The Bovina Parent-Teacher Association is sponsoring a pie supper following the football game on Friday, November 9 at the High School Cafeteria.

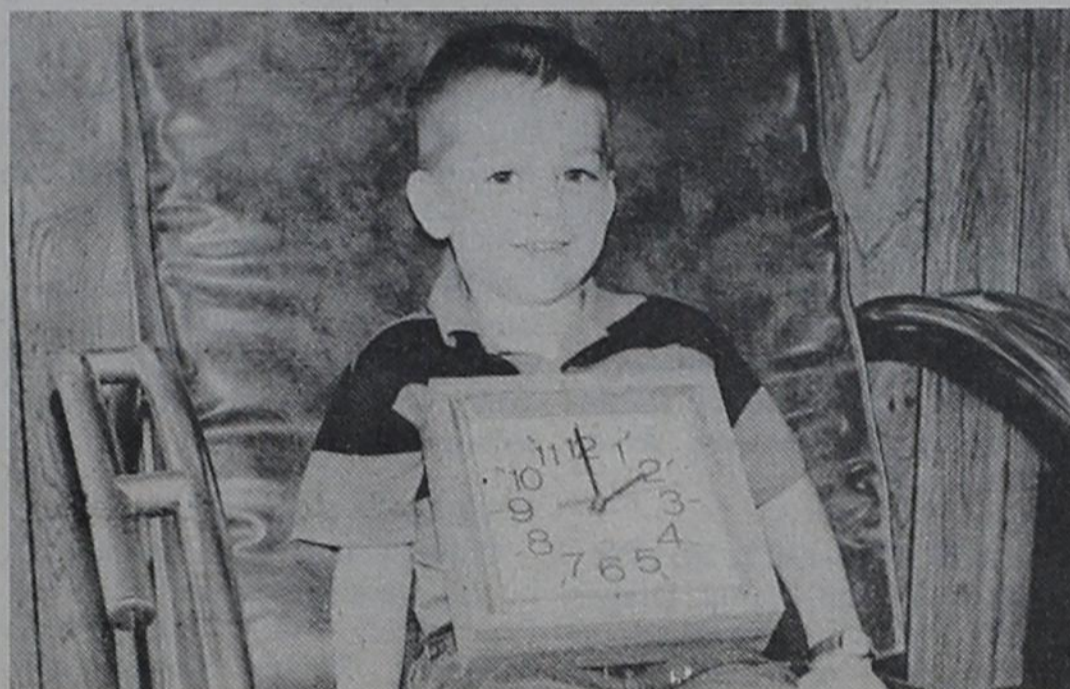
The charge for each piece of pie is seventy-five cents and coffee and hot chocolate will also be served.

Being absent on election day is no longer a requirement for the special voting. Anyone wishing to go ahead and cast their ballot is urged to do so.

Mustangs Break Into Win Column

The Bovina Mustangs, who had been playing good football all along, finally broke into the win column against the Happy Cowboys here last Friday in an 8-0 win.

The Mustangs scored in the first quarter when Hector Guevara tackled the Happy quarterback in the end zone for a safety and a 2-0 Bovina lead.

Then in the second quarter, quarterback Corey Kirkpatrick scored from a yard out for an 8-0 lead. A running try for two points failed.

Bovina had two other first-half scores called back. The Mustangs scored on a five-yard power play, but holding was called.

Later, Joe Torres knocked the ball loose and ran it in for an apparent touchdown, but clipping was called and the play came back.

"We should have had at least a 20-0 lead at the half," said BHS Coach Rock Stanley.

"We turned things up a notch on our blocking. You can't win football games without blocking and tackling," said Stanley.

It's Bovina's first win since rejoining the 11-man ranks after a pair of successful years playing in

the six-man football division.

Bovina led in yards rushing, 186-91, and in total yardage, 252-143. Isabell Marrufo had 75 yards rushing on 25 carries, and Robert Guevara caught two passes for 42 yards. Both of these players had missed prior games due to injuries.

Guevara also led the defense in the tackle department. Coach Stanley praised the defensive work. "We had two or three fumble recoveries, several knock-downs, a blocked kick and several sacks. The defense finally had a lead to defend and they did it," he said.

Friday, the team visits Vega, and will be attempting to make it two wins in a row. The Longhorns were picked to finish second in district, so the team has its work cut out for it on Friday.

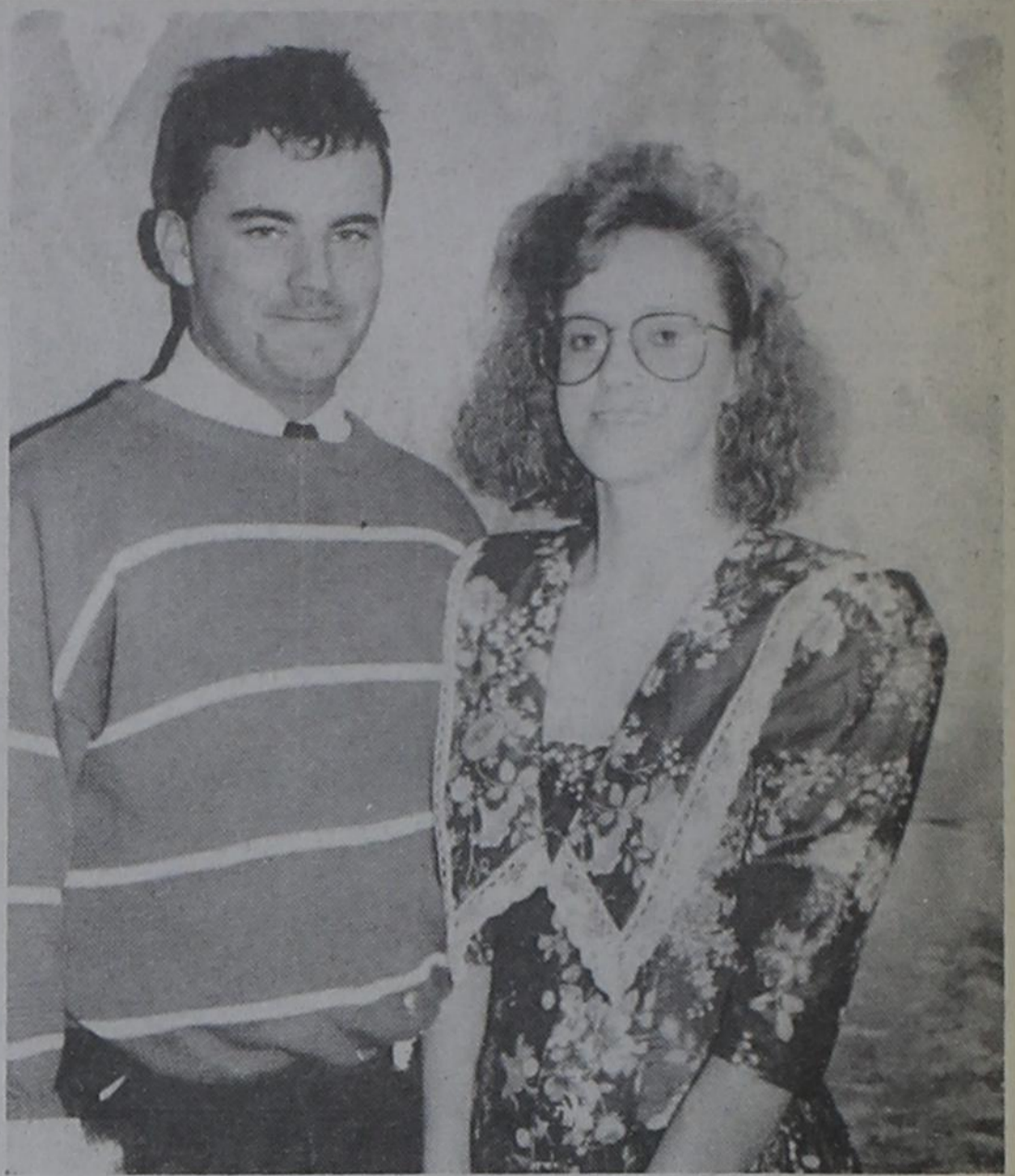

Osborn, Schueler Named To Board

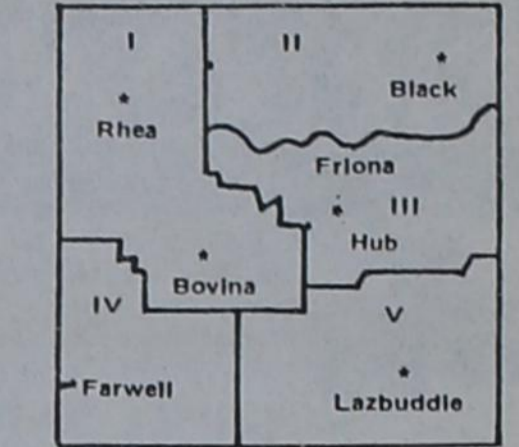
McFarland C. Osborn and Raymond Schueler, both Friona residents, were recently re-elected to the Parmer County S.W.C.D. board of directors. Schueler represents Zone 1 of the district while Osborn represents Zone 2.

The purpose of the Parmer County S.W.C.D., with headquarters in Friona, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As two of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Schueler and Osborn will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation law.

In Texas, there are 210 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agriculture landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government,



S.W.C.D.s do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

Parmer County S.W.C.D. was organized in April 1948.

Other zone representatives include: Kevin Welch, Zone III; Troy Christian, Zone IV and Mike Miller, Zone V.

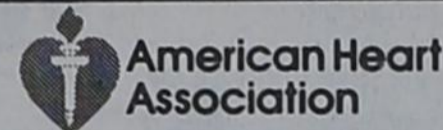

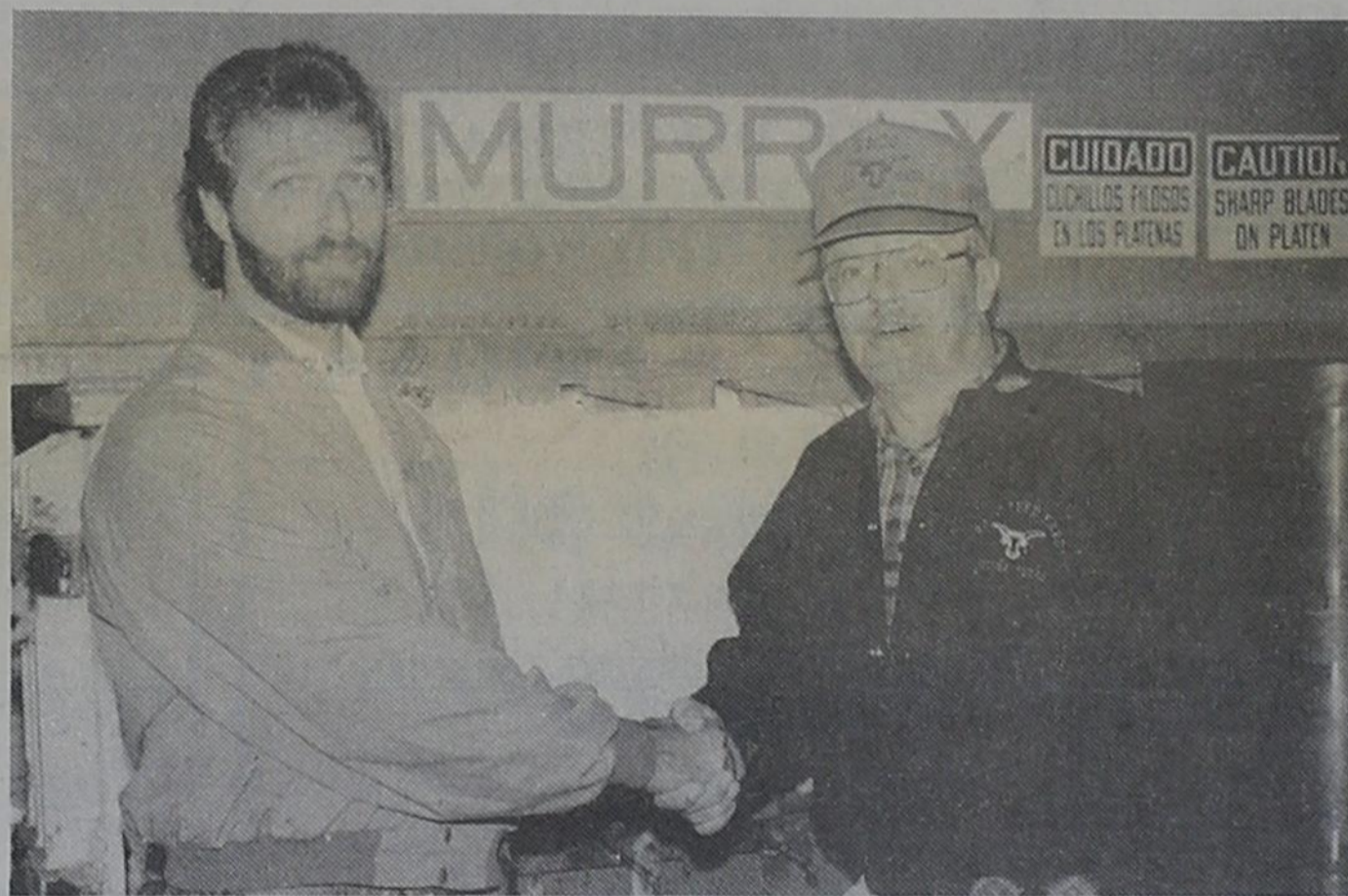

They won't ride up front with me.

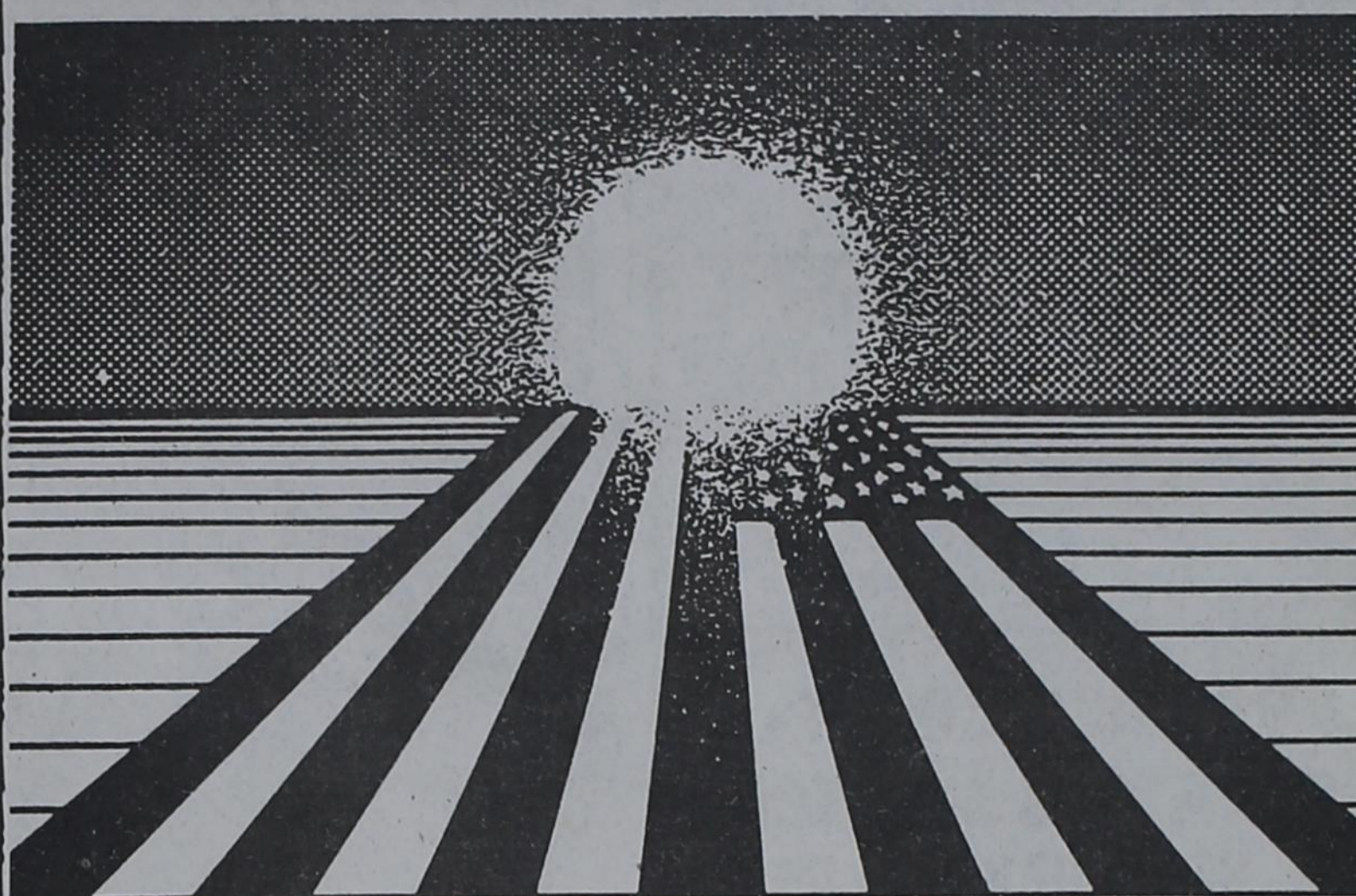
But what really makes me mad,

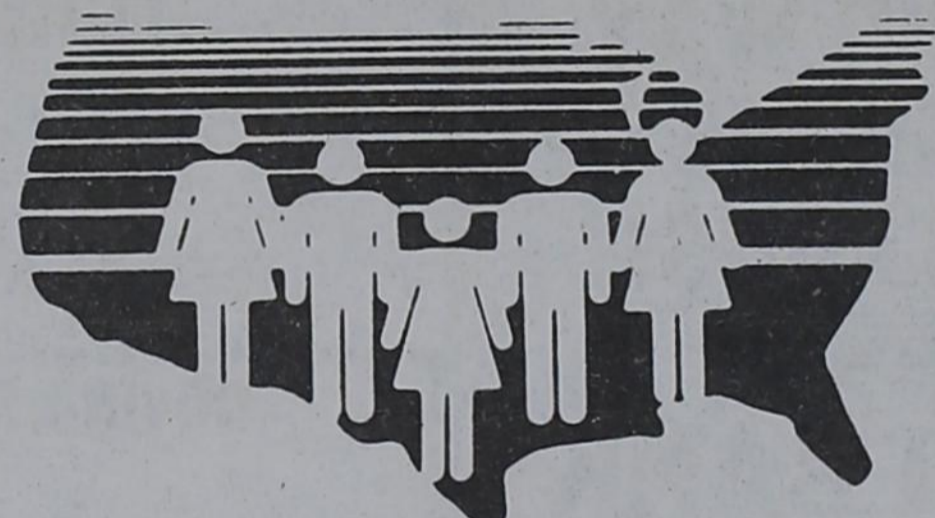

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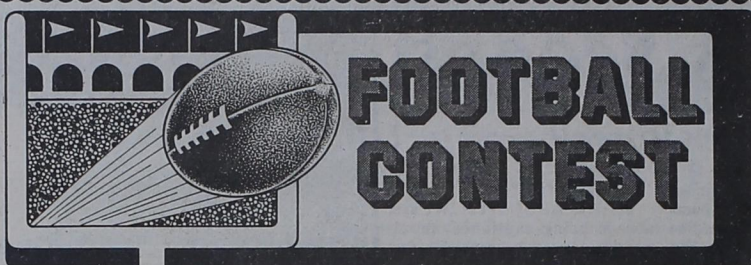
