Prizes of red and white will be awarded to first, second and third places.





A Bishop Looks at Life by Everett H. Jones, Retired

Bishop of the Episcopal Church New Trends In The Church

It was the story of the first archbishop of New Mexico told by Willa Cather in her famous novel, DEATH COMES FOR THE ARCHBISHOP, that first

aroused my deep interest in this part of the country. It is very natural, therefore, that I am excited about his successor this century later. the new archbishop, who is to be installed here at St. Francis Cathedral in a few days.

There are several reasons for excitement. The his archbishop-elect, Father Robert Sanchez, is only 40 years old and will be one of the youngest men in this high office in the world-wide Roman Catholic Church. He was appointed by Pope PaulVI while a parish priest in Albuquerque. This means that he must be consecrated a bishop before he can be installed here. It is the first time in 25 years that an American has bypassed so many other offices to head an archdiocese.

The appointment has prought rejoicing to the state's 260,000 Roman Catholics because Father Sanchez is the first New Mexican native, Spanish speaking and Spanish surnamed, to be their spiritual leader.

His choice has also had a natural impact, as shown by the fact he is one of the 200 young American leaders of the uture named in a recent survey by TIME MAGAZINE.

The new archbishop is described as a man who is quiet, humble, and soft-spoken, with a deep commitment to his church and his people. In an interview he recognized what

A voltameter across the municipal power leads at my hovel reads a scant 97 to 100 volts depending on the time of day, instead of the 110 to 120 volts it should read. Ignoring the fact that electric motors' under load tend to draw excessive current when the voltage is low, and every loaded motor on the line is in jeopardy when the voltage gets

too low, the meter runs fine. One wonders if the meter (running like a power saw) knows the voltage is low, or does it have an ampere bias and indicates watts not really delivered.

This is not a technical column, so ignoring the potentially unwarranted pocketbook dent, and looking backward, one can but feel remorse at the human side of our situation. Academically, our venture in the utility business has demonstrated very well the curses which plague many public owned utilities. What are we talking about? Let's itemize them in terms of local history and look at them.

First, the municipal utility was conceived as a money maker, and the fundamental conception was as solid as bedrock. It was somewhat unfortunate that such a well founded solid idea passed into the hands of the city fathers with such a frugal background

with an interest in money making. The result was forseeable; the adopted expedients toward economy. The primary expedient was management where salary considerations were allowed to outweigh technical knowledge and competence. Next, not realizing that a utility system is a living entity, the ranch country philosophy of baling wire repairs to get by was followed. Baling wire repairs are fine on something that does not change, but on something that must keep abreast of changes, they are for the birds, and safety factors are not in evidence.

The full supply picture looked extremely bright for a while, but it became cloudy. One must wonder if a subsidiary company could not have been formed to provide gas to operate a generating plant. Really it should not have made any difference where the profits became evident. Admit-

tedly, however, it would probably have led to extensive litigation and it must be

Busing, impeachment, free legal services for the "poor," and legislation to reduce coal mining, figured in news during the past week. A big bombshell was trig-

gered by the Supreme Court when by a 5-to-4 decision it outlawed compulsory busing of school children away from their own neighborhood schools. While it remains to be seen just how the court action will be implemented, it is rated as a major victory for education and the neighborhood school concept.

After a year of wrangling, a measure to create a public corporation to finance, at taxpayer's expense, a \$100million-a-year legal service for the "poor" was approved. It amounts to a big subsidy for lawyers who are expected to have a field day drumming up litigation. I voted against it. A surface coal mining bill,

okayed by the House and Senate, preempts much of the jurisdication of the States to control and regulate the mining of coal. The effect will vastly reduce coal mining, and it strikes another blow at the right if States to handle their

own affairs. Yielding to a massive drive by the news media, the House Judiciary committee approved rather hazy and loosely defined charges of impeachment against the President. Admittedly, the ambigious are based to a considerable extent upon 'innuendo, hearsay, and generalities."

TIPS FOR OUTDOO

Food for Fishermen

Most bass anglers like to stay out on the lake long after the lunch hour. In fact, very few fishermen want to return to shore at all-especially "just to eat."

So, take along some beef jerky on your next outing. Those strips of dried beef provide lots of energy and require no refrigeration. Besides that they take up but little space in the tackle box, or shirt pocket. Handy Line Cutters

Those large size toenail clippers are also a "must" in the tackle box of today's bass fishermen. Reason is that nylon line (the current favorite) is very difficult to break. Although smaller in diameter and more flexible, it is tougher.

Good sharp knives will cut the line okay, but not as fast or as safe (in a bouncing boat) as clippers. The knife's place is in the pocket-and pockets are not too accessible when one is seated. Besides that, the knife has to be opened and closed each time it is used.

Most ardent anglers tie a strong string to a pair of nail clippers and attach the string hunting statistic. OATMEAL BREAD

Grease 2 (1 1/2 to 2-quart) round oven-proof casseroles Stir together boiling water, oats, corn syrup, margarine and salt in large bowl; cool to lukewarm. Sprinkle yeast into warm water; stir until dissolved. Add to oat mixture. Beat in eggs, raisins, orange rind and allspice. Vigorously stir in flour, 1 cup at a time, until a smooth, moist dough forms. Cover. Chill 1 1/2 to 2 hours. Place chilled dough on lightly floured surface. Shape (do not knead) into round loaves with greased hands and place in prepared casseroles. Cover. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, 50 to 60 minutes. (Dough will be about even with top of casserole.) Bake in 350°F. oven 50 to 60 minutes. Remove from casseroles; cool on wire racks. Makes 2 loaves.
