Plane Crash Kills 3

At 9:33 p.m. Tuesday evening Officer Gesch of the Sonora Police Department reported a fire just South of the Haney Davis home. The fire turned out to be a fatal plane crash that took the lives of three people and critically injured the other passenger.

Dead at the scene were Michael J. Stucky, 20 years old from Peabody. Kansas, Beverly E. Borron, 19 years old from Imperial, Texas, and Jenni-


fer Cook, 20 years old from Odessa, Texas.

The survivor of the crash is Todd Carlisle 20 years old from Kiowa, Kansas.

The two men were employed by the Dumler Cattle Company of Kiowa, Kansas. The two girls were roomates at Angelo State University. The plane was owned by J.D. and Fred Dumler of Kiowa, Kansas. The Sutton County Sherriff's De-

partment, Sonora Police, and Fire Departments responded to the tragic crash. Dr. Browne went in the ambulance to San Angelo with the survivor.

The cause of the crash is unknown at the present time, but the FAA is investigating. Apparently the plane banked to the left and the left wing hit the tops of the trees pulling the plane into the side of the hill. Debris from the wreckage was scattered over a large area.

Everyone should be aware of the State Constitutional Amendment Election to be held November 6. Next Tuesday's election will concern three constitutional ammendments to the State constitution.

The three amendments are: The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by

The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department.

The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guanrantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas.

Voting will be from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. at the following locations. Precinct #1 at the Sutton County 4-H Center. Precinct #2 at the Sonora Wool and Mohair Company. Precinct #3-2 at the Simon's Ranch. Precinct #3-3 at the Church of Christ on the Llano River. Precinct #4 will vote at the Sonora Fire Station.


Goat and sheep prices on the hoof were up this week! However, the livestock sold at the Junction Stockyards in the Texas Hill Country were donated by area ranchman to the first annual Sheep and Goat Rais-ers Round-Up for Crippled Children.

The sale to benefit West Texas Rehabilitation Centers in San Angelo, Abilene and Snyder, was phase three of the 20th annual Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children. Included in the Junction event was a number of items donated by Junction merchants and cakes and pies baked by Kimble house-wives. The sale raised \$5,265, giving a grand total of \$206,279 for livestock this year with all three sales

Money raised from the annual CRCC is converted into dollars to provide care for over 7,000 handicapped people from throughout the Southwest.

Besides my duties as editor of WTRC newsletters and writing several Country Folk columns per week for some 35 newspapers, I am a special representative for WTRC. My travels take me to some 50 West and Central Texas counties every month. Of course, I have attended all of these Rehab functions in the past year and I don't think I have ever been so impressed with anything in my life as WTRC and its outreaching hand of service!

Having worked in the agriculture community for over 25 years, I know folks in every community of West Texas. I don't go into a business establishment that someone doesn't re-



cognize me. Yes, it is a good feeling. But what I am leading up to is how many people know about our Rehab Centers and what good our staff people are doing. My job is public relations

and therefore very seldom do I have the opportunity to visit within the WTRC departments and get to know

the more than 150 physical therapists, occupational therapists, special education teachers, audiologists and others who make up our staffs on the three campuses. Yet, in doing my job throughout the Southwest, I hear if our people are doing their job. That contact comes

through the words spoken in the small town coffee shops, from the kitchen table at one of our CRCC chairmen or a conversation with one of WTRC's directors in a bank lobby.

WTRC is unique in that it offers treatment and diagnostic services to one and all without regard to age, race, creed, geographic or-igin or financial ability. WTRC is an independent, gift-supported organization, relying on donations for approximately 65 percent of its annual operating budget.

The one fact that I am personally so proud of is that 65 percent of our budget is still supplied by agriculture and the petro-leum industries. Perhaps the only two grass root industries left by our forefathers, this basic product of God and nature is providing services to a people through WTRC that even the government can't do. Those tax-free dollars are

An Ordinance regulating the keeping of cattle, Horses, mules, asses, sheep, goats, rabbits, chickens and other domestic fowls, and prohibiting the keeping of swine, within the limits of the city of Sonora ; Providing penalty for vio-lation of this ordinance and repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conparts of ordinances in con-filict herewith, excluding the Dog and Cat Ordinance No. 180 adopted May 15, 1979: And declaring an

Be it ordained by the city council of the City of Son-ora, Texas: ARTICLE I Section I - Permit To Keep A. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep any cattle, horse, mule, ass, sheep, goat, chicken or other domestic fowl of any kind, sex or description within the



City Limits of the City of Sonora unless the require-ments of this Ordinance are met and a permit is obtain-ed. Only persons who com-ply with the provisions of this Ordinance shall be entitled to receive such a permit. The fee for such permit shall be Two Dollars [\$2.00] per year and monies received from the issuance same. of such permits shall be used to assist in the cost of the printing of forms for same. These permits shall be compulsory within ten

days of the passage of this Ordinance. B. It shall be unlawful for any person to harbor any horse, goat, sheep, cow, mule or other animal of like species within the corporate species within the corporate limits of the City without first having said animal vaccinated against rables annually. Proof of this vac-cination shall be required before issuance of permit outlined in Article I, Section

C. Suspension of revoca-C. Suspension of revoca-tion: A permit issued under this section may be tempo-rarily suspended by the City of Sonora upon violation by the holder of any of the terms of this Ordinance, or revoked after an opportunity for a hearing by the City Council upon serious or repeated violations. Any public official who receives information and complaints by another resident of the City of Sonora may investi-gate to see if proof of any existing nuisance exists, and shall notify owner of such animal nuisance by notice of letter. Such notice thall seedfy the nature of shall specify the nature of the nuisance and shall designate a reasonable time within which such abatement shall be accomplished. In the event such notice is not complied with within the specified time, the local health officer will be ad-vised, after which legal proceedings will be insti-tuted.

A minimum of four hundred [400] square feet of area shall be requir-ed for such animal unit and not more than two [2] not more than two [2] animal units shall be in any lot, pen, building, stable, enclosure or parcel of land. An animal unit is defined as follows: 5 sheep, 5 goats, 1

Section V - Area Require-ments For Fowl and Rabbits It shall be unlawful for It shall be unlawful for any person to keep, harbor maintain or permit the pre-sence on any lot or parcel of land within the City any poultry, fowl, or rabbit of any kind, sex or description, other than not more than one for each ten square feet of floor or ground area. Section VI - Maintenance Of Premises Where Livestock

Premises Where Livestock Are Kept, Disposal Of Manure

Each place in the City used for feeding, breeding, stabling pasturing or keep-ing any cow, goat, sheep, horse or any other animal of like species, shall be kept free of offensive odors, flies and rodents; and other en-closure in or on which any such animal is kept, fed, bred, stabled, pastured or housed shall have a suitable

manure box or container in which all manure and droppings shall be placed daily. Each such box or container shall be securely screened or otherwise protected from flies, vermin and ro-dents and shall be cleaned

such boxes shall not be left

such boxes shall not be left in open stacks but shall be removed or buried. Section VII - Maintenance Of Premises Where Fowl And Rabbits Are Kept It shall be unlawful for any person to keep any poultry or fowl within any structure in the City without scraping the floor of the room, coop, box or compartroom, coop, box or compart-ment and thoroughly clean-ing the area within 48 hours and so maintaining such structure or enclosure that no offensive odors are emitted therefrom.

The interior of such struc-ture where chickens, or rabbits, or turkeys or any other like species, are kept shall be disinfected with crude oil or some disinfec-tant on the roosting places at least once in each calen-dar month to discourage insects, fleas, mites and flies.

Section VIII - Running At

Large The term "running at large" shall mean permit-ting the animal, fowl or rabbit to run or be outside of the fence, cage or other facility for which permit has been issued under the pro-visions of this Ordinance.

It shall be unlawful for any person to permit or allow any chickens, ducks, turkeys, geese or other fowl, horse, mule, cow, sheep, goat, jack or jennet owned by him or under his control to run at large control, to run at large within the limits of the City within the limits of the City or to wander in or upon or invade the premises of any other person within the corporate limits of the City. Section IX - Tleing Animals To Posts, Trees, Etc. It shall be unlawful for any person to the or fasten any animal to any lamppost, awning post, tree, fence or shrubbery belonging to an-other, or to any hydrant belonging to the City. Section X - Riding Or Lead-ing Horses Across Side-walks Or Private Property It shall be unlawful for any person to ride or lead

any person to ride or lead any horse or drive any team on or across any sidewalk in the City, or across that property belonging to any-other person within the corporate limits of the City, except in such places as may be constructed and used for that purpose.

Section XI - Indecent Exhibition Of Animals

It shall be unlawful for any person to indecently exhibit any stallion, jack, buil ram or other male animal within the City, or to let or cause to be let any such animal to one of the opposite sex on any proper-ty within the limits of the City where the same will be open to the view of the







The suit names as defendants the Department of Energy and the Energy Secretary, the Department of Justice and the Attorney General, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and the U.S. Attorney in Houston.

Coastal claims the government is threatening it and its employees with grand jury indictments based on linking together a series of sales of domestic crude oil at admittedly lawful prices and foreign sales

of unregulated foreign oil. "The government's threats against the Company amount to a blatant attempt to interpret its price regulations on domestic oil, which have been an obvious disaster, to cover foreign transac

prices to American consu-mers," the spokesman said. "We are not dealing with a consumer rip-off by Coastal. The issue here is an attempt by the government to increase its regula-

tory power." Coastal pointed out that Department of Energy regulations have already been shown in the courts to be so vague and ambiguous they could not possibly form the basis of a criminal indictment such as that threatened by the U.S. Attorney

In its petition to the court, Coastal said it is seeking to prevent unwarranted and unconstitutional application of vague, ambiguous or invalid Department of Energy regulations which do not apply to the facts.

Coastal also charged that representatives of the Department of Justice have harrassed and intimidated company employees with threats and said its suit for injunction was necessary to protect its employees from such tactics.

"This case is just one more part of a politically motivated campaign to persecute energy companies through the misuse of poorly drafted, inconsistently applied, and often unintelligible rules and regulations.," the Coastal spokesman said.


