IF THERE IS ONE industry in the U.S. which is more unstable and less predictable than farming at the present time, it might be the oil industry, which has seen its share of ups and downs during the past year.

Thanks to the high price of oil, as set by the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC), America's oil industry stepped up their exploration and drilling activity considerably beginning in 1980, which was also the first year of phased decontrol of crude oil prices.

But the OPEC organization, which had always operated like a "well oiled machine," began to falter, when Saudi Arabia began to ignore the daily output quotas established for members, and produced an oil glut.

After several years of spiraling gas prices, American motorists have been treated during the past year by more stable prices, even price wars--something unheard of since 1973, during the past year.

Experts predict that crude oil prices, at least for the near future, are expected to be stable, and although gas prices may fluctuate as much as a dime per gallon, the inflation-adjusted price of crude oil is predicted to drop 14.3 per cent during 1982, and 2.1 per cent in 1983.

The price of Saudi Arabian crude oil has dropped from a level of \$40 per barrel a year ago to \$34 at the present.

While this may be good news to motorists, farmers and other consumers, the domestic oil industry has been thrown into chaos. Where exploration and drilling had caused the oil areas to flourish, operations are now having to be sharply cut back.

The increased activity had been based on oil prices of \$40 per barrel or more, and the oil industry cannot see a profit since the price of oil has dropped. (That begins to sound like farming, doesn't it?)

A spokesman for the domestic oil said that the petroleum industry's rate of spending on expansion would increase only about 14 per cent this year over 1981 levels. This compares to a whopping 39 per cent increase last year.

"When oil prices were moving up, more properties became economical to produce. Now the marginal properties are moving the other way," the spokesman said.

All across the country, the number of working drilling rigs has dropped sharply, and major projects to develop new sources of energy are being slowed or closed down completely.

Experts warn that the consequences of these trends could cause a sharper jump in the level of imports by the second half of the 1980s.

Currently, the United States produces 8.7 million barrels of oil a day, which is an increase from 8.2 million barrels in 1977. This increased production is a result of exploration and development programs begun years ago.

The surge in drilling in 1980-81 will not be felt until around 1984, according to the oil people. The experts agree that the nation's oil production potential is enormous, but is economically feasible only under certain conditions.

And, to say that the "energy crunch" is over or lessening, one would have to make some unrealistic assumptions, such as: "No Middle East dispute will disrupt the world's oil flow," a condition already threatened by the Israeli-Lebanon fighting.

America's dependence on foreign oil has dropped from 48 per cent in 1977 to around 30 per cent at present, an encouraging sign considering that our imports come from the world's most volatile region. But this trend has once again been placed "on hold."

## Area Gets Rains During Weekend

The Bovina area had some fairly good rains overall during the weekend, with some reporting as much as near two inches.

Harry Johnson at Sherley Grain said he had about 1.60 at his location just outside of Bovina west on Highway 60. It was reported by Lavoida Hawkins that in the north part of the county going out toward Pleasant Hill, that the general consensus was that most everyone got

about 1.5 inches in that direction. At the Rhea Elevator, it was reported that the rainfall there was about 1.8 inches and near two inches closer to the Deaf Smith County line. A little hail was reported in that area, but not enough to sustain damage.

At the Lazbuddie Elevator, it was reported that the area there received just over a half of an inch, at .60.

The Lawrence Jamersons, who reside east of Bovina on Highway 86, said that they received between 1.25 to 1.5 inches of rainfall Sunday, and said that their neighbors were saying they had received about the same amount.

Out on 1731, a mile and one quarter out, on the Leon Schilling farm, it was reported that they received about one inch all together, and it was just "good, slow rain, with no hail."

It was reported that on the Jack Clayton farm, south of Bovina, that 1.75 inches fell, but the report was not confirmed.

It was reported, but unconfirmed that the Les McCain farm received about 1.5 inches of moisture during the weekend.

In Bovina proper, the rain total varied, with one report up to 1.76 inches.

## Man Arrested Saturday In Rape Case

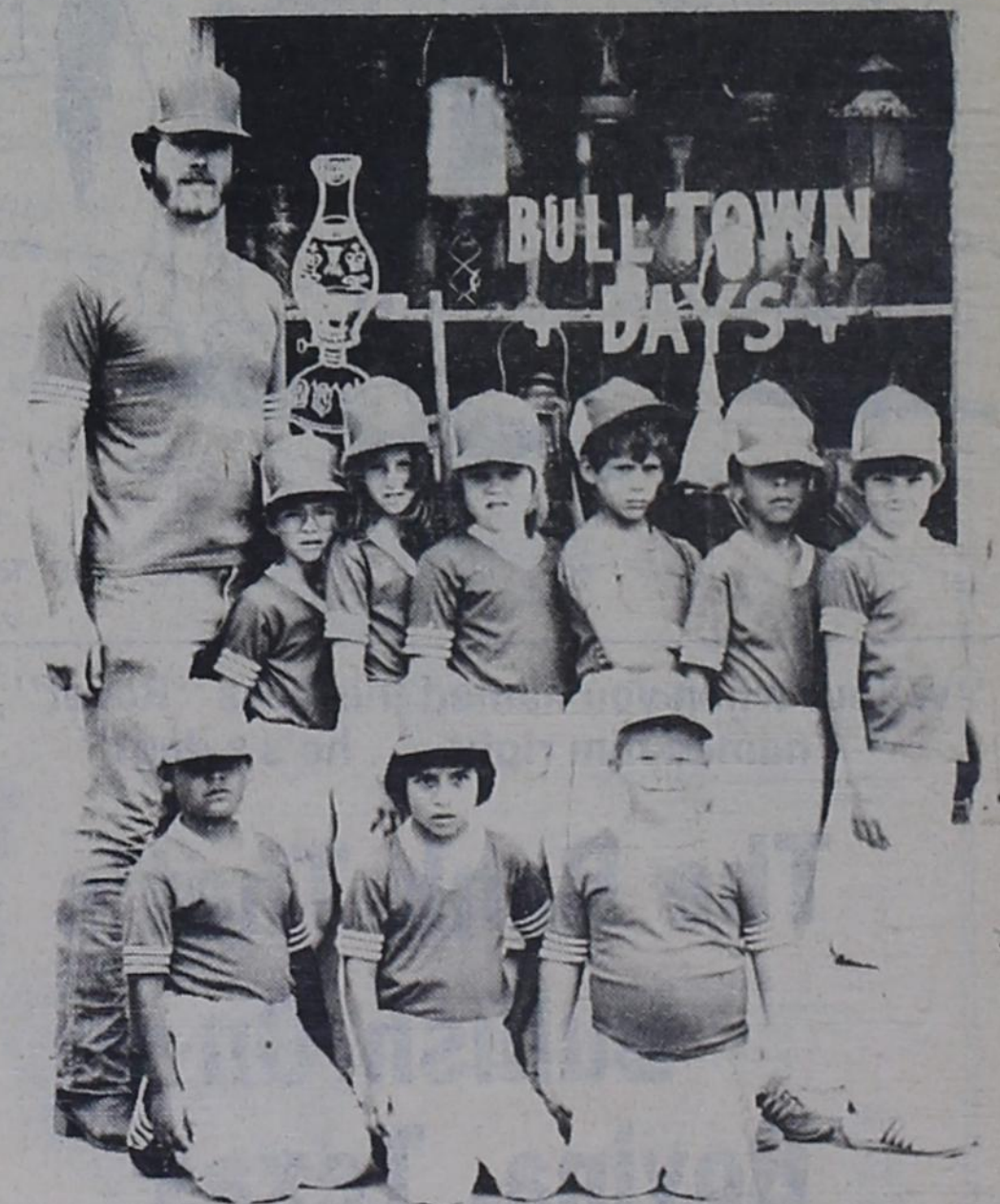
A 36-year-old Mexican-American man presently living in Bovina was arrested in connection with a rape which occurred in Bovina recently.

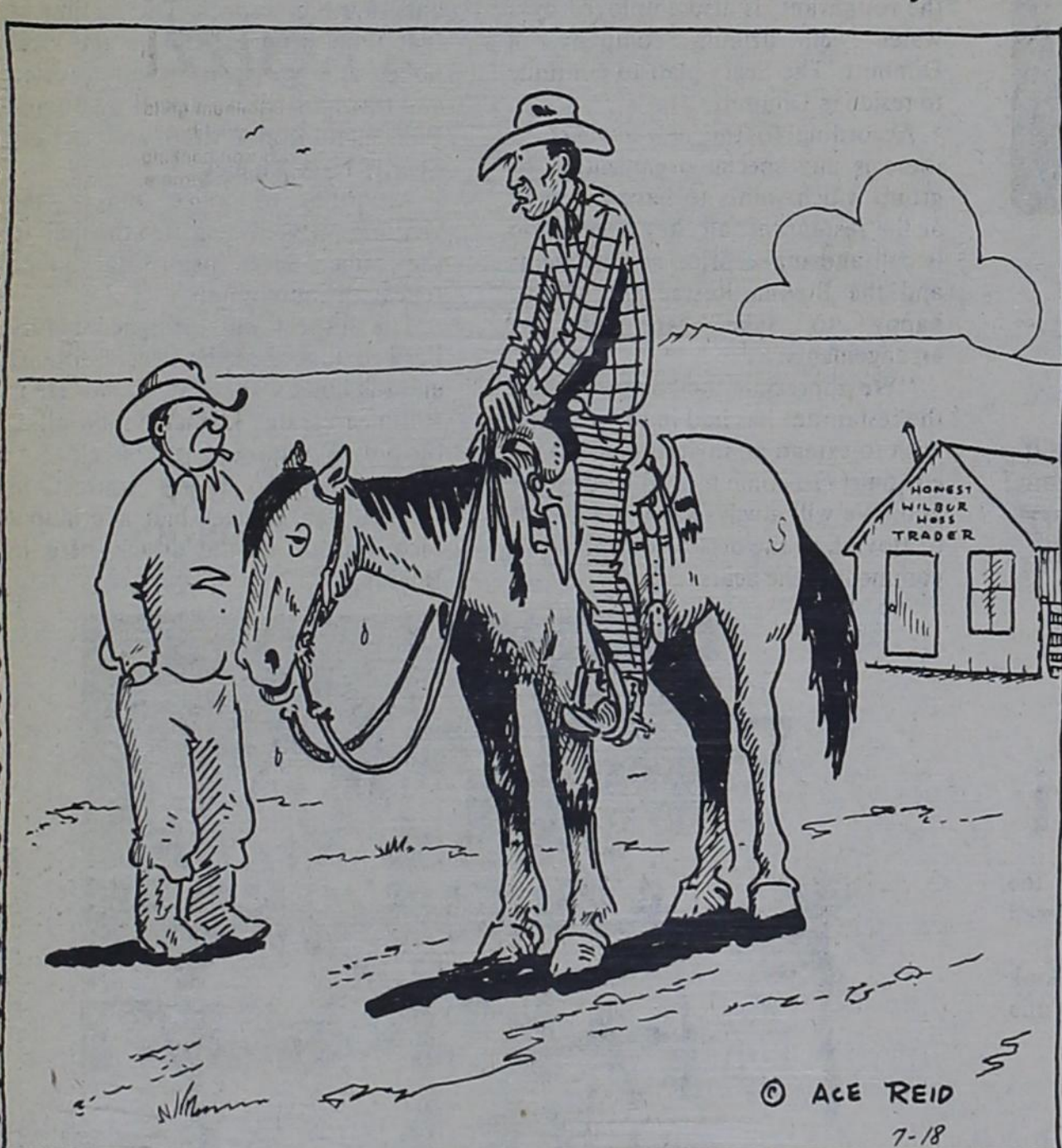

## 'Texas' In 17th Season

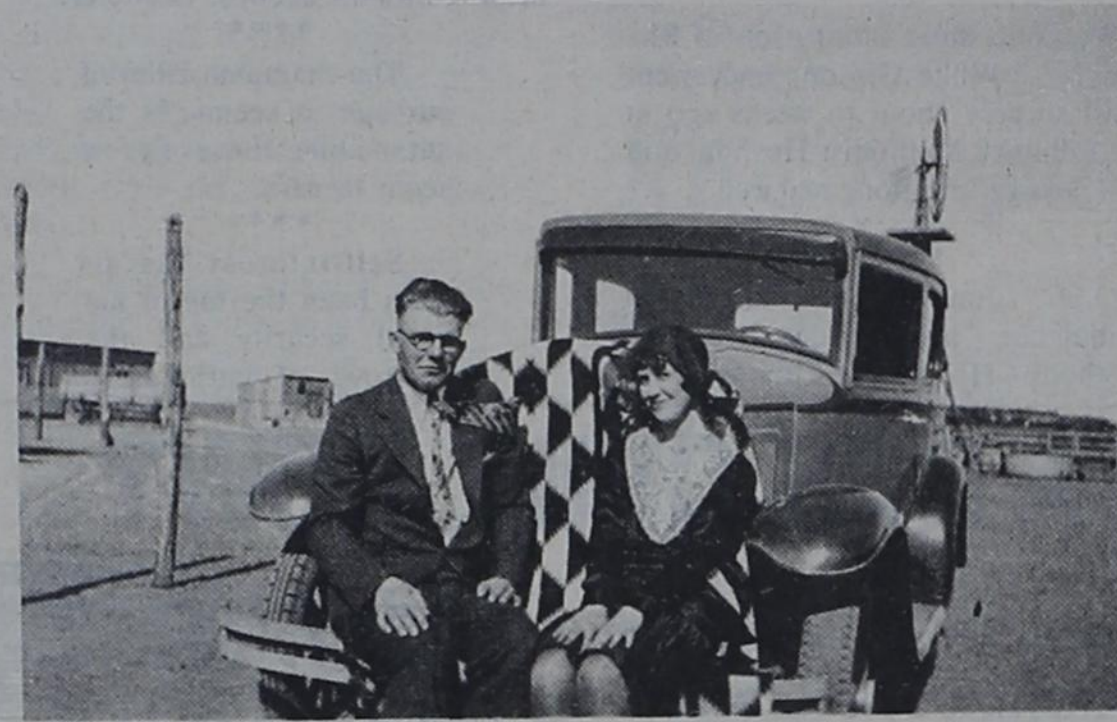

It seems as though, even when we have problems, there is always someone around whose problems are more serious.

So it is with the residents living near the New Orleans, La. International Airport.

For those of you who are completely out of touch with the world, a Boeing 727 jetliner fell from the sky Friday into a quiet, peaceful neighborhood not far from the New Orleans airport and cut a groove in the ground as the wing came down. The accident killed all of the 145 persons aboard the airliner and at least eight persons on the ground.

More than a dozen homes were incinerated by the hellish flames which tore through the previously peaceful neighborhood.

Now, there are people in this neighborhood who cannot sleep at night, and children who won't play in their treehouses for fear that another plane might drop out of the sky.

I think that the airline industry should buckle up and get down to the bottom of these unexplained accidents. It is costing the user money as well as the insurance company, not to mention the value which cannot be placed upon human life.

We are still wondering (as of Monday afternoon) what Ag Sec. John Block plans on doing about the current farm disasters on the High Plains of Texas. So far, the word has been noncommittal, but even our

congressmen believe that something will be done.

I just hope that they are right.

Having seen the destruction south of Lubbock, and also having witnessed the loss of crops (and maybe farms) around here, I feel that the Secretary should get the ball rolling.

I am not really sure about the range of farming activities that Block has had an actual hand in, but I know for sure that there are going to be plenty of farmers who will probably just have to sit this year out and watch the dust blow.

And, in this country, when the farmer has to lay out for a year, it is going to hurt all of us, no matter what business we are in.

If the word on farm economic aide doesn't come soon, I feel that some letters should be written, even as high as the President urging those politicians to get out of their ivory towers and make some decisions about the fate of America's (and especially Texas') farm families. They need to stand on one side of the proverbial fence or the other when it comes down to their policy on agriculture.

And, although, for some, it is already too late, the longer Washington waits about sending down a sign, the more farmers will have to shut down operations, and move to the towns and cities, where jobs are already a tooth and nail situation.

We need to pray that Reagan, Block and all others concerned will make this issue a top priority, because if it is not given top priority, we will all be in the same boat...and paddling to the poorhouse.

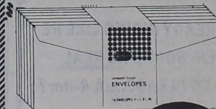
