A Bob Price supporter told us this week that the Democratic state government is doing everything legally possible to get Congressman Bob Price defeated come election time. This is being done through redistricting the areas which individual Congressmen serve to make for a more equal share of constituents for each. Looks as if Price's district, which includes Parmer County now, will be put into an area including Wichita Falls. This will make for a race between Price and Graham Purcell, who is a Democrat and has the reputation of being a capable congressman.

Parmer County will be placed in the district to the south and east, which is represented by the veteran politico, George Mahon of Lubbock. We think that's a good deal for Parmer Countians. Because of our location, we're not about to be placed in Graham Purcell's district, anyway, and we have more in common with the agriculturally-oriented counties in Mahon's district than we do with Amarillo and the North Plains.

This Price supporter warned, however, that just because the state Demo government was trying to see that Price is defeated doesn't necessarily mean that he will be.

And that's true, we'll guess. With sufficient support from Amarillo and the North Plains, Price could be in a position to win over an incumbent Congressman from Wichita Falls.

It'll be comforting to us, though, to watch the outcome from the next district to the south and west and not be directly involved in the outcome.

Mahon has such a solid hold on his office that even an opponent, from either party, is unlikely.

Voters stayed away from the polls in bunches in last Tuesday's election on amendments to the state constitution.

Only 80, for instance, bothered to mark ballots in the Bovina voting precinct. The turnout wasn't much, if any, better over the county, where only 407 marked ballots or over the state, either, for that matter.

And the people who did vote were in no mood to approve amendments as only one of the four proposed got the nod of the citizenry.

That could have been all that needed approval.

The ethics committee amendment, for instance, which was No. 1, wasn't bad to start with, but it had an implied pay raise tied to it that probably made the voters, as few as they were, give it the thumbs down treatment.

Too, an ethics committee probably isn't worth much if it's self-appointed.

Nonetheless, the voters of Texas weren't in a mood to vote in the first place and in the second place, they weren't in the mood to vote "for."

We think we know how they felt.

Another season of boys' baseball is underway four nights a week up at the old ballpark. There's some good sports competition going on by your friends and neighbors. Might be a good idea to take in the games on a regular basis. You'll enjoy it and the participants will enjoy having you.

Charles Turner provided processional and recessional music.

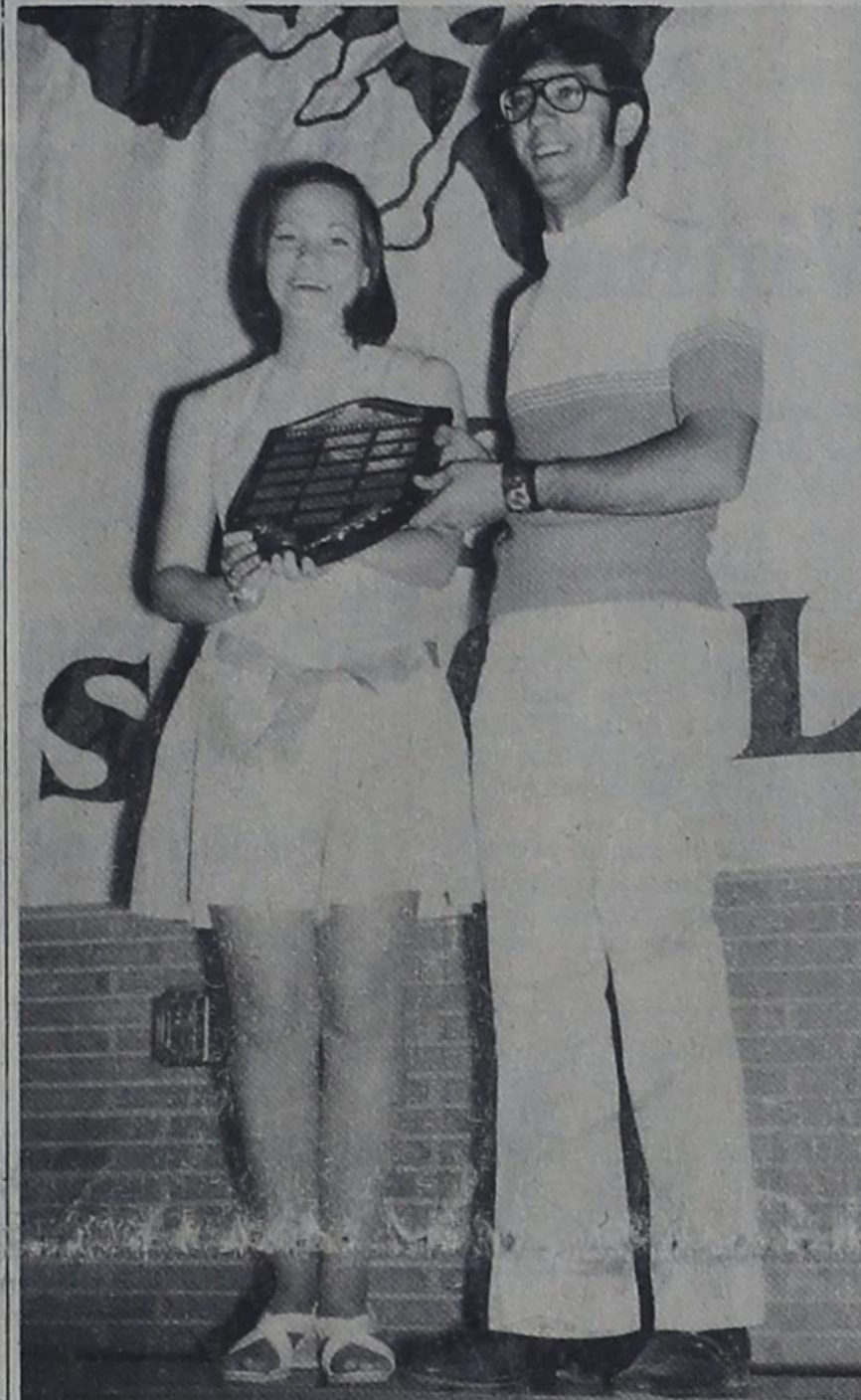
Rev. Heard brought out four points in his message, titled, "The Sweetness of Life."

## Long-Time Teacher Ends 37-Year Career

Mrs. Leola Williams is entering a new phase of her life after 37 years of teaching school -- 31 of these in Bovina. She is retiring today (Wednesday) at the end of the current school year.

Mrs. Williams, who has taught some families into the third generation, says that children haven't changed much over the years.

"There are always those who are anxious to please," she said, "the studious one, those who are mischievous and those who will do anything they can get by with, but they're all been sweet."

Born in Parker County, Mrs. Williams says she was 12 years old before she saw the county seat of Weatherford just 18 miles away. She went to a country school in Parker County and started attending North Texas State College at Denton after graduating from high school.

"When I first started teaching," she said, "it wasn't necessary to have any college work, but I went to college in the summers."

Her first teaching job was at Midway, her home community, where she taught the first four grades in a "two-room" school house for four years.

After that she moved to Tarrant County and taught for two years.

Mrs. Williams and her husband, Willie, who first met when she was 12 years old, were married in 1922 at Farwell, "out under the stars by a Church of Christ minister." Mrs. Williams remembers the Bovina preachers were all on vacation, so they drove to Farwell and waited until the minister was finished with a tent revival service there.

She taught three years after her marriage here and then took a 17-year leave of absence to raise her family.

The Williams' are parents of three children; Willie Ellen Small of Austin, Martha Barnett of Dallas and Charles Williams of Allen.



















When Mrs. Williams resumed her teaching career in 1942, she taught third and fourth grades in the old school house that burned in 1953. She recalls that they met in the old buildings that were moved into Bovina which have been used as

teacherages the past few years. There was no annual that year and activities were curtailed to a great extent after the fire.

In the meantime, she was continuing her college work, receiving her BS degree from West Texas State College "when I was 51 years old." She received a master of education degree in 1953 from the same school.

The County Clerk's office reported that only one absentee ballot was cast in the election.

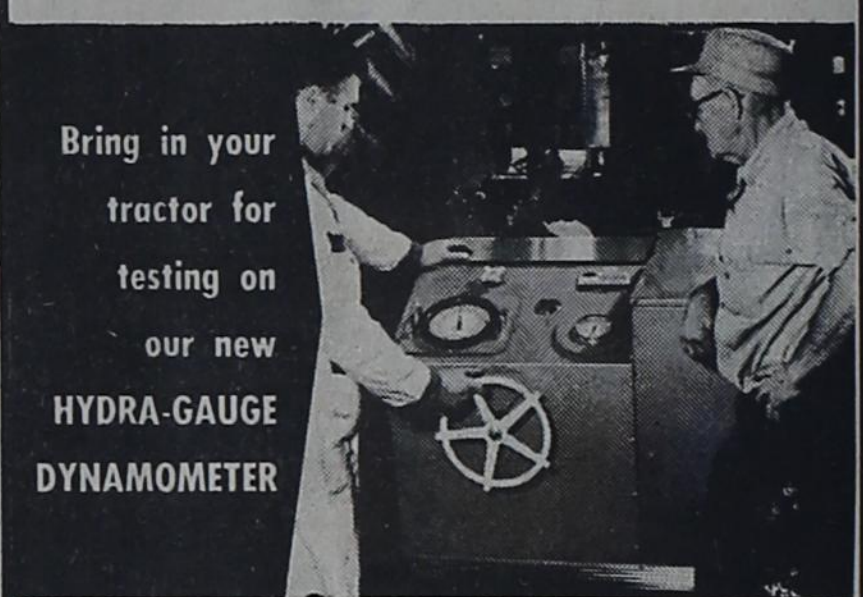
