THE RAINCLOUDS of last week, which also left some unwanted hail in places, covered a significant area.

Having made a quick weekend trip to the Dallas area, I noted that the area across the Panhandle along Highway 86 had apparently received some good moisture during the week.

The rain was evident all the way from Farmer County to where you get into what is usually considered "rainy" country. The Bovina area was not the only one to have received hail damage, either.

I noticed some fields of wheat between Dimmitt and Nazareth which otherwise would have been in great shape from the late moisture, but had been prematurely laid waste by the hail and high wind.

The dryland area, from Silverton across to Childress, had received some moisture all the way. On our return trip, we took the Highway 70 route, and the grassland from Crowell to Floydada was really green. The ranchers along the "breaks" of the caprock should have some good grazing for awhile, and we saw numbers of cattle enjoying the grass.

The hail damage was regrettable, because in the case of wheat, that crop cannot be replaced. And, replanting expenses for other young crops are something you'd rather avoid, besides facing the prospects of a shorter growing season.

But all in all, considering the entire region, much of which is dryland in nature, the benefits from the rainfall will surely outweigh the losses.

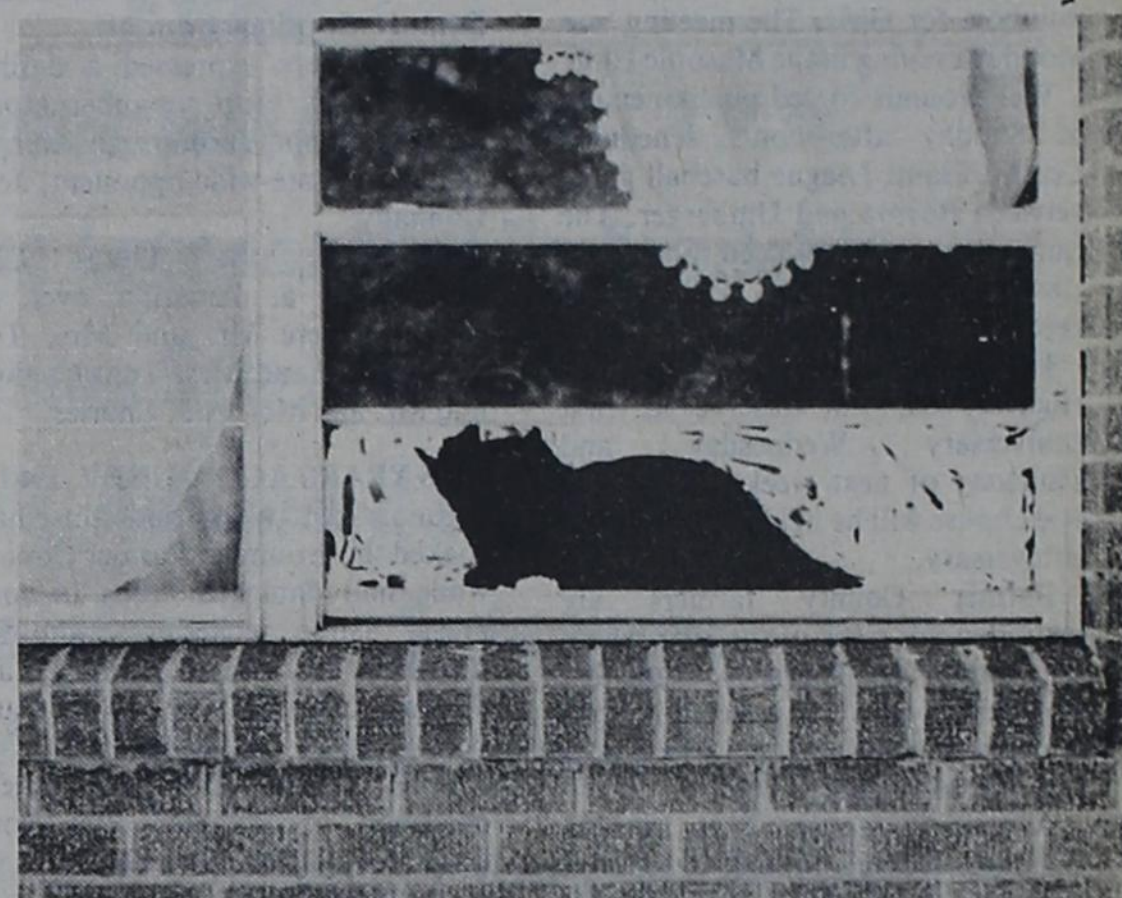
In addition to these, there will also be a "New Manager's" sale going on at Bovina Wheat Growers in conjunction with the other activities.

PUBLIC NOTICE OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES

Notice is hereby given that DEAF SMITH ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE, INC. (the "Utility") intends to change rates for electric utility service effective June 13, 1982, or as soon thereafter as permitted by law. The changes are applicable to all areas to which the Utility provides electric utility service. All classes of customers are affected by the proposed changes. The proposed rates will effect a 12.28 per cent increase in the gross revenues of the Utility based upon the twelve-month period ending December 31, 1981 as the test year.

The Utility intends to change its service rules and regulations including rules relating to obtaining service, line extension and line extension charges, the provision of electric service, service fees, and discontinuance of service.

Implementation of the proposed changes is subject to approval by the appropriate regulatory authority. There was a short business meeting conducted following the luncheon and following this there were games and entertainment.

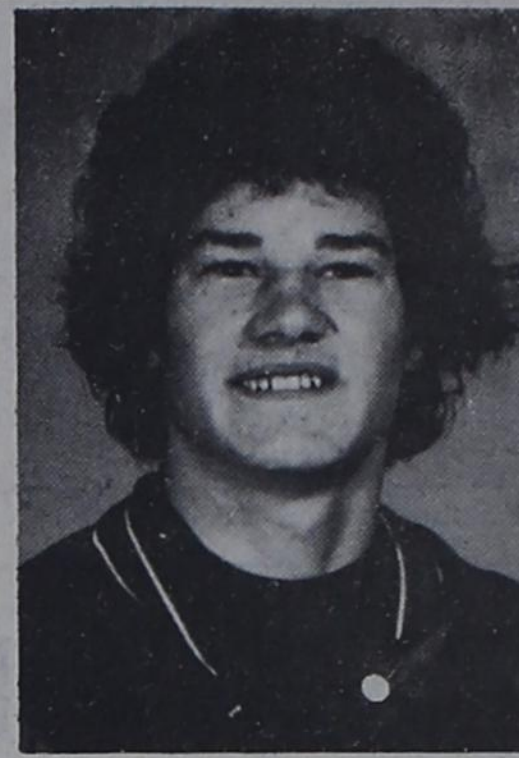

Pioneer Shows Profit Growth

Pioneer Corporation (NYSE) has reported that earnings for the first quarter of 1982 were higher than those for the first quarter of last year. The Amarillo-based energy-oriented corporation has now recorded 13 consecutive quarters in which earnings improved over those for a year earlier.

For the first three months of 1982, Pioneer earned 81 cents per share, an increase of 3.8 per cent from the 78 cents per share earned in the first quarter of 1981. Net income for the quarter was \$29.8 million, up 2.2 per cent when compared with \$29.2 million a year ago.
