## Holds Monthly Board Meeting

The School Board of the Sonora Independent School District met Tuesday in their regular monthly session to consider a number of proposals presented to them.

The issue of greatest interest was an increase in the daily rate of substitute teachers' pay. For a number of years, the School District paid their substitute teachers \$15 a day for taking over a teacher's class when he or she couldn't be there. Last year the Board approved a five dollar increase for the substitutes which brought the rate up to \$20 a day. The Board discussed the current rate at length and decided that in order "to insure the students of the most

qualified personnel" they should again raise the pay of the substitutes. In a unanimous decision, the Board passed a \$15 a day increase for substitutes pay to make the current rate \$35 a day.

Items discussed in the unfinished business area were the projects of the School District now under completion. These projects include the new Junior high building, the work at the football field, and the restoration and renovation of the old gym. The members of the Board proposed an Open House for the public to view the new Junior high building. The date for the viewing will be set upon completion of this project.

The Board approved several other items in yesterday's meeting.

Among them was a proposal to approve several transfer students, to approve the increase of bus drivers salaries 5.1% over last year, and to approve a Policy Update.

The Board members were asked to nominate five persons each for

the Tax Appraisal Board. The qualifications for these persons are

that the person nominated should have lived in Sutton County for at least two years, that he or she be responsible, and able to work with other people. The members of the Tax Appraisal Board will serve two-year terms.

Sonora's next two possessions were stalled by penalties.

Late in the first half, Coleman drove to the Bronco 19 yard line but Wesley Barton pounced on a Bluecat fumble ending the drive.

The Bronco Band gave an excellent half-time presentation.

The Broncos took the second half kick off and drove to the Coleman 9 yard line but a clipping penalty put the Broncos back to the Bluecat 38 yard line where two incomplete passes ended the scoring threat.

Late in the third quarter, Eddie Favila intercepted a Coleman pass and returned it 22 yards to the Coleman 26 yard line to set up another Bronco scoring opportunity. But, with a first down at the Coleman 7 yard line, the Broncos could only get to the Coleman 3 yard line before they ran out of downs. The Bluecats put

up an excellent goal line stand to stop the Sonora offense.

The last Coleman touchdown came on an 8 yard end run with 4:48 left in the game. The pass for the extra points was complete to give Coleman the 14-7 victory.

The only injury the Broncos suffered were Rex Surber's bruised ribs. Everyone else should be at full strength for the Ballinger game.

Coach Hopkins said that "we were disappointed in the number of mental mistakes we made at crucial times during the Coleman game." The Coach also had praise for Wesley Barton and David Reyna for playing a good game against Coleman.

Ballinger will have about the same type of team that Coleman had. That is, they are small but very quick. The game this Friday night is here in Sonora with an 8:00 p.m. kick off time.

## Sale Of Gas From Low Volume Wells In West Texas

The Railroad Commission recently approved the sale of low-volume gas production from state-owned tracts in West Texas to an interstate customer.

The approval came in the form of granting an exception to the Commission Rule 69 which requires RRC authorization before out-of-state sales of natural gas can be made from Texas public lands. The exception has been sought by Midland producer William E. Hendon Jr.,

operator of three shut-in

wells on three 160-acre state-owned tracts in Andrews County.

Under Texas statute, the Commission must make a determination that gas produced on state lands is not needed in Texas before it can be sold to interstate customers. Hendon, in his application, maintained that he would be denied an opportunity to produce the gas unless an exception to Rule 69 was granted.

Chairman John H. Poerner and Mack Wallace

signed the order granting the exception during the weekly conference on Oil and Gas Division matters. Commissioner James E. (Jim) Nugent abstained.

Hendon has sought an exception to the rule in order that he could sell gas from the tracts to

Northern Natural Gas Co., Omaha, Neb.

Oil and Gas Division Hearings Examiner Roger Schultz noted in his

findings of fact in the proceeding that Northern Natural was the only party to offer to buy the low-volume, low-Btu gas.

Schultz reported that Northern Natural has agreed to lay six miles of pipeline at a cost of nearly \$1 million to connect Hendon's wells to its system and to pay \$2 per million Btu for the gas.

He noted that the nearest intrastate pipeline, Pioneer Natural Gas Co., was 10 miles from the wells and that Pioneer was not interested in building a pipeline or buying the gas because "it was low daily volume, low Btu content and inadequate reserves."

Schultz said gas reserves underlying the

three tracts is estimated at approximately 2.4 billion cubic feet. The three wells are capable of producing between 100 and 300 Mcfd (thousand cubic feet per day), he reported.

mobile dealerships, equipment distributors, agricultural chemical companies and lending institutions at local, state and national level, he said. "Allied industry members will be able to display their support of the cattle industry and their customers, in particular, with an attractive wall plaque,

## Second Growing Season Nears

The second growing season for pastures is right around the corner.

During September and October, growing conditions become similar to spring in terms of day length and temperature. With moisture and proper management, pastures can produce a lot of hay or forage for grazing, says the Sutton county extension agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The most crucial management step is to make sure pastures have sufficient nitrogen for growth, emphasizes the agent.

Nitrogen is the key element in forage growth. Available nitrogen in most pastures is used rapidly.

Pastures that have had no nitrogen fertilizer or have had only one moderate spring application have

used most of the available nitrogen for spring and early summer growth. So there is little if any nitrogen available for fall forage growth.

Application of fertilizer also provides for a more

vigorous plant that will be less subject to winter damage. Anyone who has suffered from an excessive weed problem or a missed hay cutting because of winter kill of summer grass can appreciate this factor.

In addition to good production during the second growing season, grasses become higher in

digestibility during this period when compared to mid-summer grasses. Since fertilizing increases the protein content of forage, fall hay or grazing has a higher nutritional value for animals and gets them in the desired body condition prior to winter.

So, get the most out of fall forage by starting with an application of nitrogen fertilizer.

## Accurate Transaction Records Important

An accurate record of ranch transactions can play a big part in income tax management strategies, notes Dr. Ashley Lovell, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

For instance, the 1978 Revenue Act increased by 10 percent the net capital gain a non corporate taxpayer may deduct from his gross income. The previous 50 percent deduction of net long-term capital gain over net short-term capital loss no longer applies, notes Lovell.

So producers should review holding periods for

various assets such as breeding cattle, speculative commodity futures and farm machinery with

respect to capital gains or losses. The economist suggests that producers review purchase dates of assets that are expected to be sold to determine if holding period requirements are satisfied.

Acquisition dates are important when assets are to be sold and investment credit claimed. Lovell cites an example:

Suppose a previously purchased asset (on which

investment credit was

claimed) is sold before the three-year minimum holding period is achieved. Instead of receiving 10 percent investment credit on 33 percent of the qualified investment, the owner has to recapture the entire credit and pay it on his 1979 tax return.

Livestock producers must also be aware of "wash" transactions.

Cost of replacement livestock must be reduced by the amount received for

substantially identical animals. Lovell says this provision applies only if substantially identical animals are sold within six months either side of the date replacements are purchased and investment credit is not recaptured.

Producers trading or buying and selling used property in 1979 should recall an existing provision

in the Farmer's Tax Guide. If within 60 days of the sale date, similar used qualifying property is bought as a replacement and the basis of property

to be bought is not determined by reference to the adjusted basis of the old property, then only the amount exceeding the basis of the old property should be counted.

In this situation whether or not the 10 percent investment credit will be allowed on the total

purchase price of used items depends on their acquisition and disposal dates, adds Lovell.

He encourages producers to consult a tax accountant or attorney regarding business details.

### Glenn Fisher's

The mohair market has still not really opened up here in Texas. Probably no more than 200,000 to 300,000 pounds of fall hair has been sold out of a clip that should be about 4,500,000 pounds. The high price so far has been \$4.20 for adult and the low around \$4.00. Right now price is not the limiting factor; it seems that no new orders for hair have come from the fashion trade. Most people expect the orders to start in October and hopefully the \$4 plus price will attract enough business to move the fall clip.

We cancelled our sale that was originally scheduled for the 11th. A small weight (35,000) was

offered in Uvalde last week and bids were rejected by the growers.

South Africa's first sale was held last week and about 650,000 pounds were sold. Adult prices converted for our type of hair were about \$4 to \$4.30 or maybe a little better. They are shearing their spring clip so yearling and kid hair are difficult to compare.

The wool market has opened again and prices are strong—at least as good as spring prices when most of the clip was sold. Fall wool is moving well and we sold around 20,000 pounds of short wool a week or so ago. The bulk of the sale was fall lamb which brought 98 cents/pound.

Australian wool prices have been moving up slightly as they enter their

spring sales season. Worldwide, the demand for wool is very good.

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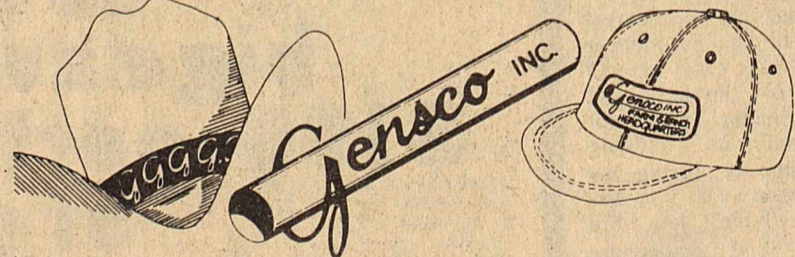

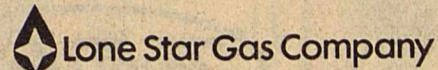

## PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1979

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would: —Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and —Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: —The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
- To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
- To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
- To prescribe procedures; and
- To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of

the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: —The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."
