Sponsor for the annual event is the Sonora Lions Club in cooperation with the Sonora Wool and Mohair Co. and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.





If you need more coverage than is provided by the automatic 10% extension available with the standard Fire Policy or Homeowner's Policy, additional amounts of coverage can be added to either type policy.
