Bible History

The thirty-nine books of the Old Testament contain God's covenant with the Jews (Deuteronomy 5:3). The New Testament's twenty-seven books contain God's covenant with Christians (Matthew 28:19-20). Bible history divides into three periods. The Patriarchal Age covers Adam's fall, man's increasing sinfulness, God's punishment of man through the flood, and the beginning of God's plan to save man (Genesis 1-12). In the Jewish Age God gave Abraham's descendants (the Jewish nation) the law of Moses to prepare the people for the coming of Christ (Galatians 3:24, 25). However, Jeremiah prophesied that God would later make a new covenant or law (Jere-

miah 31:31). Finally, Christ came to terminate the Jewish Age and inaugurate the Christian Age. Fulfilling God's promise to Abraham (Galatians 3:29), Jesus brought salvation to the sinful world and became the mediator of a better covenant (Hebrews 8:6-12). He nailed the old covenant to the cross, taking it out of the way (Colossian 2:14-17). Of course, the Old Testament still has value as God's word, for examples and admonitions (Romans 15:4; 1 Cor. 10:11). In the Christian Age, the last period, God speaks to all men through Christ who has revealed His will in the New Testament (Hebrews 1:1,2; 9:15).

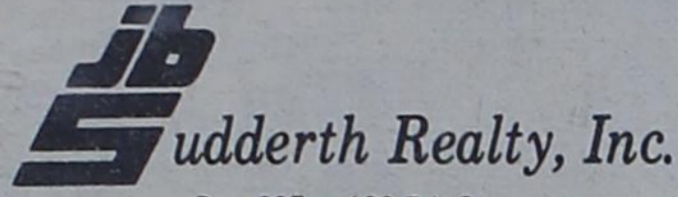

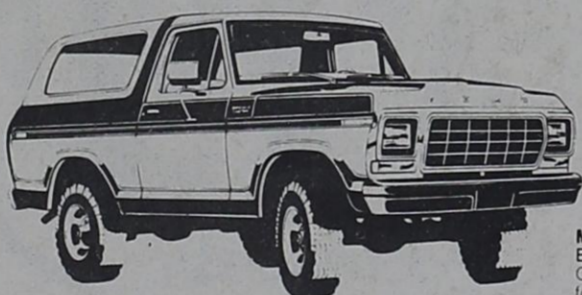

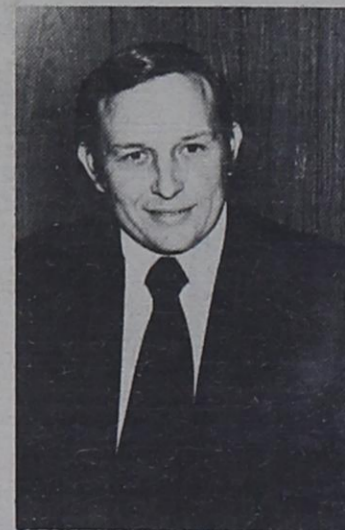
