Junior Quarter Horse Show Planned June 6

Before the day of June 6 has ended here, several scores of youths will have tested their horsemanship in 17 classes of competition.

On June 6 is the 1973 Sonora Junior Quarter Horse Show, one of the Sutton County 4-H Club's annual projects, and open to all boys and girls younger than 19 and enrolled in public school.

All begins at 9 a. m. at the race track of the Sonora Park Association, where the public is invited to watch free as Sparks Rust of Del Rio judges eleven halter and six performance classes according to rules of the American Quarter Horse Association.

Both juniors (13 or younger) and seniors (14 through 18) will compete on equal basis in nine halter classes. In the four per-

formance classes of western pleasure, reining, pole bending and barrel racing, juniors will ride in their age group, and seniors in theirs.

Juniors only will compete in breakaway roping, and seniors only in tie-down roping. Two classes of showmanship are to be judged, junior and senior, and for all but these last two, contestants will pay \$5 for every class entered.

The 1973 show committeemen are Billie Galbreath, Bill Whitehead, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Powers, Albert Ward, announcer, and secretary, Mrs. Mickey Powers.

Clay Cade and Dick Morrison are timers, and ring stewards will be R. W. Wallace, Hoot Nix and Jack Baker.

Awards to be presented by Sutton County 4-H Sweetheart, Miss Sarah Allison, will consist of halters, buckles, spurs, and trophies. Ribbons go to riders in top six places in both halter and performance classes.

There will be an entry fee of \$5 for each halter and performance class entered, said County Agent D. C. Langford.

Lone Star Files Application For Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas Company filed an application with the Texas Railroad Commission for an increase in the city gate rate for gas delivered to each town served by the company in Texas.

The primary factors involved in Lone Star's application relate to the cost of maintaining an adequate gas supply for customers, and contracting for new supplies to meet growing customer demands. The individual items included in the company's rate increase proposal are: (1) the right to recover costs and return of \$7.2 million associated with the firm's West Texas Gas Supply System, an approximate 400 mile large diameter pipeline system from West Texas to the Dallas-Fort Worth area; (2) the right to recover costs and return of \$0.8 million on approximately \$9.6 million in advance payments and prepayments the company thus far has made to producers as a part of new gas purchase agreements; (3) to bring the company's weighted average cost of gas used in the Commission's calculation of Lone Star's base city gate rate up from the 16.29-cents per thousand cubic feet to the present level of 20.53-cents per thousand; (4) to allow Lone Star to "pass on" 100% of its increased cost of purchased gas on a monthly basis, rather than the presently allowed 65% every six months.

The cost adjustments would mean an 8.1-cent per thousand cubic feet increase in the city gate rate, and an increase of \$10.5 million in Lone Star's annual revenues when costs are flowed through to customers, based on a 1972 volume of approximately 130 billion cubic feet.

The company further noted that all proposed rate increases are cost justified and within nationally established price control guidelines for utilities established last year.

LONE STAR PURCHASES MORE WEST TEXAS GAS
Lone Star Gas Company has signed a contract with Marathon Oil Company to purchase West Texas gas reserves. Terms of the contract were not disclosed, but geological information indicates that planned drilling could ultimately develop reserves in excess of 100 billion cubic feet.

The gas will come from a number of wells located in the West Grey Ranch field in Pecos County. Marathon has an interest in 18 sections in the vicinity of present development. All the gas will come from the Ellenburger formation at a depth of approximately 19-21,000 feet.

Lone Star will transport the gas to the Dallas-Fort Worth area through its new 36-inch West Texas Supply System.

Last December Lone Star purchased an estimated 175 billion cubic feet of gas reserves from several West Texas producers. Most of this gas also will come from wells in Pecos County.

Texas Oil Fields Produce All-Time High In 1972

In the face of unprecedented demand, Texas oil fields last year produced almost 1.3 billion barrels of crude oil, an all-time record for the state. This figure was tops among the nation's oil-producing states and represented some 38-percent of total U. S. production, according to statistics compiled by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

These figures show an increase of more than 67.8 million barrels over production in 1971. They reflect that during the last nine months of the year, the Texas Railroad Commission maintained a maximum efficient production rate for Texas fields. This marked the first time Texas wells had produced all-out since 1948.

Last year's crude oil production, recorded in 203 of the state's 254 counties, was valued at some \$4.5 billion.

In 83 years of recorded production, Texas has produced nearly 37-billion barrels of oil, about 36-percent of total U. S. production.

Sutton County, which has had recorded production since 1948, last year produced 163,891 barrels of oil at the rate of 448 barrels a day. Production in 1972 boosted Sutton County's production total through the end of the year to 2,752,335 barrels.

Some 32 counties last year produced more than 10-million barrels of crude oil. The top half-dozen, all with production in excess of 50-million barrels, include:

Methodists Schedule Southwest Annual Conference May 28-31, San Antonio

The chairman of the United Methodist Commission that formulated the denomination's new Social Principles will be the preacher for the Southwest Texas Annual Conference meeting May 28-31 in San Antonio.

Bishop James S. Thomas, Des Moines, one of the church's black bishops, steered the Commission through four years of discussion prior to the debate of the General Conference in Atlanta last year. The statement speaks to abortion, homosexuality, private property, conscientious objection, and civil disobedience. He will speak four different times to the conference delegates and visitors.

Worship services will be conducted in the Travis Park United Methodist Church and most business sessions during the day will be held in the Villita Assembly Building.

Key issues to be decided include the proposed sale of Mt. Wesley Assembly at Kerrville, establishing a new position of Retreat Master and the consideration of a \$1,690,700 budget. The proposed sale of the Kerrville camp carries with it a request for \$1,000 to continue study of the annual conference's camping program needs. No sale price has been revealed.

The Retreat Master position has a \$50,000 grant that would help fund the staff position for its first two years.

Opposition has stated that the work could better be done by the existing conference

personnel.

The conference budget includes \$4,300 new money which is reported to be less than one-half of one percent increase over 1973 budget.

A Father's Hope

Most young people find that sometime in their early and middle teens, parents may become quite a burden and may stay that way for quite awhile. It is during this trying time that youngsters test their wings and out of the confusion gain some understanding of life.

But now that higher education is being spread around a little more liberally than it used to be, most youngsters pack off to college just about the time they are at the height of their teenage confusion.

Very often the Ivy'd kids do little, at least for the first two or three years, to nurture the tender seed of common sense and human wisdom which may be seeking to take root somewhere in the student's cranial area.

Mr. William F. McCurdy, an executive of one of the nation's largest retailing organizations, wrote a letter to his son on the occasion of his beginning his college career. His letter offers good advice for a lot of other people as well as those on the young side of the generation gap.

He said, "Above all else we hope that you will not destroy the private enterprise system in America. We hope rather that you will understand it, appreciate it, learn to cherish it, because if you don't my

son, I predict that 20 years from now you're going to have a son driving off to school during another generation gap and you're going to be defending your generation against his generation and he's going to be saying that your generation turned out to be a bunch of sociological weirdos who were the residual legatees of an economic Garden of Eden and had neither the good sense nor strength to preserve it."

It is the job of young and old alike to see that this can never be said about any generation of Americans.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

(The following letter was received addressed to T. Driskell, in answer to last week's "Viewpoint".)

Mr. Driskell, Realizing I have not spent thirty years of my life under military control, I may not be qualified to, or question, your editorial. Since most editorials are written to make people think and sometimes may be irritating, I have refrained from permitting my thoughts pertaining to such material from becoming legible. However, you have made several statements which have not only insulted me, as a teacher and coach, but also attack the school and students. Maybe I am too thin-skinned, but I feel many remarks ridicule my intelligence and system of values.

First of all, I doubt that your experience as a substitute teacher was any more traumatic for you than it was for the students. It was quite an experience to hear the students coming out of your class. It was also interesting to know you "demonstrated an I. Q. in the upper 2% of the men this nation made available to the Air Corps." Maybe I should tell my students how intelligent I am so they can be impressed, but with your "awe-stricken admiration of the mind potential of some of the Sonora's freshmen and sophomores", I am sure they are aware that actions often speak louder than words.

Your analogy of our students as livestock was quite unique. You did not mention whether they resembled sheep, goats, or maybe even pigs. That would make some difference. It seems contradictory to characterize student behavior as being similar to livestock, and then questioning the necessity of hall passes. Having worked livestock during my "younger days", any tool, such as a good sheep dog or quick quarter horse greatly facilitated renegade stock. Hall passes serve as a means of keeping the students from wandering around or getting lost, as some so easily do. This is no reflection upon their parents and has no "harsh implications". It is just a means of avoiding unauthorized traffic.

It has been my impression, deeply instilled by education courses and teaching experiences, that regardless of environment, learning occurs any time there is teaching. Also the use of a text book as the only tool of education stimulation is rapidly diminishing. The big kick now is audio-visual aids, which I feel have greatly facilitated instruction, and with decreasing classroom regimentation, students can feel free to ask teachers questions without fear of being lashed about the head and shoulders. I would hate to replace those old Sears catalogues with an overhead projector. Those people in Arkansas may not appreciate it.

I took most of the editorial without becoming incoherently violent, but when I reached the part concerning the trophy display, I began "foaming at the mouth". The comparison of our trophy display to that of a hock shop or stud farm and then questioning the value of such a program really penetrated my "super-thin skin".

First of all, most people have the desire to excel, whether it be in number sense, drama, band, and I shake as I am forced to mention athletics. Is this desire due to chromosomal aberrations, becoming a fault in ones personality, or is it an innate response to challenges, both natural and man-made? When a school is composed of a State Champion One Act Play, Sweepstakes band, State track champion, State golf runner-up, four State Football Championships in seven years, then a lot of people have either been fooled or have felt that such activities are worth the price one must pay to excel. Also evident is the fact that the two top students in this years graduating class were exceptional athletes and that the top girl was a member of one of the best Class A bands in the state. Is it a crime that

One notes John Connally's shift in party alignment and must wonder about it. The smellier the Watergate debacle gets, the less room is left for speculation about whether or not Connally blew it. He, it cannot be denied, is an extremely astute politician. Perhaps the voters do have about the memory of a wild turkey hen. Give the franchised population a good memory, and I must assume that a gigantic political egg has been laid.

Connally was the only good thing I could see about the past Nixon team in office. He is without a doubt the most plausible presidential candidate on the political horizon--most plausible heck, only suitable would be better words. He is intelligent, articulate and versatile, and long on capability in the public and foreign relations fields.

Connally has a large following which is independent of party alignment, so it is not a question of whether or not he should run, but with whom.

Look at his chances in either major party. The democrats are hung up on Massachusetts, as well as they should be, it is the only state they carried last time. Look at their track record, a super salesman with non-existent decision making capability, warmed over New Dealism, and a proposal of the Senator McGovern. Connally is clear of that stain, but it is somewhat reminiscent of what they say about communists... "them communists is bad, but it's them feller travelers you really gotta watch out for."

Can Connally do the sweeping under the carpet which the Republicans have neglected for the past two decades? Will the voters remember that the great mental powers which allowed Watergate are still Republican? Those two questions are critical. I hope that the minds who perpetrated Watergate are institutionalized by 1976 (as they should have been since childhood). Given only some party house cleaning, the job becomes feasible.

I am an Independent in case you couldn't guess, and to me at least in the 1976 presidential timber, Connally stands out like a redwood in a tree crop failure. I am not alone, but to me the shift was a question until I analyzed it--frankly I hope it flies.
