

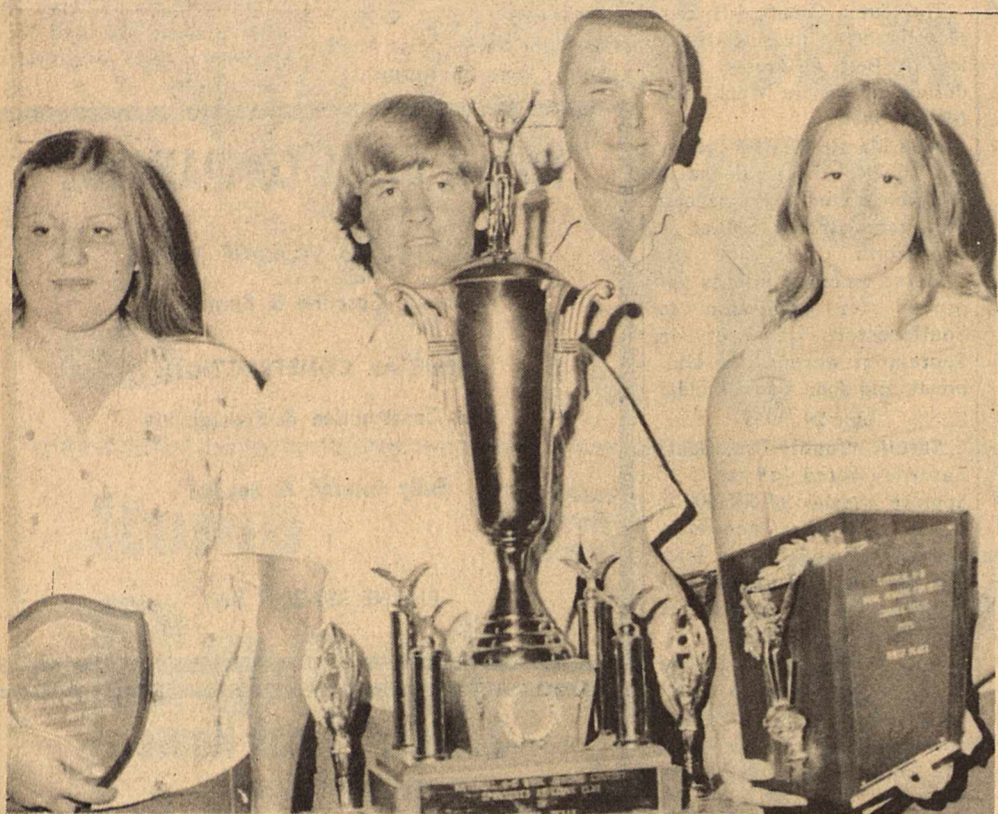

Local Judging Team First In National Competition

Sutton County's state-winning wool judging team took top honors at the National Wool Judging contest held in conjunction with the thirty-eighth annual Sonora Wool and Mohair Show. This is the fifteenth national wool show held here. The team consisting of Susan Schwiening, Marsha Finklea and Larry Finklea tallied 1831 points to take top honors. Placing second in the contest was the team from San Saba County. Third place was won by the Niobrara County, Wyoming team, with Kerr County placing fourth and McCulloch County in fifth place.

Larry Finklea was first high individual of the contest with 614 points. Susan Schwiening was second high individual and Marsha Finklea was third.

Cades Pope showed the grand champion wool fleece in the junior division. The grand champion mohair fleece was shown by Miss Dennette Haby of Rocksprings. Miss Haby was awarded the Fred T. Earwood Memorial trophy by Mrs. Fred T. Earwood and Mr. and Mrs. Armer Earwood.

The Joe Berger Memorial trophy was presented to the premier junior wool exhibitor, Andy Dunbar of Edwards County.

In the adult division of the show F. S. Price of Sterling showed the grand champion wool fleece. The grand champion mohair fleece was shown by Pember and Son of Bandera. Mayer and Rousset of Sonora was winner of the

rosette and plaque awarded for the grand champion bag of wool.

Sutton County's senior range judging team placed first in their division and were presented the E. B. Keng Memorial trophy. The team is made up of Paula Friess, Rick Powers, and Mark Van Hoozer. Mrs. Claire Powers served as team coach. This team placed third in the mohair judging, and fourth in the wool judging contest.

The junior range judging team composed of Rex Surber, Tammy Van Hoozer, Julie Stewart and Marla Van Hoozer, placed first in range judging. The wool judging team of Lance Love, Preston Love, Rex Surber and Clay Friess placed second in that division and fourth in mohair judging. The team of Preston Love, Rex Surber, Clay Friess and Brett Johnson placed second in the livestock judging contest.

The Sutton County 4-H Club was also winner of the sweepstakes award presented by the Federal Land Bank Association of Sonora. They had an overall team total of 4391 points.

Underground Cable Construction Underway By General Telephone

General Telephone has announced the beginning of a major cable construction project to bring improved telephone service to Sonora customers. Workmen are now engaged in placing over 14 miles of new telephone cable in the Sonora exchange along Highway 277, according to Jack Goss, San Angelo division manager.

The new cable will replace the present open wire facilities over which long distance service is provided to Sonora, Eldorado and Christoval customers. The cable will also

Lone Star Applies For Rate Increase

Lone Star Gas Company's representative, J. T. Morgan recently requested the Sonora city officials to enact an ordinance increasing the residential and commercial retail gas rates 10 cents per thousand cubic feet. The adjustment is requested to offset the increase in the city gate rate to 94.19 cents per thousand cubic feet which was authorized by the Texas Railroad Commission on May 1, 1975. The increase in the city gate rate authorized by the Commission is consistent with the position taken by the cities in their testimony at the hearing in March. The cities'

presentation indicated that Lone Star needed an increase in this amount to provide a reasonable rate of return.

Mr. Morgan explained that the city gate rate applies to natural gas delivered by Lone Star's Transmission Division to its distribution division for sale to residential and commercial users.

Mr. Morgan said the increase will raise the average residential gas bill in Sonora by about 8 1/2%.

The requested rate increase follows a Texas Railroad Commission emergency order giving Lone Star a temporary increase in its city gate rate due to the company's increased costs for gas purchased to serve customers.

Lone Star officials noted that the latest figures available show that in February, 1974, its average cost of gas was 30.68 cents per thousand cubic feet, and that it more than doubled to 72.29 cents by February, 1975.

Bake Sale Set For Friday

The Sutton County Committee on Aging will have a bake sale Friday, June 20 at the park on Main Street in Sonora. The sale will begin at 9:30 a.m. and no item will be priced above \$4.

Funds from the sale will be used to incorporate this committee as a non-profit organization. The purpose of this organization is to assist with the needs of all citizens in the county 60 years of age and over. The needs include transportation, telephone assistance, visits and a recreational program.

The Jayceettes are assisting with the sale by donating baked goods.

City Receives Sales Tax Rebate

Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks worth \$28.8 million Friday to more than 800 towns and cities in the third round of monthly city sales tax rebates. Included was the City of Sonora with a net payment of \$11,526.83.

Bullock said the June payments were considerably higher than the previous two months because of big end-of-the-quarter tax payments made by merchants following the April 30 deadline for reporting taxes they collected from the public in January, February and March.

Bullock converted the city sales tax payments to a monthly system in April to get away from the old quarterly rebate system which had been in use since the start of the city sales tax and which forced cities to wait 60 to 90 days for their money.

"The interest alone--at six per cent--on the \$16 million we paid in April and the \$19.9 million we paid in May was worth a good quarter of a million dollars to the cities just by not having to wait until now for a quarterly payment," Bullock said.

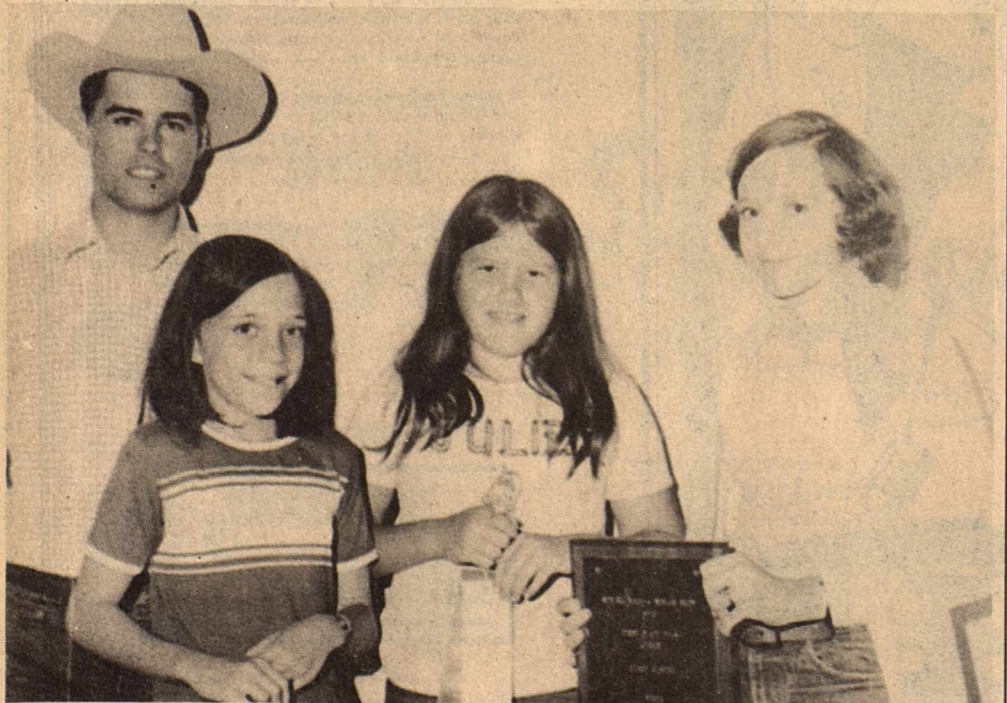
Every city which has adopted the one per cent local tax received payments this month regardless of the size of the rebate. Payments in the first and second month of each three-month cycle are not made on rebates of less than \$500.

A Bishop Looks at Life

By Everett H. Jones, Retired Bishop of the Episcopal Church

(This column is the first in a series on "Faith of our Fathers," dealing with the moral and spiritual outlook in America 200 years ago.)

In the midst of the growing literature on life in America two centuries ago it seems fitting to ask what were the religious convictions of the leaders who got our country off to its start.

The Revolution's leaders, even those not strictly orthodox in their faith, were men with strong religious background. Both Adams and Madison as young men had planned to be ministers, Adams at Harvard and Madison at Princeton. John Jay, our country's first Chief Justice, was an early president of the American Bible Society and a devout Episcopalian.

Thomas Jefferson was strongly influenced by the Enlightenment i.e. the 18th century movement that fostered the belief in natural law and confidence in human reason. However, during his second term as President he found time to write a digest of the Gospels called "The Life and Morals of Jesus of Nazareth." "It is a document in proof that I am a real Christian, that is to say a disciple of the doctrines of Jesus," he wrote to a friend.

The Founders believed strongly in the right to disagree in religion. "The Religion of every man must be left to the conviction and conscience of every man," wrote James Madison.

They also believed in the Providence of God, that God was at work in human affairs. George Washington, in one of his letters, said, "I am sure that there was never a people that had more reason to acknowledge a divine interposition in their affairs than those of the United States."

They believed in the future life. John Adams declared shortly before his death: "A kind Providence has preserved and supported me for 85 years and 7 months, thru many dangers and difficulties, and I am not afraid to trust in its goodness to all eternity."

The sometimes earthy but always wise Ben Franklin, when he saw a stalemate at the Constitutional Convention, rose to his feet: "Mr. President... our different sentiments on almost every question... is methinks a melancholy proof of the imperfection of Human Understanding... I have lived, sir, a long time, and the longer I live the more convincing proofs I see of this truth--that God governs in the affairs of men... I therefore move that henceforth prayers imploring the assistance of Heaven be held in this Assembly every morning." The practice continues to this day.

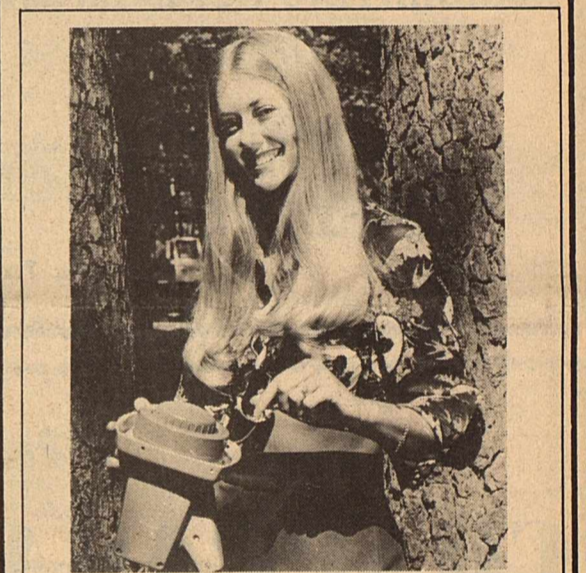

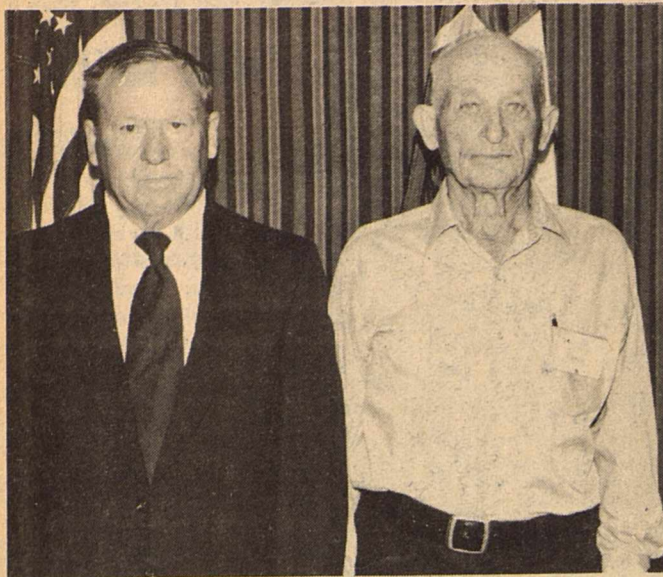

Cattail Control

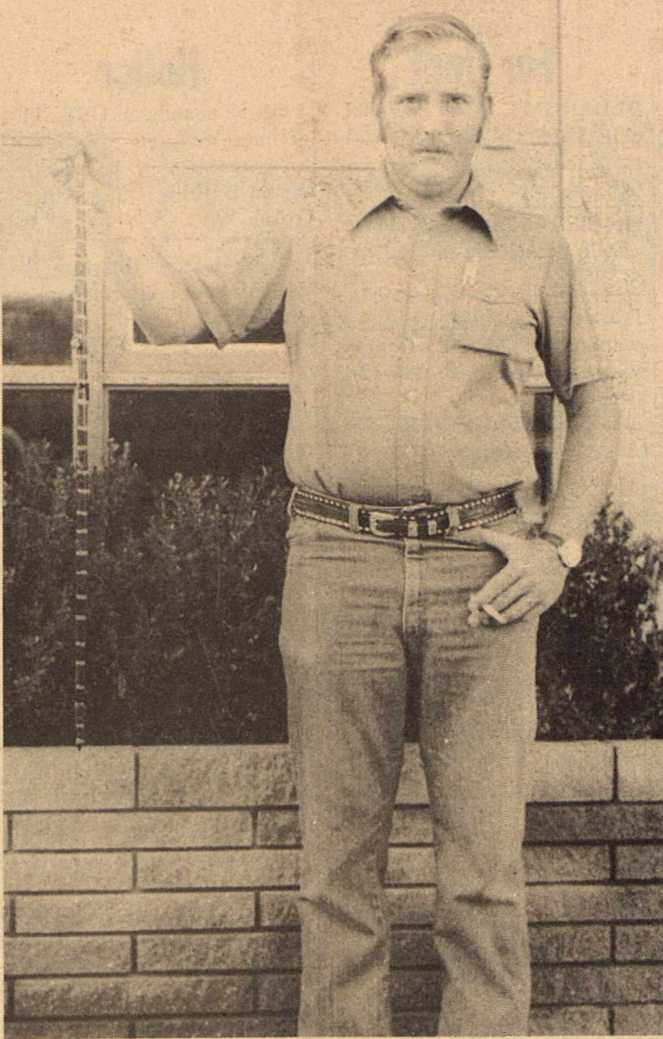
With the summer season fast approaching, the time is at hand to control cattails and other emergent aquatic vegetation, points out Clint Langford, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. If cattails were a problem last year, they will be again this year, notes Langford.

Small patches of cattails can be pulled by hand but care is needed to get all the roots, including the rhizomes from which new plants sprout.

Larger patches of cattails can be controlled with dalapon at 7½ pounds per 55 gallons of water. Best control is achieved when a surfactant is added. One cup of household detergent will suffice for the 55 gallons of spray mixture.

One application of dalapon may not completely eradicate the cattails, so a second or third application at 21-day intervals may be required.

Before beginning a spray program, be sure to properly identify the plants involved. Langford suggest a copy of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Bulletin B-1018 to aid in identifying aquatic vegetation and in determining appropriate chemical controls.
