Livestock Producers Warned To Stay On Alert For More Screwworm Cases

Screwworm cases are continuing their northward trek across Texas, and producers are reminded to re-double their efforts against the costly livestock pest.

"Texas has just recorded 590 positive cases in May, or 67 percent of the total cases it has experienced this year to date," warns Dr. E.M. Meadows, Jr., veterinarian in charge of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program at Mission.

"With rains received over a number of areas recently, the moisture is expected to increase the opportunities for more worm cases, unless producers really watch their animals and treat all wounds," Meadows says.

Until the beginning of May, only 282 of the flesh-eating worm cases had been identified in the Lone Star State.

Only 54 positive cases were reported by the Mission Lab in May, 1973.

Within the past several weeks, Cottle County, in the Rolling Plains area near the Oklahoma Line, recorded two screwworm cases, first for the season there. New cases also have been confirmed recently in El Paso, Reagan, Reeves and Crane Counties in the Trans-Pecos and far West Texas areas.

"Earlier, cases have moved north from the Hill Country to Concho, Runnels, and Haskell Counties, which probably accounts for the cases now occurring in Cottle," says Meadows. The most recent case near Sutton County was reported on the W.B. McMillan ranch, located in Edwards County.

Non screwworm samples submitted by producers dipped somewhat in May. "With the Gulf Coast ticks expected to create additional worm problems, especially in the southern portion of Texas, all producers should join in the battle against screwworms," adds Meadows.

To make the battle more effective, producers should carefully check animals regularly for wounds, submit samples from worms found in wounds, treat all wounds, and spray or dip livestock on a regular basis.

A&M Texas Agriculture Dept. Agree on Pecan Care

One thing A&M and the Agriculture Department agree on is it takes an absolute minimum of 500 pounds of spraying pressure (indicated pressure while spraying) to effectively spray pecan trees. When you have someone spray your pecan trees, check the "spraying pressure". If it is less than 500 pounds on the gauge, they are not doing an adequate job. Also watch to see that the whole tree is wet with spray, including the top. Get a guarantee on the kill. Do not waste money spraying for honey dew. Spray will not control it. For complete pecan tree care, rely on someone who has the equipment, the training and experience to do the job right. Call SAUNDERS SPRAYING SERVICE at 387-2480.
