"NOT GUILTY BY REASON OF INSANITY" is a verdict which will be much-discussed in the years to come, so as a commentator on the national news scene, we might as well get our two cents worth in print, along with everyone else's.

In the first place, we never have felt as though the "insanity" plea was fair, but simply a scam devised by the legal profession as a last-gasp effort to get their clients off the hook when it is a well-accepted fact that they are guilty of whatever charges for which they are being tried.

By the same token, the legal profession might as well introduce "not guilty because my client was enraged at the time he was charged for murder"; or "not guilty by reason that he had a bad day at the office," or how about "because he just didn't have a happy childhood."

The non-conviction of John Hinckley, Jr. for the shooting of President Reagan marks a high point for defense attorneys in this country, and one can only hope that the outrage from the American people will cause the court system to take a second look at some of its legal loopholes, which allow murderers to go free, rapists to freely roam the streets, and those convicted of driving while intoxicated or under the influence of drugs, to continue to operate their vehicles until they have slaughtered thousands of innocent victims.

The rights of the criminals have more than been served during the past generation. At this point in time, it is imperative that the leaders of our country recognize the importance of protecting the rights of its law-abiding citizens.

If Lee Harvey Oswald had been able to stand trial for the assassination of President Kennedy, we wonder if his defense could have been as successful as was that for John Hinckley.

Somehow, we doubt that it would have. Due to the extreme national feeling of loss, we feel it would have been virtually impossible to have found 12 people out of the entire nation's population who would not have voted to throw the book at Oswald.

And, if Hinckley's aim had been an inch or two better the verdict rendered this week might also have been different.

But, due to his acquittal, has not the courts further endangered the lives of public officials, since would-be assassins can now say to themselves "I can get away with it anyway."

In a time when violence needs to be quashed, when lawbreakers need to be shown that offenders will be punished, we feel that the jury in the Hinckley case took a giant step backward in making it safe for our elected officials, particularly the president.

Luckily for President Reagan, the medical staff at George Washington Hospital was a good one, and was able to save his life that afternoon in March of 1981. They received the thanks and admiration of the entire nation.

Unfortunately, the prosecuting attorney and his staff of lawyers was not quite as skilled as the surgeons, because they could not convince 12 people that Hinckley was guilty of an act that virtually the entire nation was able to witness on their television screens.

It was an historic verdict, and an interesting one. And, we predict that the verdict will be much-discussed for a number of years.

We just wonder if the 12 jurors will be ready to shoulder the responsibility, the next time that Mr. Hinckley, or any other would-be assassin commits an act during a time of "temporary insanity."

New Trooper Is Named For County

Luis Jorge Flores of Brownsville has been commissioned as a Trooper with the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Flores received his commission as a State of Texas law enforcement officer from Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, in a graduation ceremony at DPS Headquarters in Austin.

Flores completed a rigorous 18-week training course at the DPS Academy. The intensive course, recognized as one of the best programs of its kind in the U.S., included instruction in traffic law enforcement, accident investigation, criminal investigation techniques, crime prevention, first aid, riot control and other subjects related to law enforcement.

"These men and women have been trained to deal with extremely sensitive, stressful and sometimes dangerous matters on a daily basis," said Colonel Adams. "But their foremost duty is to faithfully serve the citizens of Texas."

Trooper Flores, 24, has been assigned to the Highway Patrol Service and will be stationed at Friona.

Approximately 300 persons undergo the special training and graduation from the DPS Academy each year.

Trooper Flores is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesus Jose Flores of Brownsville.

Bovina FFA Members Complete SPS Course

Two members of the Bovina High School chapter of Future Farmers of America were among the 82 FFA boys—and one FFA girl who successfully completed a course in farm electrification at a Southwestern Public Service-sponsored workshop in Amarillo, Wednesday, June 16.

Jackie Edwards and Lee Marquez, accompanied by Bovina High School vocational agriculture teacher Jack Dillard, attended the three-day workshop, the twentieth sponsored by SPS. Bret Whitten, FFA Area I vice president, helped run the event.

This was the first SPS-FFA workshop ever in which a girl was a student. She was Kathy Karber, a Booker, Texas, high school senior.

The students learned how to wire buildings, how to build and use electric controls, or how to build electric motors. They also were taught how electricity is made, and first aid and safety tips.

Five students were selected by the workshop faculty as winners of trips to the National FFA convention in Kansas City, Mo., in November. SPS will pay the students' expenses. The top students were Max Hector of Frenship High School, Dennis Stuart of Mobeetie High School, Kelly Kunka of Follett High School, David Abell of Ralls High School, and Kynan Sturgess of Dumas High School.

Berl Springer, chairman of the SPS Board of Directors and Chief Executive Officer of the Company, presented awards Wednesday to the five trip winners and to the other students who successfully completed the workshop.

City Woman Is Assaulted On Friday

A Bovina woman in her mid-twenties was a victim of an assault on Friday, June 18 at approximately 2 p.m. in her back yard, it was reported to the Bovina Police Department.

The assailant was said to be a Mexican-American male, who stood six feet tall. He had no beard or moustache, but did have medium long, unkempt hair and was 30-35 years old.

The attack took place in south Bovina and the attacker was wielding a pocket knife, which was used to cut the victim twice from the neck to the chest area. Then the alleged assault took place.

The woman was taken to West Plains Medical Center in Muleshoe for an examination and medical attention.

Police officials were called to investigate the occurrence but have not located the suspect as yet.

Ten Accidents Investigated In Parmer Co.

Sergeant Billy Don Scott, area supervisor of Parmer County, reports that for the month of May the Texas Highway Patrol Troopers investigated a total of ten accidents in this county.

There were three injury accidents with a total of six persons injured and seven property damage accidents.

In District 5B, which includes the top 31 counties of the Texas Panhandle, there were 205 accidents investigated by the Texas Highway Patrol.

Highway Patrol Captain Bob Russell reports that the Texas Highway Patrol Troopers investigated six fatal accidents with a total of seven persons killed, 65 injury accidents with a total of 104 persons injured, and 134 property damage accidents.

Reagan Looney Is Recovering From Surgery

The students came from 42 Texas communities, from Guthrie, Oklahoma and Clovis, Roswell and Tucumcari, N.M. Workshop administrators were assisted by three students: FFA Area One president Tom McDonald of Texline and Area One vice presidents Whitten and Patrick Railsback of Idalou.

Five vocational teachers paid by SPS taught the three courses. They were assisted by 21 adult FFA advisors and by SPS personnel.

The "Farm Wiring" course emphasized safe and efficient wiring of two-and-three-way switches, proper wire splicing, and how to make a meter loop. The skills can be used in homes, barns, sheds, or other places electricity is needed.

Students in the "Electric Controls" course learned how to tie in three-and-four-way switches, how to set up photoelectric cells for automatic lighting and how to set up two-and-three-pole relays.

The "Farm Motors" course taught students how to operate, repair and build small electric motors.

Tuesday afternoon the students toured SPS's Harrington Station, a giant coal-fired power plant at Amarillo which has a generating capacity of 1,122,000 kilowatts.

Southwestern Public Service primarily provides electric utility service to a population of more than one million in a 45,000-square-mile area of the Panhandle and south plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

Ms. Steffens will be graduating from West Texas State University later in the summer, and will be employed as a fulltime instructor in the Bovina system.

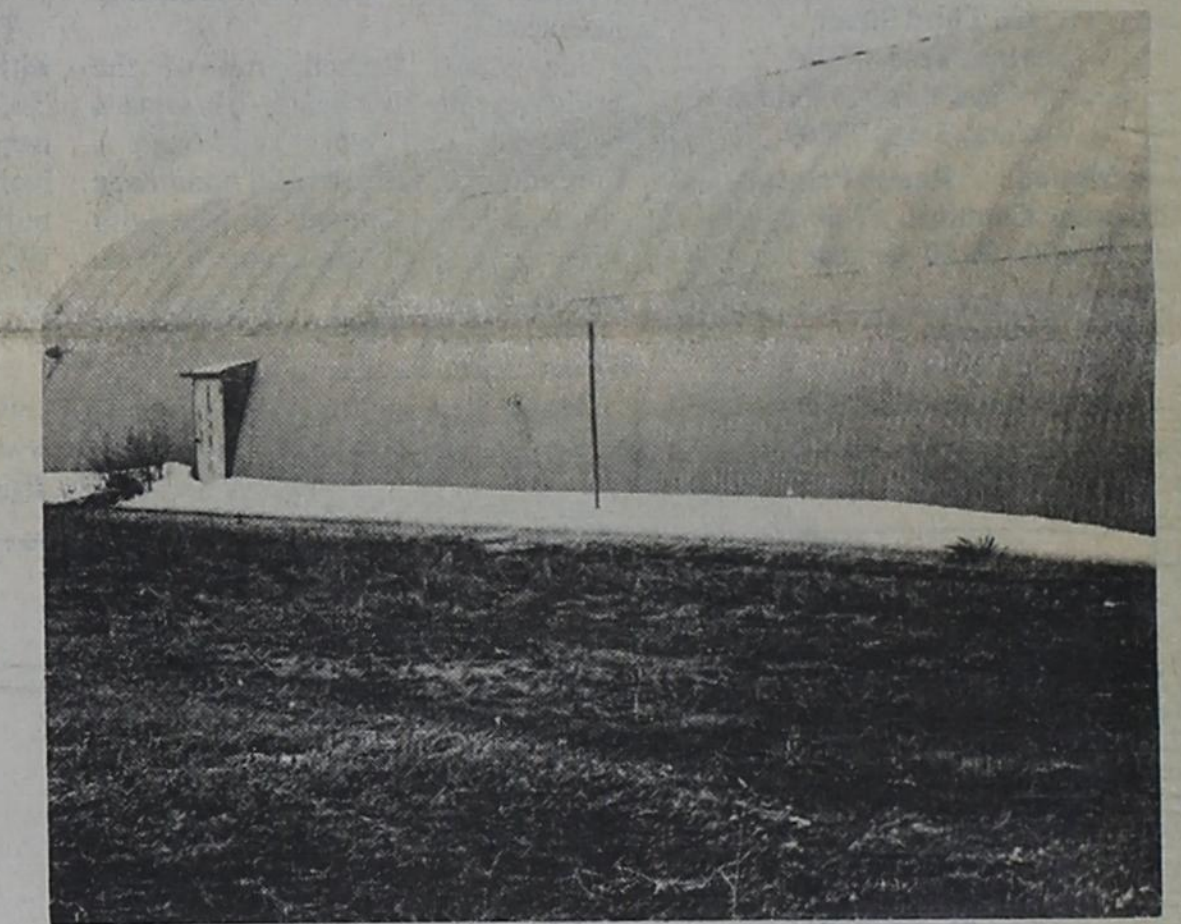
Senior Citizens Set Luncheon

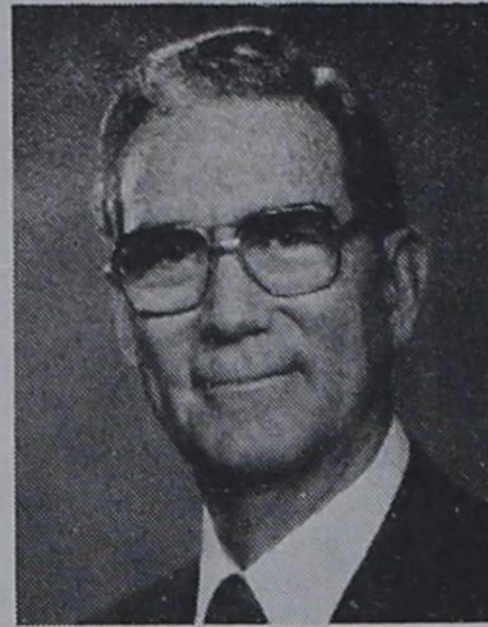
Springer Is President
