# **Planning and Zoning Commission Approves Subdivision Plan**

A 167 acre tract, 357 housing unit Preliminary Subdivision Plan was approved by the City Planning and Zoning Commission Thursday evening.

The proposed development, is located north of Interstate 10, bounded by Miers Road on the east and Highway 277 on the west.

The preliminary plan was unveiled to the commission by Philip Bryant, a San Angelo land planner, for the property owner, HNG Oil Co.

HNG will not be involved in the development, but will sell the property to developers with time limitations for construction.

"The primary interest of HNG

Oil Co. Sonora District manager Jerry Gilley explained.

"We will limit the sale to someone who will start right away to prevent speculation, "he continued.

The development includes 15 acres set aside for school use. Gilley pointed out that an official presentation to the school board had not been made, but discussions with the superintendent had been held during the past 18 months.

Gilley and Bryant explained that the intent of HNG Oil Co. is to provide the land to the school with no restrictions and as a donation.

The 357 housing units include plans for 243 single family dwellings, 34 townhouses and 80 apartment units.

There will be areas set aside for commercial development, office buildings and open spaces. "We have designated 20 per cent of the total land for public use,"

Bryant pointed out. There has been a great deal of interest from developers," Bryant continued, "from Sonora to Chicago to New Jersey.

He added that it will probably take 15 years to complete the entire project and that the land will more than likely be developed in stages. 'I am not optimistic that one

single developer will come in and try to tackle the entire project," Bryant added.

A detailed break-down of the

project shows 3.7 acres for commercial use, 4.6 acres for anoffice park, 4.1 acres for apartments, 4 acres for townhous es, 5.6 acres for a residential cluster, 17.4 acres of open space, 15.1 acres for school or park and 112.8 acres for housing units.

" Bill Roden, president of HNG Oil Co., has set a top priority to assist in the promoting of education and community development for Sonora," Gilley told the com-missioners," and that is the reason HNG bought this land and has prepared this land for development.

HNG Oil Co.' will not be in the developing business, Gilley added, but is making the land available for

# **ASU Graduate Study Offers City Help**

The entire operation of city government in Sonora had a thorough going-over after a cooperative effort between City Manager Bob Nevill and the masters degree program in public administration at Angelo State University in San Angelo. Last summer, Nevill began consulting with the laculty and graduate stu culty and graduate students in the public administration program to get ideas on modernizing e city government and adjusting to the large population increase which

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has occurred over the last several years.

The result was a study of all aspects of local municipal government, how it's done here and elsewhere and what the best methods of operation might be. Of primary concern was

whether the city had grown beyond the 5,000 population figure at which it could shift from a "general law" city to a "home rule" city, having a greater say in making the laws which govern it. Several sources were

used to determine how much above the 1970 U.S. census of 2,000 the city had grown. The population

survey ultimately showed that 4,063 persons now lived within the city and estimates were made that this would grow to 5,300 by 1980, 6,000 by 1985 and 10,000 by 1990. Fluctuations in the oil and certain areas of operation. gas industry could alter

however. The next stage in the project involved observing current local practices in other cities of similar size. At the same time, information was gathered from various professional associations and other organizations which have developed standards for

Information gathered from such sources as the Texas Municipal League, Inter-national City Managers Association of Police Chiefs, the International Association of Fire Chiefs, Law Enforcement Assistance Administration and others.

Some of the suggestions already are being implemented. A new cash

# **Reorganization Means Trouble for Cattlemen**

The reorganization of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, as proposed by the federal Office of Management and Budget, would mean serious trouble for cattlemen and consumers alike, says J.A. Whittenburg III, president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

"We oppose any effort to dismantle the USDA. Government must remain responsive to agriculture's needs. If these proposals are implemented, the lines of communication linking the individual cattlemen and the government will be tied up in knots--a bureaucratic nightmare," the Amarillo rancher

TSCRA, a livestock producer group headquartered in Fort Worth, represents more than 14,000 cattlemen in Texas and surrounding states. The OMB's blueprint for reor-

ganization could take several forms and almost all would erode the importance of USDA. Strategists have earmarked the Forest Service, Soil Conservation Service and all food regulatory agencies under the USDA umbrella for reassignment to the Department of Interior, FDA. HEW and other departments. In some cases, these traditional USDA functions would be awarded to newly created "super" agencies with immense power resulting in a 'gutted USDA'' and no real cabinet post for agriculture.

Whittenburg criticized the proposals as vague, contradictory and dehumanizing. Such action could severely damage future food production by making the livestock industry a stranger to the government agencies supposedly trying to help it. Higher food prices would be inevitable.

TSCRA also voiced opposition to the so-called labor law "reform" bill being promoted by the

AFL-CIO. The senate bill, backed by a \$800,000 lobbying campaign, would bring about compulsory unionism and would give union leaders excessive new power.

Whittenburg, quoting statistics compiled by an independent research firm for the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, says only 22 per cent of the general public favors legislation making it easier for unions to organize non-union employees.

Our membership is strongly opposed to such a move and maintains a person's right to work without having to join a union.

The bill, favored by the White House and some congressmen, comes on the heels of a recent AFL-CIO convention in Los Angeles where union leaders announced a two-year decline in membership of 500.000.

In other action, the TSCRA came out in support of the chemical Ferriamicide for control of the imported fire ant joining the Mississippi Department of Agriculture and Commerce who is also requesting use of the chemical. The fire ant has caused millions

of dollars of damage to agriculture and has killed livestock and wildlife in its rapid, unchecked spread across the southern U.S. Without a known, natural biological enemy to control its population, Mirex has been the only effective chemical available for use in its control by livestock producers. The Environmental Protection Agency, how-ever, is removing Mirex from the market in June 1978.

"Ferriamicide is our only alternative for control of this ant. Unlike Mirex, which persists in the environment for five to 10 years, it is gone in 14 to 45 days. We need Whittenburg says. TSCRA has filed statements with appropriate government "officials" and agencies concerning these issues.
