### A Bishop Looks at Life

A LESSON OF HISTORY

By Everett H. Jones, Retired Bishop of the **Episcopal Church** 

A remarkable scholarly achievement of this century was the ten volume series. The Story of Civilization", by Will and Ariel Durant. The research for this project required forty years, and the volumes covered the experience of twenty civilizations during a period of over 4000

A few years ago the Durants summarized their historical discoveries in a single volume The Lessons of History". This book is full of profound observations but one of them is so timely it deserves to be

repeated. The authors wrote: "No one man, however brilliant or well-informed, can come in ne lifetime to such fulnes of understanding as to safely judge and dismiss the customs or institutions of his society, for these are the wisdom of generations after centuries of experience in the laboratory

of history. "A youth boiling with hormones will wonder why he should not give full freedom to his sexual desires. If he is unchecked by customs, morals or laws, he may ruin his life before he matures sufficiently to understand that sex is a river of fire that must be banked and cooled by a hundred restraints if it is not to consume in chaos both the

individual and the group.' I thought of these words when I read in a recent newspaper report about the great increase in youth suicides. Suicide has become the fourth largest cause of death among teenagers, and increased

almost 100% in 1972. Several noted psychologists in commenting on this problem asserted that one cardinal cause is "the loss of all meaningful relationships. A relationship designed by God to be deep and holy has

become shallow and empty. There is growing evidence that the swing of the pendu-lum to unlimited sexual freedom is causing more misery than happiness. Sometimes the misery is so great that it seems unbearable.



It started out on wool, and the "party line" came out, You cannot tailor any material without wool in it." I agreed, being careful to note how well his polyester double knit slacks fitted his boot tops.

Next ranchmen's independence was covered. It was generally agreed that if you have the capital, ranching is the way to go. Until I retired,

I never saw the true perspective-many of my friends amply endowed with acreage retired upon graduating from high school. There can be no question, that ranching offers the least diluted freedom in our entire economic sphere. Unfortunately, against the present tax background you cannot buy a ranch-only inherit it as my

friend did, or marry it. I asked about wool incentive payments and was assured that was different.

There is no question that if an agricultural subsidy is provided, it should be paid directly to the producer-not at the wholesale level or to the middle man. I pointed out that the farmers couldn't

attempt to keep wool sales up. How are things going?

In 1962 about 10% of our clothing was synthetic, last year the synthetics represented 70% of the market. What does it mean? Frankly, I do not know and can only watch with

One can only speculate on what would have resulted if the ranchman had let their wool go below the critical competitive point for synthetics. Had that happened, today's wool prices could have been surprising, sans incen-




