Governor Dolph Briscoe announced his approval recently of two grants, totaling \$75,310 for continued support of probation and police training projects in the Concho Valley area.

The money comes from the Criminal Justice Division of the Governor's Office. CJD administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Crime Control Act of 1973.

A \$46,210 grant to Kimble County will continue funding of a regional probation project, serving Bandera, Kimble, Kerr, Gillespie, Kendall and Sutton counties. Since the project's beginning in 1973, the unit's three officers have served over 565 adult and juvenile proba-

A second grant to the Concho Valley Council of Governments provides \$29,100 for continuation of the regional police academy. An anticipated 450 police officers will receive basic, intermediate, and/or advanced training through the academy. Selected officers will be sent to specialized training schools approved by the Texas Commission of Law Enforcement Officers Standards and Education.

The grants were among 38 approved by Governor Briscoe, totaling \$2,682,210 for improvements in law enforcement and criminal justice at state, regional and local levels.



On Knowing Our Limitations

During the recent tennis finals at Forest Hills, N.Y., in the decisive match between Chris Evert and Evonne Goolagong, one of the commentators remarked that Evert knew her limitations. Though hard-pressed at times, she stayed with the kind of game she played best. This was one secret of the victory that made her the new U.S. Women's champion.

The Bible is full of reminders that in our spiritual life we need to remember our limitations, especially our need for help beyond our own. Paul wrote to the Christians in Corinth: 'Let him that thinks he stands take heed lest he fall." In his letter to the Romans he said: "I say to every man among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think."

The most familiar Bible example of what happens to a person unaware of his own weakness is Peter. He boasted on the day before Good Friday, "though I should die with thee, yet will I not deny thee." It was this very over-confidence that led to his three shameful denials n Christ's last hours or

Dogs and Cats Often

Bearers of Harmful Bacteria The chances are good that the family dog or cat is carrying around a microscopic organism that can cause a nasty infection if the animal nips you.

The offender is known to physicians as Pasteurella Multicoda. It is often found in the mouths of healthy dogs and cats, and is a common cause of infection following bites or scratches.



But this attitude exists both in Congress and in the Administration in both Republican and Democrat parties and wherever it occurs, it does not, in my judgment, contribute to good national policy.

The part of the bill to which I take strong objection is the oil pricing provision. The Congress voted to pay producers five different prices ranging from \$5.25 to \$12.50

for the same product. That kind of irrational approach seems to me indefensible and is certain to be vetoed. Nothing in the bill was done to decrease our heavy dependence on foreign imports which now constitute about 40% of the oil we use. Were the bill to become law, it would make our nation weaker rather than stronger.

The bill gives the Federal Energy Administration power to require cities, states, and businesses to convert from the use of natural gas to oil or coal as a boiler fuel to produce electricity. Ninetyfive percent of the electricity in Texas is produced from natural gas.

The bill requires all cars produced in the country by 1985 to average 28 miles per gallon in country and city driving. Such a provision is clearly unrealistic. On the floor of the House, some of the proponents of that provision argued that cars producing 28 miles per gallon already exist. I, in turn, pointed out that they themselves did not choose to buy them and drive them and I couldn't see why they would require the American people to buy cars which they themselves were unwilling to

The list could go on, but the pattern is clear. Sometimes Members of Congress, like any other group, get tired and, in their fatigue, are willing to support almost any sort of policy just so they can report to others that they have "done something." In this case, the balance of power which our Constitution wisely set up will have to be exercised by the Executive Branch when the bill is vetoed. After that, perhaps there will be a possibility of compromise by the majority of the Congress and the Executive that will lead to an intelligent policy for the nation. I hope so, and will continue to retain my optimism because of the long tradition of good government in America and because of my confidence in the basic good sense of the American

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

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

Brucellosis Regulations Still In Effect

AUSTIN-Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) officials are awaiting federal response to the commission's rejection of proposed changes in brucellosis regulations.

"TAHC's vote applied only to proposed changes," Dr. H. Q. Sibley, executive director of TAHC, said. "This decision does not mean that all brucellosis regulations are suspended in Texas.'

The brucellosis control program under which Texas has been operating is still in effect, Dr. Sibley stressed.

Federal response to the TAHC's action may come at the United States Animal Health Association meeting in Portland, Oregon November 2-7.

The commission rejected by a 5-3 margin at a September 4 hearing the proposed changes which would have brought regulations on brucellosis in Texas up to the minimum standards set by the United States Department of

Agriculture (USDA). A possible result of the commission's decision is that the USDA could refuse to recognize the status of brucellosis-free counties in Texas or the state's modified-certified status if Texas does not conform with national standards.

A large crowd of cattlemen was present at the hearing and voiced opposition to the proposed

Pecans Up, **Cotton Down**

AUSTIN-According to the September crop report released recently, Texas cotton production has dropped almost 75,000 bales while pecan production is expected to increase by 20 million pounds over last year's crop, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White

Cotton production, estimated at 3.1 million bales, decreased because of weather and insect damage on the High and Low Plains. yield of approximately 3.025,000 bales is expected

This year's cotton crop still is almost 23 percent above the 2,462,000 bales ginned in 1974, which was one of the smallest crops in 30 years, White noted.

The Texas pecan crop estimate reflects an increase of 53 percent over last year's crop of only 38 million pounds.

Sweet potato production also increased from August and the crop currently is estimated at 950,000 pounds

Estimates for most crops remained the same as for August. Corn remained a near-record crop at 115.5 million bushels; wheat, 131.1 million bushels; rice, almost 24.9 million pounds per hundredweight; sorghum, 394.4 million bushels; and soybeans, 9.1 million
