

### Reflections

Several centuries before Christ a document we know as the book of Daniel was penned. Last week we reflected on Daniel's insistance that he be permitted to retain his identity as a Jew, in refraining from eating the rich and forbidden Babylo-

nian foods. Daniel's struggle to maintain his identity did not end there. Much like the story of Joseph, we find in Daniel an account in which someone is framed, and punished for doing that which was the right. Some of the king's advisors became jealous of Daniel's favor and persuaded the king to forbid anyone to make a petition or pray to any God but the king for thirty days. Punishment was prescribed within the decree. Whoever disobeyed this decree would be sentenced to death in the king's zoological gardens.

Daniel not only disobeyed the decree, but did it openly. Several times each day he would kneel before open windows and pray to his God. He was caught, sentenced, and thrown into the lion's den. Daniel survived. The point of the story is not solely his great faith. In fact, would his faith have been necessarily less if he had been devoured by the wild beasts? I think not if the lessons of the martyrs are to be taken seriously. The point is not so much that he was not eaten, but rather that he chose to put his God above all other things. He chose to do that which he considered right in his own eyes, even though it meant punish-

There are no lion's dens today, but often men and women are punished, discriminated against and the like for following their own conscience. The cry today is not, "throw him to the lions," but perhaps, implicitely, "throw him to the Christians.' should learn from Daniel several things. First, there are certain issues we must stand for. Second, we should strive to be open toward those who sincerely march to the beat of a different drummer.

# Sutton County Ranch News



COORDINATED SCIENTIFIC EFFORT underway at the Rio Grande Plain Experimental Ranch near Spofford is seeking answers to problems ranchers face in making the best use of animal, plant and water resources on the area's 15 million acres of rangeland.

# **Management System Could** Add \$25 Million To Area

Most Rio Grande Plain ranchers

are aware that a well-planned range management system on their land could add almost \$25 million to the income of this area.

But, their dilemma is knowing how to put such a system into practice in an economical way. Finding that answer is one of the goals of the grazing management research effort underway at the Rio Grande Plain Experimental Ranch near Spofford.

'The present situation of high ranch expenses and low livestock prices demands that more efficient methods of operation be employed," said Dr. Patrick Reardon, an assistant professor of range science with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

'We know, for instance, that with proper management, mechanical brush control and seeding with improved grasses such as buggelgrass or kleingrass may nearly double livestock production."

But, the scientist emphasizes, this practice costs \$40 to \$75 per acre and then requires continuous follow-up treatment and careful grazing management. Very few landowners can afford this type of

expense. "Land management techniques and programs need to be developed in this land resource area which offer the landowner an alternative to the more expensive treatments," Dr. Reardon said.

He said ranchers who are able to balance current forage resources on their range with livestock numbers might add 50 cents profit per acre; a well-planned, systematic grazing system could add another 50 cents per acre; and a properly managed wildlife habitat and harvesting system could add at least another 50 cents per acre.

'This can mean an additional \$1.50 per acre profit, an extra \$4500 to the average 3000 acre

Finding the most economical way of getting that income into the pockets of Southwest Texans is what Dr. Reardon and his associates are trying to do at the experimental ranch. He is seeking specific answers to problems such as grazing systems which maximize production per acre, types and amounts of livestock supplementation needed; types or breeds of beef cattle best suited to the range and achieving maximum sustained income from wildlife; brush management-reseeding operations as they relate to grazing systems; and establishment of new and improved varieties of range grasses and forbs.

Dr. Reardon, who is housed at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Uvalde, said area ranchers have seen the need for such information for a long time and have contributed a great deal of time, effort and financial backing to get the research program off the ground.

"People such as Robert Bracher, Charles Griffin, Jr., Louis Capt, and Virgil Helm, and others contributed tremendously by assisting in locating the experimental

ranch," Dr. Reardon said. "After going through the normal headaches any rancher might have in stocking a South Texas Ranch with the proper kinds, numbers and quality of beef cows, the first calf crop is now on the ground at the experimental ranch.

Information should be coming soon which will give area ranchers a few answers or at least alternatives to their problems.



The federal planners, realizing that such a catchall department would naturally create a generous measure of internal friction, suggest that a degree of insulation be granted to maintain program independence -- for EPA.

They apparently consider EPA worthy and deserving of independence and protection but don't feel the same way about the programs to be stolen from USDA.
