





by T. DRISKELL FIT stands for "Fight Inflation

Together" and once again the ugly ogre-toothed head of fadism rears itself on the American social scene. FIT is a commendable bit of equine theft prevention, long after the proverbial horse has been stolen, and completely worked to death Like the bride left waiting in the church, I say to those crusaders, "Where wuz you all when the price of automobiles doubled, windmills quadrupled, razor blades tripled, and master plumbers wages went to \$18 per hour?"

The sensitivity of the movement is obviously deficient. If it is on an object generally purchased on credit, inflationwise they can swallow almost any camel, or whole caravan for that matter, but on an item purchased routinely and for cash, price rises compatable to all surrounding increased costs is a gnat which makes an urgent tracheotomy necessary. If we cannot acheive an overall balance, we are flogging

a dead horse. One must necessarily note the similarity between the welldressed middle class women on national television (in prime time periods) and the long-hair. ed agitators trying to induce mob action. A lynch mob, a student revolt, a racial mob; it's all the same bag. There is a distinct possibility that the esults this time will be equalv disastrous.

The key to the situation is the group of independent agriculturists. They represent the last independent and unorganized facet of our economy. They ar good poker players, as they should be after all those years gambling with the elements, markets and livestock hazards. Strong willed? They are living examples of hair growing out of granite-you haven't seen harder heads. Suppose they decide arbitarily to reduce thei beef herds by 25%, and with the growing demand it might not be a bad play. In that case price be dammed, availability would become the question. One wonders how long the agriculturists can combat an over-organized economy surrounding them and remain un-

organized (or is it disorganized? More and more, they are saying, "What's the use?" and pulling their capital out of agriculture. Food productions then falls into the hands of corporations. Of all the things that can be said about American corporations, they are disorganized, is not one. In corporation operation such activity as FIT would be met by a curtailment of production or divisions of resources.
