With hunting season opening Saturday in the Edwards Plateau region, hunters will find the deer fat and plentiful, the turkey in abundance and plenty of quail and javelina to keep everyone supplied. The deer population, according to local Game Warden Nolen Johnson, looks real good with only a few poor, small deer being spotted. Johnson stated that deer in the vicinities where ranchers are adding feeders have shown great improve-

Hunters may pursue deer from 30 minutes before daylight until 30 minutes after dark and may take a total of three deer with no more than two bucks. According to landowner permits, a hunter may kill as many as three does. Deer season ends at sundown January 4.

Bob Krueger's Weekly Report

This last week I had the |heavy-handed and inapproprivilege of chairing the opening session of joint House-Senate hearings investigating the role of federal regulatory agencies. I have received many letters from constituents expressing concern about these agencies and the role which their regulations play in our lives. Therefore, chairing these hearings was a special opportunity, which I hope will prove helpful in time to the people whom I represent.

Most federal regulatory agencies were established in the 1930's in an effort to control the powers of sometimes monopolistic industries, and to bring coherence to our trade and interstate commerce. Clearly, Congress cannot attempt to examine every detail of our business transactions. Instead, it has chosen to establish regulatory agencies to carry out the intent of Congress. The problem, of course, is that regulations can readily be-

sensitive to the needs of citizens entitled to expect protection from monopolistic power, unfair trade practices and unsafe food and drugs. He Takes A Dim View Of Contention That Most News Comes From T.V.

Editor's note: The Devil's River Philosopher on his bitterweed ranch on the Dry Devil's River looks at television news this week, more or less. Dear editor: 'N

According to an article I read in a Newspaper last Monday night in between plays to keep from having to listen to Howard Cosell, most people now get their news from television.

This was stated as a confirmed truth and I got to thinking about it. Possibly it's true, considering how uninformed most of us are about what's going on in the world, although that's no test; most of us were in that shape even before television was invented. Now I'm not berating

television news. For example, the other evening during the TV news I marveled at the fact that man has put a satellite into orbit to bring a live picture from Japan to Sonora to tell us that Nancy Kissenger has bought a shaving brush for Dr. Kissenger, when all along I'd thought television commercials persuaded everybody to use shaving cream from a squirt can, unless of course they'd tuned in another network and were persuaded to use an electric shaver. It's clear the Kissengers don't watch much television, but that doesn't explain why he has to keep flying back and forth between those mid-east countries to make sure what he found out yesterday is still true today, which most of the time it isn't.

But back to the notion that most people get their misinformation, I mean their

they get the big news there first, like when Patty Hearst is captured or when the President is fired at by a woman, whom TV first reported was a man. But to say people get most of their national and international news from television 30 minutes a day, take away 5 minutes for commercials, and most of their local news from television another 30 minutes a day, take away 10 minutes for commercials and 5 more for car wrecks, is to be uninformed on how human nature operates.

Newspapers, which now have more circulation in the U. S. than ever before in history, furnish I'd say 50 times more news than television, and word-of-mouth beats both, if you're on speaking terms with your neighbors.

When the country was young it sometimes took two months for a speech by some Congressman in Washington to reach the outer parts of the nation, and sometimes you get the feeling those were bound to have been the good old days.



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



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Valley Citrus Growers Predict

Plentiful, High Quality Harvest

AUSTIN-It's looking like

a good year for Texas citrus. Rio Grande Valley citrus growers are expecting to harvest the highest quality crop in several years and the 1975-76 crop is forecast to be 33 percent larger than last year's crop.

"Fruit is coloring well because of unseasonably cool September and October nights and the trees are in excellent condition due to abundant rain during August and September," Agriculture Commissioner John C. White

Grapefruit production is xpected to total 10 million boxes, an increase of 37 percent over last year.

Production of all oranges is forecast at 5.8 million boxes, 28 percent more than the 1974-75 harvest.

Early mid-season oranges are expected to show a 30 percent increase to 3.8 million boxes, while Valencia oranges are predicted to increase by 24 percent to 2 million boxes.

Harvest of early oranges got underway in mid-September. Some light grapefruit picking had begun by late September with volume expected to pick up around mid-October.

'Last year, Texas agriculture added at least \$10 billion to the state's economy," Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said.

"It's only appropriate that we set aside this month, during which we celebrate Thanksgiving, to take a closer look at the contributions Texas farmers make to our lives," White added.

Texas farmers and ranchers supply meat, vegetable, fruits and grains for our tables and natural fibers to clothe us.

Texas consistently ranks first among all states in a number of agricultural statistics.

In 1974, Texas was the leading state in the nation in the total number of cattle and calves.

Texas was the leading state in the number of cattle on feed.

Texas was first in the number of sheep and lambs. In crops, Texas was first in production of grain sorghum.

Texas also was first in the nation in production of several fruits and vegetables.

Texas farmers are willing to experiment with new ideas and crops, White said. In response to demand, farmers on the High Plains began to produce sunflowers commercially.

When demand for sugar exceeded supply, Rio Grande Valley farmers began planting sugarcane.

When cotton growers needed expanded markets for their crop, they set about developing stable markets.

One result is the Littlefield cotton textile mill, an all-denim mill, scheduled to be opened in 1976. Also planned are small sock-knitting mills.

In addition, a company

soon will market a glandless cottonseed kernel to be used in candy production.

"Texas farmers and ranchers are doing an exceptional job feeding and clothing citizens of Texas, the United States and the world. It is fitting that we should honor them for their achievements and give them our year-round support," Commissioner White said.

A Bishop Looks at Life

by Everett H. Jones, Retired Bishop of Episcopal Church Are Church People Complacent?

A friend recently said to me: "You church people don't seem terribly upset about the horrible moral conditions in the world today. I don't understand how you can be so complacent when everything you stand for is being ignored or flagrantly

I am sure there are others who would share this complaint. May I sum up what I said to him in reply?

Unfortunately it is true that many church people close their minds not only to moral degradation around them but also to tragic instances of injustice, hunger, and other forms of human suffering.

Fortunately, there is another side to the situation. The great Jesuit priest and scientist, Teilhard de Chardin, once wrote: "Whatever the merits of other religions, it remains an undeniable fact--explain it how one will--that the most ardent and most massive blaze of collective love that has ever appeared in the world burns here and now in the heart of the Church of God."

That "blaze of love" finds expression in many forms of action, both by individuals and by groups. Most of these activities receive little or no publicity.

More than we can ever measure, the large-scale efforts toward moral reform and the alleviation of suffering undertaken outside the churches are actually motivated by the heritage maintained within the churches.

If church people do not become hysterical about evil in the world, there are several reasons that might be mentioned.

One is that they see the conflict of good and evil as a continuing part of human existence. According to the Bible, the conflict began soon after the creation of the world and has continued ever since. The best contribution an

individual can make in this continuing conflict is not to jump up and down in panic but to set an example of concerned and constructive involvement wherever possible. Similarly, the churches themselves serve best when they are loving communities, large or small, where the traditions of the good life are maintained and exemplified. Some day the world will want to return to moral standards and will be very grateful to

Still another reason for what sometimes appears to be complacency is the Christian's conviction that in the long last truth is stronger than falsehood, love will conquer hatred and bitterness, and God is more powerful than the Devil.





Children Design Christmas Seals

Christmas seals - an annual tradition in America's fight against lung disease for almost seven decades - have a youthful "new look" this year. For the first time, they've been designed by school children throughout

the United States. Sutton County board members of the Big Country Area of the American Lung Association of Texas are Mrs. Dennis Dunnam, R.N. and Charles Browne, M.D. Headquarters for the 32-county area are at 1962 W.

Beauregard, San Angelo. The board of the Big Country Area got a preview of the 1975 seals at their meeting in San Angelo in September. Dr. Browne pointed out that the Texas seal is located number one on the sheet of seals being mailed out to millions of citizens of the United States.

The 54 original paintings chosen for the seals have become the property of the American Lung Association and will hang in a special exhibition in the National Collection of Fine Arts in Washington, D.C. from No-



Mrs. Dunnam said, "I was glad to see something like this children's art project done with the seals. We were the first voluntary health association in this country, and we've always been interested in healthy lungs for people, particularly children. We've always been involved in school health; this is the place to develop good health habits."

In recalling some of the history of the Christmas Seal, Dr. Browne said the seal was introduced into the United States in 1907 by Emily Bissell. Miss Bissell, a social worker in Wilmington, Delaware, borrowed the idea which was originated by a postal worker in Denmark, to raise money for a financially distressed TB hospital on the banks of the Brandywine River in Delaware. Miss Bissell designed the first U. S. seal herself. It was a wreath of holly with the simple greeting,

Christmas.' In later years well-known artists such as Rockwell Kent, Howard Pyle, Dale Nichols and Steven Dohanos created Christmas Seal designs. More recently, Seal designs were chosen by the lung association from entries in an annual nationwide competition open to ameteur

and professional adult artists. Mrs. Dunnam pointed out that each sheet of the Seals bears the heading, "Christmas Seal Greetings from the Children of America:" She added: "Let's not let the children down. Fed. Cattle Prices **Continue Down**

Despite lower supplies of fed beef and an increase in beef consumption, fed cattle prices will probably continue to decline during the next few weeks, predicts Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

Some economists feel that increased demand will keep fed beef prices up as high as those of last summer, but Uvacek does not believe demand has changed much in the past few months.

"In July of this year Choice beef retailed for \$1.61 per pound. Prices now are about \$1.53 per pound, even though the increase in per capita beef consumption was only up a small degree."

The proportion of beef fed this year compared to the total cattle slaughter is at its lowest level in 10 years. The amount of Choice beef consumed, therefore, should also be correspondingly lower, points out the specialist with the Texas A&M University System. Grass-fed heef, however, will be in large supply for the rest of

the year. Uvacek says that unless high fed cattle prices are followed by high retail prices, the price of live cattle must

Preliminary estimates of per capita beef consumption during the July-September period indicated about 30.3 pounds per person while the retail price for Choice beef was \$1.57 per pound, notes Uvacek. He predicts that per capita consumption for the last quarter of the year--October through December--will go up to 35 to 36 pounds per person while retail prices will fall to \$1.49 to \$1.50 per pound. Much of this consumption will be from other beef rather than fed beef.
