Sonora City Council Meets To Discuss Issues

The Sonora City Council met Tuesday in their regular session to consider several proposals on their agenda.

The first item on the agenda was the consideration of the creation of the Sonora Industrial Development Corporation.

A corporation similar to the one now being founded was established many years ago to benefit the Sonora-Eldorado Woolen Mills. The new corporation will benefit all types of industry. It will promote the development and establishment of industry in the Sonora Area.

This corporation will have the power to issue tax revenue exempt bonds.

After much discussion and deliberation, the Council agreed to sponsor such a corporation for the promotion of industry in Sonora.

City Manager, Jim Dover, and Mayor, Doyle Morgan, then reported on their trip to Temple, Texas, where they had a conference with a Farmers' Home Representative con-

cerning the plans for a new sewage treatment plant to be installed in Sonora. The Environmental Protection Agency has appointed Farmers Home to review all plans for the sewage treatment plant.

According to Mayor, Doyle Morgan, the City has been working on installing a new sewage treatment plant for the last four years. The

City has decided on a race-track extended aeration type treatment plant. The representative from Farmers Home approved the plan after much discussion.

Engineers' first cost estimate was \$500,000. That figure was the total cost of installing a new plant four years ago. Now, with inflation, the cost of the project has risen to \$1,300,000. "Bids on the project will not be accepted for the next year, and who knows what the cost will be then," Morgan added.

The Council members were then notified of the review of the City's contract with WTU for all utility needs. WTU had, earlier, asked for a

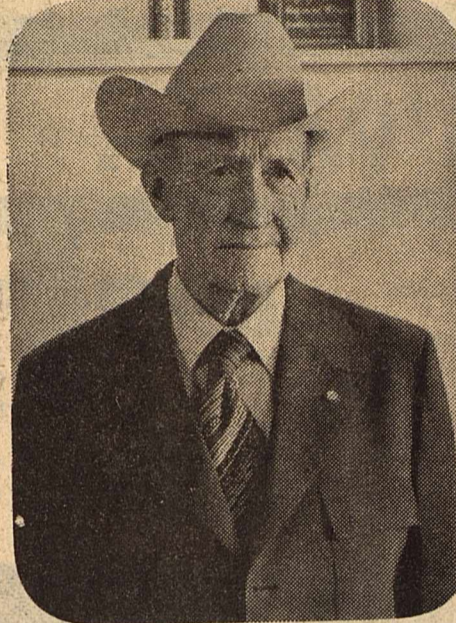
10.56 percent rate hike. This hike was turned down because of the contract with the city which states that the cost of utilities to the city will remain the same until 1984.

The County and City are presently working on their joint project of updating the Airport facilities, and according to City Manager Jim Dover, all is going well. The Airport recently acquired an old fuel tank from the City which has been steam cleaned and will be ready for use whenever they need it.

Nelson Stubblefield was appointed to the City's Planning and Zoning Commission by the City Council. Plans for the City Council Elections to be held April 5 were also discussed. The terms of office of two members of the Council have nearly expired.

Rev. Paul Terry has been selected by the Council as the election judge. Lou Thomas and Lou McMillan have been chosen to work as clerks at the polls during the Saturday elections.

Deadline for entry into the City Council elections will be March 6, 1980.

Morriss Re-elected To Mohair Producers Board

Thomas Morriss of Sonora was re-elected to a 6-year term on the Texas Mohair Producers Board in mail balloting concluded recently, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

Morriss represents District 6. Other board members re-elected were James L. Greer, Jr. of Rock-springs and Herman Moore of Brownwood. F.H. "Tuffy" Whitehead of Del Rio was elected to fill the position held by Noel Fry, also of Del Rio.

Under the Texas commodity referendum law, the commissioner of agriculture is required to audit and certify balloting by Texas agricultural commodity groups. These groups are organized by producers of certain commodities to fund marketing,

research, education and promotion in their specific areas. Under the law, members are assessed fees based on production.

In other action, Texas mohair producers elected to increase the assessment on their product from 2 1/2 to 4 1/2 cents per pound. This decision, which carried by a 70.68 percent margin, was the first time any Texas commodity group has voted to raise its assessment. Brown pointed out.

The Texas Mohair Producers Board was formed on February 10, 1976. Using assessments collected from producers in a 54-county area of the state, it funds mohair promotional activities in the U.S. and abroad through the Mohair Council of America.

Loeffler Meets With Airport Authority Over Fuel Shortage

Congressman Tom Loeffler, the 21st Congressional District's representative in Washington, visited Sonora Saturday to speak with members of the Airport Authority about the critical shortage of aviation fuel in the area.

Present at the 3 p.m. meeting were Authority chairman Joe Kiowski, Gay Copeland, Robert Kelly, John David Fields, and Bill Morris. Kiowski outlined the problem that the Sonora airport operators, and many others in this area, have been facing in recent months since Phillips Petroleum cancelled deliveries of aviation fuel in early January. Operators have been told that more fuel will not be available before April.

Loeffler advised the group that West Texas was not the only area affected by the shortage. Kansas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico were also hard hit, he said. "On Wednesday before I left Washington," Loeffler said, "we had a hearing and had the Economic Regulation Administration people before our subcommittee. Before I walked out, I went over to the guy in charge and asked if there was anything that could be done. And he was well aware of their problem. But he said there's nothing we can do on the Federal level." Aviation fuel, unlike gasoline and other petroleum products, is no longer allocated to suppliers by the Department of Energy," Loeffler explained.

Phillips does have another plant, at Sweeny, Texas, Loeffler said. That plant is capable of producing some aviation fuel, and according to industry sources, has upped its production by approximately a thousand barrels a day. But, he said, that plant has an emissions problem subject to control by the Texas Air Control Board. "As I understand it, Phillips is going to have to make an application for a waiver on that particular regulation; and when I get back to Washington on Tuesday I'm going to get as many of the members of Congress as I can who are interested in this, and see if we can't jointly sign a letter and send it to the Texas Air Control Board."

Loeffler promised further to work with Ed Vetter, head of the state energy department established by Governor Bill Clements, in an effort to persuade the Texas Air Control Board to grant the Sweeny plant a variance which would allow aviation fuel production at maximum capacity, at least for an interim time until the recently demolished Borger, Texas plant, site of a major explosion last month could be brought back into production later in the year.

Loeffler also promised to check to see if there was anyway that aviation fuel (and diesel fuel) could be purchased in Mexico for distribution here. He agreed to use his good offices in an attempt to arrange contacts with Tesoro Petroleum and

Sigmar Oil, of San Antonio, who may be able to divert small amounts of fuel occasionally.

Loeffler stressed that local pilots, drivers, and farm equipment operators should not be optimistic about future fuel supplies. "The bottom line is, America just hasn't gotten its act together yet," he said.

"There's no question about there being a shortage-- the question is, how you alleviate the shortage. If we let the prices go up, we'll see conservation measures increase as a result of those higher prices, as we're seeing right now! And the problem is not only with oil and gas, but with everything we could use as energy alternates," he asserted. "That's the reason that the windfall profits tax was such a critical error...if we could reinvest that money, we'd save a great deal of time in finding the answers we need."

Loeffler expressed long-term optimism, however. "We'll get the problems resolved, even if we have to settle for half a loaf right now. But we've all got to work together on this. Next time, it could be diesel fuel, for agriculture; it could be gasoline, a gasoline shortage right here in West Texas."

Before leaving, Loeffler expressed his confidence in the course of his campaign for re-election, and his thanks for the support he received from Sonora and Sutton County in the last campaign.

School Board Elections Set

During the February 12 meeting of the Sonora Independent School District Board of Directors, three of the Board members were notified of the expiration of their terms of office.

Those three places on the Board include Sammie Stewart, Place 5, Mary Adele Balch, Place 6, and Dorothy Pope, Place 7. Sammie Stewart and Mary Adele Balch have expressed their desire to run for re-election. Dorothy Pope has decided not to seek another term on

the Board.

An election was ordered by the Board for April 5, 1980, for the purpose of filling these three vacancies.

All requests by candidates wishing to run for election should be in writing and filed with the secretary of the School Board at the School Administration Office not less than thirty days prior to the election.

Voters are urged to partake in the casting of their ballots on April 5. All four precincts will cast their

ballots at the Sutton County Courthouse. Jerry Johnson will preside over the voting. The polls will be opened at 7:00 a.m. and will not close until 7:00 p.m. that evening.

Absentee voting in the election will be held at the School Administration Building, 807 Concho Avenue. Polls at the Administration Building will be open from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Schulze Announces Candidacy For District Attorney

Jack P. Schulze, County Attorney of Reagan County, has announced his candidacy for District Attorney of the 112th Judicial District. He is a candidate for the Democratic nomination, subject to the Democratic Primary on May 3, 1980.

Schulze is County Attorney of Reagan County and has held that office since August of 1975. Schulze was appointed by Reagan County Commissioners Court to fulfill the unexpired term of Dan Tabor who resigned to enter private practice. Schulze was elected to a full term in 1976 and his present term will expire at the end of 1980.

Jack Schulze graduated from Coleman High School in 1958 and received his B.A. degree from McMurray in 1962. He spent two years at Baylor University in graduate study in chemistry then taught science and chemistry at China Springs High School. He then went to work for Shell until 1969. He then went to work for Shell

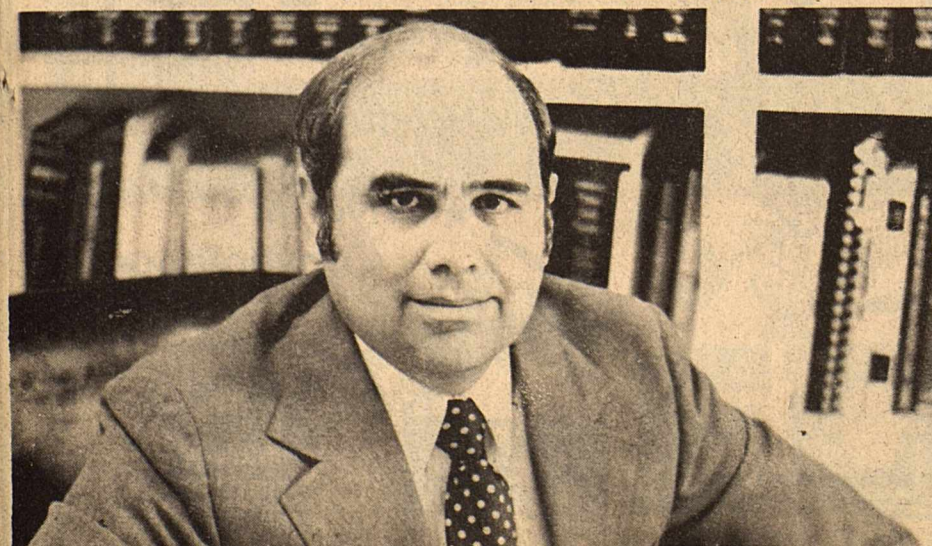
Chemical Company as a marketing representative in the Petroleum Chemicals Division. Schulze was assigned to the Houston office in the summer of 1966 and worked for Shell until 1969. He then worked for E.I. DuPont in the Petroleum Chemical Division in Houston as a laboratory supervisor. There he became familiar with gasoline and diesel fuel technology. In the spring of 1970, Schulze enrolled in South Texas College of Law in Houston and continued to work for DuPont.

He graduated with a Doctor of Jurisprudence Degree in May of 1974. He continued to work for DuPont until August of 1975 at which time he was appointed County Attorney of Reagan County of Reagan County. Schulze decided on a career of law after attending the University of Texas Medical School in Galveston for one year.

Schulze's campaign theme will be simple and straight. Law and order

of the old-fashioned kind. He said, "Law enforcement should be maintained at a high level of competence in order to preserve the reputation West Texas has as being a good place to live." Schulze is gaining a reputation in Reagan County as being a fearless prosecutor. "My job as a County Attorney and later hopefully as a District Attorney, is to represent the people of the county or district," said Schulze. "This means prosecuting people who have been charged with violating the laws of our state. That means representing the law abiding people of the district and not the law breakers. I will be a working, prosecuting District Attorney," stressed Schulze.

Schulze will be making an active campaign for the job of District Attorney of the 112th Judicial District. The 112th Judicial District includes the counties of Pecos, Crockett, Sutton, Upton and Reagan.

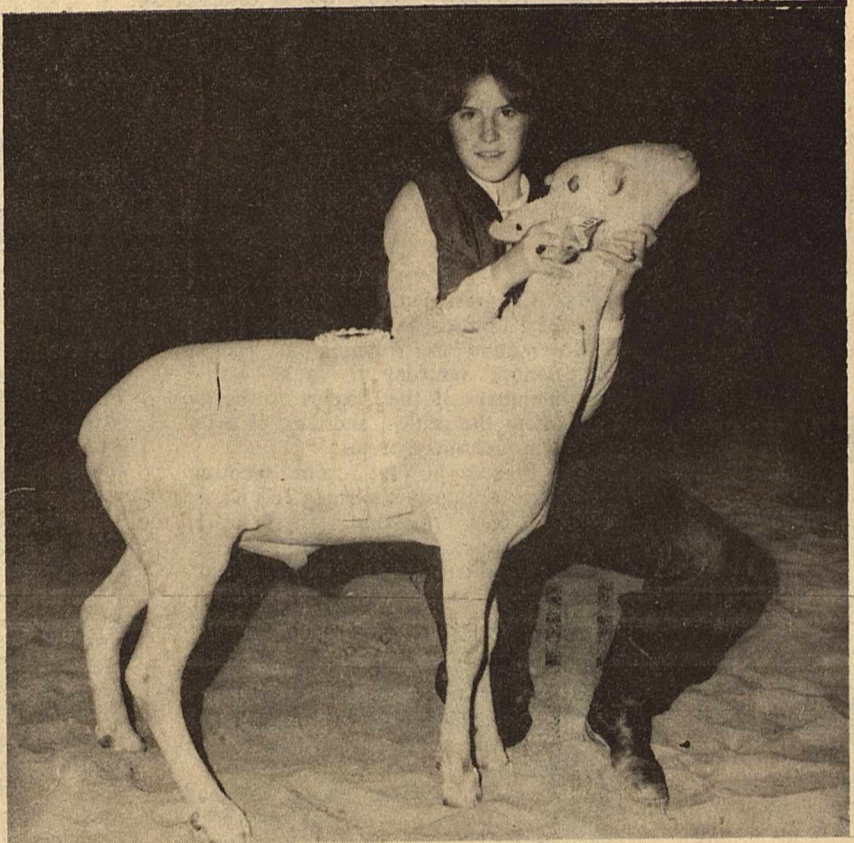


Sonora Newcomers

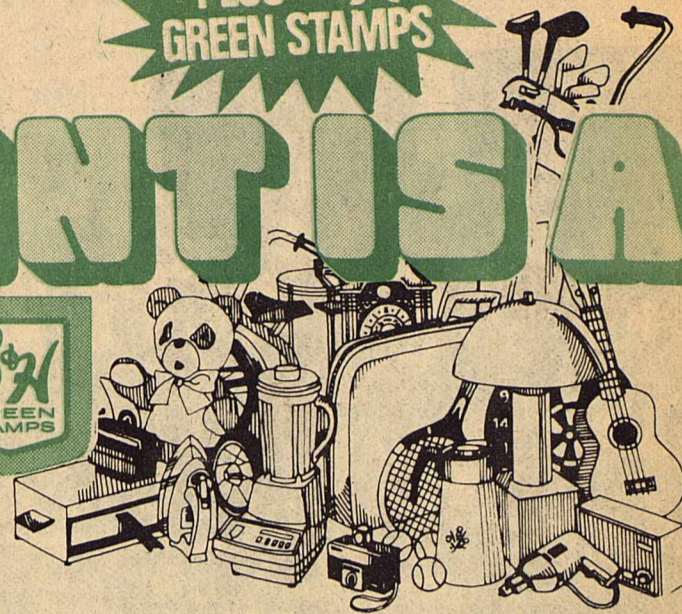

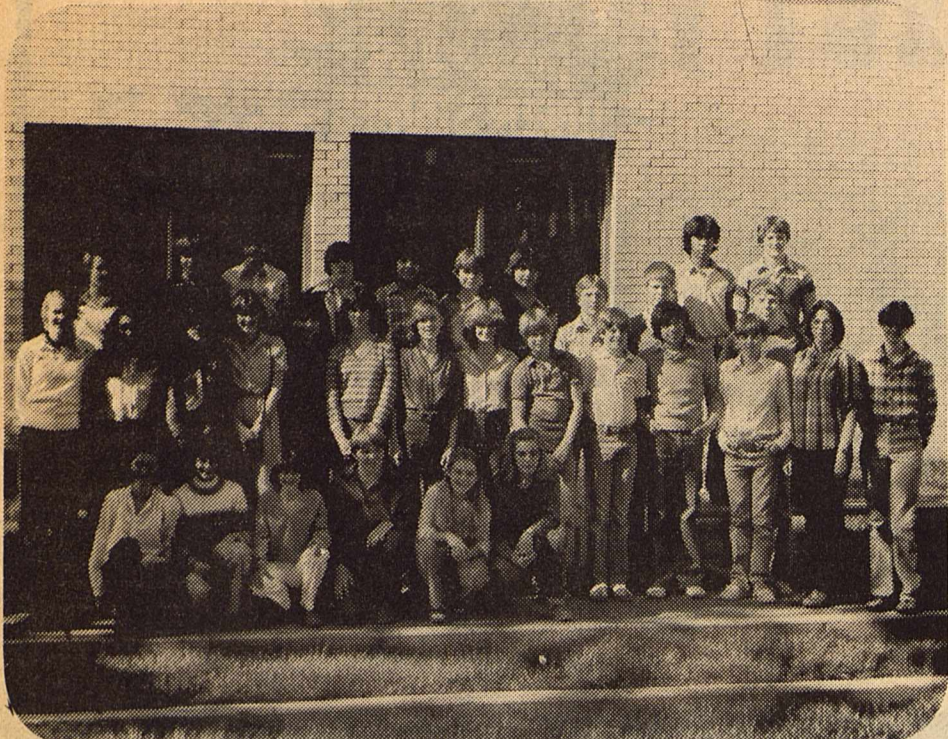

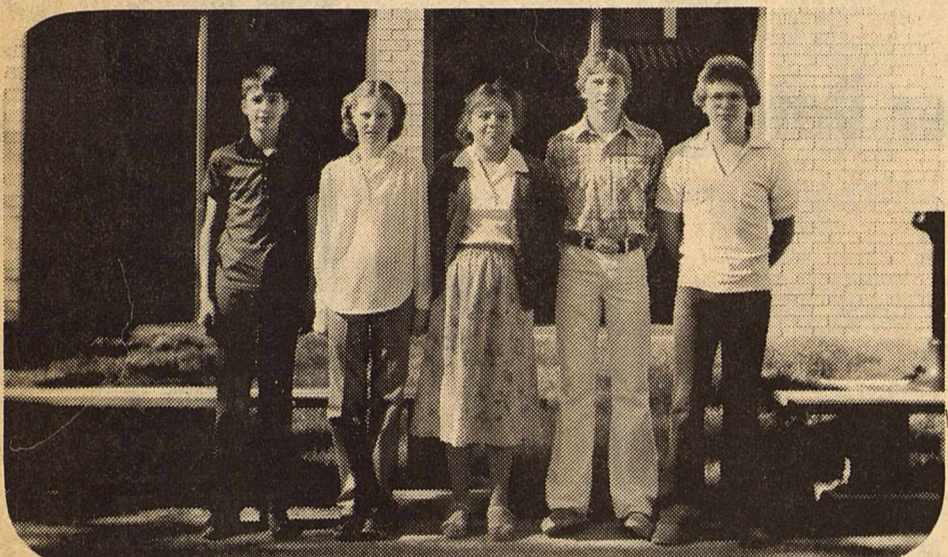

YCC Provides Summer Employment Opportunities

The Texas Department of Community Affairs has announced the availability of summer job opportunities in the '80 Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) projects throughout the state of Texas.

Unlike many other federally funded youth programs, YCC is open to young people from all economic sectors. Applicants will have a choice of being considered for nonresidential projects, or work encampments which provide food and lodging facilities, as well as around the clock supervision. Minimum wage (\$3.10 per hour) will be paid for thirty (30) hours work per week; the other ten (10) hours will be devoted to environmental education. All projects proposed for 1980 are to be

coeducational and will average eight (8) weeks duration.

YCC, similar to the Civilian Conservation Corps of the 1930's, is jointly sponsored by the U.S. Departments of Interior and Agriculture-Forest Service.

The program objectives are to accomplish needed conservation work on public lands, and to provide outdoor summer employment for 15 to 18 year old male and female youth, and to develop an appreciation of our nation's natural resources among participants.

As Texas' recruitment coordination office, the Children and Youth Services Division of the Texas Department of Community Affairs is distributing blank application forms through-

out the state until early March, 1980. Interested young people should contact their local school administrators for program concept information and application forms, and a list of nonresidential projects and encampments away from home.

Deadline for application submission is March 15, 1980. Selection will be made by random technique.

OZONA-Everything in Texas is supposed to be bigger or better or greater in some way, but the "Second Annual St. Valentine's Day Massacre" chili cook-off at the Circle Bar Truck Corral Feb. 8 and 9 was almost more than Sam Lewis and I could handle. (Lewis is the little guy from San Angelo who invented the Jalapeno Lolly-pop they're sucking these

days in Shanghai, and he and I put on the second Massacre at Ozona despite a near freeze-out a year earlier when the chosen weekend provided a high of 19 degrees for some 3,500 hardy chiliheads, including more than 50 teams of cooks.)

The 1980 running was a little warmer most of the time (although it was a nippy 13 on the campgrounds the first night, somebody said), but a couple of inches of snow at the point of no return cost us about 2,000 participants and about a thousand bucks for the Texas Prisoner of War-Missing in Action

group for which the Ozona cook-off is a benefit.

The 10,000-meter race was canceled for reasons of safety just before half a dozen super-hardy athletes showed up in jogging attire, and the coldest-blood ladies declined even a "dry tee-shirt" contest.

But Bill Edge of Ozona won his first-ever "chilampship" over 35 other teams to earn three points of the six needed to compete at the Terlingua World's Championship Nov. 1; Odessa Wayne Hill was second for two points; and Sam Stewart of Sonora took third and one Terlingua point.

The "Davis Gang and Chicken Charlie" outfit of Sanderson and Ft. Stockton won "Showmanship" followed by Angelo's "Travlin' Kitchen" and Ozona's Girl Scouts with their "Tillie's Chili" team.

Other child winners were "Black Bart" Kline of Angelo, fourth; Angelo's Lowell Murphy, fifth; Odessa's Spyder Schogging, sixth; Eldorado's Sam Whitten, seventh; Hensel Mathews of Sonora, eighth; David Cozens of Odessa, ninth; and Tilly Kramer of Ozona, tenth.

And it isn't only the weather that has caused us to start calling the Ozona

Massacre "the coolest cook-off in the world."

Lewis converted boards from Tom Mitchell's out-house into some classy plaques, and the cooks themselves had a rare chance to judge their own far when Juding Directress "Allegani Jani" McCullough (first Fem World's Champ at Terlingua in '74) drew six team numbers to join Circle Bar Assistant Manager Jeff Staurt and Michael Howard (Jimmy Carter's nephew) of Plains, Ga., as judges. (Howard dug it so much he's moving to Texas.)

So George Davidson of Angelo, Wayne Hill of

Odessa, Mrs. Bertie Sims of Seminole, H.W. Scott of Eldorado, "Moe" Banda of Odessa, and Tim Kenner of

Odessa had the best of both worlds, as chili chefs and judges. (Most couldn't find their own chili.)

And the snow outside only made the svelte tropical atrium of the Circle Bar Motel more heavenly as most of us turned Scandinavian by dipping intermittently in the Jacuzzi and the Sauna and romping in the snow.

(Only Texas would have such a truckstop-and-the chow is both reasonably

priced and hearty, from the real biscuits to the real

Mexican food all hours of the day and night. It's six miles east of Ozona on Interstate 10 if you haven't had the pleasure.)

The next West Texas chilaffair is the Cathedral Mountain Cook-off Easter weekend (with an easter egg hunt and sunrise sermon by Rev. Pendergrast).

And I promise not to turn this column into a chili report, but the fun and fellowship of the Ozona Massacre was just too good to pass up.

Loeffler Urges Restoration Of B-1 Bomber

Calling on the President to back up tough talk to the Soviets with the necessary military hardware, U.S. Congressman Tom Loeffler has urged restoration of the B-1 bomber as an integral part of America's national defense.

In a letter to the President, Loeffler, and a bipartisan group of his House colleagues, reminded the President that his decision to cancel production in 1977 was a qualified decision. The President said in 1977: "If at the end of a few years, the relations with the Soviet Union should deteriorate drastically, which I don't anticipate, then it may be necessary for me to change my mind."

In view of Soviet aggression in the Persian Gulf Region, Loeffler told the President, "we re-

spectfully suggest that the time has indeed come for you to change your mind on the B-1 bomber."

Pointing to a "pattern of Soviet inspired tension and international aggression," culminating with the armed invasion of Afghanistan, Loeffler told the President that "in the face of conditions you yourself had set for the restoration of the B-1 bomber"...doing so now would be "a direct, forceful response to the awesome growth of Soviet military power and blatant aggression of the Kremlin."

Military experts testify to the inherent value of the named bomber in general and the B-1 in particular, which, as of this date has not been surpassed as a penetrating bomber aircraft under the most sophisticated computer analysis.

"It is our conviction that

this monument to American technological ingenuity, if brought on line through an accelerated production schedule, could preserve the security of the United States and the peace of the world for the rest of this century.

Reminding the President that many of his military advisers had warned about Soviet global ambitions within a year of B-1 production cancellation, Loeffler said that "Soviet declarations concerning the importance of detente have been continually compro-

mised by the arrogant support for so-called national wars of liberation directly aided and assisted by Cuban proxy troops and advisers in Africa and the Middle East.

"If we're going to talk tough with the Soviets, it is critical that this country have more in its arsenal than rhetoric. The B-1 bomber was—and is—an essential part of this country's national defense. Its production must be restored, and in my view, the sooner the better.

Trainer was the Sonora Postmaster for 32 years. James D. and his wife, Peggy have two sons, Gil and Mitch who also live here in Sonora.

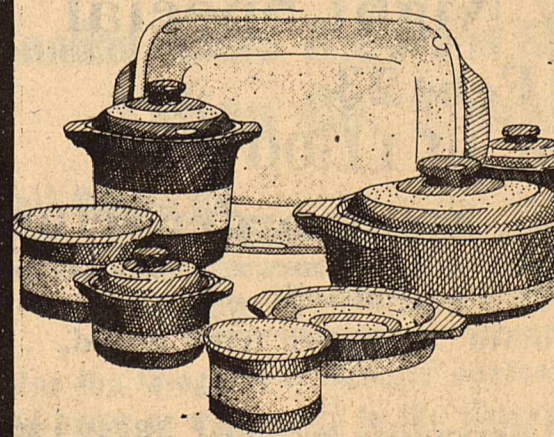

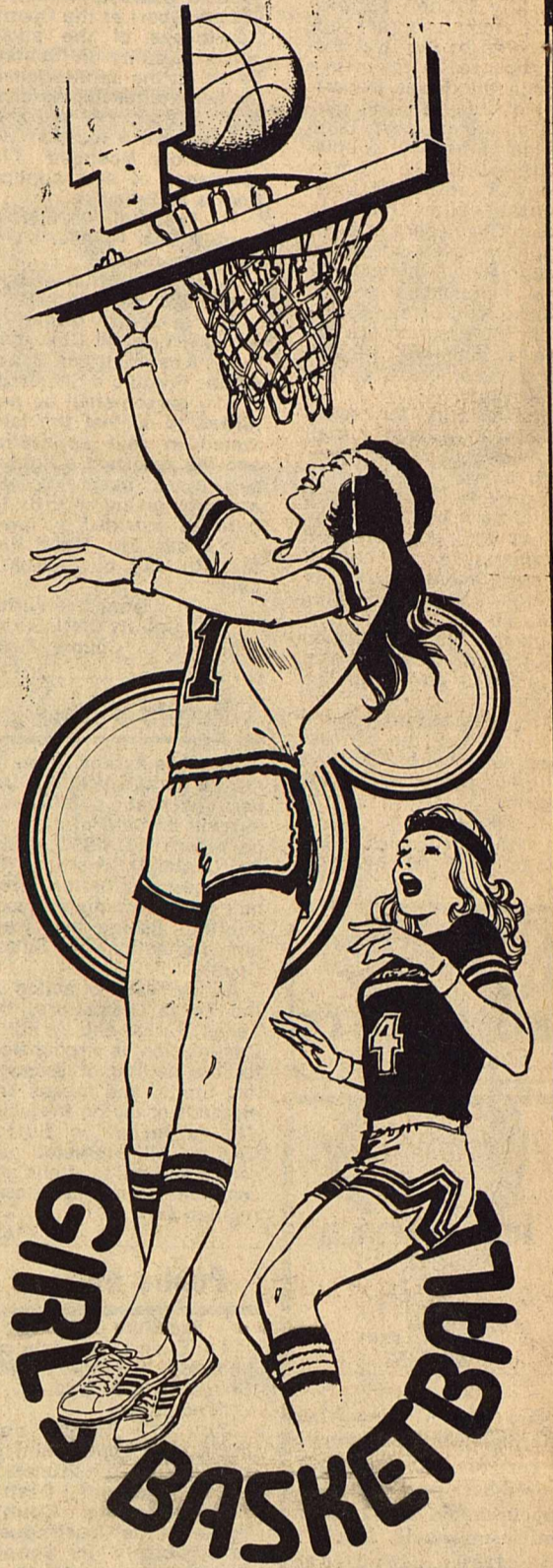
fense held, keeping them very much in command of the game.
