

Lumbrera claims she 'blacks out'

GARDEN CITY, Kan. (AP) - A woman accused of smothering her 4-year-old son told police she could have killed her son during a mental blackout, a police detective testified Tuesday.

Garden City police Detective Kendall Elliott testified that another detective, Michael Utz, suggested to Diana Lumbrera that she might have smothered her son during a mental blackout and could not remember killing him.

"She said that could have happened," Elliott said.

Mrs. Lumbrera, 31, is charged with first-degree murder in connection with the death of her son, Jose Antonio Lumbrera, May 1 at their Garden City home.

Mrs. Lumbrera, who moved to Garden City from Texas in 1985, also faces murder charges in Texas for the earlier deaths of three of her daughters. Grand juries in Texas are looking into the deaths of two other sons and a niece.

Elliott also testified Mrs. Lumbrera told police, "I didn't do it with a pillow." But he said during cross-examination she just as likely might have said, "I didn't kill my baby with a pillow."

Earlier Tuesday, doctors testified they believed the boy was smothered.

"I believe the child died from non-accidental means and that he died from asphyxiation and from being smothered," said Dr. Michael Shull, a pediatrician who treated the boy in the emergency room at St. Catherine Hospital.

The boy was lifeless and not breathing when Mrs. Lumbrera brought him to the hospital, Shull said.

Earlier, Dr. Lauren Welch, a Garden City surgeon, testified in Finney County District Court that the child had no vital signs when he was brought to the hospital's emergency room and immediately hooked to a monitor.

There were broken blood vessels on the child's face caused by the buildup of blood pressure against the walls of vessels and capillaries, he said.

The presence of the broken blood vessels and two other factors - evidence of food in the victim's stomach and no obstruction or signs of vomiting in the airway - led him to a diagnosis, Welch said.

Lumbrera is also charged with three counts of Murder in Parmer County while a Bovina resident, and one in Bailey County. However, evidence on the Texas deaths won't be permitted in the Kansas trial, expected to last about another week.

NASA Balloon Seen In Area Wednesday

Local residents were treated Wednesday morning to a spectacular view of a helium research balloon as it floated aloft across the area at heights of up to 25 miles.

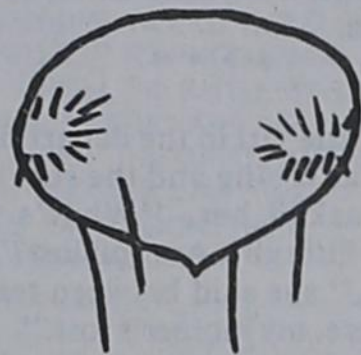
First spotted in the dark early-morning sky to the southwest, the balloon at first looked like an extra-bright star. It continued to be a bright object well past sunup, and was clearly visible throughout the morning hours except for a time when some high clouds obstructed the view.

By noon, the intriguing object was almost directly overhead to Bovina residents, and later moved on in a north-easterly direction, and was photographed later in the day by the Amarillo news media.

The balloon is thought to be a helium research balloon of the type launched at Fort Sumner, N.M., by a scientific group affiliated with New Mexico State University and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

A number of people were able to observe the balloon through binoculars and telescopes, and could see four "feet" which protrude downward to the gondola that is loaded with scientific instruments.

The balloons never carry passengers. Instead, they tote state-of-the-art monitoring equipment used to study such things as ozone, the colorless gas providing protection from the sun's ultraviolet rays that some scientists believe is being destroyed by pollution on earth.

Observers could also see a pair of "sun spots" on the balloon, due to its transparent nature, as the sun was hitting the side of the balloon closest to the sun and going through to the other side.

Although the object appeared small to the naked eye, that was due to the fact that it was so high aloft. The balloons released at Fort Sumner are 350 feet high and 400 feet in diameter when fully inflated, and are large enough to contain a football stadium.

It is thought that the balloon seen Wednesday was similar to one

that came to earth in a wheat field on the farm of Russell O'Brian ten miles east of Hub on March 16, 1962, and was photographed by the Friona Star.

O'Brian was one of the many viewers of the balloon on Wednesday, but didn't get to see this one quite as closely as the one in 1962.

The balloons represent an important part of the nation's ongoing effort to conduct atmospheric studies quickly and cheaply, without relying on rockets or the space shuttle.

An article recently in the Albuquerque Journal quoted a pair of scientists who are associated with NASA's National Scientific Balloon Facility.

Marvin Leventhal told the Journal reporter, "This is sort of a poor man's space program. Rocket projects cost tens of millions, even billions of dollars. The space shuttle takes years to get something on board. But a balloon and the helium to inflate it will probably run only a couple of hundred thousand. In the space physics game, that's chicken feed."

Leventhal reportedly has used such balloons to study supernovas, or exploding stars, and calls them "wonderful" for research.

The National Scientific Balloon Facility previously launched their balloons at a Palestine, Texas, site, between Dallas and Houston.

However, due to the possibility of the 3,000 pound gondola falling on people or houses, the launch project was moved to Fort Sumner in 1987.

Fort Sumner is located 57 miles west of Clovis, N.M., on U.S. Highway 60, which makes it roughly 90 miles west of Friona.

Mustangs Hosting Plains On Friday

The Bovina Mustangs did a commendable job of containing Highland Park quarterback Hurd Harrell for three quarters in their game at Amarillo last Friday.

But the transfer from Angleton, who was given Player of the Week honors by the Amarillo Globe-News for his performance against Bovina, went wild in the second quarter as the Hornets went on to a 29-6 win over the Mustangs.

"He threw the ball 58 yards in the air on one pass play, and had another play that was nearly that long. If we covered his receivers, he'd run, and if we played a run, he'd pass. We just couldn't get to him during that one period," said Bovina Coach Rock Stanley.

"We felt that we were prepared for the game, and we were. But Harrell improvised his game plan, and he was a scrambler. You can't cover a quarterback with an arm like he has who can scramble," the Mustang coach added.

Stanley said he made some adjustments at the halftime, and as a result Bovina matched HP, one touchdown each during the second half of the game.

"The kids never quit. We didn't score until late in the game, so they were still after them," Stanley said.

Bovina's touchdown came on an 18-yard pass from Corey Kirkpatrick to Genaro Ruvalcaba. Defensively, Stanley lauded Hector Guevara, defensive end,

and Ruvalcaba, left linebacker, who had 13 tackles each. "They were all over the field," he said.

Friday, the Mustangs host Plains, and although the Cowboys have just a 1-2 season record, Stanley said they probably are the toughest team Bovina will have faced.

Plains dropped their first two games, to Farwell and Seagraves, but scored a 32-0 win over Morton last week.

The Cowboys have a big squad, with three kids over 220 pounds and a couple more who go 170 and 180. They have no freshmen on the team.

"But we'll do our best. I have confidence that when district play starts, we'll be able to play with anyone in the district," he said.

The team hopes to have Robert Guevara and Isabel Marrufo back in the lineup this week. Hugo Renteria hurt his ankle against Highland Park, but is expected to be ready to play Friday.

The baby weighed eight pounds, ten ounces and measured 22 1/2 inches long.

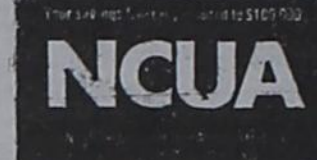

ASCS Approves Farm Programs For 1990-91

A news release from the ASCS in Parmer County stated that ASCS programs for 1990-91 have been approved.

Those serving on the board are Wesley Barnett, chairman; Jerry Don Glover, vice chairman; Vernon Willard, member and Martin Chandler, county executive director.

The county committee meets the second Tuesday of each month.

Emergency Feed Program: Parmer County producers are approved for the Emergency Feed Program if they have eligible cattle and have suffered at least a 40% loss in production of livestock feed. Other provisions of the program include:

1. You must have owned the cattle for at least six months or the county committee must determine if it is a part of your normal operation to not own livestock for six months at a time (must be evident four out of five years).

2. You must have a livestock feed loss (pasture, haygrazer, cane, etc.).

3. You must be purchasing livestock feed above normal.

Contact this office as soon as possible if you feel you might be eligible.

1991 Wheat Program: The program has not been finalized yet, however, the Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter has indicated that leave out requirements will be in the neighborhood of 10-20%.

Sodbuster/Swampbuster Provi-

sions: Producers who desire to break out new cropland or prepare a wet land area for crop, should contact ASCS and SCS before work begins. If you violate the Sodbuster/Swampbuster provision, you will be ineligible for any program benefits on that farm or any other farm in which you have an interest.

Maintenance of ACR and CRP: This office will be making ACR and CRP maintenance spot checks until December 31. If you have weeds that are subject to blow after frost, you are required to take adequate steps to prevent this problem. Loss of part or all of your payments could result for non-compliance.

Haying and grazing ACR and CU for pay: Before you hay or graze ACR or CU for payment acreages, you must come by this office to make a request. If the acreage has been watered since January 1, 1990 or will be watered before November 1, 1990, the acreage is not eligible to be hayed or grazed. If you have planted wheat or any winter crop on the ACR or CU for payment acreage you need to remember that the acreage cannot be grazed before November 1, 1990.

Failed acres: Any program crop that has failed due to hail, excessive moisture or any other reason must be reported on a form ASCS 574 prior to destruction or any other use of the land.

Proposed Furlough Notice: (Graham-Rudman-Hollins Act): A

furlough is being proposed because the agency is under a sequestration order pursuant to the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (commonly known as the Graham-Rudman-Hollins Act). The schedule is planned to keep ASCS offices open on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursdays of each week with Monday and Friday for furlough days, beginning on October 1, 1990. Newsletters will be sent out only if an emergency should arise.

County committee meetings will be delayed unless it is for an emergency meeting. If the furlough should go in effect we will try to serve your ASCS needs as prompt as possible.

1990 loan rates: wheat, \$2.00 bu.; barley, \$1.41 bu.; corn, \$1.86 bu.; sorghum, \$3.06 bu.

Graham-Rudman deduction of 1.4 applies to 1990 loans.

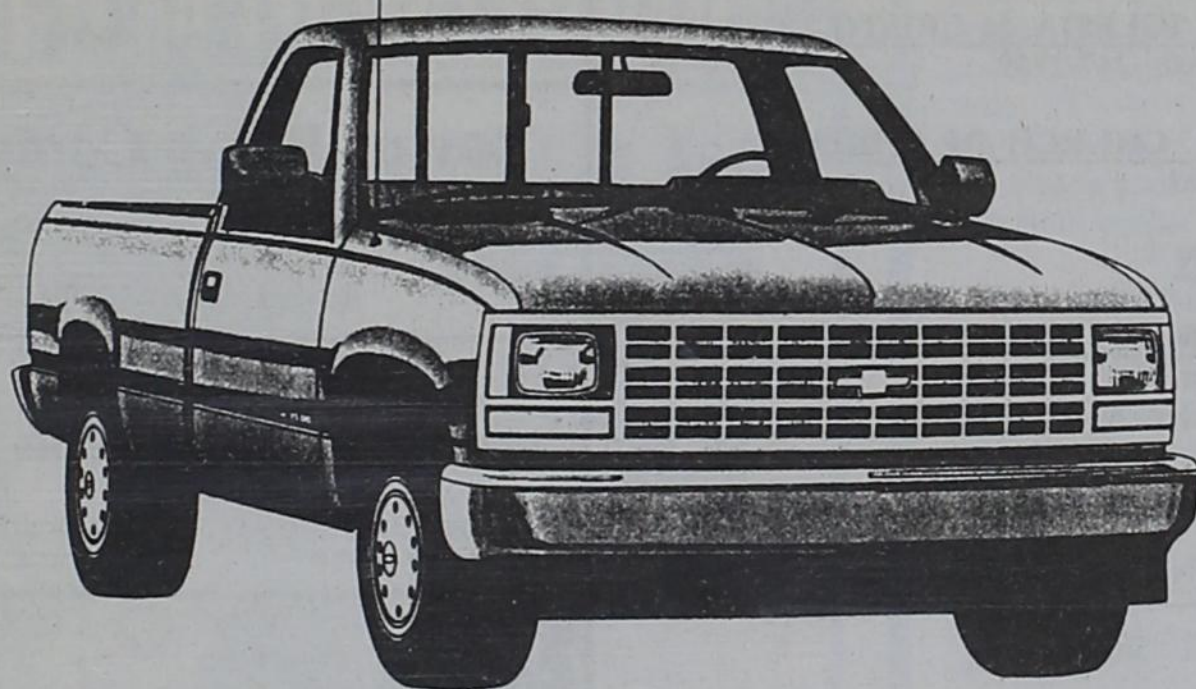

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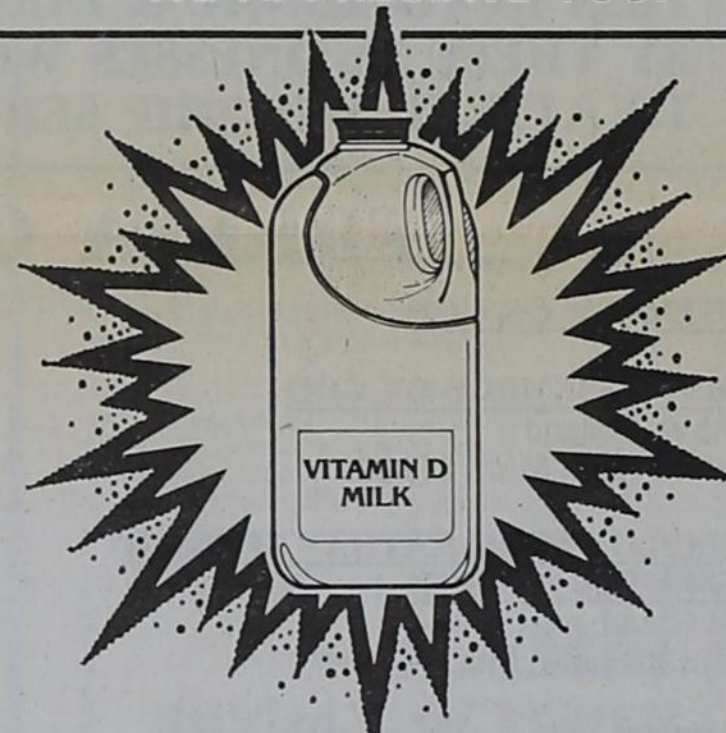

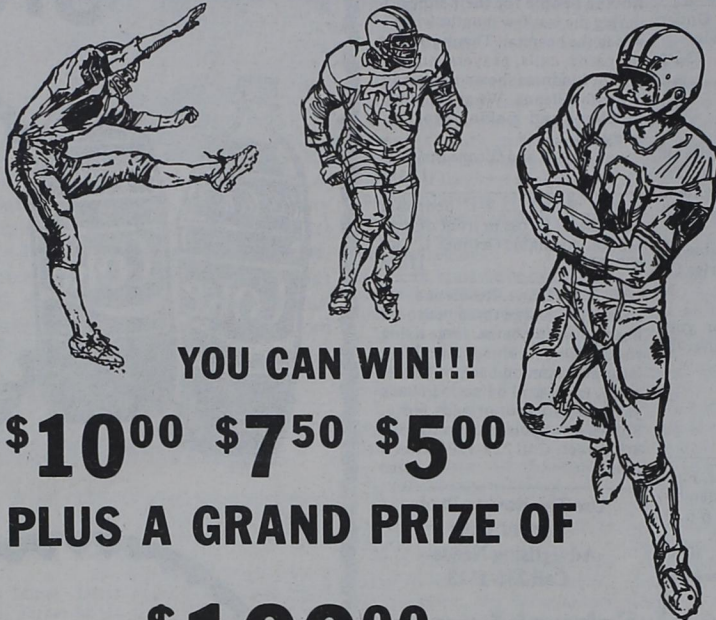
