amarillo Civic Center, expected to draw thousands of United Methodists from across the Northwest Texas area. The Festival of Sharing will be held from 4-7 p.m., featuring booths and tables highlighting United Methodist ministries from the local to national levels. The Vision 2000 Rally will begin with a hymn festival at 7:15 p.m. in the Civic Center auditorium, followed by the rally at 7:30 p.m. A 250-voice choir, composed of vocalists from Amarillo and the surrounding areas, will be featured. they will The service of ordination and consecration will be held Wednesday, June 5 at 7:30 p.m. Three persons will be consecrated as diaconal (lay) ministers, four will be ordained deacon and 11 ordained elder during the service. Featured preacher for the annual conference will be Dr. Joe Harding, director of evangelism and church growth ministries with the United Methodist board of discipleship. The church growth specialist is author of the new denominationwide Vision 2000 program, being used nationally by annual conferences in United Methodism, as a vehicle for strengthening local congregations as they move into the 21st century.



water district with 451 tailwater return pits, followed by Parmer County with 338 and Castro County with 309.

There are approximately 300 modified playa basins in Floyd County. Castro County follows with 263 modified playas and Parmer County has 186.

Excess irrigation water, or "tailwater," running off the end of a field has been a serious concern of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 since its creation in 1951. The primary cause of tailwater were furrow runs in excess of about one-half mile which required large flow rates to literally "push" the water through the furrows.

In the mid-1960s, the water district constructed V-notch weirs and placed them in county bar ditches to measure actual tailwater losses. Flood gauges installed in front of the weirs measured the height of the water flowing through the weir. Signs showing the conversion of the inches of water passing through the weirs into gallons per minute were placed inside each installation.

The district's study concluded that as much as 20% of the volume of water pumped by an irrigator could be lost as irrigation tailwater. In addition, it was discovered that tailwater waste encouraged soil erosion.

Since then, the district has actively promoted the use of tailwater return systems to stop accumulation of silt in bar ditches, flooding of county roads, damage to neighboring fields and to conserve precious groundwater resources.

The water district designed and constructed several tailwater return demonstration systems in the 1960s. Public tours of these demonstration systems was one method used by the district to promote the adoption of this water conservation technique. The positive results obtained from these first tailwater return pit installations convinced many irrigators to install and use tailwater return systems on their farms.
