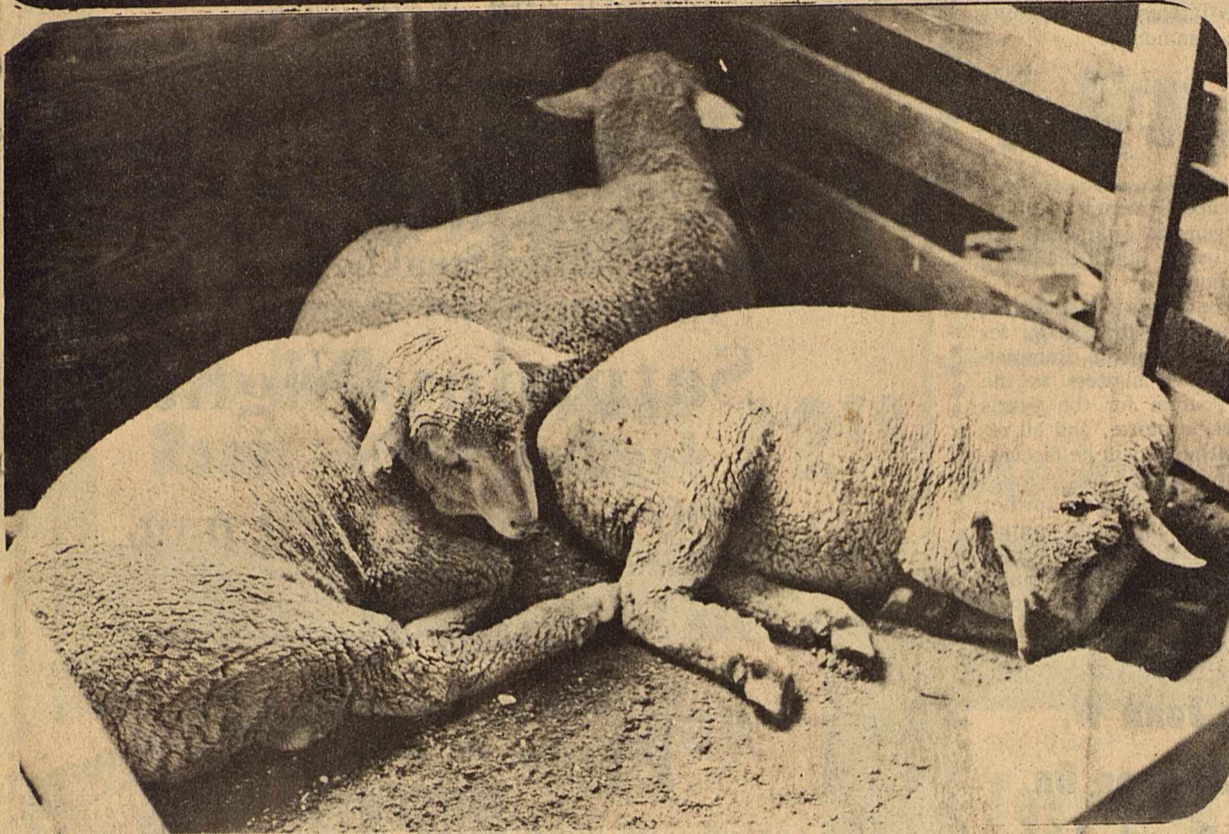

Heart 'O Texas has several branch offices. Its home office is in San Saba.

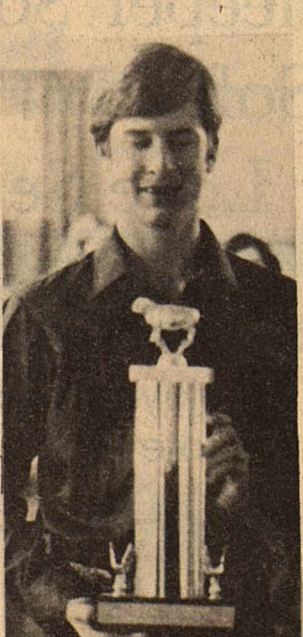

## Texas Farm Bureau Clarifies Position On Beferendum

The Texas Farm Bureau has clarified its position on the Beferendum, according to TFB President Carrol Chaloupka.

In a letter to county FB presidents, Chaloupka said the TFB Board has voted to implement the state policy adopted at the recent state

convention which supports voluntary contributions for beef research and promotion and opposes the proposed Federal Beef Research and Information Order.

Chaloupka explained that the Board met following the annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation Jan. 6-10 in Phoenix.

"National policy, as interpreted by the AFBF Board of Directors, permits each state Farm Bureau to establish its own position on this matter," he said.

"The TFB Board voted to implement the state policy adopted in McAllen in December."

The state policy reads: "We support the National Livestock and Meat Board in their promotion of the meat industry and urge all local livestock markets to participate in the voluntary check-off program."

"We also oppose the Federal Beef Referendum Program."

The TFB leader said livestock producers gener-

ally support a program to promote their industry, but said it would be difficult to comply with the proposed Order "because it is confusing and cumbersome."

Chaloupka explained that he wrote Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland Jan. 3 asking for clarification of "conflicting statements in the Order and in USDA announcements" regarding the exemption of dairy and beef breeding cattle.

"As of this date (Jan. 15), we have not received clarification of this mat-

ter," he said.

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## Breakthrough In Cattle Breeding

Area beef and dairy producers will benefit from a recent breakthrough in cattle breeding technology which involves a compound to synchronize heat.

The compound, a prostaglandin developed and named Lutalyse by the Upjohn Company, allows scheduled breeding in cattle. Combined with artificial insemination (AI), this new compound can mean accelerated production and improvement of beef and dairy herds through increased use of genetically superior semen from top rated sires.

Field studies show that normal fertility rates are achieved in much less time with less on-farm labor involved when using the prostaglandin. This means potential profit to cattlemen.

Although Lutalyse itself

is not a cure for cattle reproduction problems, it should mean increased use of AI and genetically superior semen. According to a leading American dairy scientist, greater use of AI will mean more meat and milk to feed a growing world population.

Harold D. Hafs, Ph. D., dairy science professor at Michigan State University, notes that the greatest progress in animal production during the past 30 years has been made through artificial insemination. Because of improved genetic lines, the time required to produce a 1,000 lb. steer has been halved since 1950 and per cow milk production has increased about four times.

He states that almost all tillable land suitable for cereal grains and row crops

already is under cultivation. Consequently, he looks to animal agriculture rather than crops to supply an increased share of future world food needs.

With proper management, Dr. Hafs predicts that within 10 years Lutalyse could mean a doubling of the number of dairy calves sired by AI and a 10-fold increase in the number of beef calves produced from AI bulls. The result will be accelerated production of meat and milk.

"It's a time when the ability of agriculture to produce adequate food supplies appears to be slipping. Yet today, there is hope that controlled breeding of cattle will help buy time to balance food supply with world population." The estrus synchronizing compound is now available through local veterinarians.

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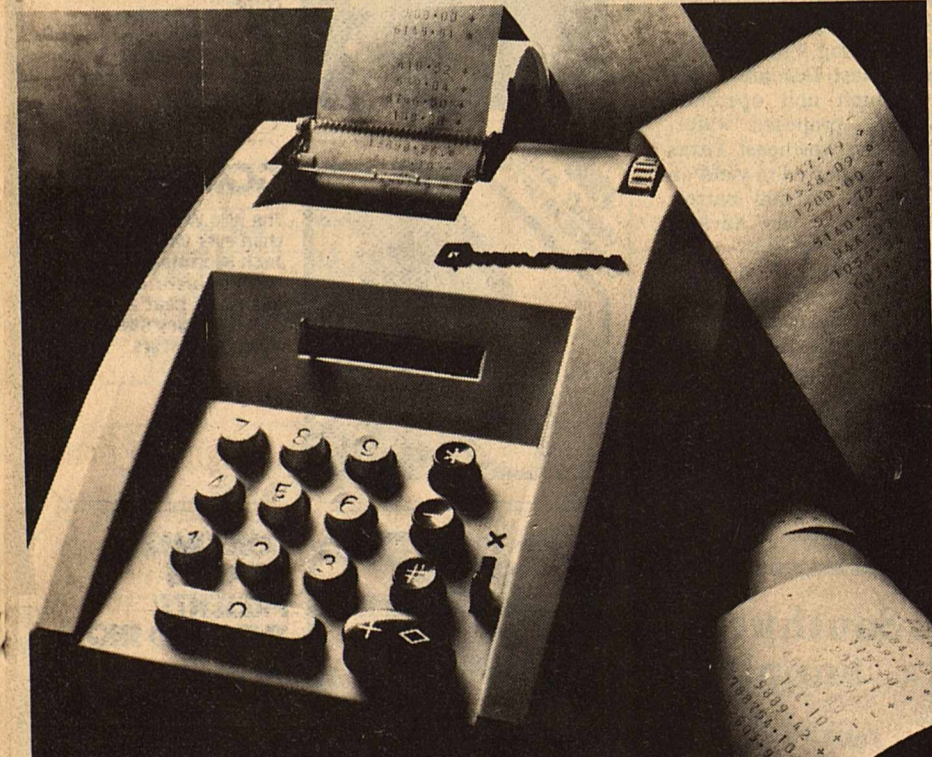

## Thousands Receiving Checks From The "Energy Crisis Assistance Program"

From the offices of the Permian Basin Petroleum Association. Thousands of the nation's poor who don't pay heating bills are receiving checks under the "Energy Crisis Assistance Program". This word comes

spacing rules. Chairman John Poerner and Commissioners James E. Nugent and Mack Wallace approved a motion for an emergency order for shutting in Consolidated's Number 1 Hopkins B well in the Vera Field area, two miles south of Halsell, during Monday's weekly con-

ference on Oil and Gas Division matters. The motion was entered by Heydrick Petroleum Co., Wichita Falls, which has a lease adjacent to the one on which the Hopkins well is situated. Legal examiner William E. Black of the Oil and Gas Division supported the mo-

tion. Heydrick, in its motion, maintained that more than 25,000 barrels of oil may have been produced from intervals in the North Texas well during 1979 in "blatant" disregard to RRC rules and regulations. Heydrick asked the Commission to place the pro-

ceeds from runs of oil from the Hopkins well in escrow and that any oil on the lease be confiscated. "Heydrick finally prays that this well not be granted any Form P-8 (production) clearance, reduced rate authority or any other relief allowing production or runs of oil from this lease

until such times as the Railroad Commission, by final order, shall so allow," reads the Heydrick motion. The Commission has before it an application by Consolidated for new field designation and discovery allowable and for an exception to Statewide Rule 37 for the Hopkins B well.

## Poerner To Meet With Mexico Officials Petroleum

Railroad Commission Chairman John Poerner will go to Mexico City at the end of January to meet with top officials of Mexico's petroleum and railroad operations to discuss means to expedite energy and commodities traffic between Texas and the neighboring nation. Poerner will fly to Mexico City on Jan. 28 and return to Austin on Jan. 31. In addition to his meetings with the rail and oil

officials, Poerner will participate in the opening of Petrovance 80, an oil equipment and technology exposition held annually in Mexico City. Texas firms will have 30 exhibits at the show. Poerner hopes the meetings with Mexico's rail officials will lead to an improvement in rail traffic across the Rio Grande from and into Texas border railheads. The Railroad Commission has been designat-

ed by Gov. William P. Clements as the lead agency in planning improvements in Texas rail service. In meetings with officials of Petroleos Mexicanos (Pemex), the national oil company of Mexico, Poerner plans to discuss the future transportation of Mexico-produced natural gas into and through Texas. The Railroad Commission has safety jurisdiction over such movements. Also on Poerner's agen-

da is a discussion of future development of oil and gas along both sides of the Rio Grande and how they may involve Mexico's petroleum regulators and the Railroad Commission. Last August, Poerner proposed the creation of a Mexico-Texas joint commission to deal with offshore petroleum development in the Gulf of Mexico. He offered his services to President Carter and Mexico's President Lopez Por-

tillo in mobilizing petroleum and environmental experts in Texas to serve on such a commission. "We need Mexico's oil and gas to supplement Texas resources," Poerner said in announcing his plans to visit Mexico City. While in Mexico's capital city, Poerner will join representatives from several other state agencies and the Legislature at the Texas Industrial Commission's

trade office there for discussions on expanding the office and converting it into a Texas-Mexico relations office. Poerner is a member of a panel that Gov. Clements has asked to make a study of the trade office and how it might be expanded to serve the State of Texas and Texas businesses engaged in trade with Mexico.

## J.V. Waggoner Promoted To President For El Paso Products

The El Paso Company announced recently that J.V. Waggoner will assume the duties of president of El Paso Products Company, its chemical subsidiary, effective March 1, 1980. W.D. Noel, who has headed this Odessa, Texas based subsidiary since

1963, will become its chairman of the board. Waggoner, who is 52 years of age, has thirty years experience in the petrochemical business. He was most recently group vice president and managing director, Plastics and Resins Company, Monsanto

to Corporation, St. Louis, Missouri. Waggoner, a graduate of the University of Texas with a master's degree in chemistry, began his service with Monsanto in 1950 and has held various key positions in the marketing and sales of hydrocarbons,

plastics and polymers. He became business director of the petrochemical group in 1968 and moved up to general manager in 1972. In 1977, he was named group vice president. The El Paso Company is a diversified energy company with major operations in natural gas transmission,

oil and gas production, liquefied natural gas activities and chemical manufacturing.

## EPNG Rate Settlement

The El Paso Company announced today that its

subsidiary, El Paso Natural Gas Company, submitted a rate settlement proposal to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission that would extend the provisions of an earlier settlement, approved by the Commission in July of 1979, for a period through May 31, 1981.

Upon approval of the proposal, the settlement provides that the Company will refund in excess of \$40 million and reduce its rates approximately \$30 million annually. The Company also will periodically refund monies based upon the occurrence of certain

events related to level of service and level of costs during the effectiveness of the settlement. The Company has agreed to withdraw a rate filing made with the Commission on December 31, 1979 for increased rates that would have been effective June 1, 1980.

With approval of the settlement proposal, which provides for a 14 percent return on equity for the term of the extended agreement, the Company said that its basic gas sales will be firm for a period through May 31, 1981.

## RRC Authorizes Bryans Mill Production

The Railroad Commission recently authorized the Shell Oil Co. to operate the Bryans Mill (Rodessa Upper) Field in Cass County as a unit and to initiate a water injection program there to enhance additional oil production.

Chairman John Poerner and Commissioners James E. Nugent and Mack Wallace approved Shell's application during the weekly conference on Oil and Gas Division matters. Legal Examiner Roger Schultz and Senior Staff Engineer George F. Singletary accepted testimony on the request during a public hearing on last December 18.

Through unit operation and the proposed water-flood, the Northeast Texas field is expected to yield an additional 400,000 barrels of oil, Singletary advised the Commissioners. The field, discovered in 1974, has produced more than 644,000 barrels of oil and presently has six producing wells that average 11 barrels of oil per day.

The newly authorized unit consists of 286 surface acres of which 261 are considered productive. Production is from the 6,200-foot interval.



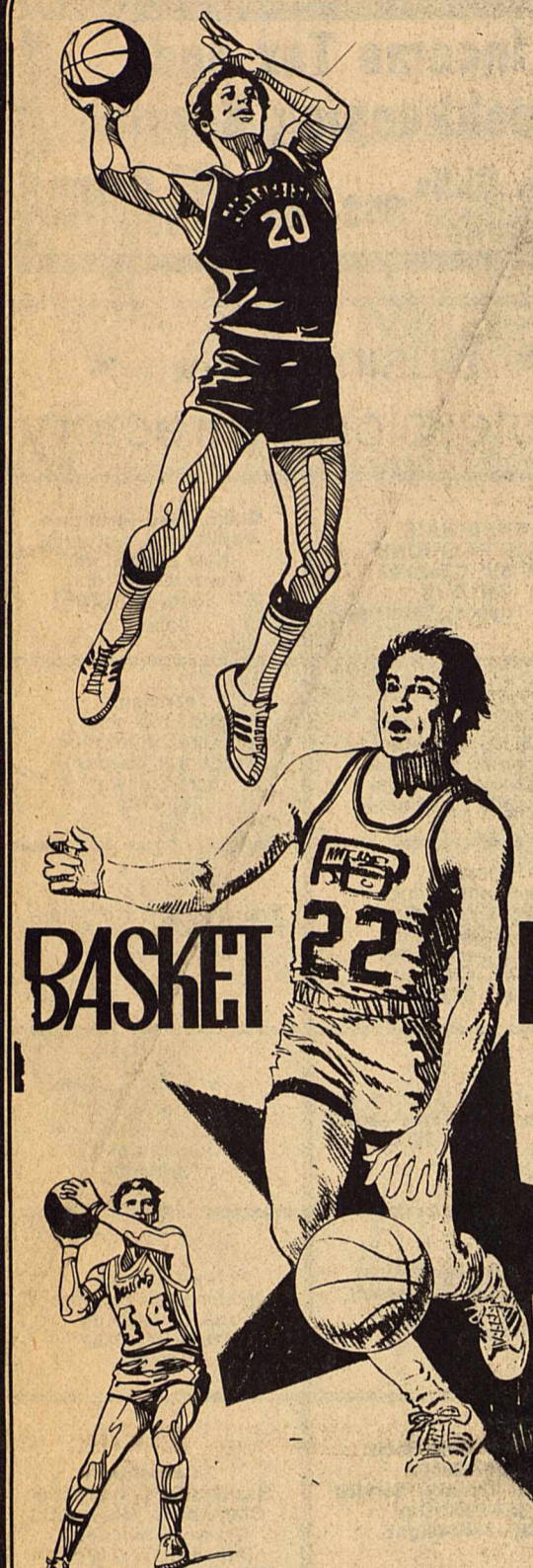
