BILL SOUTHARD, our newspaperman-friend at the Clovis News-Journal, is currently experiencing a rare thrill for a writer.

As you may have read, Southard has a book in print. Not only that, but the Clovis editor's Western novel won a \$25,000 prize in a contest sponsored by Bantam Books and 20th Century Fox.

"Season of Vengeance" is probably one of the most carefully-written western novels to hit the market in years.

Southard told this writer that he wrote the book a third time before submitting it to the Bantam contest. Maybe that's why it's such a good book.

The Clovis editor said that he had written the manuscript, and had it finished when he heard about the national contest. He decided then to re-write the novel and enter it in the competition. He did, but still not satisfied, he re-wrote his work another time before sending it off.

"When I re-wrote the book, I would pause, asking myself 'Is that the word I want to use?' I labored to get just exactly the right word I wanted for each instance," Southard says.

Southard's effort won him the prize, from approximately 1,000 manuscripts entered in the contest. Included in his prize money is a check from 20th Century Fox for movie rights in the event the book should be made into a movie.

Although this writer has been a longtime Western movie fan, we must confess that it had been years since we had read a Western novel.

The book was extremely enjoyable, and now, like Bantam Books, we are anxiously waiting for Southard's sequel.

You read the book with the knowledge that not only is Southard an extremely good writer, but he knows what he is writing about.

"Season of Vengeance" is set in the mountains of New Mexico. Southard has been a New Mexico resident all of his life. As a youth he enjoyed horseback riding, hunting and fishing.

After high school, he spent four years in the Navy, at the time of the Korean conflict. He then returned home, and earned a degree in journalism at Eastern New Mexico University.

Southard has been in newspaper work ever since. He has served as managing editor of the Clovis News-Journal for the past ten years.

As a youngster, Southard became a fan of Western novels, by the old masters, Zane Grey, Max Brand, Luke Short, etc., and later on, Louis L'Amour. Today, if you go into a store which sells Bantam Books, you'll see Southard's paperback right there with those of his idols.

"It's quite a thrill, I can tell you, to go into a bookstore and see your book on their racks. It's what you always dream of," says the writer whose first ambition was to grow up to be a cowboy.

His hero in "Season of Vengeance" is Jessie Ramming, who is thrust into a quest to find the murderer of his wife, seemingly without help from the law.

Ramming's efforts, against the elements, and naturally, against the "bad guys" makes for an exciting story. So well does Southard build the book's climax that we found ourselves speeding ahead, to see how Ramming would "come out."

As one reviewer points out, Southard's book is accomplished without the profanity and four-letter words that some writers feel they must use to get attention.

It's a good book, and we think our readers would enjoy it. It's not often you get a chance to read a book authored by a good neighbor.

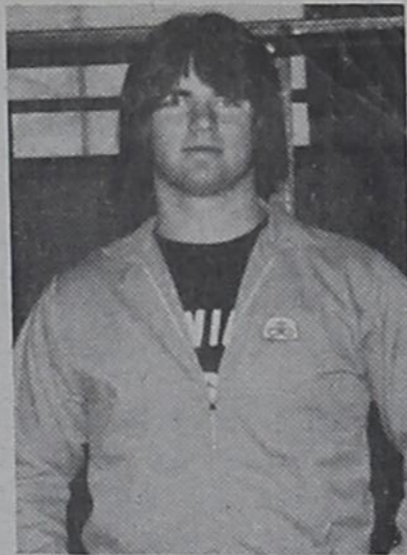
Bovina FFA News

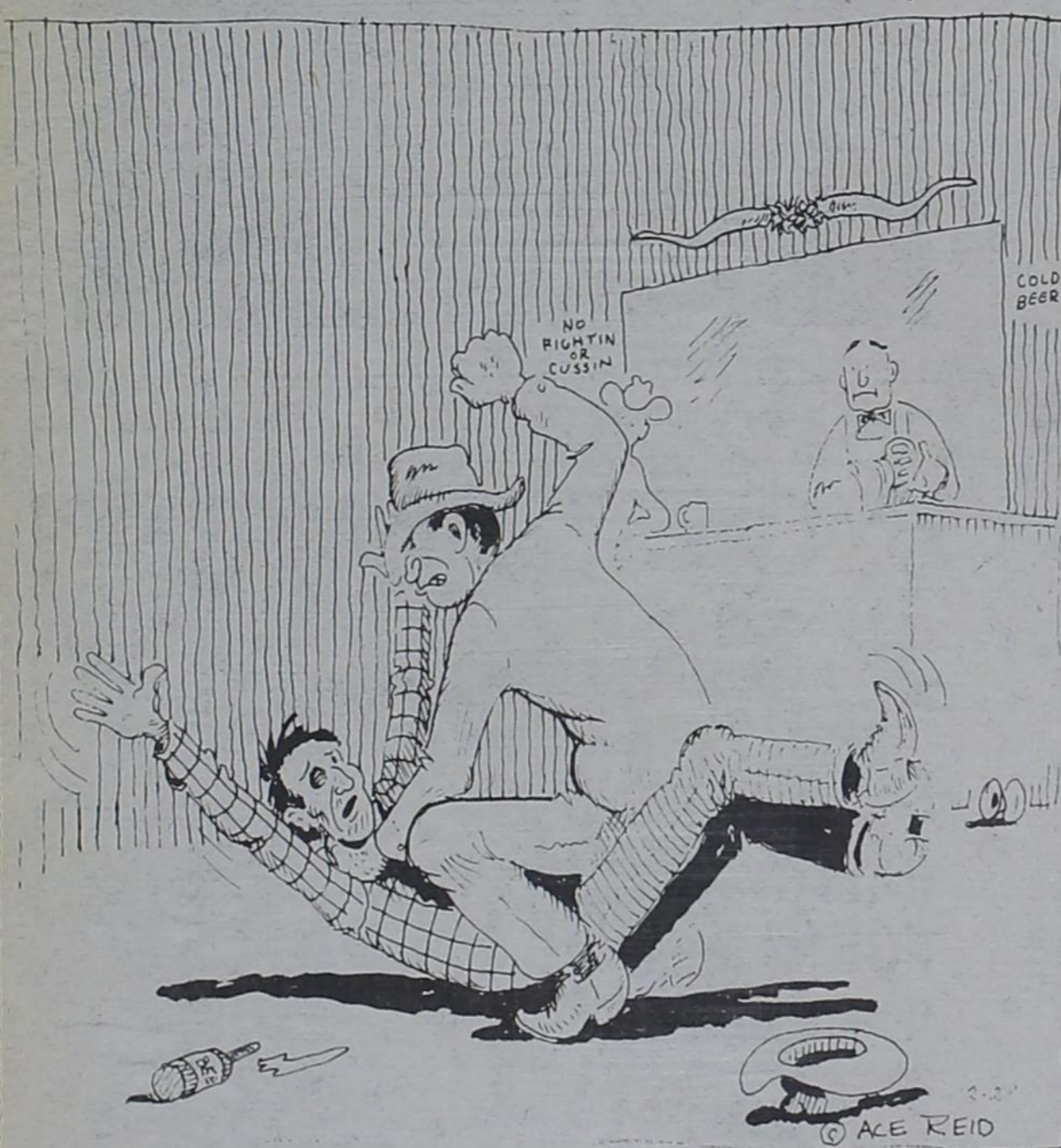

Homemaker Of The Month

Sue Fowler is the homemaker for the month of April. She was born and raised in Floydada, Texas, where she graduated from high school. She also attended business college in Plainview.

Mrs. Fowler married Joe, December 7, 1946, and they lived in the small community of Sand Hill, then moved to Silverton in 1951, before moving to Bovina in January of 1964, where they are engaged in farming.

The Fowlers have two children, Nancy Harden, who lives in San Diego, California and Robert, who farms in Bovina.

Sue and her husband Joe are members of the First United Methodist Church of Bovina where she has taught Sunday School, helps in Vacation Bible School and goes to Friona once a month to help at Prairie Acres Nursing Home. Mrs. Fowler was named Woman of the Year in 1976.

She likes to work with plants, enjoys gardening, growing and arranging gladiolas. She has her own hot house where she has various house plants, along with many garden plants.

She shares a hint for those that

have Easter Lillies. After the leaves die naturally, (they usually turn brown), cut it and plant it outside. It will come back and will bloom in July.

"When planting garden plants be sure to plant them all the way up to the first leave," Sue says.

The Fowlers grind their own wheat and corn for breads. Sue bought bread last week for the first time in two years. She shares some of her favorite bread recipes:

WHOLE WHEAT PANCAKES

Mix together:
1 1/2 cups whole wheat flour
5 tsp baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 cup powdered milk
ADD:
1 1/4 cup water
1/2 cup cottage cheese
1/4 cup corn oil
1 egg (beaten) may be added
serves three or four

BREAD

Place in mixer bowl:
3 cups whole wheat flour
1/2 cup salad oil
1/2 cup honey
1 Tbsp. salt
1 Tbsp or 2 pkg yeast

2 1/2 cups warm water
Beat at low speed until well mixed.
Add 1 cup water
3 to 4 cups white, unbleached flour.
Using dough hooks or by hand mix well. Knead until smooth and no longer sticky, adding bits of flour if needed.

Place in large greased container in warm place, allow to rise until double. Punch down, let rise again. Make into 4 loaves. Oil pans well, place in pan, turn over to oil well on all sides.

Let rise until double. Bake 350 degrees until done. Turn out of pan. Butter tops.

GLAZED CHICKEN AND VEGETABLES.

2 1/2 to 3 lb. fryer cut up
salt and pepper
1 Tbs. oleo
1 onion sliced
1 cup celery (cut up)
1 cup sliced carrots

1/2 of red or green pepper
1 cup tomatoes (1 use Del Monte wedges)
1 clove garlic
1/2 cup sliced mushrooms
1/2 t. thyme

1 bay leaf
1 1/2 Tbs. cornstarch.
Salt and pepper chicken. Brown pieces in oleo. Add: vegetables and seasoning. Simmer 30-40 minutes until tender. Adjust salt. Blend cornstarch with a little water. Add-cook 2 minutes. Remove bay leaf. Serve with rice. Serves 4-6.

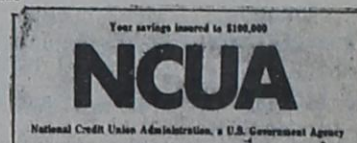


SUE FOWLER, WITH "impatiens", a plant grown in her hot house.

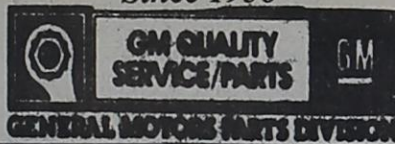

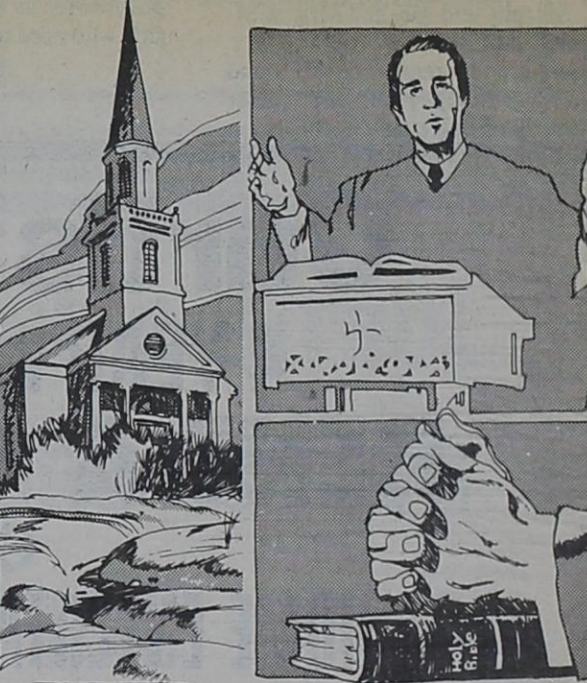

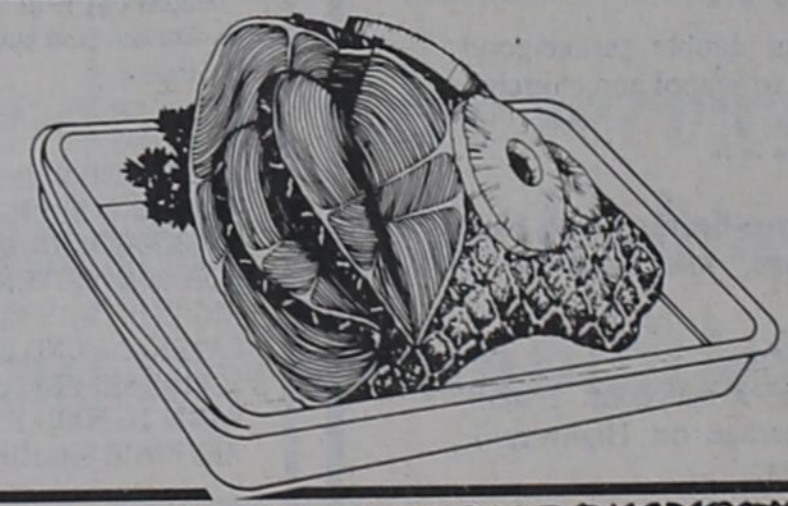
