



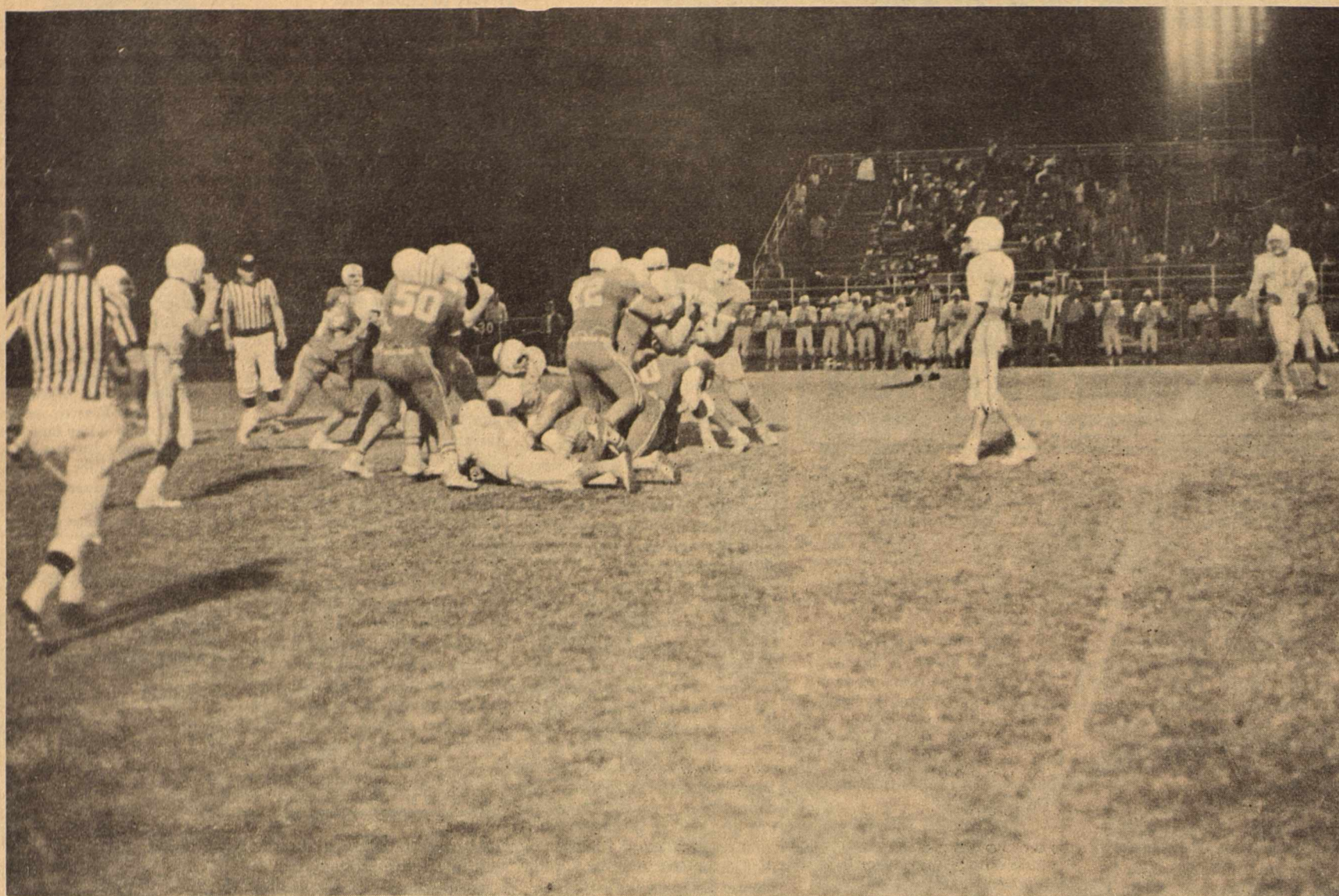

Broncos Trample Steers 41-7

The Sonora Broncos rolled up over 400 yards total offense in defeating the Robert Lee Steers 41-7 Friday night in Bronco stadium.

21 point first period. Early in the first quarter David Wallace returned a Steer punt 40 yards to the Steer's 45 yard line and Bruce Kerbow carried up the middle for the first score.

Robert Lee fumbled on their next possession and the Broncos had a first and ten on the Steer 40. Looking like an instant replay of his first romp, Kerbow again scored from 40 yards out. Mata kicked true making it 14-0. The Bronco defense forced the Steers to punt on their next possession. David Wallace caught the ball on his own 30 and using good blocks, rambled 70 yards for the third Bronco TD. The PAT by Mata gave the Broncos a 21 point first quarter lead.

The shearing and weighing of lambs for the 1974 Sutton County 4-H Livestock Show will be Saturday, October 27 at the Sutton County 4-H Center from 8 a. m. to 12 noon.

County 4-H Livestock Show or who need help in selecting or securing livestock for the show, should contact County Agent D. C. Langford.

All lambs that are going to be exhibited in the carcass or commercial lamb classes must be sheared and weighed at this time in order to be eligible. Boys and girls may shear as many lambs as they desire for the show but they will be eligible to exhibit only four cross-bred and four finewool lambs in the county show plus one additional lamb in each class if they place a lamb in each of the carcass classes.

All children entering the parade will assemble at the courthouse at 4:30 where sponsors will be on hand to take charge. TS & GRA To Hear Mohair Council, National Wool Growers Speak Oct. 30

Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association members and directors attending the fall tri-annual meeting at the Inn of the Hills in Kerrville October 30 will hear reports from Association officials in regard to current action being taken to protect the interests of producers. In addition, Ed March, executive secretary of the National Wool Growers Association, will report on the national scene, and Noel C. Fry, secretary-treasurer of the Mohair Council of America, will report on his recent trip to Europe.

The Mohair Council team comprised of Fry, Ed McManus, deputy executive director of the New York office, and Ross McSwain, information director, spent two weeks in England, France, Italy and Spain visiting with mohair brokers, mills and spinners. This trip was made under the auspices of the Foreign Agriculture Service. Roger Lowen was the representative of the FAS.

Noel Fry will give a detailed report to the directors and members at the general session Tuesday afternoon, October 30. The report will cover the outlook and opinions for mohair as expressed by the textile trade in the European countries visited.

Texas Sheep Council delegates will meet immediately following the TS&GRA meeting in order to elect directors for the coming year. Mrs. Jack Groff, Woman's Auxiliary president, advises that the Auxiliary will meet Tuesday afternoon. TS&GRA committees will meet at 9:30 a. m., followed by a Dutch Treat lunch at noon. Ten Well Gas Drilling Program Slated For Area

An initial ten well natural gas drilling program by Lone Star Producing Company of Dallas, was announced last Friday in Salt Lake City, Utah and Wichita Falls, by Oakridge Exploration, Inc., and by Noel Pautsky Drilling Company. Lone Star, a subsidiary of Lone Star Gas Company, is obligated to a minimum of ten 5200 foot tests to the lower canyon and straw formations. Oakridge Exploration and Pautsky Drilling Company assembled the 20,000 acre lease block in late 1972 and with Lone Star as operator completed to successful canyon sand wildcats in June of '73.

Both Oakridge Exploration and Pautsky Drilling are led by Noel Pautsky as president. The drilling company holds the initial four well drilling contract with Lone Star. Oakridge Exploration was organized as a Utah public company in 1969 and 1970. Working interests in the block are Oakridge 25, Pautsky, 25, and Lone Star, 50, excluding certain shallow (above 3000 feet) differences. Lone Star assumes all dryhole costs and producing well costs are re-payable out of production revenues. Lone Star Gas hold a 13-year purchase contract.

The initial well in league 2-MSCL survey is staked 1320 feet from the south and 1320 feet from the west, roughly one mile northeast of the Wallace B-1 completed as a wildcat canyon discovery in June of '73. The lease lies midway in a 60 mile long stratigraphic trap stretching through Sutton, Edwards and Real Counties. Gross revenues have been estimated at 5 trillion cubic feet for the area, served by five gas transmission companies.

Barbara II has had three paintings selected for the Big Country Circuit Tour and recently displayed a Citation Award Winner in the TFAA Ex-

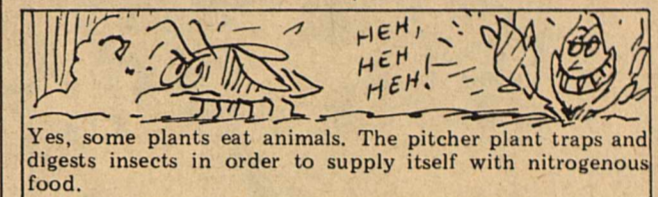

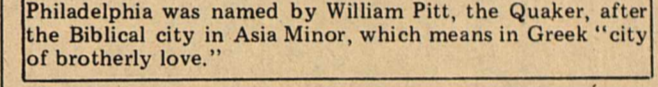

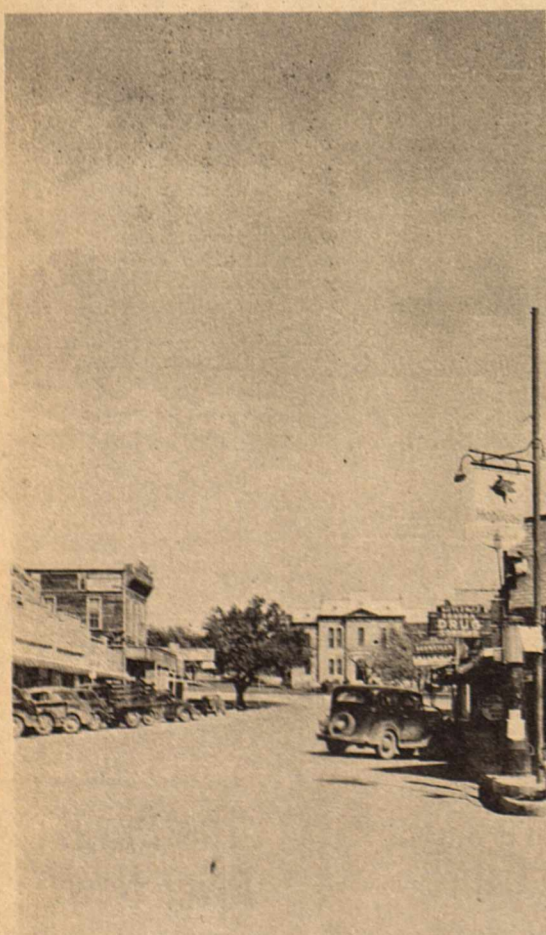
