Elect New Officers

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association elected new officers at the State convention Saturday night. The Convention, held in San Angelo, drew ranchers and supports from all over the state

Martin Wardlaw of Del Rio was elected president. Joe Mertz of San Angelo moved up to the first vice president's post behind Wardlaw. I.W. Terry of Sterling City succeeded Mertz as second vice president.

In other business during the Saturday session, the ranchers Bentsen and Reagan Brown, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture.

Brown told the ranchers that a new survey indicated that 58% of all sheep and lambs that died in Texas in 1978 were killed by predatory animals. 72% of all deaths of goats and kids were attributed to predators. Coyotes were the number one killer of the livestock. Brown concluded by saying that the predator situation must be solved with reasonable and effective compromises with the oppostion to predator control.

Also during the convention, ranchers heard a discussion of the Savory Hub Rotation Method for grazing pasture lands. Savory is from Rhodesia and he presented his method for high concentrations of grazing for short periods of time. The animals are then moved to another pasture. Sonora Delegation Meets With Highway Commission

Eldorado and Del Rio met Tuesday with the Texas Highway commission to present the case for establishing the terminus of the I-27/I-10 interconnector route at Sonora.

The case for that location was prepared by the committees of three communities and was supported by letters for consideration and support from the three communities.

A solid community desire for that decision was evidenced by a petition prepared by the "I-27 Committee", Chairman Charley Graves assisted by Don Dooley and Tom Metzger. The petition was circulated by the Petroettes, an organization of Sonora women, dedicated to civic betterment. They obtained nearly one thousand names of supporters of the proposition in Sonora.

The rationale presented to the Highway Commission by Sutton County Judge Charles Sherrill is as

follows: WHY THE PROPOSED FOUR-LANE HIGHWAY IN WEST TEXAS SHOULD JOIN INTER-

STATE 10 AT SONORA West Texas desperated needs the North-South limited-access fourlane highway which was approved by Congress this year and authorized under the signature of President Carter.

This road (formerly proposed as Interstate 27) is designed to carry the increased flow of North-South traffic in West Texas. The road is needed to connect West Texas with the Gulf Coast area, and, equally important with the border areas and Rio Grande Valley. There is only one shortest route to serve

The citizens of Sonora, Eldorado, Christoval, Del Rio, Rocksprings and several other communities recently formed a task force to study possible routes for this road.

The task force believes that it is obvious that the proposed four-lane highway should be designated along Interstate 27 from Amarillo to Lubbock, then South along U.S. Highway 87 through Lamesa, Big Spring and into San Angelo. This is the main North-South traffic flow in West Texas, and San Angelo is one of the state's larger areas without access to an interstate.

The route that should be followed South from San Angelo to Interstate 10, however, is not so clear as there is no one established traffic

The task force from the citizens of communities directly South of San Angelo believe that the argument is overwhelming that the Texas Highway Commission should designate this route as following Highway 277 South from San Christoval, through Eldorado and Sonora.

Here is a capsule of the reasons why we believe this to be the most favorable route:

(1) Construction cost based on rough estimates of Del Rio district experience: with the very serious economic need for our federal government to balance its budget and bring an end to inflation which is destroying the nation and putting severe hardship on its highway transportation system, dollars to build the badly needed West Texas highway will be in very short supply. Therefore, construction cost must be the most singularly

important consideration. If the Highway 277 route is followed South from San Angelo to Sonora, it will save many miles over the two other most likely routes. U.S. 277 follows a drainage divide. This eliminates numerous minor drainage structures. The one major stream crossing at Christoval is much smaller than crossing the San Saba River on the alternate

The Highway 277 route would involve 66 miles on construction

(see Exhibit on following page.)

If Highway 87 is followed to Brady, Fredericksburg and joining Interstate 10 at Junction, it would involve 170 miles of construction

(Brady Route.) This four-lane highway will cost, by 1981 or 1982, at least \$1 million

a mile -- and possibly much more. Should the cost of the road, service areas, traffic control devices and right-of-way by only \$1 million a mile, the savings by using the Sonora route would look like this: MILES \$66 million Sonora 97\$97 million 170 \$170 million Brady

This means a minimum distance savings of \$31 million for the Sonora Route over the Junction Route and a minimum savings of \$104 million over the Brady Route.

If the cost of the road is \$1.5 million a mile, the savings by using the Sonora Route would be much higher.

Also, the terrain between San Angelo and Sonora is much flatter and would require fewer cuts through rock mountains than the other two proposed routes. This factor could easily add another \$10 million to the cost of the Junction Route and perhaps double that to the Brady Route.

So it is easy to see that, at a time when saving taxpayer dollars is at the forefront of the nation's needs, the Sonora Route could save as little as \$41 million, over the Junction Route, and perhaps as much as \$60 million.

The savings against the Brady Route would range from \$124 million to perhaps as much as \$176 This factor alone should deter-

mine that the Sonora Route is the

best choice for the West Texas

(2) Maintenance Cost: building the road is only the most immediate part of the problem. The Texas Highway Department also much consider maintenance for the

four-lane road.

next 30 to 40 years. Last year, it was costing \$4,000 a mile to maintain a four-lane highway in the Del Rio district. By 1981, this will be at least \$5,000 a mile. The average cost over the next three decades is certain to be at last \$10,000 a mile. Using this figure, the savings by using the Sonora Route would be:

\$310,000 a year less than the Junction Route, or a savings of \$9.3 million over 30 years.

\$1,040,000 a year less than the Brady Route, or a savings of \$31.2 million over 30 years.

To sum up construction and maintenance cost savings, the Sonora Route would mean a minimum savings of more than \$50 million against the Junction Route and a minimum savings of more than \$155 million against the Brady

(3) Traffic Flow: Of the three possible routes out of San Angelo, the established traffic count pattern favors Sonora by a significant

Using the Texas Highway Department's official traffic count for 1977, the Sonora Route already carries more through traffic than both the other routes do. If the lowest traffic count along the routes if considered the best indicator of through traffic, more North-South West Texas traffic already prefers the Sonora-San Angelo route.

(4) Population served by Sonora connection would be substantial. Sonora population (including residents outside city limits but within 3 miles of city center) is approximately 6500. Residents of Del Rio, (population 35,000) of Eagle Pass (population 22,000) of Cuidad Acuna (population 46,000), Piedras Negras (population 80,000), would get on the North-South controlled access route at Sonora. U.S. 56 and U.S. 83 to Junction is too tortuous for easy access to the Interstate system.

There is only one shortest route to serve this population.

(5) According to count, Amistad visitors in 1978 numbered 1,250,000 Projections for the 1979 year are 1,400,000. Easy access to this facility would afford even greater participation by West Texans. There is only one shortest route to Amistad.

(6) Military benefits: This connector would give a direct North-South route between Laughlin AFB at Del Rio and installations at Abilene, Lubbock and Northward. There is only one shortest route to serve this need.

(7) Industrial benefits would be enormous. The Sonora Gas field centering on Sutton County and extending into Val Verde, Real, Schleicher, Crockett and Tom

Green Counties is served from an industrial site in Sonora. The next nearest service center is at Odessa, some 200 miles distant. The future demands for drilling,

servicing and delivery of petroleum products indicates an ongoing need for first class transportation needs for at least twenty-five years.

Lack of rail facilities and lack of a first class connector route with the Odessa-Midland complex will inhibit the growth of this petroleum recovery effort at a time of maximum national need. There is only one shortest route to serve

thses needs. (8) A new port of entry to Mexico would result. Extensive bridge, culvert, grade and alignment on U.S. 277 South of Sonora has been done in the last three years. At a time when the United States is making every effort to better its trade relations with Mexico a connector between the Western part of Mexico (Acuna, Musquiz, Monclova, Scitrillo) would promote tourism in Mexico on the one hand and our ability to transport products from the interior without funnelling through the Eagle Pass or the Laredo ports of entry. There

is only one shortest route. West Texas needs a North-South road, and it desperately does, the road should serve the growing North-South needs and are

When all the facts are considered, the task force is confident that the merits of the Sonora Route for the proposed West Texas four-lane will prevail.

The dollar savings to taxpayers would be tremendous if the Sonora Route is designated, and North-South traffic in West Texas from the border with Mexico to the High Plains would be better served. Copies of the position of the







Junction Cemetary. Brother Gayland Mc-Clellan officiated the services. The services were directed by the Kerbow Funeral Home.







New Oil And Gas Wells Discovered

Texas operators reported 24 oil and 61 gas discoveries juring the July 1-15, 1979 period, the Railroad Commission's Oil and Gas Division announcyear-earlier period 11 oil and 54 gas discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Through the first six and a half months of 1979, Texas operators have reported 709 gas and 247 oil discoveries, against 582 gas and 243 oil discoveries in the year-earlier period. Successful exploratory and field completions in the six and a half months

of 1979 total 4,260 oil and 3,075 gas, against 4,503 oil and 3,057 gas completions in the same period last year.
Oil discoveries in the

first half of July 1979 included six in the Refugio area, five in North Texas, four in deep South Texas, three in the Lubbock area, two each in the Southeast and West Central Texas, and one each in the San Antonio area and East

Gas discoveries included 26 in deep South Texas, 12 each in the Refugio area and Southeast Texas, four in the San Antonio area,

In the July 1-15 period, operators reported 164 exploratory and field tests wound up as dry holes. There were 1,809 dry holes reported in the first

Settlement Proposal Approved

The El Paso Company announced today that the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission approved a settlement proposal by El Paso Natural Gas Company, its natural gas transmission subsidiary, covering increased rates

June 1. 1979.

The settlement porposal would produce additional revenues of about \$80 million annually and provides for an overall rate of return of 10.78 percent on its rate base.

Amoco's New Proposal Should Help Energy Shortage

Amoco Production Com-pany's \$1.5 billion propo-sal to inject carbon dioxide into aging Permian Basin fields to recover millions of barrels of oil represents one of the best near-term contributions to solving the energy shortage, according to Amoco President George E. Galloway.

Whether the enhanced oil recovery project proceeds in the vast complex of oil fields straddling the Texas-New Mexico broder will depend on results of field tests. If the tests-costing nearly \$50 million and scheduled for completion over the next few years--are favorable, some full scale projects to begin producing the otherwise unrecoverable oil could start as early as mid-1984.

"This is a pioneering effort that will require huge initial investments with extremely high op-erating costs over the 40 to 50 years of the project's life," Galloway said. "While the growing emphasis on synthetic

fuels and alternative energy sources is long overdue, projects such as this one illustrate that oil is still the most practical answer to our near-term energy problems."

Studies by Amoco and other companies show that carbon dioxide (CO2) acts as a solvent that overcomes the forces that trap oil in rock pores. This simple gas may help recover a significant share of the approximately 60 percent of oil still beyond the reach of conventional production techniques. How much additional oil will be produced with CO2 injection is a question that will be answered with more accuracy, Galloway said, when Amoco's field tests are more advanced.

"We believe that injecting CO2 into oil reservoirs will increase the recovery of oil," he said. "The total project will take a tremendous capital outlay to develop a CO2 source and to operate enhanced oil recovery projects.

He said the CO2 project represents a 15-year investment in research and development. Galloway pointed out that while sythetic fuels and alternative energy sources are long-term solutions to curbing our dependence on foreign oil, expanding the conventional domestic oil and gas supplies is "the only practical alterna-

needs in the years immediately ahead." Despite the economic uncertainties of the project, Amoco is taking steps to develop a source of CO2 in northeast New Mexico. Amoco holds leases on more than 65 percent of the approximately 1.2 million acres in an area called Bravo Dome.

Amoco has drilled more than 30 wells in the three-county Bravo Dome area and estimates that about eight trillion cubic feet of nearly pure CO2 may be recoverable. A 20-well research drilling program currently is underway to further evaluate the field's potential and how best to produce it.

Consider Income Tax Consequences

"Income tax consequences of farm and ranch decisions should be weighed year-around," contends Dr. Ashley Lovell.

Cash-basis taxpayers tend to think of tax management strategies near the end of the taxable year, notes Lovell, an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. However, unless tax-saving moves can be completed before the year's end, many tax management strategies become inappropriate after December 31.

"Solutions to business management problems should contribute to maximizing after-tax income and net worth of the business," contends the economist. "When profit opportunities are limited, should be generated to equal the manager's zero bracket amount in the appropriate tax table or

schedule." Successful farm income tax management requires awareness of tax

provisions applicable to farming and ranching and of the particular accounting system used.

"Good records are essential for efficient farm management and are useful in preparing credit

applications," emphasizes Lovell. "They can also lead to maximum social security coverage and income tax savings."

Accurate and complete accounting of expense and income items is essential to tax management. An ommitted \$1 expense in 1979 may cost 14 to 70 cents in extra tax dollars,

depending on the tax bracket, points out the economist.
