## Planning and Zoning Commission Approves Subdivision Plan

A 167 acre tract, 357 housing unit Preliminary Subdivision Plan was approved by the City Planning and Zoning Commission Thursday evening.

The proposed development is located north of Interstate 10, bounded by Miers Road on the east and Highway 277 on the west.

The preliminary plan was unveiled to the commission by Philip Bryant, a San Angelo land planner, for the property owner, HNG Oil Co.

HNG will not be involved in the development, but will sell the property to developers with time limitations for construction.

"The primary interest of HNG

Oil Co. Sonora District manager Jerry Gilley explained.

"We will limit the sale to someone who will start right away to prevent speculation," he continued.

The development includes 15 acres set aside for school use. Gilley pointed out that an official presentation to the school board had not been made, but discussions with the superintendent had been held during the past 18 months.

Gilley and Bryant explained that the intent of HNG Oil Co. is to provide the land to the school with no restrictions and as a donation.

The 357 housing units include plans for 243 single family dwellings, 34 townhouses and 80

apartment units.

There will be areas set aside for commercial development, office buildings and open spaces.

"We have designated 20 per cent of the total land for public use," Bryant pointed out.

"There has been a great deal of interest from developers," Bryant continued, "from Sonora to Chicago to New Jersey."

He added that it will probably take 15 years to complete the entire project and that the land will more than likely be developed in stages.

"I am not optimistic that one single developer will come in and try to tackle the entire project," Bryant added.

A detailed break-down of the

project shows 3.7 acres for commercial use, 4.6 acres for an office park, 4.1 acres for apartments, 4 acres for townhouses, 5.6 acres for a residential cluster, 17.4 acres of open space, 15.1 acres for school or park and 112.8 acres for housing units.

"Bill Roden, president of HNG Oil Co., has set a top priority to assist in the promoting of education and community development for Sonora," Gilley told the commissioners, "and that is the reason HNG bought this land and has prepared this land for development."

HNG Oil Co. will not be in the developing business, Gilley added, but is making the land available for development.

## Council Enters Agreement to Purchase Bank Building, Plans to Move City Hall

City councilmen Monday morning approved a sales contract with the First National Bank to purchase the recently vacated bank building for \$125,000.

The purchase includes furnishings in the bank building and a 65' X 100' parking lot in the area behind the bank adjacent to Oak St.

The building purchase will be financed through General Obliga-

tion 20 year certificates, arranged through Rauscher Pierce Securities Corp. of San Antonio.

The vote Monday approved an ordinance for intent to obligate, with expectations for final action at the March 6 council meeting.

Relocation of city offices to the new city hall is expected to take 60 days.

The council also discussed compensation for election judge and clerks, and postponed naming of the judge and clerks until March. The city election will be held April 1, 1978.

A preliminary housing development plan was also presented to the council by Philip Bryant of San Angelo on behalf of HNG Oil Co.

No action was required of the council, but councilmen did review the project with Bryant and HNG Oil Co. Sonora District Manager Jerry Gilley. (see related story on page 1).

Councilmen expressed appreciation to HNG and urged continuation of the proposed project.

A review of the Golf Course

support showed the city contributed \$2,102.12 during 1977 for electricity, water and garbage services. Councilmen voted to continue the support.

Compensation to municipal court jury members was discussed and \$5 for jurors who appear for duty was authorized.

A special Management Audit for Sonora was presented to the council by Angelo State University gradu-

ate intern Richard Fitts.

The study, begun in July 1977, is a comprehensive look at Sonora, city management functions, current operational activities, organization, population and future growth with recommendations for improved management techniques.

Councilmen will study the audit, which contains a number of recommended changes already implemented.

## Board of Trustees Accepts HNG Oil Company Land Offer

A special meeting of the School Board of Trustees was held yesterday for the purpose of discussing some 15 acres of land HNG Oil Company has offered the school system. Making the presentation on behalf of HNG was local manager Jerry Gilley and land developer Philip Bryant.

After deliberation the board accepted HNG's gift with no obligations or development restrictions.

The only stipulation to the gift is that the school can not in the future sell the land; but if they find it undesirable for school use, will return the land to HNG.

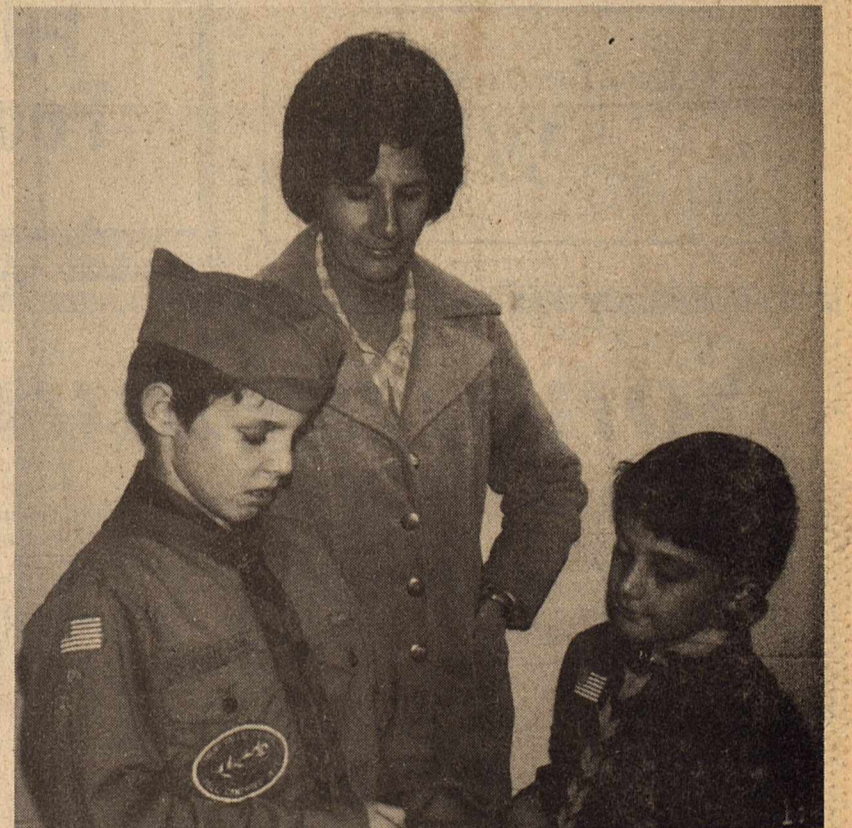
James Hunt, president of the board, asked HNG representatives if Dr. Joe Andrews had presented an accurate picture to the board in the past meeting. He was told that there had probably been some misunderstanding at that time.

Also asked was whether the board's refusal to accept the

property would sabotage HNG's development. Bryant and Gilley told the board it would in no way deter their plans, as property offered the school was the most desirable for commercial use.

Board members at the meeting were Hunt, Dorothy Pope, Sam Stewart, Lin Hicks, Bud Whitehead and Mary Adele Balch.

### County, School, City Election Dates Set

Filing ended Monday at 6 p.m., in the county race with only two offices having more than one candidate.

Commissioner of Precinct 4, the most sought after county office, has Polo Cervantes, Juan Carlos Gonzales and Victor Chavez all vying for that position.

Bill Wade, incumbent, is seeking re-election as commissioner of precinct 2. J.W. Elliott is the incumbent and only contender for the office of county judge. Erma Lee Turner is running uncon-

tested for county and district clerk as is Metha Trainer for county treasurer and C. Adam Morriss for county attorney.

The office of justice of the peace, presently held by Mat Adams who is not seeking re-election, is being sought by Frances Templeton and Jim Green. Mrs. Templeton has served as clerk in that office for the past several years.

Filing for office of Democratic Chairman is Charles Sherrill. Albert C. Elliott is seeking the precinct 4 chairmanship and Nolan Gibbs precinct 3 chairmanship.

All these offices are subject to the May Democratic Primary election.

Of other local interest is the city and school elections which will be held April 1.

In the city election the offices of mayor and two city aldermen will be filled. The last day to file for one of those posts is March 1.

Mayor Norman Rousselet has stated he will not seek re-election. Aldermen Doyle Morgan and James D. Trainer have not revealed their intentions at this time.

Persons wishing to file for a spot on the city ballot must do so at the office of the city secretary.

Places 1 and 2 on the Board of Trustees of the Sonora Independent School District, presently occupied by Don Lawson and Lin Hicks, will be expiring this year. Persons wishing to file for a place on the school board may do so at the business office with March 2 being the last day to file in that election.

Neither Lawson or Hicks have filed for re-election at this time.

The entire operation of city government in Sonora has had a thorough going-over after a cooperative effort between City Manager Bob Nevill and the masters degree program in public administration at Angelo State University in San Angelo.

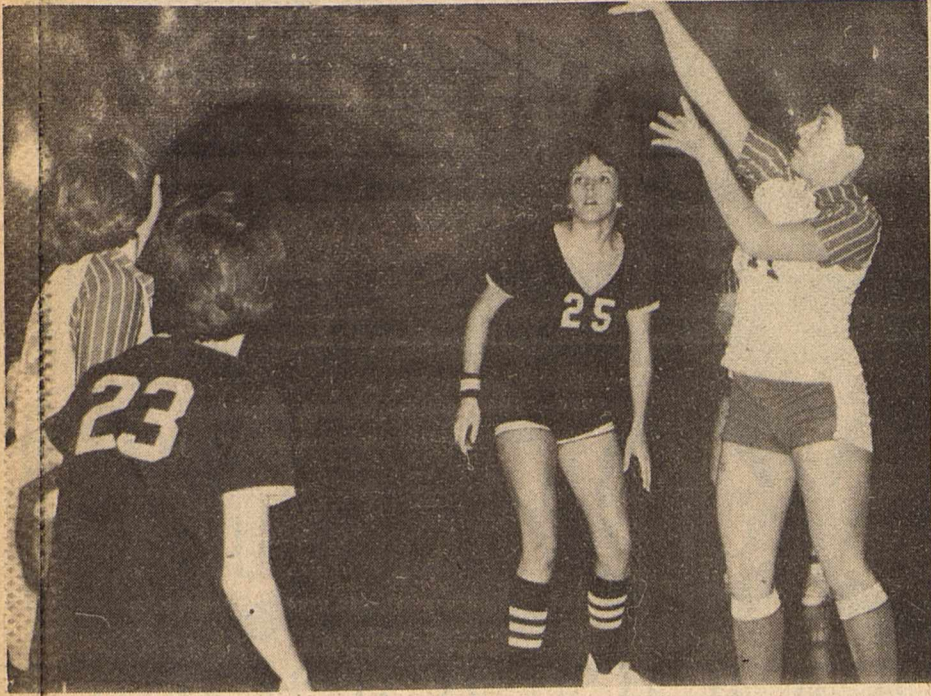
The Broncos host Crane here this Friday for a crucial district game.

## Reorganization Means Trouble for Cattlemen

The reorganization of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, as proposed by the federal Office of Management and Budget, would mean serious trouble for cattlemen and consumers alike, says J.A. Whittenburg III, president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

"We oppose any effort to dismantle the USDA. Government must remain responsive to agriculture's needs. If these proposals are implemented, the lines of communication linking the individual cattlemen and the government will be tied up in knots—a bureaucratic nightmare," the Amarillo rancher says.

TSCRA, a livestock producer group headquartered in Fort Worth, represents more than 14,000 cattlemen in Texas and surrounding states.

The OMB's blueprint for reorganization could take several forms and almost all would erode the importance of USDA. Strategists have earmarked the Forest Service, Soil Conservation Service and all food regulatory agencies under the USDA umbrella for reassignment to the Department of Interior, FDA, HEW and other departments. In some cases, these traditional USDA functions would be awarded to newly created "super" agencies with immense power resulting in a "gutted USDA" and no real cabinet post for agriculture.

Whittenburg criticized the proposals as vague, contradictory and dehumanizing. Such action could severely damage future food production by making the livestock industry a stranger to the government agencies supposedly trying to help it. Higher food prices would be inevitable.

TSCRA also voiced opposition to the so-called labor law "reform" bill being promoted by the

AFL-CIO. The senate bill, backed by a \$800,000 lobbying campaign, would bring about compulsory unionism and would give union leaders excessive new power.

Whittenburg, quoting statistics compiled by an independent research firm for the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, says only 22 per cent of the general public favors legislation making it easier for unions to organize non-union employees.

"Our membership is strongly opposed to such a move and maintains a person's right to work without having to join a union.

The bill, favored by the White House and some congressmen, comes on the heels of a recent AFL-CIO convention in Los Angeles where union leaders announced a two-year decline in membership of 500,000.

In other action, the TSCRA came out in support of the chemical Ferriamicide for control of the imported fire ant joining the Mississippi Department of Agriculture and Commerce who is also requesting use of the chemical.

The fire ant has caused millions of dollars of damage to agriculture and has killed livestock and wildlife in its rapid, unchecked spread across the southern U.S. Without a known, natural biological enemy to control its population, Mirex has been the only effective chemical available for use in its control by livestock producers. The Environmental Protection Agency, however, is removing Mirex from the market in June 1978.

"Ferriamicide is our only alternative for control of this ant. Unlike Mirex, which persists in the environment for five to 10 years, it is gone in 14 to 45 days. We need it," Whittenburg says. TSCRA has filed statements with appropriate government "officials" and agencies concerning these issues.

## November Well Production Down 7.19 Percent

Texas oil and gas wells produced 592,311,673 Mcf of gas in November 1977, down 7.19 percent from field runs a year earlier.

Marketed gas production totaled 500,273,135 Mcf and reflected a 9.07 percent decrease from the

November 1976 volume. Marketed production is the total gas to transmission lines, carbon black and plant fuel and lease use.

Gas exported from Texas in November totaled 253,786,783 Mcf and included some 69,124,986

Mcf of imported gas. Exports of Texas-produced gas in November totaled 184,661,797 Mcf and reflected a 7.57 percent decrease from the year-earlier month. Natural Gas Pipeline Co. of America was the month's largest exporter, moving

70,536,205 Mcf of gas of which 35,700,096 Mcf was Texas-produced gas. The El Paso Natural Gas Co. was the leading exporter of Texas-produced gas with 37,894,714 Mcf.

Texas gas production in November 1977 came from 191,283 oil and gas wells. In October 1977, Texas wells produced 603,495,942 Mcf of gas. Marketed gas production in October totaled 503,292,766 Mcf.

## Average Allowable Totals 3,491,238

Average calendar day allowable of Texas oil production of Feb. 1 totals 3,491,238 barrels, the Railroad Commission's Oil and Gas Division has reported.

This legal rate of flow from 180,620 wells on allowable schedules compares with 3,818,064 barrels daily on Jan. 15 when 181,362 wells were listed. Texas oil allowable in February 1978 is pegged statewide to a 100 percent market demand factor.

Estimated actual production this month is approximately 2,982,000 barrels daily and compares with actual production of 3,071,920 barrels daily in the same month last year. The Commission lists 8,869 oil fields in the state on Feb. 1.

### December Bond Sales Announced

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$20,953,232, while sales for the twelve months of 1977 totaled \$283,011,461 with 102% of the yearly sales goal of 276.9 million achieved.

Are all you townspeople aware that an officer can give you a ticket for speeding the day before? on Private property? in Sonora they can.

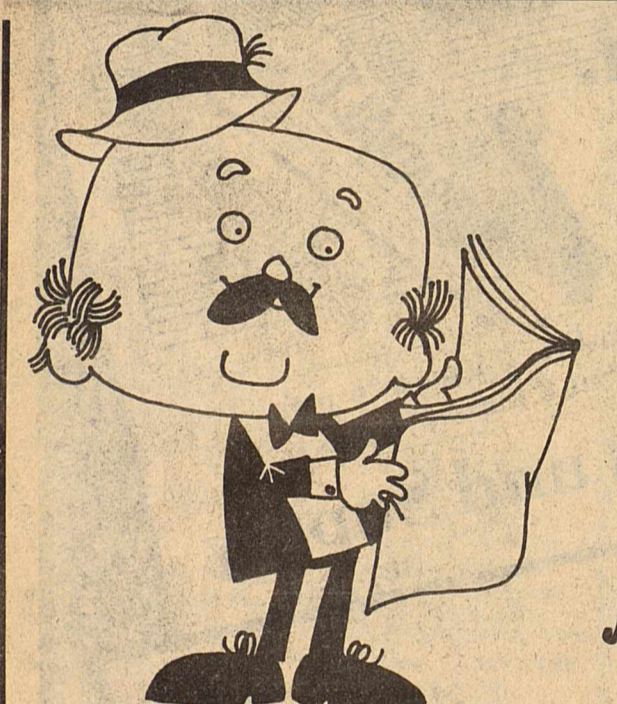

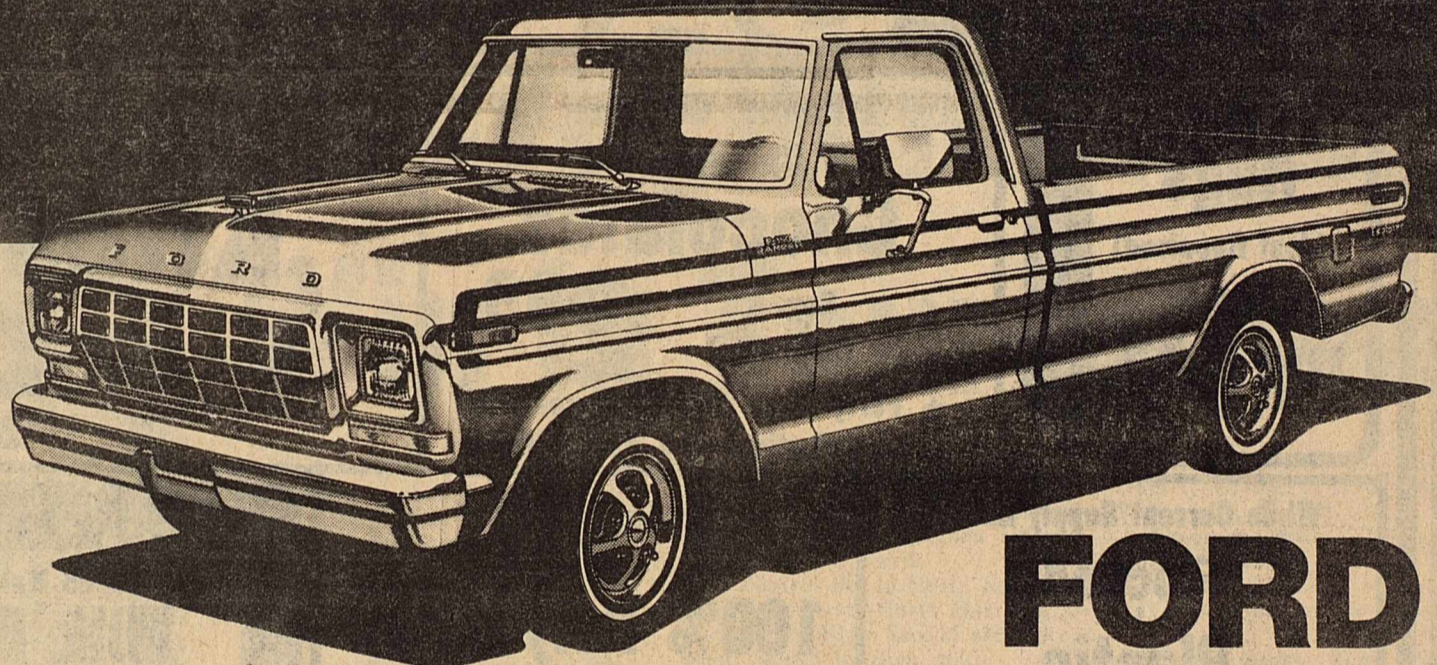

Dr. Joe Andrews, superintendent, suggested to the board that they supplement her salary and pay her expenses to San Antonio, where she underwent examination last week.

Dorothy Pope, board member, made a motion to approve Dr. Andrews' suggestion and it was unanimously approved.

The building program was discussed and Dr. Andrews told the board that the construction on the school property located on 2nd Street was behind 40 to 60 days and he was sure there had been a breakdown of communications somewhere along the way.

The board also gave their approval to broadcast all athletic events provided that approval of the superintendent is given.
