## Soil Stewardship Week To Be Held May 23-30

Soil Stewardship Week, a nationwide observance which emphasizes man's responsibility to protect and conserve soil, water and other natural resources, will be May 23-30, Vestel Askew, Chairman of the Edward's Plateau Conservation District announced Tuesday.

This year's theme, "We Begin Again", emphasizes "that it is time to reach out to people in our nation and awaken every citizen of his individual responsibility as a steward of the land to manage and protect national resources for our own good and for generations to come," said Mr. Askew.

Among the churches in the district that are scheduling special Soil Stewardship services are First United Methodist Church, First Baptist Church and St. John's Episcopal Church.

Local events scheduled for this week include a breakfast and program for ministers.

"We hope," said Mr. Askew, "that during Soil Stewardship Week, mil-

lions of Americans will pause for a moment to consider their responsibilities for the protection and use of the Lord's earth."

Members of the Edwards Plateau Soil Stewardship Committee are Askew, W.B. McMillan, George Brockman, Armer Earwood and Bob Caruthers.

The district, upon request, will provide local churches with programs, bulletin inserts and copies of this year's observance booklet. The material was prepared by the National Soil Stewardship Advisory Committee of the National Association of Conservation Districts, along with almost 3,000 similar districts throughout the nations who have sponsored Soil Stewardship Week. The custom of setting aside special "Rogation Days" for this purpose began more than 1,500 years ago in France when French peasants prayed for help after crop failures had brought widespread hunger.

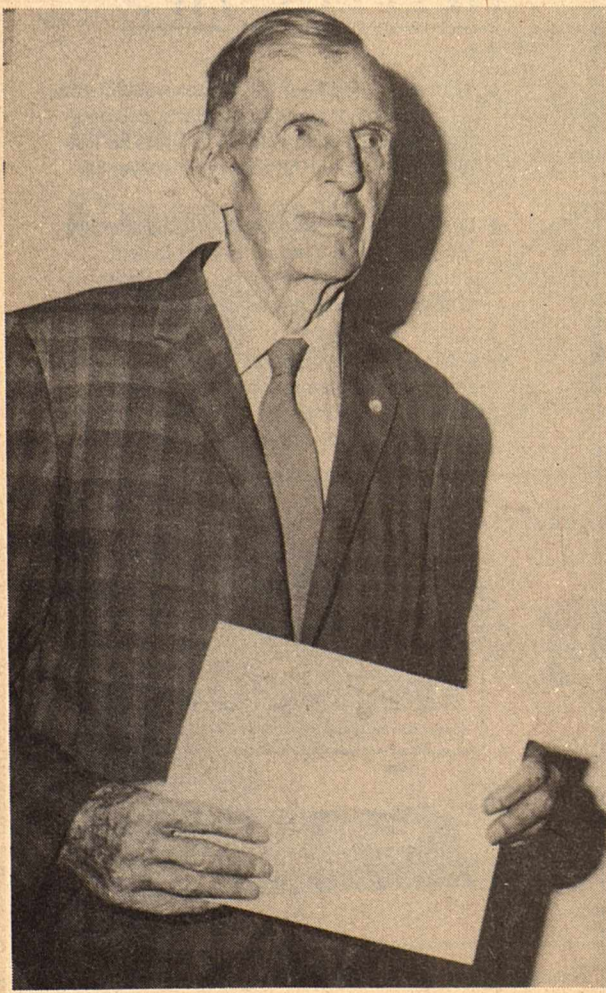

### The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN — How do you decide where you're going to take your business? Most consumers never really think about the qualities they want from the merchants they patronize.

But our Consumer Protection Division attorneys and other consumer experts say there are many variables that can make one store a better place to shop for certain individuals than another might be. That's because people want and need different things when they shop, and the right place for one person might be the wrong place for another.

The best way to decide is to comparison shop when you have enough time to do so. That means reading newspaper ads and going around to several stores. If you are shopping for a major item which you will replace only a few times, such as a washer or refrigerator, you should always check at several different places for the best product, service, and guarantee for the lowest price.

If you're shopping for such items as groceries, which must be purchased constantly, you might comparison shop at different places, then select one where you feel you get the best deal overall. But you should continue to check ads and should shop around occasionally to make sure that the store continues to be the best place for you to trade.

Of course, when you need to buy a major item in a hurry, or when you are unable to shop around, it's best to trade with reliable merchants where you know you will get satisfaction.

There are other times when reliability is equally important, if not more so, than price. Trading with merchants with good reputa-

tions for reliability, who stand behind their products or services, is a good idea if you are not knowledgeable about what you are buying. For example, few consumers know how to make valid comparisons between television sets so it's important to deal with a merchant who won't sell you a set that has proved troublesome.

There are several ways to check a merchant's reliability. Our attorneys suggest that you contact the Better Business Bureau in your community to determine whether a business has had justifiable complaints from dissatisfied customers. You should also find out how long the firm has been in business, and ask friends or relatives what they know about its reputation. What sort of guarantees and return policies does the business have? If return or exchange of unsatisfactory products is allowed, it's usually a good sign the merchant has confidence in his merchandise.

The services offered by a business can also affect the prices of its products. More special services usually mean higher prices, but many consumers find they are worth the extra cost. Charge accounts and credit, free parking, gift wrapping, repair service, free delivery, installation, staff advisors such as interior decorators — all of these can add to the prices a store must charge to make a reasonable profit. Only the individual consumer knows if these services are important enough to him to justify generally higher prices.

If you have a consumer complaint, contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, your county or district attorney, or your local Better Business Bureau.

### Bob Krueger's Weekly Report

Congress is a body that usually responds to crises, acting after some disaster has occurred, rather than in anticipation of potential future problems. A recent case in point is the Packers and Stockyards Act that passed the House of Representatives last week on a voice vote, being supported by major national farm organizations and national banking groups.

The impetus for passage of this act clearly comes from the recent bankruptcy of a large Iowa stockyard. That bankruptcy hit many farmers and ranchers severely. After their animals had been sold and slaughtered, they were unable to collect for their animals. Undoubtedly, many farming families in the area suffered substantial loss and hardship. A relevant question, however, is whether future loss and hardship of this kind can be best prevented by appropriate local or state action, or whether the federal government should pass laws to try to solve the problem.

The bill which the House passed to deal with the problem has the following provisions: (1) Packers whose annual purchases exceed \$500,000 must be bonded (that is, have a financial insurance policy to cover losses in cases of bankruptcy); (2) packers must pay for livestock by the day after purchase; (3) packers cannot use animals for which they have not paid as inventory for borrowing from banks.

No doubt these provisions will give added protection to beef producers. But there may very well be offsetting disadvantages of this bill. We must ask whether it is necessary for the federal government to try to solve this problem for farmers, ranchers and packers.

In the past 17 years only \$43 million has been lost because of such bankruptcies; that is an average of less than \$3 million per year. There can be no doubt that the new bill will require far higher expenditures than \$3 million per year in bonding costs. These costs will be paid

In a saucepan, blend prepared mustard with about ¼ cup vinegar. Stir in remaining vinegar, sugar and next six ingredients. Heat to boiling. Add vegetables; heat just to boiling. Simmer while quickly packing one clean, hot jar at a time. Fill to within ½ inch of top, making sure vinegar solution covers vegetables. Cap each jar immediately. Process five minutes in boiling water bath. Yield: 9 to 10 pints.

**Heroin Smuggling...Big Business**

By Lloyd Bentsen,  
United States Senator  
Smuggling heroin from  
Mexico into the United  
States across our own  
State of Texas has become  
big business, dangerously  
big.

Over the past year alone  
102 plane crashes along  
the U.S.-Mexican border  
involved the illegal drug  
trade. Ninety percent of all  
the heroin seized in the  
United States today comes  
from Mexico, which  
amounts to about 10 tons a  
year.

And now there is new  
and disturbing evidence  
that stolen U.S. military  
weapons are being traded  
for narcotics in Mexico.  
According to testimony  
given to Congress by the  
Director of the El Paso  
Intelligence Center of the  
Drug Enforcement Admin-  
istration, the set-up is  
this:

There are two groups in  
Mexico today that want  
automatic weapons. Revo-  
lutionaries are one, and  
narcotic traffickers the  
other. Both have found  
that the best way to get  
these weapons is to trade  
drugs for them.

An ounce of heroin, for  
instance, will buy them an  
M-15 rifle worth about  
\$1,000 on the black

market.  
It's not a pretty picture,  
but it's the way it is. The  
El Paso official says some  
700 stolen military weap-  
ons have already definitely  
entered Mexico. And the  
Drug Enforcement Admin-  
istration has received  
repeated reports of nu-  
merous aircraft carrying  
military and civilian  
weapons into Mexico and  
coming back, carrying  
large drug cargoes.

I want to put an  
immediate stop to this, but  
apparently the Defense  
Department is dragging its  
feet. El Paso's DEA  
representative told Con-  
gress he's had a lot of  
trouble getting any kind of  
cooperation from Defense  
officials, and aside from a  
get-acquainted visit,  
there's been no move for a  
joint DEA-Defense effort  
to cut off the supply of  
stolen weapons.

This is why I've  
personally asked Chairman  
John Stennis of the Senate  
Armed Services Commit-  
tee to conduct a full  
investigation into the  
situation. This should  
serve as a needed spring-  
board to whatever steps  
are necessary to get the  
job done.

In the meantime, we can  
be encouraged by reports

that a cooperative U.S.-  
Mexican effort to eradicate  
the poppy fields in Mexico  
that produce heroin is  
beginning to show some  
returns. In the past few  
months 18,000 poppy  
fields spread over a  
5,000-acre area have been  
destroyed through the use  
of herbicides.

DEA Chief Peter Ben-  
singer also reports to me  
that U.S. and Mexican  
officials are confiscating  
an increasing amount of  
heroin being shipped into  
our country. Last year,  
2,359 pounds of heroin  
were removed from the  
international market,  
which is twice as much as  
in 1974.

Obviously our border  
monitoring system is an  
integral part of this effort  
and I intend to continue  
my personal fight to obtain  
personnel and enough  
funding to maintain an  
effective monitoring  
system.

I believe this is vital,  
both to reverse growing  
drug addiction among our  
citizens and to stem rising  
crime throughout the  
nation.

tion. A Bicentennial pro-  
ject of the Mason County  
Historical Commission and  
the Mason County Histori-  
cal Society, the 384 page

churches, communities,  
schools, businesses, and  
organizations. Many old  
photographs add to this  
historical record.

A committee chaired by  
Wilburn Shearer has  
worked on the project  
since early 1975. The  
books will be available in  
July, in time for the  
Mason County Roundup  
celebration, July 16 and  
17.

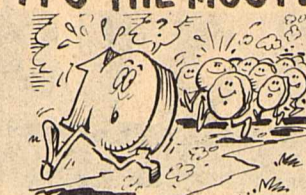
