THE PHONE LINES into Washington D.C. were clogged with 500,000 calls last week as half a million people called in, five to one against the President's proposal for lifting the ban on gays in the military.

Probably as big as the gay issue, is the question "Will the people's voice make a difference?" During election campaigns, the politicians are vitally interested in the opinion of us common folks. But we usually notice a big difference in attitude once they've gotten settled into those plush Washington offices. The opinion changes almost immediately from... "We invite your input on these issues" to... "We experts are the only ones qualified to make the decisions."

A good example of this is the answer given by Texas State Senator Temple Dickson to a constituent who complained to him about a piece of proposed legislation. Dickson replied "You don't seem to have enough sense for me to waste my time on." (*Newsweek*, Jan. 11, 1993) This is similar to the response that Bill and I received several years ago from Senator Lloyd Bentsen (now Secretary of the Treasury) when we were urging our elected officials NOT to give away the Panama Canal.

Most of us realize that the "gays in the military" thing is just a smokescreen to divert our attention from the fact that nothing is being done about the economy. For that matter, gays have their own smokescreen and are experts at using it. The minute the AIDS topic comes up they start screaming about being discriminated against, their civil rights being violated, and how they can't help themselves because they were born homosexual. Baloney! Masters and Johnson, the recognized experts on human sexuality, say there is no basis for the genetic theory of homosexuality. It is a learned condition.

As a patron of the arts, I have personally known some very nice gay fellows and have nothing against them as individuals. To some degree, I can understand the need for creative-type people to express themselves in a non-traditional manner as long as it does not harm others. But I am heart-sick at the devastating effect the AIDS virus has had on the visual and performing arts in our society.

35 YRS. AGO--FEB. 5, 1958

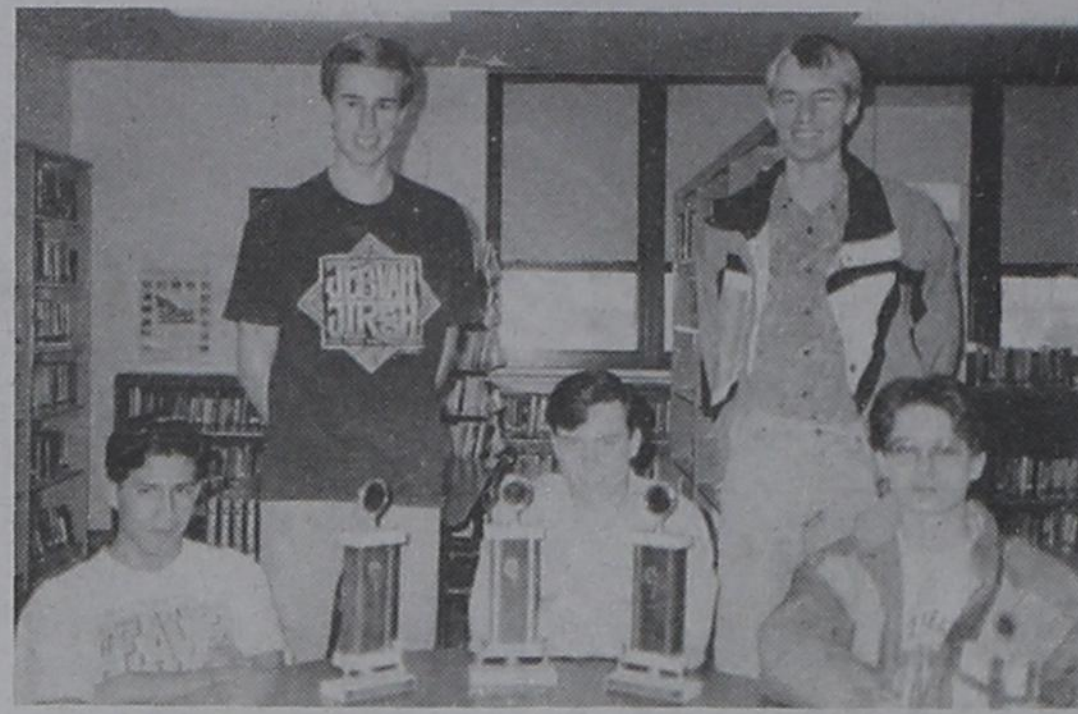

BHS Trio Wins In Computer Contest

Students from the Bovina High School computer team competed in the Area I computer contest

sponsored by the Texas Computer Education Association in Amarillo on Saturday, January 30.

The teams competed against area teams in 1A, 2A and 3A schools and received first and fifth place honors.

The first place winners were Darren Hromas, Kody Wilson and Matt Hromas who won with 21 points. This score was the highest of any school competing, including the 4A and 5A schools who were represented.

Andy Espinoza and Donnie Estridge made up the second team and placed fifth.

The TCEA contest consists of a set of problems that the teams must solve using the computers. They must complete as many programs correctly during the two hour time limit.

An example problem might be to compute and print out a Fibonacci sequence of numbers. Each program has a point value of 2, 5 or 9 points depending on the difficulty of the problem.

This win entitles the first place team the honor of competing in the state computer contest in San Antonio on March 6. The team sponsors are Janie Sudderth and Linda Lewis.

Mustangs Continue In District

The Bovina High School Mustangs dropped both of their district games during the past week.

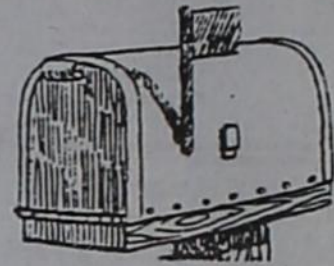
The team fell to Sudan here last Friday, 76-60. Sammy Rodriguez scored 19 points, Rusty Venable 18 and Darren Hromas 14.

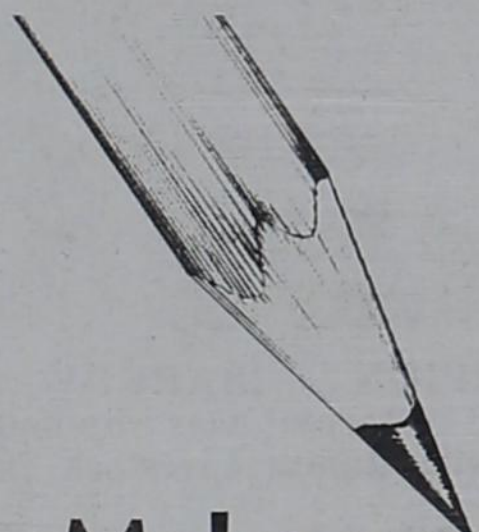

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Recipes Using Grapefruit

One of my most fond Christmas morning memories is of the huge bags of grapefruit that Santa Claus left beside the tree every year. We would eat grapefruit for weeks, it seemed.

I still enjoy a fresh and tangy grapefruit sprinkled with just a touch of sugar. Of course, even as children, we learned that the prized grapefruit were Texas Rudy Reds.

The red grapefruit originated in Texas. Today, there are several varieties of Texas red grapefruit, including the Rio Star and the Ruby-Sweet.

Grapefruit are nutritious and low in calories. A typical red grapefruit has 37 calories, and each half provides 78 per cent of the U.S. Recommended Daily Allowance of Vitamin C. Grapefruit also is a good source of Vitamin A, potassium and dietary fiber.

When measuring grapefruit, keep in mind that one medium grapefruit equals 2/3 cup juice, 1 cup bite-sized pieces, 10-12 sections, or 3-4 tablespoons grated peel. To get the most juice from a grapefruit, let it come to room temperature and roll it gently before squeezing.

To section a grapefruit, cut off the ends of the grapefruit with a sharp, thin-bladed knife. Place the fruit flat side down and cut away the peel from top to bottom along the curve of the fruit. Remove all the white pulp. Cut down along one section to the center. Then, turn the knife sideways to loosen the section and lift out. Other sections will be easy to remove.

Texas grapefruit are available from October through mid-May. When buying grapefruit, look for well-shaped, heavy fruit that is springy to the touch. Avoid grapefruit which is soft or discolored at the end.

Although fresh grapefruit eaten with a serrated spoon for breakfast is probably the most popular method of eating the citrus fruit, grapefruit can be used in a variety of recipes and can be eaten hot as dessert. Try the following recipes:

BROILED GRAPEFRUIT

1 grapefruit
Brown sugar
Butter or margarine, softened
Cut grapefruit in half. Cut sections from membrane, leaving them in place. Cut out core and remove seeds. Sprinkle each half with a little brown sugar and dot with butter. Broil for 10 minutes or until golden brown and heated through.

CITRUS SALAD WITH GRAPEFRUIT DRESSING

3 cups torn spinach leaves
3 cups torn leaf lettuce
3 cups torn iceberg lettuce
1 grapefruit, peeled and sectioned
2 oranges, peeled and sectioned
1 avocado, peeled and sliced
1/2 cup sliced celery
1/2 cup sliced green pepper
1/4 cup slivered almonds, toasted
Combine spinach and lettuce in a large bowl, and toss lightly. Arrange remaining ingredients over greens. Top with Grapefruit Dressing (see following recipe).

GRAPEFRUIT DRESSING

1 (.75-ounce) package Italian salad dressing mix
2/3 cup vegetable oil, divided
1-1/2 teaspoon grated grapefruit rind
1/2 cup grapefruit juice
Combine salad dressing mix and 1/3 cup oil in a jar. Cover tightly and shake vigorously. Add remaining 1/3 cup oil and remaining ingredients. Cover tightly and shake vigorously. Refrigerate.

GRAPEFRUIT CHEESECAKE

1-9 inch crumb crust
2/3 cup low-fat cottage cheese

1 cup nonfat lemon yogurt
2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice
3 tablespoons sugar
1-1/2 cups freshly squeezed grapefruit juice
2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
1/2 cup water
1 grapefruit

Prepare the crust and chill until ready to use. Blend the cottage cheese and yogurt in a blender or food processor until very smooth. Add the lemon juice, sugar and grapefruit juice; blend again until well mixed. In a small saucepan, sprinkle the gelatin over the water and let it stand until softened, about 1 minute. Stir over low heat until gelatin is completely dissolved, about 5 minutes. Remove from heat and let cool to lukewarm. Add the gelatin mixture to the cheese mixture and mix well. Chill until thickened. Beat with a rotary beater or electric mixer for 1 minute. Pour into the crumb crust and chill until firm. Separate a peeled grapefruit into sections and remove the membrane. After the cheesecake is firm, arrange the grapefruit sections in an attractive pattern on the top. Sprinkle with additional crumbs.

MINT-GRAPEFRUIT SORBET

2/3 cup sugar
2-3 large pink grapefruit, peeled and sections, membranes removed, divided
5 tablespoons white creme de menthe
1/4 cup water
Mint leaves, for garnish
Combine the sugar, grapefruit, creme de menthe and water in the bowl of a food processor or blender and puree until smooth. Let mixture stand for 30 minutes. Pour the puree into a shallow glass dish and place it in the freezer for 12-24 hours or until frozen solid. Transfer the frozen fruit mixture to the food processor and process on a

pulse setting until it is smooth. Return the mixture to the dish and re-freeze for 1 to 1-1/2 hours. Remove the dish from the freezer and let stand at room temperature for about 10 minutes before serving to allow it to soften slightly. Scoop out small balls and serve in bowls with a grapefruit section and a sprig of mint leaves. Makes 8 servings.

GRAPEFRUIT PIE

1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons cornstarch
1-3/4 cup water
Pinch of salt
1-3 ounce package strawberry gelatin

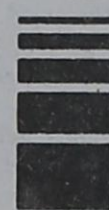
3 medium grapefruit, peeled
1 baked 9-inch pastry shell
Whipped cream

Cook sugar, cornstarch, water and salt until thick and clear. Add gelatin and stir until mixture begins to set. Remove membrane from grapefruit sections, drain sections in a strainer and cut into small pieces.

Add grapefruit to gelatin mixture. Pour mixture into pastry shell and top with whipped cream. Chill until ready to serve.

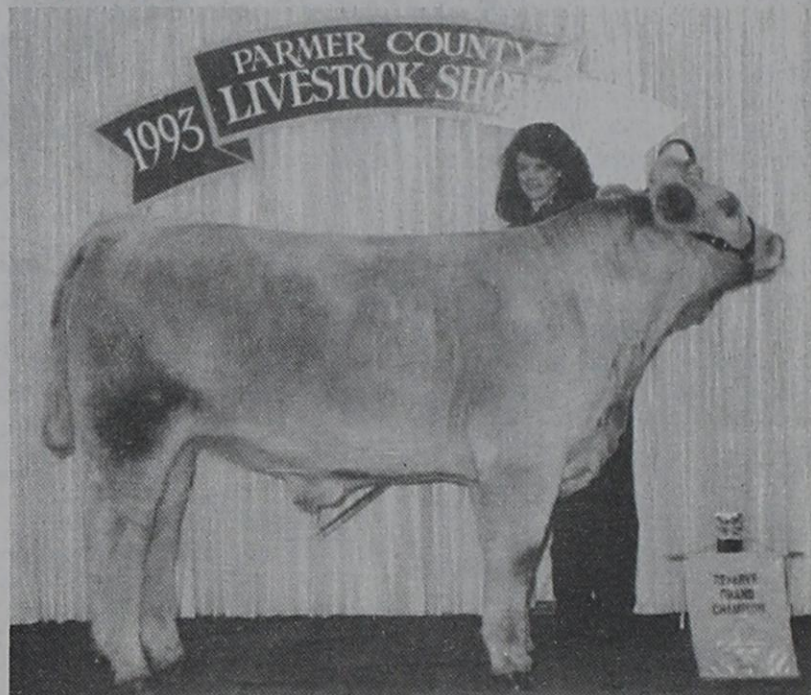

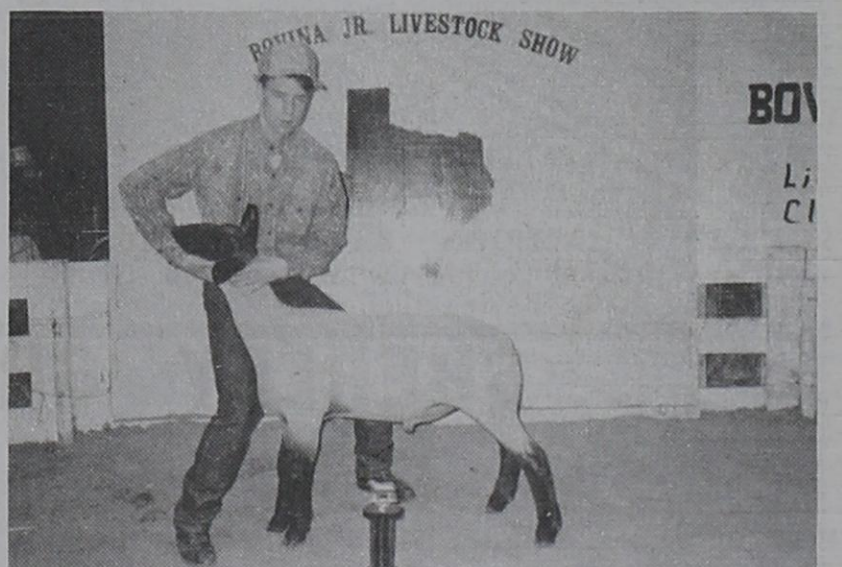

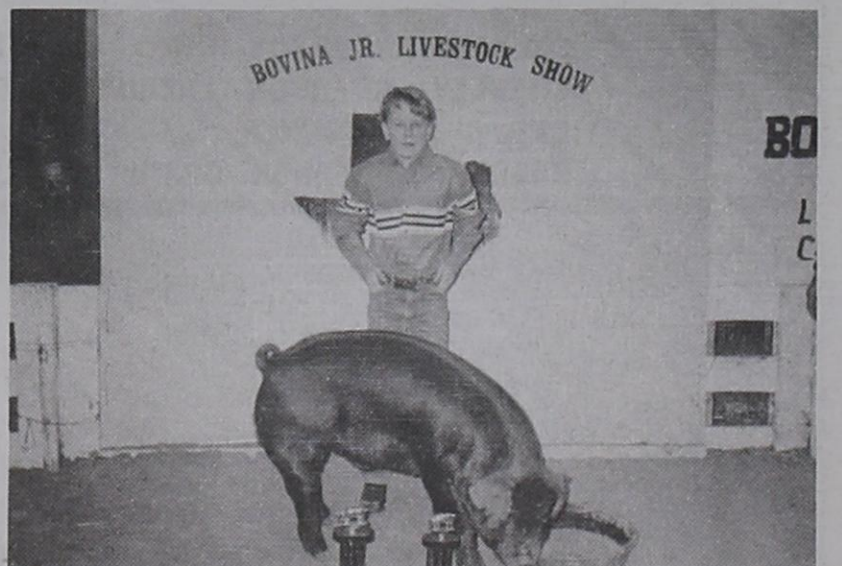

Brooke Charles led the scoring with 12 against Vega. Miss Charles and Darla Stormes each scored six against Farwell.

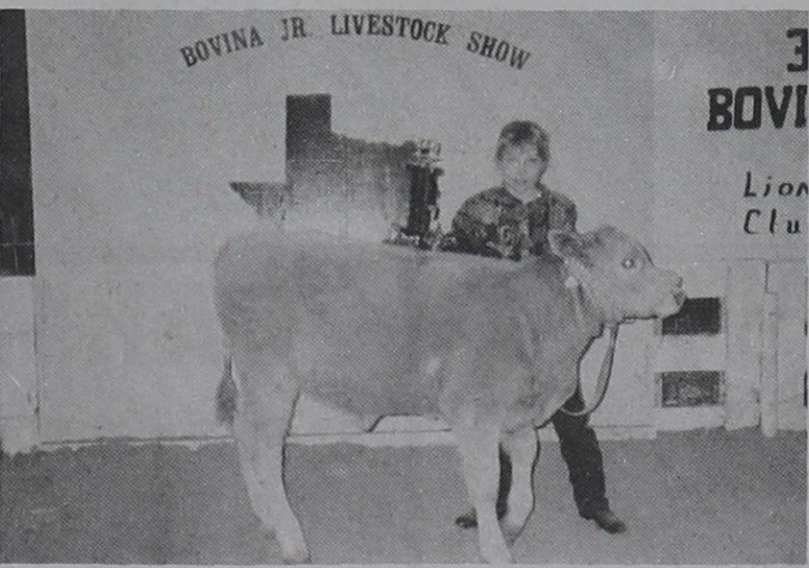

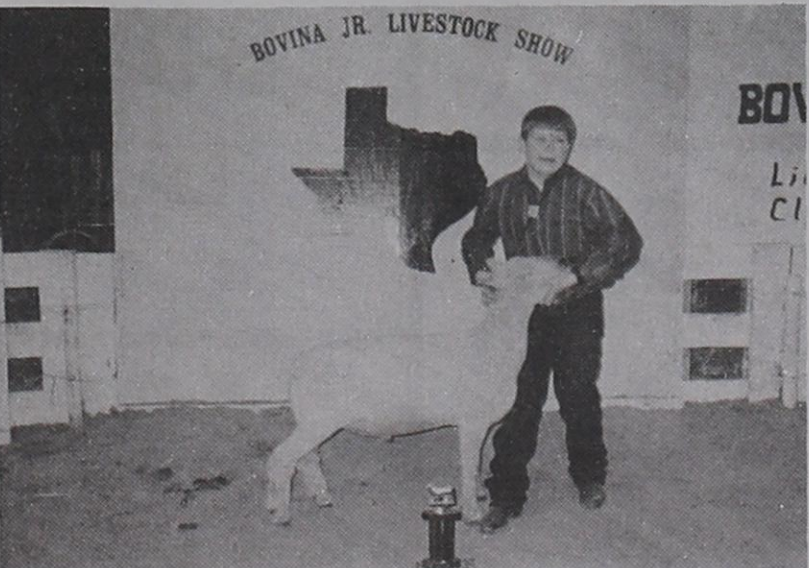

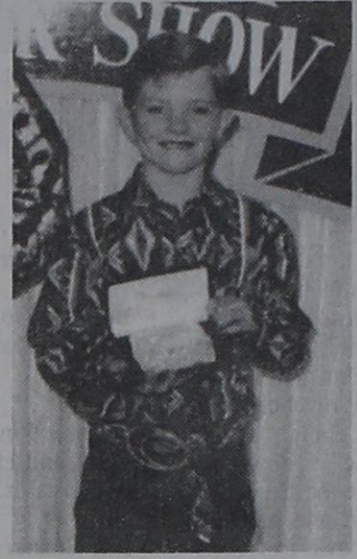

LANCE TEAGUE'S Southdown lamb won its class and was named breed champion at the 1993 Parmer County Junior Livestock Show.



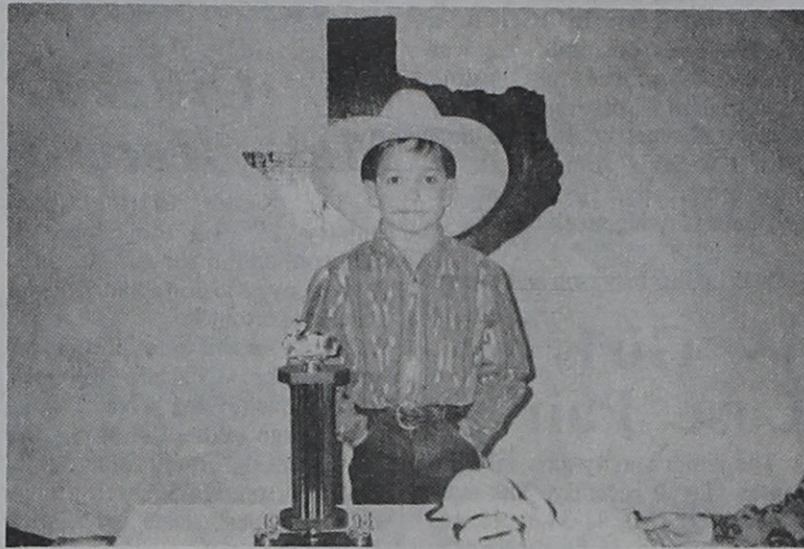

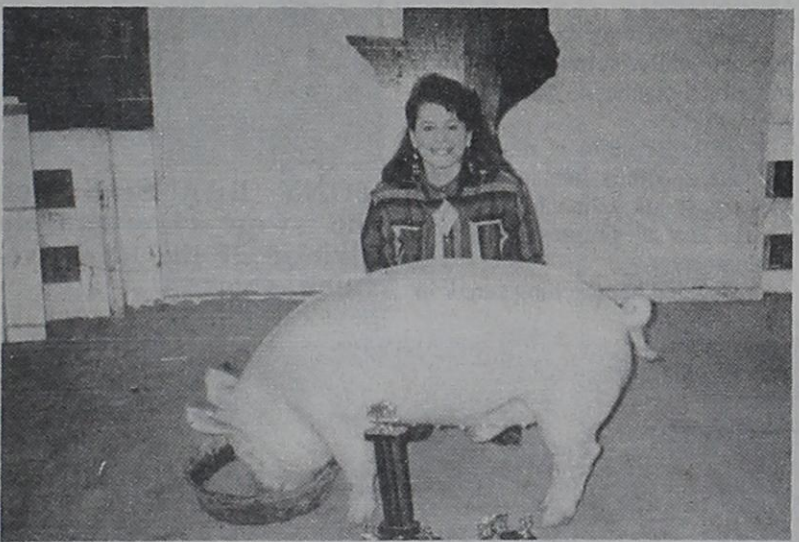

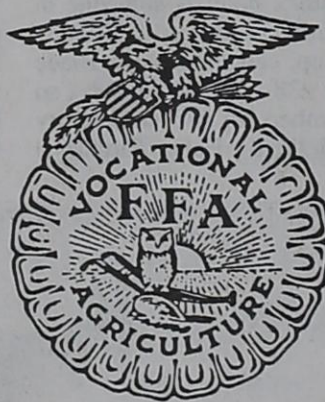
