
Dorothy Harris had 13 correct too but her tie-breaker guess was not good enough to get in the money. Sorry, Dorothy.

Mustangs Rout Lorenzo Hornets in 24-0 Shutout

The Bovina Mustangs had some fun on Mustang Field last Friday as they rolled to a 24-0 victory over the Lorenzo Hornets.

The young squad overcame ten penalties and four turnovers with 17 second half points to dominate the

game on both sides of the ball. Mustang runners, led by sophomore Johnathan Chisom, amassed 281 yards on 42 combined carries. Chisom had 112 yards on 15 carries and scored on a 15yard fourth quarter run. He has three touchdowns in two

games and ranks among the area 1A scoring leaders.
Other rushing stats came from Renee Flores on 10 carries for 68 yards; Nemecio Rodriguez, 8 for 54; David DeLaRosa, 8 for 45; and David Garcia, one carry for 2

DeLaRosa opened the scoring in the first quarter with a 15 yard TD run. Rodriguez powered in from oneyard out in the third quarter and Flores was perfect on the night with three extra points and a 21-yard field

Head Coach Bruce Scroggins was pleased with the young team's performance: "We cleaned up our execution and our line is really coming together. Defensively we put in some run stunts this week and turned the boys loos."

Bovina's defense forced five Lorenzo fumbles and held the Hornets to 61-yards of total offense. The 'Stangs also had four quarter back sacks, one each by DeLaRosa and Chisom and two by Flores. In addition, DeLaRosa had five tackles to lead the defense.

The Mustangs travel to Olton tonight to challenge the Olton Mustangs. Olton is coming off an upset win last week against Bovina's district rival, Sudan. Game time in Olton is 7:30 p.m. Next week is an open date for Bovina followed by the annual homecoming game September 28 against a tough Sundown Roughneck

Americans Asked To Fly Flags For 30 Days Americans have been asked to fly their flags for 30 days in

support of democracy, Congressman Larry Combest announced Thursday.

In a conference call with some of the news people in his area early Thursday, including this writer, Combest said it had been heart-warming to see how Americans are reacting to the tragedy in New York and Washington, through donation of blood, and many other things. The Congressman said that the House had been in session

until 1 a.m. Thursday, and was to re-convene later Thursday to consider a number of resolutions. Foremost will be a resolution to support the administration

in its efforts to discover the perpetrators of these acts, and to punish them in a reasonable manner.

"We cannot refuse to respond to this terrorist act, and whoever is responsible needs to be brought to their knees, not to justice. I was glad to hear the president say that the countries who support and harbor terrorists are just as guilty as those who actually committed the acts," Combest told us.

Combest said that he had never seen Congress as unified during his stay in Washington as it is on this cowardly act. "It's far more unified than it was during the Gulf War. I think whatever the president requests will pass by a huge non-partisan vote. We may have bickered over details of certain legislation in the past, but that won't be the case here," he

President Bush has asked for \$20 billion to assist the New York loss alone, and this will be granted, Combest said, along

with whatever else might be needed. "This has put the argument as to 'what to do with the surplus' to bed. And anything we might borrow from any other fund will be repaid. Thank goodness the country is in a fiscal condition to have the means to rebuild whatever has been lost," he stated.

As to the question on Tuesday of whether to bring President Bush back to the White House, Combest said there was a huge concern that the terrorists had planned to down Air Force One (the president's plane), and that they might have sharpshooters in the White House area.

"I'm a little bit furious with Peter Jennings for his hints that the President "hid in a cave" until it was safe. We got a call to our ofice at one point that there was a plane in the air that would be in Washington in 20 minutes," Combest told

The congressman said he was confident that Pres. Bush and vp Dick Chaney will think things through before acting. "We need to send a signal to the world that while Americans may fuss among themselves, that when you hit us, we'll stand together and respond. We don't need to over-react without thinking things over, but we need to deliver the message that this was a BIG MISTAKE, and I think Congress will pass a resolution along these lines as early as tonight

(Thursday)," he said. Responding to the question of how long the airlines, the Stock Market, etc. would be shut down, Combest said "We would rather err on the safe or cautious side rather than going back too soon." Combest said he thought the decision to ground all air traffic immediately Tuesday was a brilliant decision. "At that time, we didn't know how many planes had

been hijacked," he said. As to the lack of intelligence on the tragedy, Combest said we had suffered considerably from the Clinton administration's policy of not having intelligence work in Baghdad. "He didn't think we needed to "dirty our hands" in places like that," he

At the conclusion of his report, the newsmen all thanked Combest for his good work, and asked him to convey to the president our best wishes as he deals with this tragic situation.

Caballero Art **Exhibit Begins**

Beginning September 15, the Panhandle-Plains Histori-cal Museum at Canyon, Texas, will open a retrospective of long-time Texas artist, Emilio Caballero. Emilio Caballero: Artista y Maestro en el Llano will celebrate the artist's unique contributions to the cultural life of Texas and include works from private and public collections across the United States, in several media, including oil, watercolor, and copper enamel.

Born in 1917 in Newark, New Jersey, to Spanish parents who immigrated to the United States via Cuba, Caballero came to the Texas Panhandle in 1937. He studied first at Amarillo Junior College and West Texas State College. Caballero then served in the United States Army infantry in both Europe and the Pacific during World War II.

Following the war, Caballero taught art in Amarillo public schools before receiving a master's degree from Columbia and beginning his tenure at West Texas State University in 1949. In 1955 he received his doctorate from Columbia and was appointed full professor and art department head at West Texas. One of the most versatile and acclaimed artists to work in the area, Dr. Caballero taught at West Texas State from 1949 to

"Do We Have The Will?"

There is only one topic to write about this week

On the other hand, everything that can be said about the terrorist's murder and mayhem has been said. Over and over again. Twenty-four

hours a day all week.
Unless you have been to the Twin Towers in the World Trade Center, you cannot appreciate the magnitude of what has happened.

I have been to the top of the World Trade Center. Ate lunch at the restaurant on top called Windows On The World. I didn't really enjoy the meal because I don't like

The windows in Windows On The World were floor to ceiling glass. People could walk right up to the window and gaze down almost 1,400 feet to the city below.

I stood back several feet and made a feeble attempt to peer down, but I didn't like it. After a few minutes of tourist gazing, I was ready to get back down to earth.

I have also flown many miles in airplanes like those

used to take down the towers. The entire episode is incomprehensible to me.

Of course we want retaliation. We want our pounds of flesh and retribution and we want to see remorse. What we don't get is this: terrorists do not show remorse. They have none,

Terrorists do not fear retaliation or retribution. Neither do they fear death or any consequences the U.S. might threaten them with.

After all, we are America. We open our arms and our borders and invite the world in because, after all, all Americans descend from immigrants.

Our politicians seem to think that everyone would be better off if they lived in America or at least were more like us. We are a nation of laws (sometimes we make a few exceptions for people in high places). We are a religious and righteous society, setting examples for all the world.

The problem is, to much of the world we are a bunch

of arrogant, pious, hypocrites that meddle in affairs where we don't belong. We flaunt not only our ideology but our wealth and morality (which is getting a little frayed around the edges).

In other words, a lot of foreign folks hate our guts. Like it or not, they just don't like you and me because we are Americans. That extreme hatred should be obvious to people this week.

Let's suit up and go to war they shout. But against who? Terrorists do not have a uniformed military with bases around the world. They do not have an air force or navy.

And when they fight, they don't fight fair. There are no terrorist etiquette

Only an extreme fanatical belief could hatch a man smart enough to fly a Boeing 757 and stupid enough to fly it into a building and die. America does not understand that kind of passion and committment.

Our leaders don't seem to understand that. We think that we can sit down with Israel and Palestine and make everything peachy in the Middle East. How many times have we had the little carpet-head Arafat over here to shake hands with another Arab or Israeli leader.

We think we can continue to open our borders to all nations and remain safe by converting the immigrants to American values. Hasn't

The debate seems to center on a "we're good, they're evil" premise. We are the good guys. The Islamic terrorists (and other groups)

But they think that we are evil. They think they are right and good and that we should all die. This week they drove the point home in a

horrible way.

Terrorists are patient.
They tried to take down the twin towers in 1993 with a bomb in the basement. We caught a couple of guys and had a trial and were glad they were found guilty and we applauded American

Since then they practiced by bombing a couple of embassies and the USS Cole in Yemen. We caught a few of them and had trials and found them guilty and we felt really good about American

This week we got a hard look at terrorist justice. Eight long years later, they managed to construct a plan to finally demolish the twin towers. And America didn't have a clue it was about to

happen.
Our congress men and
women gathered to declare that this is "an act of war." Then they stood on the capitol steps and sang God Bless America and hugged each other.

They vowed to use the untouchable Social Security trust fund if they had to. They vowed to become an

even stronger nation.

But I can't help but wonder if they have the will to combat terrorism. I wonder if they have the will to bomb and kill and maim a country or group into submission.

Terrorists have the will, determination and patience to accomplish their mission.

The retaliation that needs to be done is contrary to our fundamental American beliefs of right and wrong, good and evil. Do we have the will? I hope so.

Discussions earlier in the week the increasing press coverage of a shrinking Federal Budget surplus has many reconsidering Congresses ability to pass any type of meaningful Agriculture policy reform this year. That's the bad news.

The good news is the fact that so far the House of Representatives leadership appears to be sticking to its budget agreement based on the last official budget projections completed last

A recent meeting between members of the House leadership, Ag Committee Chairman Larry Combest and Budget Committee Chairman Jim Nussle resulted in agreement to stick by the promises made earlier in the That agreement supported agriculture programs with an additional \$73 Billion in spending authority from 2002-2011.

Supporters of H.R. 2646, The Farm Security Act of 2001, intend to present a strong case that proposed level of funding is necessary to properly address the serious financial state of the

U.S. Ag sector. They will also point out that the healing of Ag in related industries is also important because it would prevent further harm to the precarious U.S. economic situation.

Arguments for the House Ag Committee's Bill include the fact that it provides a 'safety net' that is much more stable and predictable and more responsive to volatile price and income swings than current policy.

The House Bill provides support at a level that bridges the gap left by current policy, which has partially addressed the situation through a combination of fixed and supplemental payments.

Key to the effort to get a new farm program in place for the 2002 growing season will be passage by the House next week and then a willingness by the Senate to pull together a package in the coming weeks.

The quest to initiate the next Farm Bill is made rougher by the political turbulence being created by possibly lower budget surplus projections in the future.

It is important that agriculture as a whole pull together to support the legislation under consideration in the House. It is also important that agriculture groups strongly encourage the Senate to move quickly to approve its own version of farm policy.

Without strong support, encouragement and quick action in both Houses of Congress, the ability to provide strong 'safety net' for U.S. agriculture in 2002 could be lost.

Guide". The guide provides much of the information necessary for producers to begin the





PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 52)

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the clearing of land titles by the release of a state claim of its interest to the owners of certain land in Bastrop County.'

PROPOSITION 2 (SJR 37)

Proposition 2 would amend the constitution to establish the process for issuing up to \$175 million of state general obligation bonds and notes to provide aid to counties for access road projects to serve border colonias. Generally, a colonia is an economically distressed geographic area with inadequate public services (such as water supplies, sewer services, or paved roads) in a county without adequate resources to provide such services. These projects could include the construction of access roads, the acquisition of materials used in maintaining those roads, and projects related to the construction of those roads, such as road drainage. The Texas Transportation Commission, in consultation with the Governor, would be authorized to determine what constitutes a border colonia for purposes of selecting the counties and projects that would receive assistance.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of state general obligation bonds and notes to provide financial assistance to counties for roadway projects to serve border

PROPOSITION 3

(SJR 47)

Proposition 3 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to exempt green coffee and raw cocoa held in Harris County from property taxes in order to qualify Harris County as an exchange port for coffee by the New York Board of Trade. The authorization of exemption would not apply to any other county.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation raw cocoa and green coffee that is held in Harris County."

PROPOSITION 4 (HJR 1)

Proposition 4 would amend the constitution by setting the term of the fire fighters' pension commissioner at four years. The constitution currently provides that the duration of all offices not otherwise fixed by the constitution may not exceed

PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 45)

Proposition 6 would amend the constitution to require the governor to call a special session of the legislature so that the legislature can appoint presidential electors when the governor determines that it is reasonably likely that the outcome of the election for a presidential candidate's electors will not be clearly determined in time for the appropriate electors to meet before the federal deadline to cast their votes. Under current law, when the people vote for a particular candidate for president, in reality they are voting for that candidate's electors who will meet to cast their votes for president. If the electors are not determined by the certification date, no electoral votes may be cast for the state. The proposed amendment ensures that the state's electoral votes

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring the governor to call a special session for the appointment of presidential electors under certain circumstances.'

PROPOSITION 7 (HJR 82)

Proposition 7 would amend the constitution to authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell up to \$500 million of additional general obligation bonds to finance additional home mortgage loans to veterans. Additionally, the proposed amendment would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to use assets from the land and housing assistance Proposition 11 would amend the constifunds to create, operate, and improve veterans' cemeteries.

PROPOSITION 8 (HJR 97)

Proposition 8 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize the Texas Public Finance Authority to issue and sell up to \$850 million of general obligation bonds. PROPOSITION 9 (HJR 47)

Proposition 9 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide for filling vacancies in the legislature without an election if only one person is a qualified candidate in the election to fill the vacancy. Under current law, a special election must be held to fill a vacancy in the legislature even if there is only one qualified candidate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the filling of a vacancy in the legislature without an ty." election if a candidate is running unopposed in an election to fill a vacancy."

PROPOSITION 10 (SJR 6)

Proposition 10 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to exempt certain items of personal property from property taxation by political subdivisions of the state if the property is warehoused temporarily in a location in Texas to be assembled, stored, manufactured, processed, fabricated, or repaired and then forwarded to another location inside or outside Texas. The proposed amendment would authorize a political subdivision that imposes ad valorem taxes, at its option, to tax this type of property after a local public hearing on

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote equal tax treatment for products produced, acquired, and distributed in the State of Texas by authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation tangible personal property held at certain locations only temporarily for assembling, manufacturing, processing, or other commer-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to eliminate obsolete, archaic, redundant, and unnecessary provisions and to clarify, update, and harmonize certain provisions of the Texas Constitution.'

PROPOSITION 13 (SJR 2)

Proposition 13 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize a board of trustees of an independent school district to donate real property and improvements formerly used as a school campus in order to preserve that property. The board may make the donation if the board determines that the property has historical significance, that the donation will help to preserve the property, and that the school district no longer needs the property for educational pur-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to authorize the board of trustees of an independent school district to donate certain surplus district property of historical significance in order to preserve the proper-

PROPOSITION 14 (HJR 44)

Proposition 14 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize a taxing unit, other than a school district, to exempt travel trailers from property taxation as long as the travel trailers are lawfully registered with the state and are not held or used for the production of

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to authorize taxing units other than school districts to exempt from ad valorem taxation travel trailers that are not held or used for the production of income."

PROPOSITION 15 (SJR 16)

Proposition 15 would amend the constitution to create the Texas Mobility Fund, which would be administered by the Texas Transportation Commission. The Fund would finance the construction, acquisition, and expansion of state highways and would pay a portion of the costs of public toll roads and other public transportation projects. The legislature may reserve specific sources of state revenue for the Fund and may authorize the Commission to guarantee the payment of any obligations or credit agreements with the full faith and credit of the state. The attorney general shall determine the legality of any such obligations or credit agreements.

The proposed amendment will appear on amendment authorizing the Veterans' trict, including a water district, to receive the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas Mobility Fund and authorizing grants and loans of money and issuance of obligations for financing the construction, reconstruction, acquisition, operation, and expansion of state highways, turnpikes, toll roads, toll bridges, and other mobility projects."

PROPOSITION 16 (HJR 5)

Proposition 16 would amend the constitution to reduce the waiting period required for a valid home improvement lien on a homestead from 12 days to 5 days. Currently, a lien may not attach to a homestead for a home improvement loan if the homeowner executed a contract for the improvements less than 12 days after applying for the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would

authorize the conversion and refinance of a personal property lien secured by a

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment prescribing requirements for imposing a lien for work and material used in the construction, repair, or renovation of improvements on residential homestead property and including the conversion and refinance of a personal property lien secured by a manufactured home to a lien on real property as a debt on homestead property protected from a forced sale."

PROPOSITION 17 (HJR 53)

Proposition 17 would amend the constitution to allow the state to relinquish claim to certain state land and to clear title defects for persons who claim title to those lands. The proposed amendment would apply to land whose owners have disputed title to the land, but for which no patent from the state, giving clear title to the land, was ever issued. Among other requirements, all of the taxes due on the land must have been paid. Under current law, there is no procedure allowing the state to settle title disputes without a constitutional amendment for each piece of land in dispute.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to settle land title disputes between the state and a private party."

PROPOSITION 18 (SJR 49)

Proposition 18 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to create a program to consolidate and standardize the collection, deposit, reporting, and payment of criminal and civil court fees. If the legislature creates such a program, any new fees imposed by the legislature may not take effect before January 1 of the following year, unless an earlier effective date is approved by a vote of two-thirds of the members of each house of the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote uniformity in the collection, deposit, reporting, and remitting of civil and criminal fees."

PROPOSITION 19 (HJR 81)

Proposition 19 would amend the constitution to allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue up to \$2 billion of additional general obligation bonds. The Board issues bonds to pay for water supply projects, water quality enhancement projects, flood control projects, state participation in water and wastewater facilities, and projects for economically distressed areas. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$2 billion."


