Looks as if Price's district, which includes Parmer County now, will be put into an area including Wichita Falls. This will make for a race between Price and Graham Purcell, who is a Democrat and has the reputation of being a capable congres-Mion of being a capable con-

Parmer County will be placed in the district to the south and east which is represented by the veteran politico, Geroge Mahon of Lubbock. We think that's a good deal for Parmer Countians. Because of our location, we're not about to be placed in Graham Purcell's district, anyway, and we have more in common with the agriculturally-oriented counties in Mahon's district than we do with Amarillo and the North Plains.

This Price supporter warned, however, that just because the state Demogovernment was trying to see that Price is defeated doesn't necessarily mean that he will be.

And that's true, we'll guess, With sufficient support from Amarillo and the North Plains, Price could be in a position to win over an incumbent Congressman from Wichita Falls.

It'll be comforting to us, though, to watch the outcome from the next district to the south and west and not be directly involved in the outcome.

Mahon has such a solid hold on his office that even an opponent, from either party, is unlikely.

Voters stayed away from the polls in bunches in last Tuesday's election on amendments to the state constitution.

Only 80, for instance, bothered to mark ballots in the Bovina voting precinct. The turnout wasn't much, if any, better over the county, where only 407 marked ballots or over the state, either, for that mat-

And the people who did vote were in no mood to approve amendments as only one of the four proposed got the nod of the citizenry.

That could have been all that needed approval.

The ethics committee amendment, for instance, which was No. 1, wasn't bad to start with, but it had an implied pay raise tied to it that probably made the voters, as few as they were, give it the thumbs down treatment.

Too, an ethics committee probably isn't worth much if it's self-appointed.

Nonetheless, the voters of Texas weren't in a mood to vote in the first place and in the second place, they weren't in the mood to vote "for." We think we know how they felt.



The County Clerk's office reported that only one absentee ballot was cast in the election.

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
