Funeral services were held December 26 for Elmo Johnson.

James McLaughlin was named fireman of the year at the Sonora Fire Department's annual Christmas party.

Mrs. Edna Malmstrom died in a Kimble County Hospital following a long illness.

Funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church with burial in Sonora Cemetery.

Dr. Charles F. Browne was awarded a memorial plaque in appreciation of 24 years of loyal service to the local hospital and his patients. The plaque was given to the doctor by hospital administrator, Gene Martin, in behalf of the Board of Trustees of Hudspeth Hospital.

### Sonora Ranchman, Duke Wilson Dies Suddenly At His Home

Prominent Sutton County ranchman, Duke Wilson, 67, died December 28 in his Sonora home after a sudden illness.

Services were held at St. John's Episcopal Church December 29. Burial was in Sonora Cemetery, directed by Ratliff-Kerbow Funeral Home. The Rev. Ray Nations of Sonora and the Rev. Norm Griffith of San Angelo officiated.

Mr. Wilson was a member of one of Sutton County's early pioneer families. He was born September 22, 1908 to John William and Nancy B. Wilson and was the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. O. T. Word, among Sonora's first settlers.

He attended Sonora Schools and graduated from Schriener Institute in Kerrville and the University of Texas. He married Adele Kyle June 15, 1929 in Hillsboro.

Mr. Wilson was a Sutton County rancher and had extensive land and mineral holdings in Sutton, Brewster, Nolan and Frio counties of Texas and in Wyoming and New Mexico.

He was a life member of St. John's Episcopal Church in Sonora. He was a member of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, National Wool Grower's Association and the Thoroughbred and Quarter Horse Associations. Survivors include his wife, Adele; two daughters, Mrs.

## 4-H Livestock Show Set For Jan. 5, 9, 10

54 4-H members will exhibit 188 animals during the 1976 4-H Livestock Show scheduled January 5, 9 and 10. These livestock exhibits will include 60 crossbred lambs, 98 finewool lambs, 17 Angora goats and 13 rabbits.

Trophies for the show will be provided by Nathan's Jewelers of San Angelo, Sonora Food Center, First National Bank, Foodway Stores, Foxworth-Galbraith Lumber Company, White's Auto Store, Federal Land Bank, Iwin Oaks Motel, Ruth Shurley Jewelry and the Sonora Lion's Club.

Judges will include Werner Lindig of Bandera, who will judge market lambs and angora goats; James A. Gray of San Angelo, Dr. Frank Orts of College Station, and Dr. George Ahlschwede of San Angelo, who will serve on the lamb carcass judging committee; Gary Coates of Christoval, who will judge market rabbits; Hoot Nix, Butch Taylor, Robert Langford and Max Tomlin of Sonora, who will judge showmanship.

Highlights of the scheduled events will be at 12 noon Saturday, January 10 when

45 lambs or lamb carcasses will be sold in the auction sale with Mr. L. P. Bloodworth serving as auctioneer. A barbeque luncheon will be served at 11:30 a.m. prior to the sale.

Buyers may bid as much as they like in the auction sale, but the 4-H member will receive a ceiling price of \$100.00 per head for regular sale lambs and \$125.00 per head for the champion lambs. All that is bid above these amounts goes into the 4-H fund to support other 4-H activities.

One lamb will be sold in a Chinese Auction to raise money for other 4-H activities and to help finance the 4-H Center. The 4-H Center has been painted inside and out this fall, a new door has been installed at the front of the building, the roof has been repaired and other improvements are planned when funds become available.

Other 4-H activities supported by funds raised at the sale include the 4-H Horse Show, the 4-H Ball, 4-H Camp, a 4-H Achievement party, Livestock judging, Horse judging, wool &

mohair judging, range & grass judging, 4-H Dress Revue, 4-H Food Show and other special 4-H activities.


### Lamb Carcass Show January 5

45 Sutton County 4-H boys and girls will compete in the 1976 Sutton County 4-H Lamb Carcass Show January 5, sponsored by the First National Bank of Sonora.

The purpose of the show is to assist in training 4-H members and ranchers to produce a more acceptable lamb for market. This lamb should have a high dressing percentage, have a high percentage of leg and loin, have highly palatable meat, reach a correct finish at a desirable market weight and age and utilize a minimum amount of feed per pound of gain.

60 crossbred and 99 finewool lambs were ear tagged, sheared, vaccinated, drenched, weighed and placed on feed by 4-H members, in preparation for the carcass show, on October 18, 1975. The lambs will be weighed again at the 4-H Center on January 5, 1976 between 8 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. prior to the live judging of carcass lambs at 3:45 p.m.




