City Audit Shows Vast Increase

City Aldermen unanimously approved the city's audit report which showed a profit of \$192,405.10 for the year ending September 30, 1976. This audit shows an increase in revenue over last year in the amount of 31 percent, with a 36 percent increase in income. The electrical fund showed the highest percentage of increase.

Aldermen heard the recommendation of Joe Kiowski, president of the Airport Board, who submitted his request by

letter, that the city rent to Don McFarland, a portion of land at the airport entrance to be used for a radio repair shop. Gay Copeland was on hand at the meeting to oppose the request, stating that he felt the business would cause crowded conditions at the already overcrowded facilities.

The commission tabled the request until airport representatives could appear at a special meeting called for December 13.

Dr. Joe Andrews, superintendent of the Sonora

Independent School District, asked the council to okay the drilling of a water well for irrigation purposes at the football field. The request was approved.

Christmas and New Year's holidays were discussed and aldermen voted to give all city employees December 24 and December 31 off. It was also agreed that all employees would also be given a turkey for Christmas.

Discussion was held regarding 4-H animals kept in the city limits that could become a possible health hazard to the community. City Manager Bob Nevill told Aldermen that County Agent Clint Langford has offered to police these areas. The proposal by Langford was approved.

J. Simpler, who owns and operates the J & V Mobile Home Park, appeared before the council with a request that the city assist him financially in the installation of a 6 inch water line to a new addition at his mobile home park. This line would bring water pressure of sufficiency to operate a fire plug on his property.

The council told Simpler that their ordinance does not provide private enterprise with sewer and water lines but that they would install fire plugs if he installs at his expense, the requested water line. Aldermen also reminded Simpler that the new fire truck purchased recently by the fire department was bought for the purpose of fighting mobile home fires.

Simpler also told commissioners that his intention was to add ten more acres of land to the city limits in which he intends to extend his mobile home park, enabling him to park 100 mobile homes. The park presently houses 46.

A vote to enter into negotiations with Rip Ward for 243 acres of land in which to dispose of treated waste water, was unanimous.

In other action of the commission, Jerry Kemp was hired as the new city police chief to replace Bill Webster when he takes office as Sutton County Sheriff January 1.

Kemp Named Police Chief

Jerry Kemp was named City Police Chief in action taken by the City Commission Monday.

Kemp will take office January 1, replacing W. W. (Bill) Webster who will take over the duties of Sutton County Sheriff and Tax Assessor/Collector.

Married and the father of 13 year old Debbie and 12 year old Philip, Kemp has been on the city police here since September 1974.

A special meeting of the city Aldermen has been set for Tuesday, December 14 at which time Kemp will present his proposals for the operation of the

police department.

Kemp did state that the present method of operation which the police department has worked under the past two years has been most effective and he feels no reason for change. He will be working in close harmony and cooperation with Webster and the sheriff's department.

Officer Kemp has a total of 41 college hours and 913 hours in various police schools. He is schooled in many major areas of police work including breath analization, investigation, drug abuse, and communications.

HNG Purchases Land For Future Home Sites

HNG Oil Company has purchased 171 acres of land north of Sonora, according to company official Kit Weaver.

This land, which will first house their new company office, will eventually make home sites for the many newcomers and any other potential homeowners.

Weaver says that Bill Roden, who is president of HNG Oil Company and a resident of Midland, felt that the company could

contribute to Sonora more in this fashion than any other way.

A professional land planner has been hired by the company to evaluate the cost and planning for the medium priced homes that are to be built as the demand requires.

A paved road will be the beginning and construction is expected to begin on that part of the project within the next 30 days, according to Weaver.

Gasoline was reported missing from buses also and school personnel were unable to determine whether the theft of gasoline occurred at the same time as the tire incident.

Due to this vandalism principals at elementary, junior high and high school, have agreed that during basketball games, all students will be confined to the gymnasium. Those leaving the gym must leave the campus. If they return for a later game, admission will be charged.

Dr. Elroy Otte, high school principal, said Police Chief Bill Webster has agreed to work closely with the school, and will patrol during games to stop any loitering on the campus.

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Rev. Frank Flores Appointed To Baptist Hospital Board

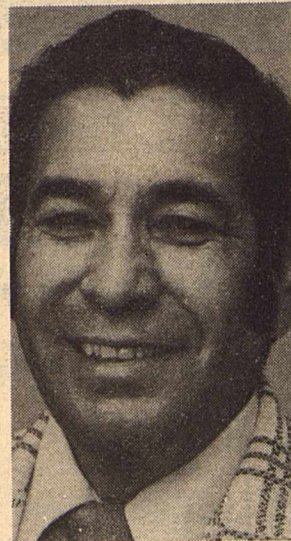
The Rev. Frank Flores has been appointed to the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Memorial Hospital System, replacing Dr. John D. Barbee.

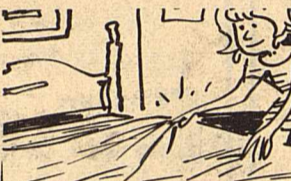
60 Plus Club Plans Party

Amoco Completes Second Well

Standard Oil Company (Indiana) subsidiary Amoco Production Company announced recently that it has completed its second successful well in the Abo Reef trend in West Texas. Amoco spokesmen said that the new well situated in Yoakum, County, further substantiates the potential for significant new oil reserves in the area.

The new well, the N. C. Clananah "D" No. 1, was drilled below 8,000 feet and completed pumping 200 barrels of oil daily from two separate zones in the Abo Reef formation. The Clananah well is situated some two miles from existing oil production in the Southwest Prentice field and some 16 miles southeast of Amoco's recently announced completion from the Abo, the W. G. Frazier No. 87 in Hockley County. The W. G. Frazier No. 87 has the capability of producing 180 barrels of oil daily.

Amoco owns 100 percent interest in the Clananah well. The company is in the process of completing a second well and is drilling a third well nearby. Both of these wells are being drilled to the productive zones identified in the Clananah. Several additional wells are also planned for surrounding Amoco acreage.

Amoco holds substantial acreage in the Abo Reef trend, a geological province that extends from eastern New Mexico into West Texas. Company drilling operations are underway in several other prospective field areas in the trend.

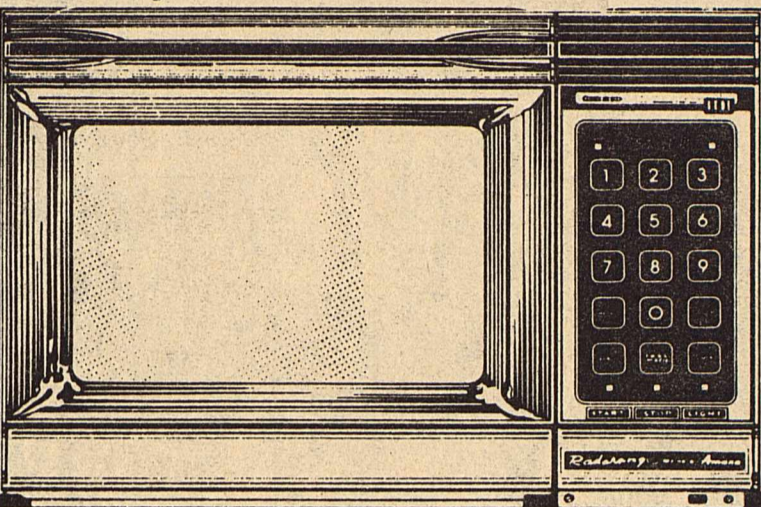

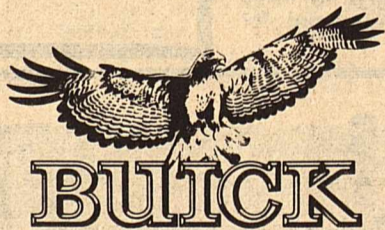

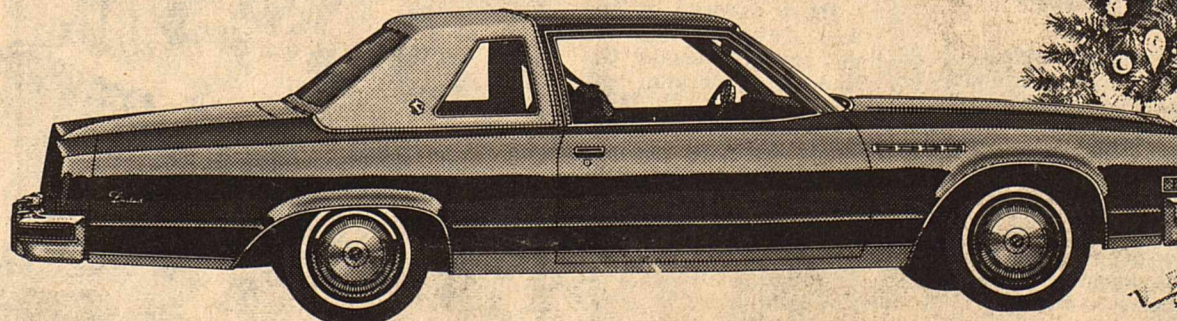

Cool Weather Joins Fight Against Texas Screwworms

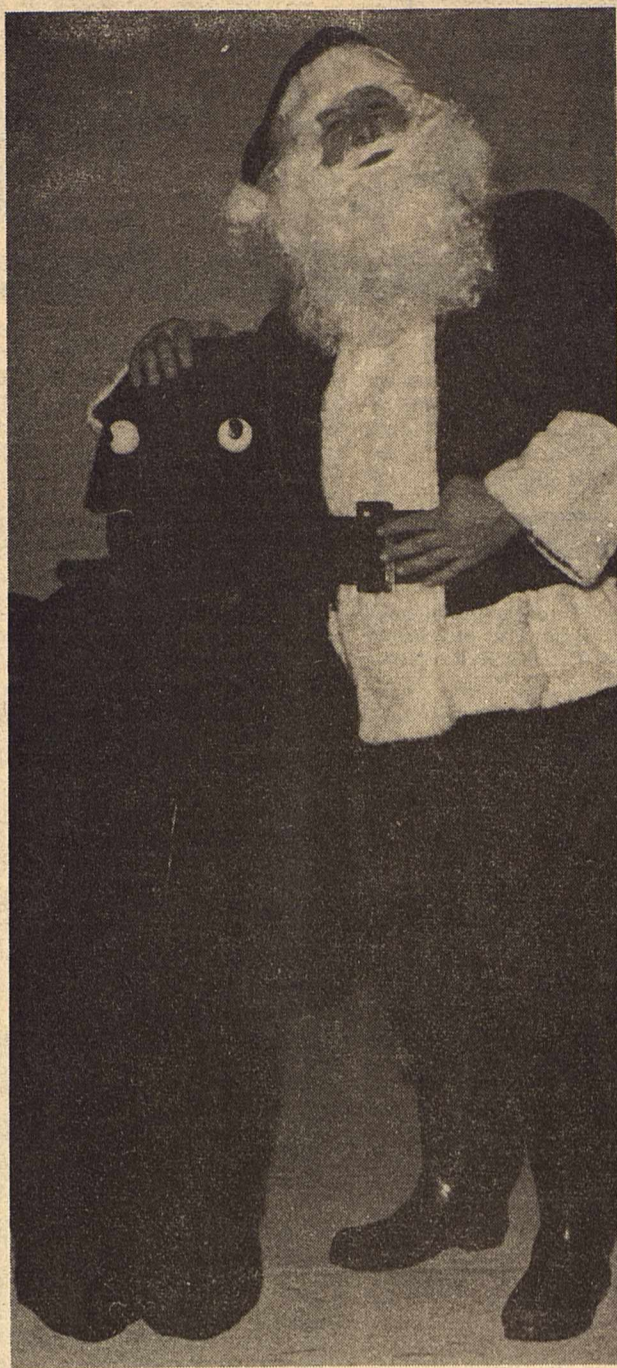
Cool November weather added another force to efforts being made to reduce the massive screwworm population that tormented Texas livestock this year, says a U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) veterinarian.

Other forces working against this live flesh eating parasite are primary livestock care by owners, sterile flies produced at the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) laboratory at Mission, and still more sterile flies produced in Mexico by the joint Mexico - U.S. Commission for Eradication of Screw-

worms.

Dr. M. E. (Cotton) Meadows, Jr., is director of the Screwworm Eradication Program. He says the 1,988 November screwworm samples from 115 counties brought the year's Texas case total to 29,070. This compares to 16,278 a year earlier, and 90,567 by the same time in 1972. Sutton County's November total was 23.

Screwworms are larvae of the screwworm fly which deposits eggs on wounds in warm blooded animals. As eggs hatch the tiny maggots enter the wound to feed on live flesh.

The local sorority is presenting the ballet as gift to the community and to expose children and adults alike to the art of ballet.



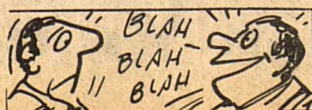

Born September 17, 1888 in Mexico, Mr. Galindo came to Sonora in 1911. He worked for rancher Bryan Hunt for 44 years.

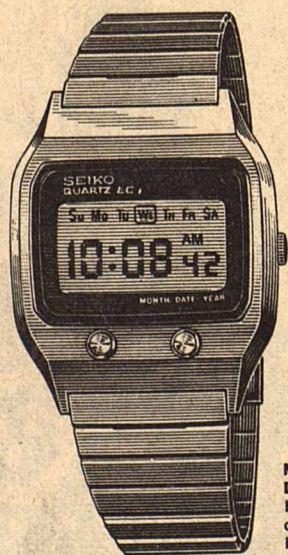
