That will also take care of the ers, the Longhorns, the Mules,


H. Bartlett Winner In Freeze Date The 27th Annual First Freeze

# **Voters Poised For** Amendment Election

Next Tuesday's Constitutional Election, which features the vote on the proposed state lottery, will find Parmer County voters going to their "old regular" polling places, according to County Clerk Bonnie Warren.

"We're trying to stress that the precinct changes which were recently advertised do not go into effect until January 1, 1991," Mrs. Warren said.

The County Clerk said on Thursday that approximately 70 absentee ballots had been cast in the early voting stage, and thought that might indicate a larger turnout than usual for a constitutional amendment election.

Polling places will be as follows:

Precinct 1: Martha Hamilton residence: Friona, 2-1, Calvary Baptist Church; Friona 2, Fire Station; Friona 2-2, Friona Community Center; Bovina, EMS Center; Rhea, Community Center; Lakeview, Dee Willard residence.

The election will mark the final time for the Black and Lakeview polling places to be operated, as both have been consolidated with the Friona polling places beginning in 1992.

One of those "things" was a pass interception return by Jerry Reyna. He was caught by the leg by the Vega quarterback to prevent a Bovina touchdown.


In addition, Angel Porras knocked down a pass with a clear field in front of him, and had a 33yard kickoff return that he almost broke all the way. The list goes on.


Freshman Rey Reyes came in and gained 39 and 25 yards on two reverse plays--64 yards on two carries.

Rainfall Sunday night and Tuesday morning brought a halt to grain sorghum havesting which was just beginning to get underway.


