## Local Show Winners Told

**HAVE YOU SENT IN** your entry to Ed McMahon's "Am-UHRR-ican" Family Publishers Sweepstakes yet? Each year in January, our mailboxes are inundated with these unsolicited sweepstakes offers and get-rich-quick schemes. How many people do you know who have ever won anything from one of those scams?

At least three-fourths of the mail that comes to our house on Maple Street goes immediately into the trash without being opened. The average American household receives between 40 to 60 pounds of junk mail each year.

That thick envelope with good old Ed McMahon's face on it goes through the mails at a cost of less than half of what you are now paying to mail a letter and on Sunday the cost of our first class postage stamp will be increased again.

Frankly, I think Ed McMahon is rich enough to mail all those things out at the same rate of postage as the rest of us. If bulk-mail rates had been increased proportionally to first and second class rates since 1974, then we would still be able to mail a letter for ten cents. As it is, the general public is subsidizing all those companies which send out junk mail.

The current method of charging for postal delivery by ounces was begun July 1, 1885 with the two-cent stamp. Thirty-two years later, in 1917, the one-ounce stamp was raised to three cents, where it remained for forty-one years until 1958. Since 1981 we have faced a postal increase on an average of every 2.8 years, the last one occurring in April 1988, and the next one scheduled for next week.

Remember, magazines and newspapers which you subscribe to, are usually mailed second class, which is somewhat cheaper than the first class rate by which you mail letters. By being a subscriber to said publication, you have indicated that you wish to receive it. When the first-class postage rate goes up, second-class postage rate is always raised accordingly.

But the items which are mailed at the lower cost bulk-rate are things which you have NOT subscribed to and usually don't want. Postal costs for this sector have not kept pace. Why, I don't know.

Added to the bulk-rate junk mail fiasco, is the good old franking privilege which is overused and abused by our politicians. Members of Congress, acting on official business, are allowed to use the postal system free of charge. This amounts to a lot of free advertising during each election year.

Every elected official, no matter how insignificant his or her office, now mails out a monthly newsletter. Again, the affect is to keep their names before the public for purpose of getting re-elected next time around. Of course, Mr. and Mrs. Average American are the ones who are getting stuck with the bill for these abuses, in the form of continuing higher postal rates.

Please don't gripe at the folks down at the local post office. It's not their fault. We are fortunate to have an amiable, efficient crew of nice folks at the post office here, who bend over backward to help out in any way they can.

Write to your congressmen and the Postmaster General about the continued postage hikes (or clip out this column and mail it to them), but don't expect a lot of action right at first. Remember, they've got a good thing going in their own behalf and won't give up their free postal service without a lot of angry insistence from the general public.

If the current rate of postal increases is allowed to continue unchecked, there will come a day when fax copies and phone calls will cost less than mailing a first class letter.

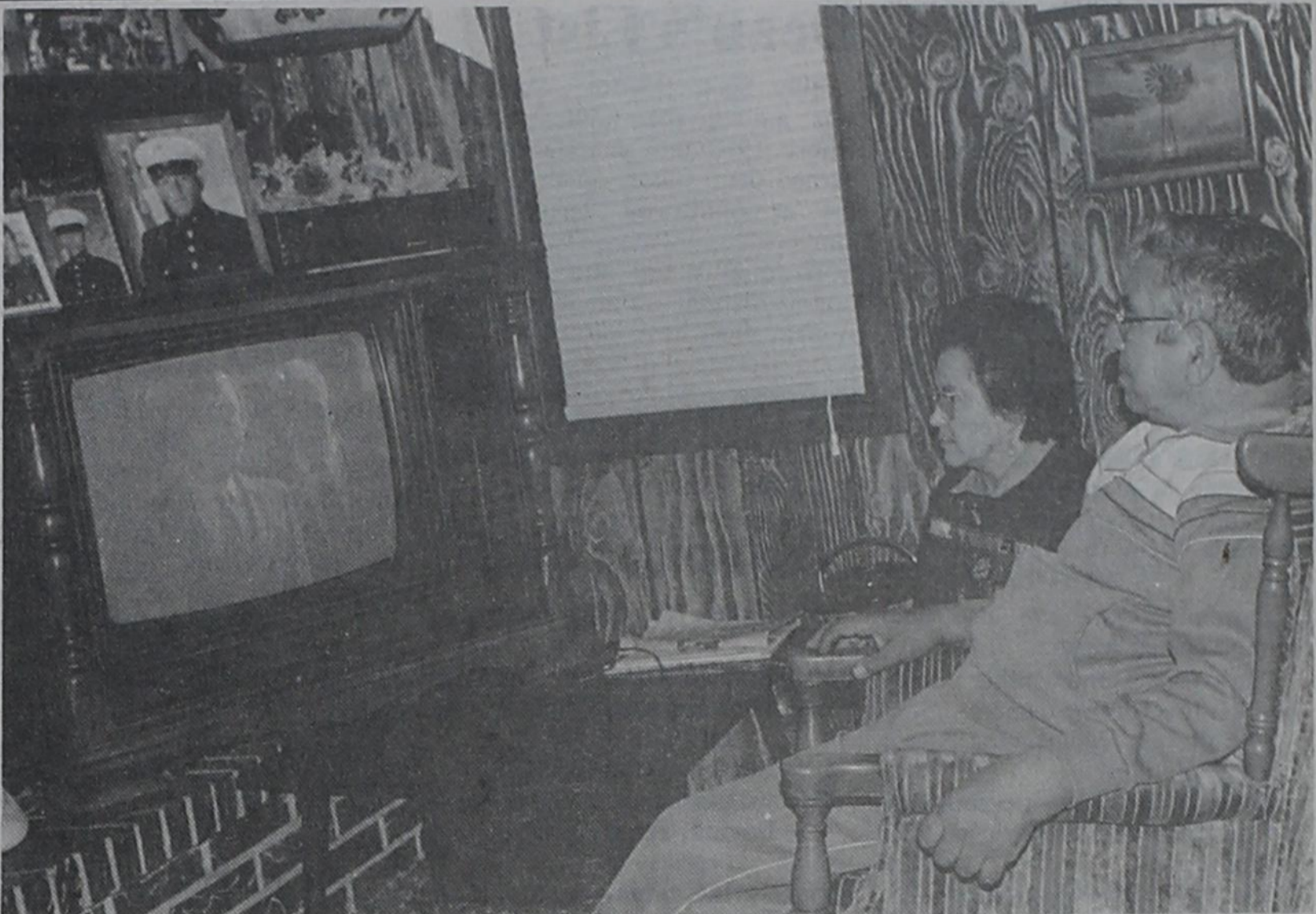

## Couple Has Triple Focus On Mid-East

A Bovina businessman, Joe Brito, has ample reason to be focused on activities in the Persian Gulf.

Joe and Celina Brito live in Portales and Joe operates Bovina Body Shop. The Britos have three reasons that they are concerned about the Gulf war. Three of their children, Larry Brito, Albert and Fred Chavez, are currently assigned to Operation Desert Storm.

Fred, 37, and Albert, 35, are both graduates of Portales High School. Larry, 33, grew up in Lamar, Colorado. Fred has been in the service 18 years, Albert 18 years and Larry 14 years.

According to Mrs. Brito, who is a teacher at Steiner Elementary School, Fred has been in Saudi Arabia since last August. She says he is in the combat supply support detachment on the front line near the Saudi Arabian border. Mrs. Brito could not disclose an exact location.

Fred joined the Marines in 1973 and is married to the former Andrea Raines of Portales. They live in California.

"I know Fred is proud to be a Marine and I know he would rather go fight in this war, than to have his son go," Mrs. Brito said.

Mrs. Brito said she talked with Larry Sunday night and he is doing well. According to Mrs. Brito, Larry said the soldiers are getting some information from American television, which they are able to pick up there and they have visited with several TV reporters. Larry's parents are able to pick up the telephone and call him at any time.

## Mustangs Win Games

Bovina's Mustangs won both of their two outings during the past week, scoring district wins over Kress last Tuesday, 64-42, and over Lazbuddie here Friday, 81-59.

The Mustangs unleashed Corey Kirkpatrick against the Kangaroos, and Kirkpatrick scored 33 points. He had 31 of his points in three quarters. He tallied two three-pointers, nine twos and nine free throws.

Kirkpatrick paced Bovina to leads of 20-14, 31-25 and 43-33 enroute to the win. Rusty Venable scored 14 points in a backup role.

Kirkpatrick picked up where he had left off in the first quarter against Lazbuddie, scoring 12 as the Mustangs took a 20-11 lead. Bovina had a halftime lead of 47-28.

It was 63-43 favoring Bovina after three quarters.

Kirkpatrick scored 22, Darren Hromas 18 and Rusty Venable 12.

Larry has been in Saudi Arabia since August and is an ammunition distributor with the Marine Expeditionary Force.

"Larry's job is in an ammunition dump and is on the front line. He is involved in combat," Mrs. Brito said.

However, Larry said he does want to get it over with and come home, because he is anxious to be with his family," she added.

"I believe Larry would rather not fight, but he feels it is his duty because he is in the Marine Corps," Mrs. Brito said.

Albert has been in Saudi Arabia since October and is currently assisting in launching Patriot missiles with the 11th Air Defense Artillery's 2nd Battalion.

# Pet Corner



It's a mistake to think your dog's fur coat will protect him from harsh winter weather.

When the mercury hits freezing, indoor dogs should be taken out for five or ten minutes only, says Dr. Richard Thoma, a veterinarian in Cheektowaga, N.Y. Don't force your pet to stay out longer than he wants to.

"If your dog whimpers or heads toward the house, you know it's time to go back in," he advises in the current issue of American Health.

On warmer days, in the upper 30s, healthy adult dogs can be walked for 20 minutes, or so. But puppies and older dogs can't stay out as long, says Thoma, because their internal thermal regulators don't work as well.

Doggie sweaters help small dogs and indoor pets retain body heat, allowing them to brave the cold longer.

Paw protectors can also help keep your dog warm.

Here are some other cold-weather tips for dog owners: \*Don't let your dog walk through puddles.

\*After a bath, be sure your dog is thoroughly dried before you take him outdoors.

\*A doghouse is a must for outdoor canines and dry warm bedding.

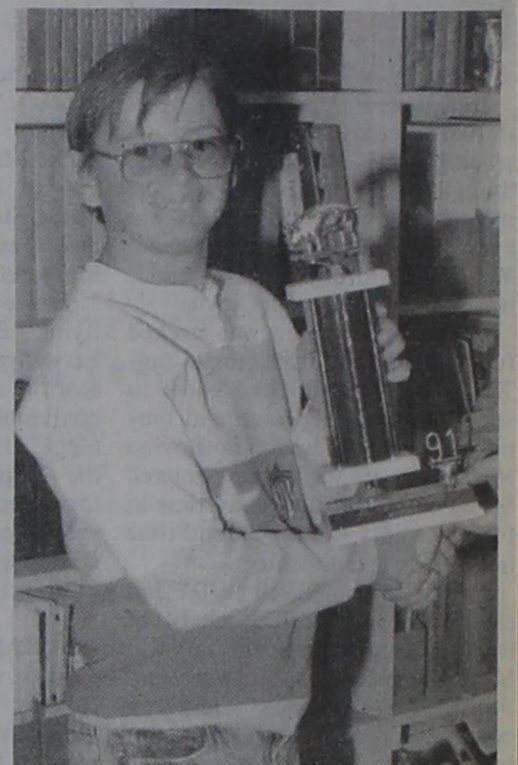

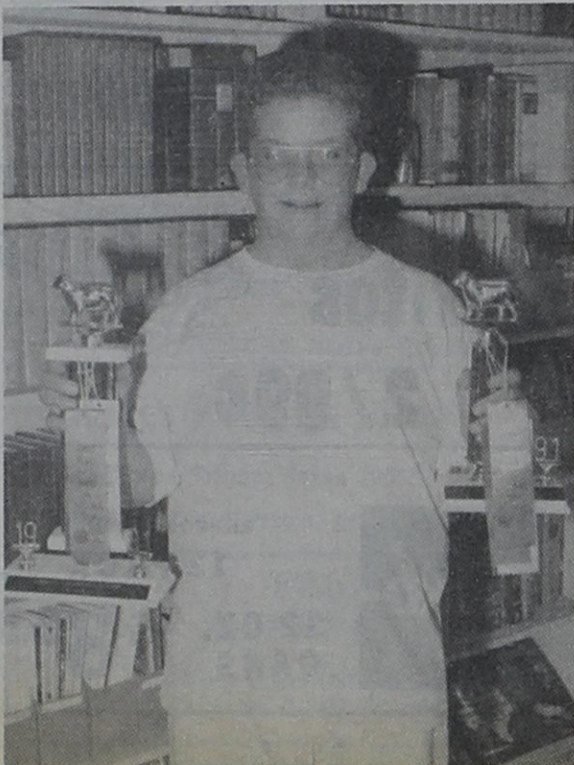

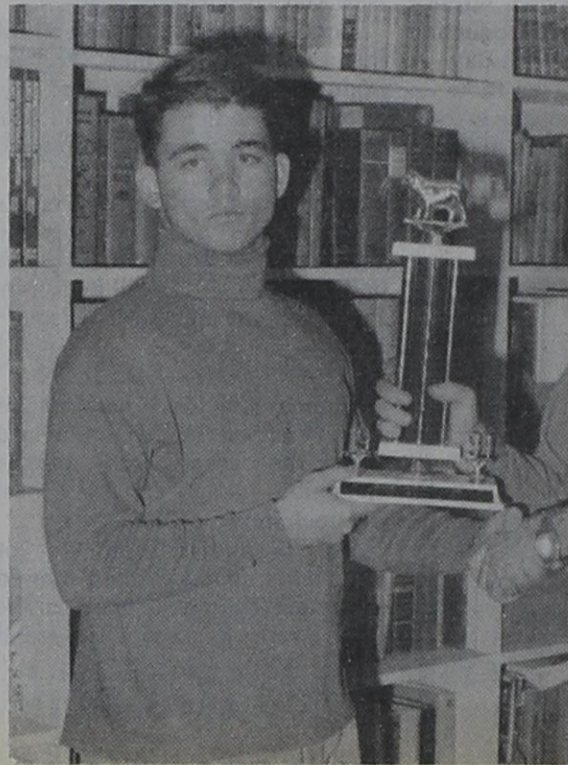

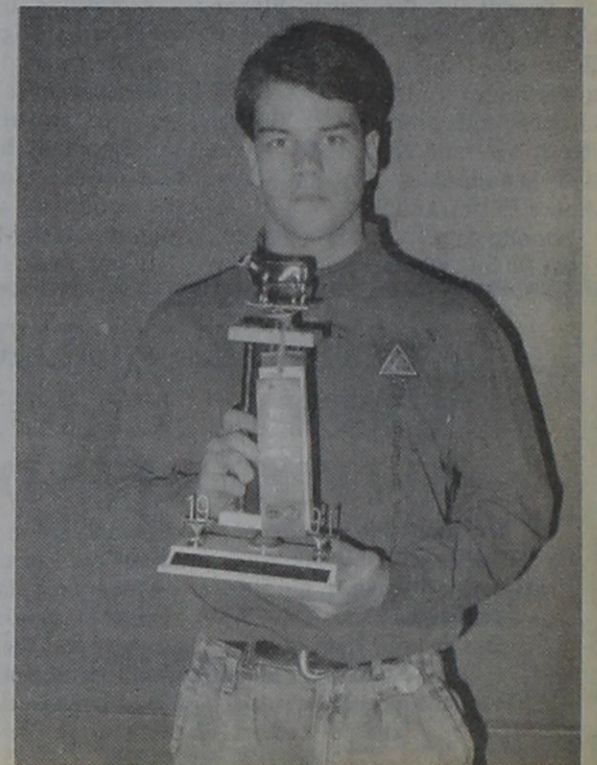

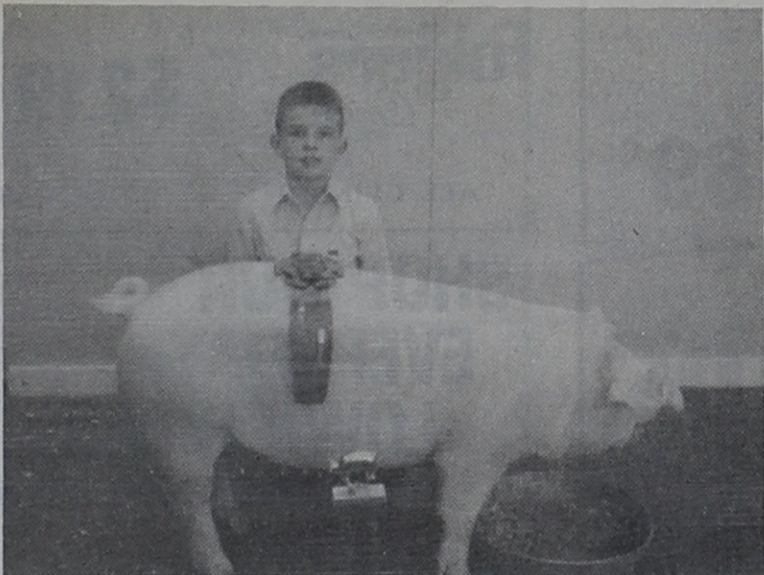

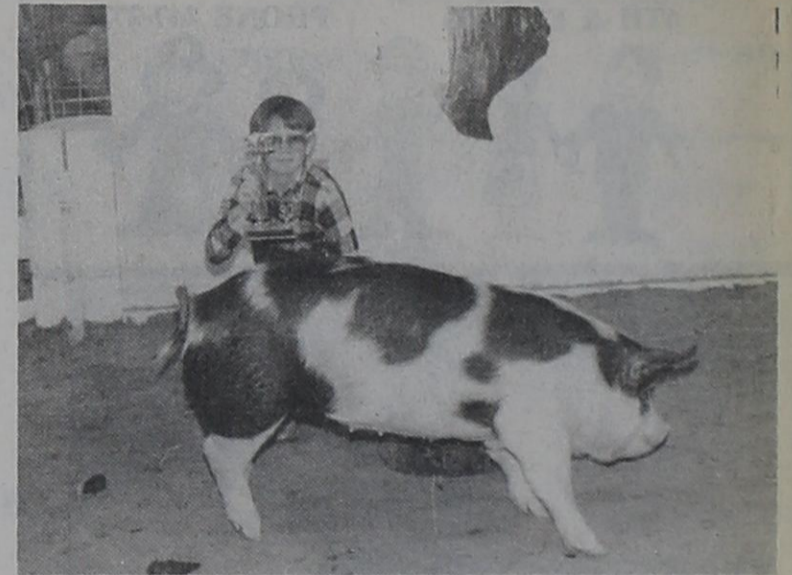
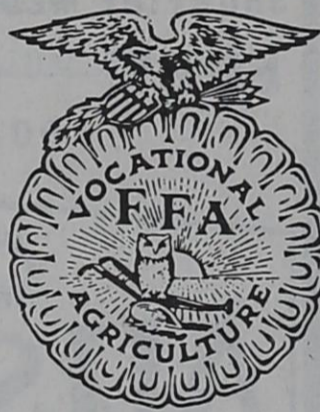
